## NEW BUSINESS BLOCK PROMISED EARLY NEXT YEAR

Another modern and attractive business block is assured Brady in the co-operative movement of Messrs. Jordan & Wood, Crothers & Hallum and J. C. Wall to improve their properties on North Bridge street. According to these gentlemen, they expect to let a contract early in January for a modern structure of brick and plate glass, and which will adorn the site of the buildings at present occupied by the Express office, the Jordan & Wood grocery, the Wegner Meat market and the Davis Auto Top shop. The Express office, owned by Mr. Wall, has a frontage of 25 ft., Jordan & Wood grocery store, 35 ft., and the Crothers & Hallum building, 30 ft. In the plans for the new block, Mr. Wall would obtain 5 ft. off the Jordan & Wood property, making three store buildings of uniformly 30-ft. width. The property extends 95 ft., in depth.

Needless to say, the new building will constitute one of the most attractive in the city, and the gentlemen interested in its construction are to be highly complimented upon their progressive move.

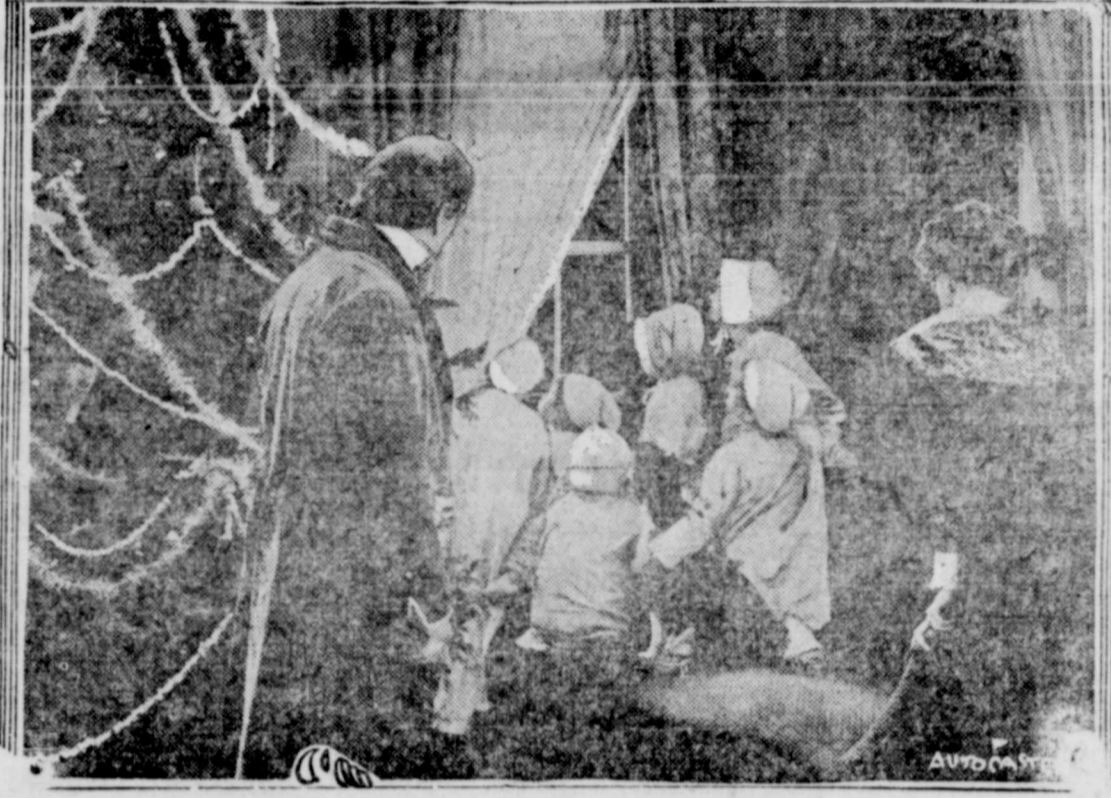

Perhaps an item of interest would be mention of the names of a few of the real pioneer families who were in this country when I came. On Coal Creek were the Wyckoff family and the Bauman's. On Field Creek were the Akes Achers and Jesse Wallace. On the San Fernando were Uncle Ben Willis and his family. On Deer Creek were Grandma Crouch and her sons-in-law, Jack Latham and Lawrence Hayes and his brother, Parks Hayes. Also on Hinton Creek was a Mr. Hinton. I believe they called him "Uncle Billie" Hinton. And on the head of Lost Creek was Uncle Dick Barton and the spring where he located is called "The Barton Spring." Further down on Lost Creek at a spring that takes its name from him was Autney Conner. At the mouth of Waterhole Creek a mile from Dan Wills' was Noah Taylor. And near the mouth of Tiger Creek was Meredith Spiller and his family. Across the San Saba above the mouth of Lost Creek at the Blair Spring was a Mr. Blair. On the river at the next ranch above was Uncle Nelson Willis and his family. Across the river from the Willis ranch, on the south side were located Jack and Cal Davis and below them was Mr. Farmer. While the next pioneer families up the San Saba were the Millers and John Andrews, of whom we have already spoken in a previous article, and who saw real Indian warfare. Where Fredonia now stands was A. J. Williams and family. Nearly all of these early pioneer families raised large families of children who married and settled around them. "O. I. C." "RIGHT."

