

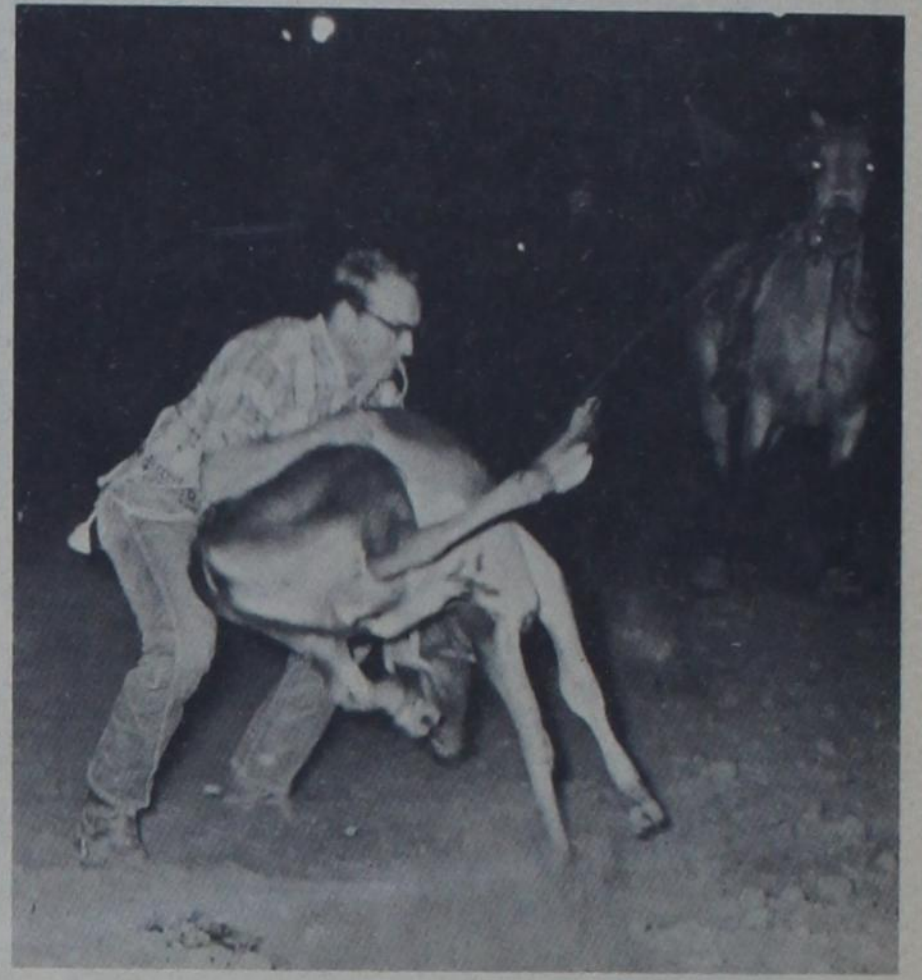

FOOD A-PLenty was available from the heavily laden tables at last Thursday's annual Old Settlers' Reunion on the courthouse square. Approximately 200, old

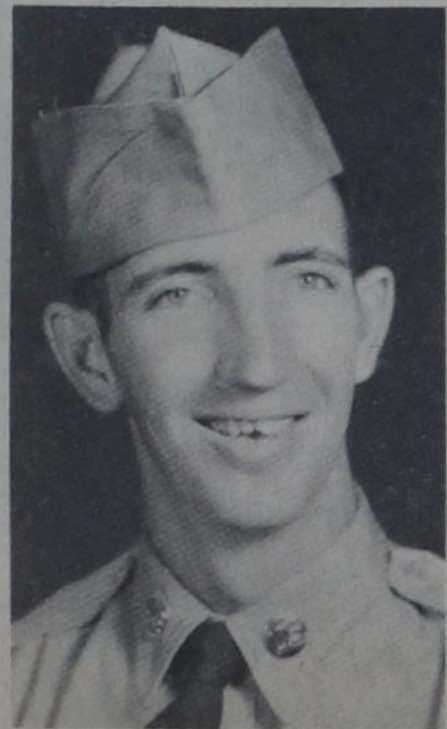
and young alike, gathered to renew old acquaintances and visit during the day. Elmer Dixon and Mrs. Dorothy Sheffy headed up the reunion.

