### BRADY AND SOUTH McCULLOCH GET SOAKING RAINS

The Brady vicinity and all of the Southern half of McCulloch county were included in a soaking rain which fell Tuesday night. In Brady, the rain totaled close to 1 1/2 inches, while in the South part of the county it was heavier. At Calf Creek, 5 inches of precipitation is reported. The rain extended on down into Mason county and was very heavy in Menard county, the San Saba river being reported on an 18 to 20 ft. rise at Hext. Telephone reports indicate only a good shower in San Saba county, although the creeks were said to be running. North the rain extended out into Cow Gap, but at Lohn, Pear Valley, Fife and Waldrip, and on into Coleman and Runnels county, only a shower is reported, and at best a half-inch of precipitation. In fact, Mercury is reported about the only point north that received any great amount of rain Tuesday night.

Wednesday another slow shower fell in Brady, amounting to .4 of an inch. The rain gauge at the Commercial National bank records the precipitation the past week as follows:

### OFFICERS STILL GATHER IN STOLEN AUTOMOBILES—VISIT HERE FIRST OF WEEK.

Still camping on the trail of stolen automobiles, a party of officers visited Brady Tuesday. Included in the party were Sheriff Bob Miller of Concho and Sheriff J. P. Flynt of Runnels county, and Duke Carver, city detective of San Antonio. Accompanying them was C. E. DeWitt of Dallas, representing the Auto Underwriters of America, with headquarters at San Antonio. Mr. DeWitt stated that his company in a period of three months, lost a total of 24 cars on which they carried insurance, and so far he had succeeded in recovering six of the number. He spoke very highly of the efforts of Sheriff Flynt in getting on the trail of stolen autos, saying he had made the best record of any officer he (DeWitt) had ever known. Mr. Flynt recovered a total of fifteen cars in two weeks time, all of the number being new Fords.

Rex Lewis, indicted with others of the alleged auto thieving gang, is spending the week with his family here while at Liberty under bond. Lewis has been indicted upon a total of six counts so far—three at Belton and three at Waco. He is to stand trial at Belton next week.

### ROY IKNER FREED NEGRO BURGLAR GETS TWO YEARS

"Not guilty," was the verdict returned to district court yesterday morning by the jury which tried Roy Ikner, colored, on a charge of murdering Bryant Wellington, also colored. Ikner, who had been held in jail without bond ever since the fatal shooting over a year ago, left the court room a free man.

The trial was carried through with dispatch. It was called by Judge Woodward at the opening of this week's session of court, Monday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. A special venire of 112 men was used to secure the jury, and the jury was completed by 10:30 o'clock Tuesday morning. All evidence was in by Tuesday night, and Wednesday morning was taken up with arguments of the counsels for State and defense, the case going to the jury at noon Wednesday. The jury's verdict was returned at the opening of court yesterday morning.

R. A. Johnson, colored, was tried on a charge of burglarizing Roy Wyres store at Cow Creek, his case coming up Wednesday afternoon, following the turning of the Ikner case over to the jury. Johnson entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

Motion for new trial in the case of J. M. Radford vs. H. Wilensky, suit on contract, was granted, and the case continued to next term of court.

In the case of State vs. Wilber Liverman, charged with theft over the value of \$50, and in which the jury returned a verdict against the defendant and gave him a sentence of 30 days in jail, motion for new trial was granted. On motion of the district attorney, the charge was dismissed, the evidence being held insufficient to warrant conviction in a new trial.

Lonnie Roberts vs. Jewel Roberts; judgment for plaintiff.

Jesse Wallace vs. Matthealay Wallace; judgment for plaintiff.

My opponent has repeatedly appealed to the ladies, as well as men, for their support and I am creditably informed he has on more than one occasion declared his opposition to woman suffrage; and I declare my loyalty to it and plead guilty to having supported one lady, and retain the right to support others. If elected, I shall ever try to serve the people faithfully, courteously and efficiently.

### GOVERNMENT TO STOCK CLUB LAKE WITH GAME FISH

Judge J. E. Shropshire, and all members of the Shropshire Lake club, as well, are wearing broad smiles this week, because of the big lake formed at the dam by the rainfall of Tuesday night. Henry Spivey, manager of the Shropshire ranch, reported about twenty acres being covered with water, and the lake having about 16 ft. of water at the bar pit. The top of the big dam stands about 25 ft. above the bar pit, and when filled, the lake will cover between 50 and 60 acres, and have a shore line approximately 1 1/2 miles in length.

Some months ago, Judge Shropshire took up with the government fish hatchery at San Marcos, the matter of stocking the lake and was assured that the fish would be sent whenever ordered, and that a man would be sent with the fish to care for them and place them in the lake. The fish were wired for yesterday. Incidentally, Messrs. Edd and Howard Broad put in application for fish to stock the lake they have on their ranch.

The dam at the Shropshire Lake Club site was built last summer, and has been dry as a bone ever since. The members of the club have endured much good-natured chafing upon the subject, but it is now their time to smile.