## \$450,000 ROAD BOND ISSUE ELECTION BEFORE VOTERS DECEMBER 28

CITIZENS OF ROAD DISTRICT NO. ONE TO DECIDE MOST IMPORTANT ISSUE NEXT THURSDAY WITH EVERY INDICATION OF CARRYING OVERWHELMINGLY.

The citizenship of the recently created Road District No. 1, extending through McCulloch from the Mason county line to the Concho county line, will on next Thursday decide a most important issue, viz: the issuing of \$450,000 worth of bonds for the purpose of building of permanent highways in this district. Every indication points to the carrying of the issue by an overwhelming majority. The proposition, as outlined in the petition presented to the Commissioners court, and which resulted in the calling of the election, embodies plans for road building which meet, in every respect, the requirements of the State Highway commission, and which will, therefore, enable the Road District No. 1 to secure Federal aid to the amount of 50% on the project.

That the road bond issue is viewed with general favor is evidenced by the fact that the petition presented the Commissioners court carried the signatures of 596 voters who not only favored the issue, but who, in signing the petition, pledged themselves to vote for and support the proposition. Additional signatures secured give a total number of 800 pledged supporters of the issue, thus assuring virtually 90% of the qualified voters already pledged to vote for the issue.

Further than that, an analysis of the county-wide issue voted upon just a year ago, shows that the vote cast in the present new Road District No. 1 only lacked 7 of giving the county-wide proposition a two-thirds majority. In other words, a gain of seven votes over that given in favor of good roads a year ago, will carry the present proposition in Road District

No. 1. This statement can be verified by the following figures, taken from the official count of a year ago, the boxes named being those which are included in Road District No. 1:

There is no question but what those who favored the good roads issue a year ago, are even more strongly in favor of the present road bond issue, and, in addition, there are several hundred voters who were not in favor of the county-wide issue, who will vote favorably to the present issue. Those facts make certain the carrying of the election by much

greater than the required two-thirds majority.

The question of eligibility to vote may be simply stated, viz: all property tax payers residing within Road District No. 1 are entitled to vote. This means that anyone who pays tax on anything, above a poll tax, is entitled to vote in next Thursday's election. Women are equally eligible with the men, providing they hold a poll tax receipt.

The Standard places itself on record as unqualifiedly endorsing the road bond issue, and hopes to see the election carried by fully a 90% vote, which may reasonably be expected. Should the issue carry, we feel that when the wonderful benefits of a first-class highway through the county are fully realized by actual experience, every district in the county will speedily fall in line and vote bonds for the improvement of the roads traversing their own territory.

## BRADY'S "WHITE WAY" WILL OPEN SATURDAY NIGHT

Saturday night Brady will inaugurate her long anticipated "White Way," and incidentally will begin the illumination of three of her principal residential thoroughfares. The cable, which has been delayed in arrival for the past couple months, was received the first of the week, and W. O. Kirchner, superintendent of the Brady Water & Light works, has had a force of workmen engaged the past several days in laying the same, and in making connections with the switch at the light plant and also with the various ornamental light posts, the cable being laid underground. Finishing touches are now being put on this work, and by tomorrow night everything will be in readiness to turn the lights on.

The initial illumination of the city will constitute one of the most progressive steps the city has ever taken. The down-town illumination, in conjunction with the illumination of the courtyard plaza, will give Brady the most attractive "white way" of any city in West Texas.

The equipment includes twelve ornamental lighting standards, six of which are placed at the street intersections on the public square, while the remaining six are placed about the business district—one at the O. D. Mann & Sons street intersection, the second at the Radford Grocery Co. corner, and the remaining four at the street intersections, on North Bridge street, at corners of the Brady Auto Co., the old Waterworks plant, the street leading to the ice plant and the Walker-Smith corner. All these lighting standards will be surmounted by ornamental frosted globes, making for most attractive illumination. In addition, there will be 30 hooded street lights at each street intersection on South Blackburn street beginning at South Second street and running to South Eighth street, or the corner of the O. S. Macy residence; also on North Bridge street from the H. H. Sessions residence to the city limits, and on West Commerce street from the public square to the Tourist park. All fixtures have been in place for some time pending arrival of the cable.

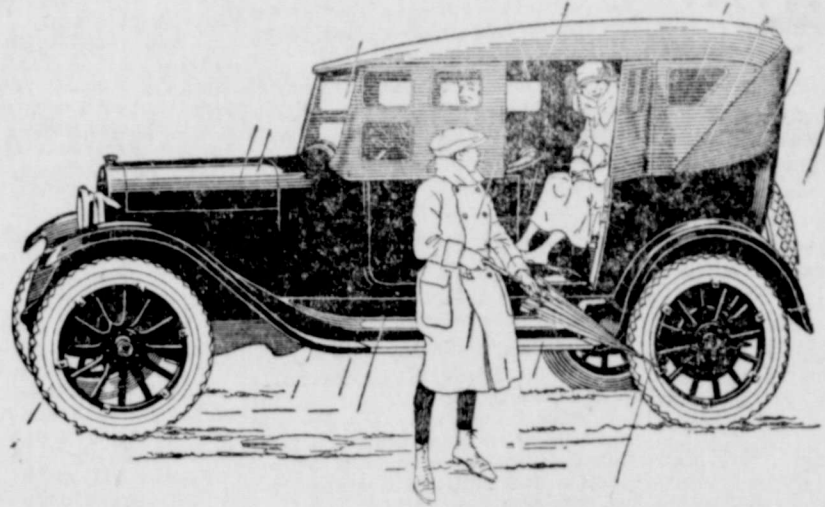