Former Athletic Star Is Killed In Vietnam

Tragedy struck home to Dimmitt from Vietnam again last Thursday when Warrant Officer L. E. "Gene" Easley, Army helicopter pilot, was killed in action. EASLEY, 34, was a 1961 graduate of Dimmitt High School, where he rewrote record books as a track runner and football player. He was married to the former Fayrene Greathouse, also a 1961 DHS graduate, who now lives in Brady.

He died in an Army field hospital after being fatally wounded on a helicopter mission. He was flown to the hospital by his copilot and reportedly lived long enough to write his wife a final note.

FUNERAL services were conducted Monday at 2 p.m. in the First Baptist Church of Brady. Military graveside rites followed at Brady Cemetery.

Besides his wife, Easley is survived by his two sons, Mike, 14, and Ricky, 6; and his mother and adoptive father, Mr. and Mrs. Cliff Easley of Amarillo.

He was the second Dimmitt man to be killed in action in the Southeast Asian conflict. George Wall, 22, died less than four weeks ago aboard the carrier USS Forrestal.

A career Army man, Easley was a member of the 282nd Aviation Co. and piloted the huge UH-1B and UH-1D "Huey" helicopters. He was reportedly due to return home from Vietnam within two months after a year's tour of duty there.

DURING HIS high school days

he anchored the mile relay team that set a new state record that year. He also placed second in the state in the 440-yard dash and fourth in the 100. He later participated in track at Wayland Baptist College.

IN ADDITION to gaining fame as an athlete here, he was well known as a singer. His deep bass voice was a mainstay in the DHS Mixed Chorus and Boys' Choir and he teamed with Dr. Bill Murphy, Jesse Burch and Don Nelson to make up the Bobcat Quartet, which performed throughout the Panhandle for three years.

Easley had been in the Army nine years and intended to be a 20-year career man.

IN A LETTER to a former classmate recently, he commented, "Vietnam has been quite a challenge to me. I don't like being at war, but my job is so interesting that time hardly permits fear to enter in the picture. . . I can definitely see the need for being over here, because these people need and want help and have the potential to be powerful and necessary allies. Remember how you always hated to be backed up against our goal line? Well, we are over here keeping the goal line from having US grass growing on it."