## TO THE VOTERS OF BRADY

On account of being lame from rheumatism, and having to devote my time as clerk for Mr. Knox in order to make a living, I have been unable to meet all of you personally; therefore, I am taking this method of again asking you for your vote and influence in my behalf for the office of city secretary in the election to be held on the 4th day of April. His record was too long or his card too small to give a full statement, however, the lack of a full statement is sometimes misleading. I mean no reflection on my opponent, he is a good man, but he should remember that the people of Brady know something about the city taxes, and they also know that should he pass away before the coming election, they would still be able to find a man who could fill the office of city secretary and could show a record after two years that would compare with his own.

As stated on another occasion, if I am elected, I will, with the permission of the council, keep you informed on the financial condition of the city by giving you a quarterly report. In conclusion, I assure you that if elected, I will use my best efforts to merit your confidence in me, and further assure you that I will give you no reasons to ever regret having voted for me. I am a poor man and need the office. I know that I am competent to meet and discharge the duties of the office and if elected, I shall follow and be guided by the principles of duty, efficiency and courtesy.

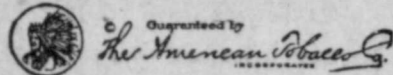

Mr. Beasley has had the subject under consideration for some time, and has rather left the matter up to his friends, he states, telling them he would not go back on them if they wanted him to stand for re-election.

According to the re-districting act, Lampasas is included with McCulloch and San Saba counties, making the 93rd district. On account of Swisher county being left entirely out in the re-districting of the state, it is very likely that the act will not stand, in which event, the old 114th district, composed of McCulloch and San Saba counties, will choose their representative.

Mr. Beasley has made an enviable record in the state legislature. Among other good legislation, he was author of the tick eradication bill, which has done so much for the cattle interests in this section. He was an ardent supporter of State-Wide Prohibition and Women's Suffrage, both of which have become realities. The past term he has been chairman of the Commission on Banks and Banking, and during his second term he was Vice-Chairman of the Appropriations committee.

Mr. Beasley will, in all probability, have a statement to make to voters at some future date.

**LOCAL BRIEFS.**

J. S. Abernathy returned latter part of last week from Pioneer, the new oil town in Eastland county, where he has been dealing in oil leases. Seth says he never saw such a boom town in all his life. In the few weeks of his stay there, the town had grown from a place of only a couple dozen shacks, to over a hundred business houses, and business in every line was booming.

Judge W. J. Cunningham of Taylor county was in Brady last Saturday for a brief visit, while on his return to Abilene. Mr. Cunningham is now serving as district attorney, but has ambition to be sent to Congress from the 17th district, and expects to visit in McCulloch county later and present his candidacy to the people. Judge Cunningham is a most pleasant and affable man, and made friends readily with the citizens with whom he met.

Commissioner Chas. Samuelson is having some commendable work done in the smoothing out of the sharp turn on the Brady-Coleman road just beyond the bridge over Brady creek. The turn is being widened by taking in a strip of land off T. J. Wood's place, and the stretch is being graveled from the bridge to the top of the hill. Some difficulty is being experienced in getting gravel, several of the gravel pits that have been opened, playing out after but little working.

Kirby Huffman Monday was exhibiting some specimens of ore taken from a water well being drilled by Harvey Martin on his place, about four miles north of Brady on the Brownwood road. The ore appears identical with that found in the well being drilled by Curtis & Ellenwood on the Frank Wilhelm place, and is thought to contain silver and copper ore. The ore was first encountered between 125 and 130 ft. depth and a thirty or forty foot strata was drilled through.

Jim Matthews in Brady and Joe Matthews on the ranch at Peg Leg, spent some anxious hours during the big rain Tuesday night and Wednesday morning. About 75 head of goats and 185 head of sheep had been cut off on an island by the rising waters of the San Saba, which came down on an 18 to 20-ft. rise following a two-inch rain there. With the help of neighbors, Joe succeeded in hauling 50 head over to the mainland, when they were compelled to cease on account of the rising waters. The river kept rising until noon Wednesday, when it again began falling. This is the third time in ten years the Matthews Bros. have been at Peg Leg that the water has risen sufficiently to cut off this neck of land from the mainland.

One of the most awesome displays of lightning recorded in many a day, accompanied the rain storm which visited this section Tuesday night. Apparently two big rain clouds met, and the accompanying electrical display resembled artillery barrage laid down between two front line trenches. At about 1:00 o'clock a. m., a bolt of lightning struck the small garage at the A. J. Ricks' residence, near the standpipe, scooping an armful of shingles out of the roof, and smashing one of the rafters into splinters. Following the telephone wire to the corner of the house, the bolt jumped sideways to where two nails driven in the weatherboarding acted as conductors, through which the bolt entered the bed room where Glenn Ricks was sleeping. Glenn says it looked to him like two balls of fire leaped from the wall clear across his bed, which was set in the middle of the room. The stroke set the wall paper on fire, which, however, was extinguished without assistance by Glenn, and without damage of great consequence. A dangling clothes wire presumably grounded the lightning bolt, and in all likelihood, prevented more serious damage resulting.
