M'CULLOCH COUNTY TEACHERS ORGANIZE ASSOCIATION LAST WEEK

ALSO COMPLETED ORGANIZATION OF INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE WITH EVERY SCHOOL IN COUNTY A MEMBER—BASKET BALL SCHEDULE COMPLETED.

Declaring the teachers institute held in Brownwood the past week as one of the best meetings ever had, W. M. Deans, McCulloch county superintendent voiced the unanimous verdict of all McCulloch county teachers. A splendid school spirit, fostered by the college atmosphere, aided in making the institute, in which the teachers of five counties were joined, the great success it was, and there was no question but what it was worth the money for any school to have had its teachers in attendance upon the institute. The citizens of Brownwood showed the visiting teachers every courtesy and attention, entertaining them at every opportunity, giving receptions for them, and treating them royally. No concert of action was had in the matter of organizing the institute permanently, although general sentiment favored Brownwood as the place for holding the joint institutes.

Taking advantage of the fact that president of the organization, and all the McCulloch county teachers other officers are to be elected at the time of holding the first meeting of the organization. In taking this forward step, Mr. Deans was actuated by a desire to have a strong educational organization in the county, which, through occasional meetings and entertainments, might foster a better school spirit throughout the county, and as well aid the teachers in their work and bring them in closer relationship, one with another.

First Association Program October 29. The first program of the McCulloch County Teachers association is to be given Saturday afternoon, October 29th, at 2:00 o'clock at the Methodist church in Brady. Every citizen is invited to attend this meeting and the presence of all district trustees is especially urged. The program will be as follows: Opening Address...Erie D. Roberson "Shall We Have Monitors?"...Perry T. Brown Piano Solo...Miss Nella Mae Beakley Reading...Lohn Expression Teacher Impromptu Debate, Limit, Five Minutes: Affirmative, J. M. Young, Miss Ina Wolfenberger; Negative, J. D. Conner, Miss Knola King. "How Would You Create An Athletic Spirit in School".....W. A. Hall Address.....J. B. Smith "Late Rulings of the State Superintendent".....W. M. Deans Business Session.

In speaking of the county association, Mr. Deans stated that he hoped to include the Brady teachers in that body, for while their work was, to some extent, different, yet their interests and those of the county teachers were mutual enough that both could derive great good out of such an association. Interscholastic League Organized. Another important accomplishment at the Brownwood institute was the organization of the McCulloch County Interscholastic league, with every school in the county a member. J. B. Matlock, superintendent of the Pear Valley schools, will again head the league as director general. The program of events for the various schools of the county is already being worked out, and the basket ball schedule has already been completed. The basket ball games will begin November 15th. Mr. Deans is expecting to have all the finals held in Brady.

Referring again to the matter of a permanent institute, Mr. Deans said that the San Saba teachers voted 62 for Brownwood and 6 for Brady. No vote of the McCulloch county teachers was taken, although sentiment strongly favored Brownwood. There are a number of reasons for this, among others being the fact that many of the teachers in this county were students of Howard Payne and of Daniel Baker and are naturally inclined towards Brownwood. Then with the college atmosphere and royal entertainment given the teachers, it was natural that they should want to return to that city again to enjoy the many advantages that city has to offer. Still another feature of the Brownwood meeting was the fact that a meeting for the county superintendents was held. Such a meeting is impractical in Brady by reason of the fact that some of the neighboring counties do not have county superintendents, the county judge being ex-officio superintendent of schools, and therefore not as vitally interested in the schools as a county superintendent. Taking all these things into consideration, it is more than likely that next year's institute will again be held in Brownwood, for while the expenses there were somewhat greater, the teachers appeared, to feel that they derived greater general benefit. AMERICAN LEGION ORGANIZES HERE FRIDAY NIGHT—LUNCHEON PLANNED

EX-SERVICE MEN PLAN ROUSING MEETING OF CITIZENS TO AID IN ESTABLISHING POST IN McCULLOCH COUNTY—WILL SERVE REFRESHMENTS.