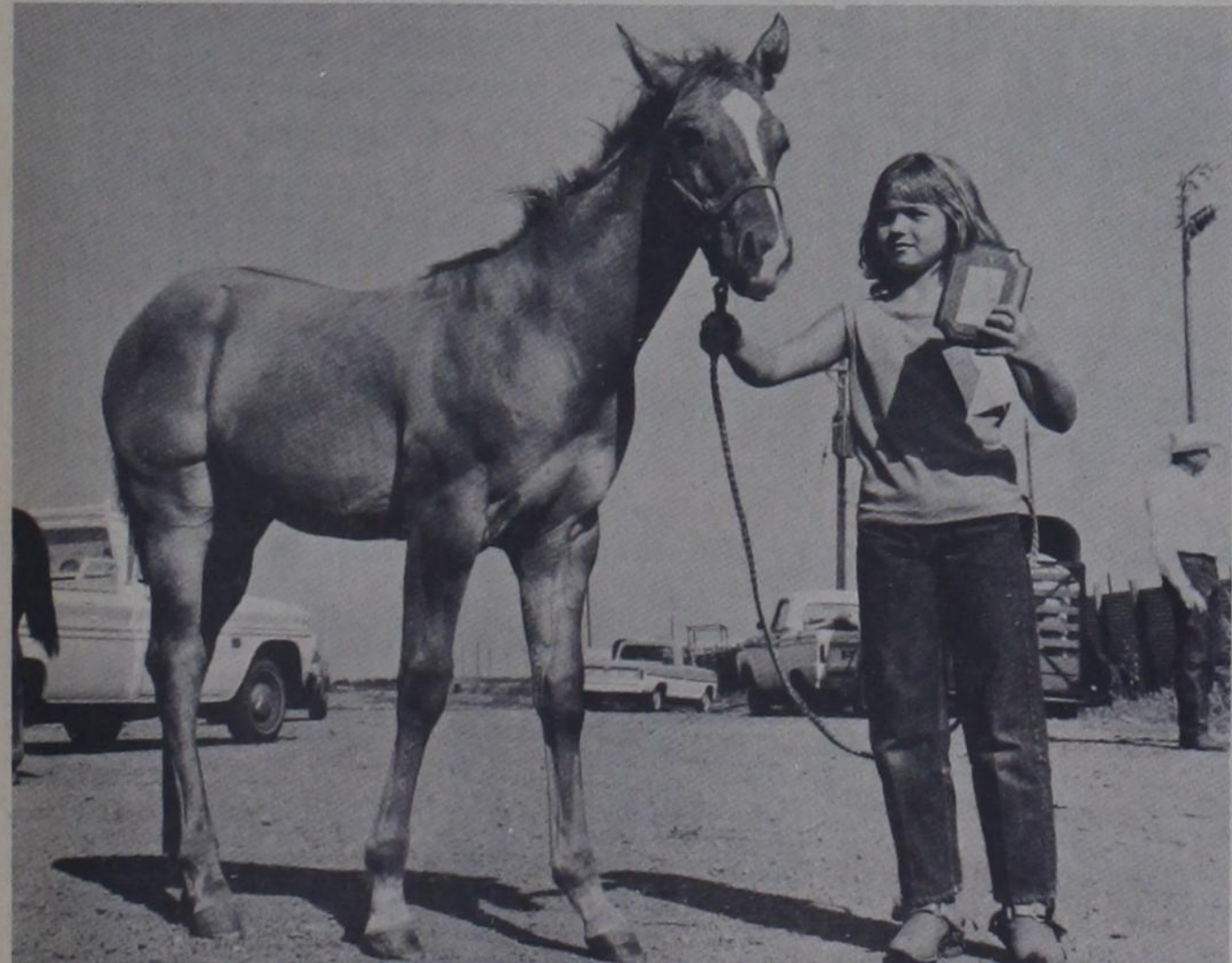

Airport Gets \$43,569 More

The City of Dimmitt has \$43,569 more for airport construction today than it had a week ago.

HIKES IN allocations by both federal and state aviation authorities have boosted the airport budget by 22 percent, to \$239,569. The Federal Aviation Agency Friday not only approved matching funds for the airport improvement project, but boosted the federal share from the requested \$95,431 to an even \$120,000, an increase of \$23,569.

AND City Manager E. B. Noble said this week that he had been notified that the Texas Aeronautics Commission has approved a

\$20,000 state grant to help the project along.

"I had a phone call from director of the commission, informing us of the state grant approval," Noble said, "but we've had nothing in writing yet."

AIRPORT boosters here have held on to cautious hope for state funds being approved for the Dimmitt Airport project, since so many small cities had applied for the limited funds and the state has established a policy of concentrating its aid on larger airports.

But the \$20,000 from the state and the extra \$23,569 from the FAA will give the city more "breathing room" in planning and constructing a modern airport here.

The original airport budget was \$195,431, with \$100,000 to be raised by city bond issue and the balance to be allocated by the FAA.

Dimmitt voters overwhelmingly approved their share of the cost last March, 470-102, and city commissioners said they would not need to raise taxes to pay off the bonds.

PROMPTING the FFA fund hike, apparently, were the bid amounts received on the airport project. The city commission received three bids July 17 and forwarded them to FAA officials

in Albuquerque for study, and Friday's fund increase in Washington was the first FAA action on the project since that time.

