DEATH OF CHAS. BROAD OCCURS UNEXPECTEDLY WEDNESDAY EVENING IN DALLAS

A message was received here at 6:30 o'clock Wednesday evening by Messrs. Edd and Howard Broad announcing the sudden and unexpected death of their brother, Chas. Broad, in Dallas that evening at about 5:30 o'clock.

Chas. Broad was well-known to the people of Brady and McCulloch county, having been one of the original firm of Broad Mercantile Company, and later being associated with Edd and Howard Broad in the hardware stores in Brady and at Menard.

Surviving are his widow and also his son, who were with him in Dallas; four brothers, E. J. of Fort Worth, Will of Coleman and Edd and Howard of Brady; and one sister, Mrs. Ed Jackson, of Houston, all of whom are in attendance upon the funeral.

The following account of Mr. Broad's death is reprinted from Thursday morning's Dallas News: C. C. Broad, 44 years old, a traveling salesman residing at 5502 1/2 street was fatally stricken with illness about 3:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon while on Elm street, near Stone street, in the business section of Dallas.

Later he partially revived and was taken to his home by Emergency Ambulance Driver George Hartford. Just as the ambulance reached his home death came.

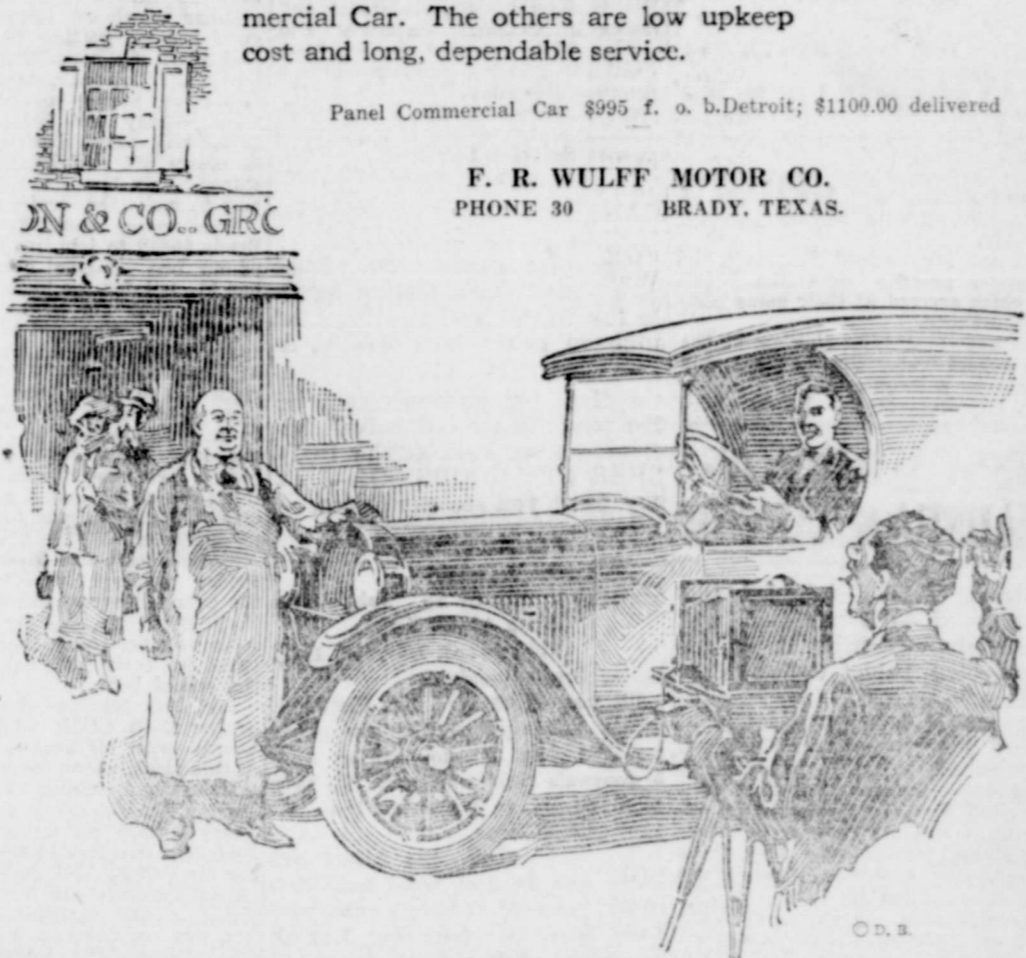