The plans for organizing a local American Legion Post, as now completed, call for a luncheon at the Odd Fellows Hall Friday night, instead of the mass meeting at the courthouse as at first planned. Also the election of permanent officers and the performing of all ceremonies will be completed at the initial meeting. Ex-service men from every point in McCulloch county are expected to be present and take part in the meeting, as this is to be a county organization, and every World War veteran is wanted as a member. Every citizen is invited to be out and help put pep into the meeting as well. John R. Lapp Post of Eden will be in attendance and perform all the ceremonies.

The meeting will be called to order at Odd Fellows Hall promptly at 7:30 o'clock Friday night, at which time the luncheon is to be served all present. Following the luncheon there will be a number of addresses, chief among the speakers of the evening being County Judge Evans Adkins, a former-service man. The election of officers will follow, the following places being filled: Post Commander; Vice-Post Commander; Post Adjutant; Post Finance Officer; Post Historian. Following the election of the officers, the same will be installed with due ceremony by John R. Lapp Post of Eden. That interest in the new post is widespread among the ex-service men of the county is manifested by assurance of a full attendance from all parts of the county. The Brady Chamber of Commerce has added its endorsement of the establishment of a Legion Post in the county, and will lend its influence to the move. Likewise the citizenship of Brady and of the entire county is enthusiastically in favor of the move. CONCHO COUNTY MURDER TRIAL TO BROWN CO.

The grand jury at Paint Rock Wednesday morning returned an indictment against Sheriff Bob Miller of Concho county, charging him with the murder of Tom Bengé. Judge J. O. Woodward immediately transferred, on his own motion, the case to Brownwood, and set the date of the trial for December 5th. Mr. Miller was placed under \$7,000 bond.

Due to the notoriety which has been given the case on account of the trouble of long standing between Miller and Bengé, it was predicted that the court would experience trouble in getting a jury in Concho county, and it was expected that the case would be transferred to some other county.

Miller shot Bengé in the town of Eden on Sept. 17th, the killing taking place on the business streets of that town and was the culmination of trouble between Miller and Bengé, which was made more serious when Bengé last spring shot and killed Mil-

FRISCO MAKING FASTER TIME FT. WORTH TO BRADY

The Frisco railway last Sunday morning at 12:01 o'clock put into effect a faster operating schedule between Fort Worth and Brady and vice versa, which, in effect, enables a saving of better than one hour's time to travelers between these points. Leaving Fort Worth, the train gets a 25-minute later start, and yet arrives in Brady forty minutes earlier than heretofore. Returning to Fort Worth, the train departs from Brady twenty minutes behind the former schedule, and reaches Fort Worth fifteen minutes sooner than heretofore. Needless to say, the new schedule meets with popular approval.

JOHN R. WINSTEAD LOSES GROCERY STORE BY FIRE AT ELIASVILLE THURSDAY

The many friends of John R. Winstead, former Waldrup merchant and long-time resident of McCulloch county, will regret to learn that his grocery store at Eliasville, Texas, was completely destroyed by fire last Thursday morning. The fire originated on the second floor of the Young County Furniture and Hardware Store, and swept the entire town, causing damage estimated around half-million dollars. Two banks, hotel and five residents were all that escaped the flames. Graham as Breckenridge sent their fire-fighting apparatus over to assist in fighting the fire. Newspaper reports say they was very little insurance carried, the rate being very high on account of the town not having any fire-fighting equipment.

Mr. Winstead established at Eliasville last year, the town being flourishing oil boom town. When the oil boom subsided, however, the citizens took up other endeavors and the town continued to prosper. Mr. Winstead doing a very satisfactory business. As showing the spirit of the citizens, many of the forty individual firms that had been burned out, had reopened for business temporary quarters before the town went down. In the meantime the council passed an ordinance calling for fireproof structures to replace the burned buildings.