Approval of a bid by the FAA is expected at any time, Noble

Congressman Bob Price's office notified the News by telegram Friday:

"**ADVISED** today by Federal Aviation Agency that Dimmitt Airport Improvement Program has reached grant offer stage and based on bids received and increased land costs, federal share has been increased by \$23,569, bringing total allocation to

\$120,000.

Sen. John Tower announced the allocation hike in a similar telegram, but didn't bring up the subject of bid amounts or land cost. Sen. Tower cabled:

"**FAA** has allocated \$96,431 to Dimmitt Airport under Federal Aid to Airports Program for 1967. Need for additional funds has caused FAA to authorize increase of \$23,569, making total \$120,000."

Rec Center Dues Will Begin Early

Construction on the Castro County Recreation Center's clubhouse is expected to start within two weeks.

HOWEVER, members of the association will begin paying their monthly dues before then.

A few members are complaining about having to pay dues during the construction stage, but Dr. James Wohlgenuth, association president, said, "Most of them seem to understand the situation."

In a letter to members earlier this month, Dr. Wohlgenuth and Secretary-Treasurer Gerald Harden said, "The first payment . . . will be interest only which is due Jan. 1, 1968, so we feel that beginning of the \$10 monthly dues on Sept. 1, 1967, will provide use with sufficient funds to meet our first payment."

IN THE SAME letter, the board announced that those selling their memberships will be subject to a \$25 transfer charge.

"This has been necessitated because of the expense involved in effecting transfers," the letter said.

Approximately 12 of the 300 original charter members have transferred their memberships.

Most of these were members who have moved out of town, Dr. Wohlgenuth said.

NEXT DUTIES of the board are to hire a golf pro and purchase maintenance equipment for the center.

Dr. B. H. Lee has been appointed to head the committee to interview and hire a golf pro. His committee members are H. B. Thomas, Jim Butler and R. N. Carpenter.

On the maintenance equipment committee are Bill Birdwell, chairman, James Bradford, Dale Winders, Donald Wright and Frank Wise.

THE SWIMMING pool, Dr. Wohlgenuth said, will be built just as originally planned and the separate wading pool will not be omitted, as reported in the letter to members. He said the Wichita Falls pool contractor had "cut back some prices" to bring the pool back to original specifications.

The \$165,000 construction contract on the center was awarded to Padgett Construction Co. in March, and land leveling started last month.

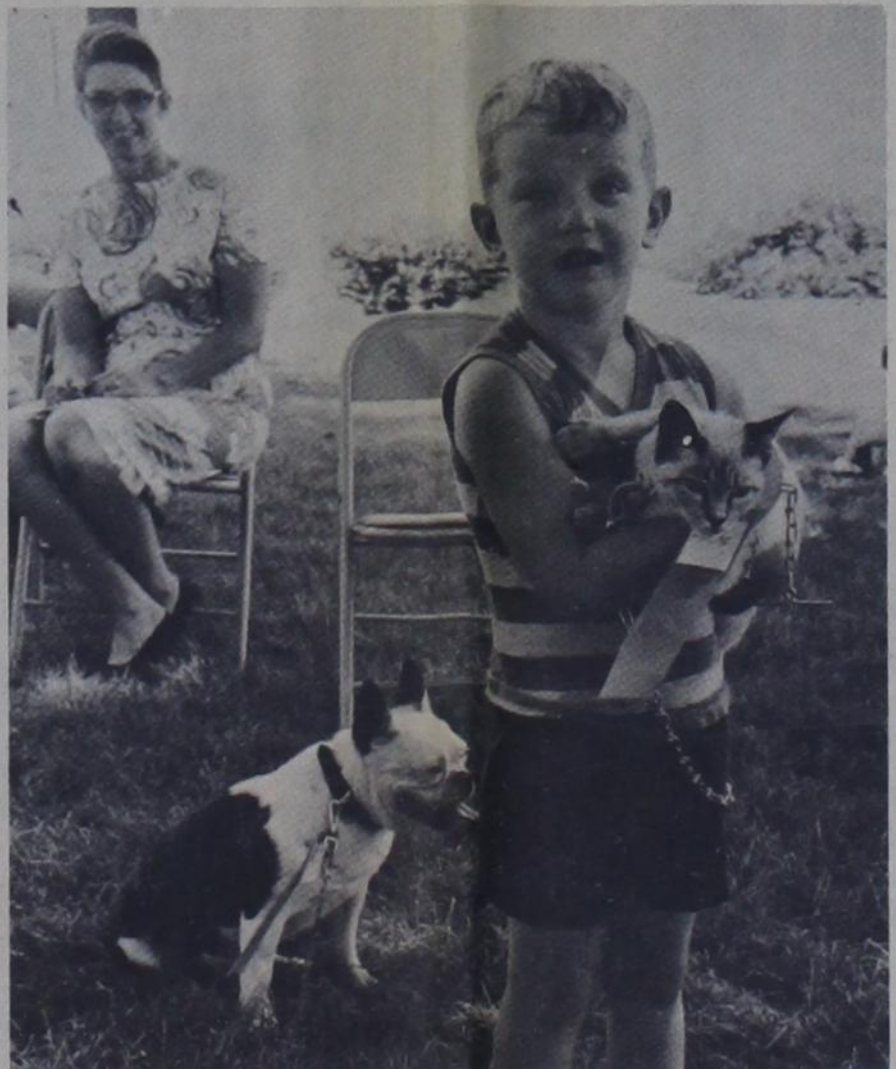

Supermarkets Show Big Changes

Today's homemaker, if transported back to the supermarket of 1957, would have difficulty filling her 1967 shopping list. Many of the items just wouldn't be there.

Mrs. Frances Reasner, foods nutrition specialist, Texas A&M University, reports that 82 percent of the frozen food items today would not be on display; 86 percent of the baking mixes would be missing, along with 66 percent of the wrapping materials and practically all of the patterned and colored papers.

HER CHILDREN would be disappointed in the elimination of 43 percent of today's cereal section

and 65 percent of the soft drinks. The household pet might even whimper when he discovered that 81 percent of today's pet foods are not available.

Progressive Grocer Magazine has reported that these changes have evolved as a result of better and more exciting packaging and entirely new products developed by manufacturer research and development, the specialist says.

But newness alone does not assure success for an item mak-

ing a debut on the supermarket's shelves. In comparison to the hundreds which survived in the past 10 years, thousands succumbed. Those which remained have the common denominator for success in careful test marketing, high quality, and elements of social research which fit the product to customer wants and needs. OTHER ITEMS are likely to fall by the wayside, also, Miss Reasner says, as more and more items are developed to fit the new mood and the new demands of changing living patterns.

I served aboard an aircraft carrier during World War II, with Admiral Halsey's famed Third Fleet, Task Force 38.

TWICE OUR carrier was engulfed in flames, and afire from bow to stern. Once, off Okinawa, after being hit by a Japanese Kamakazi (suicide plane), our carrier burned out of control for four hours, only by great effort and heroic action by the crew, was the ship saved from sinking.

In both instances, the toll in dead and wounded was staggering, and damage to the ship and planes very heavy.

Carrier duty is hazardous duty, and should be so classified by the US Navy, as are flying and submarine duty.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52e, reading as follows:

"Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hospital bills for Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November

11, 1967, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold

any other office or position of profit under this state, or the United States."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13 thereto to read as follows:

"Section 13. Notwithstanding any other section of this article, the Legislature in providing for the creation, establishment, maintenance, and operation of a hospital district, shall not be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services or mental retardation services including the operation of any community mental health centers, community mental retardation centers or community mental health and mental retardation centers which may exist or be thereafter established within the boundaries of such district, nor shall the Legislature be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility of public health department units and clinics and related public health activities or services, and the Legislature shall not be required to restrict the power of any municipality or political subdivision to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations or to expend public moneys for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities within or partly within the boundaries of any hospital district, any municipality or any other political subdivision or state-supported entity within the hospital district may participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units and clinics and related public health activities and may levy taxes, issue bonds or other obligations, and expend public moneys for such purposes as provided by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

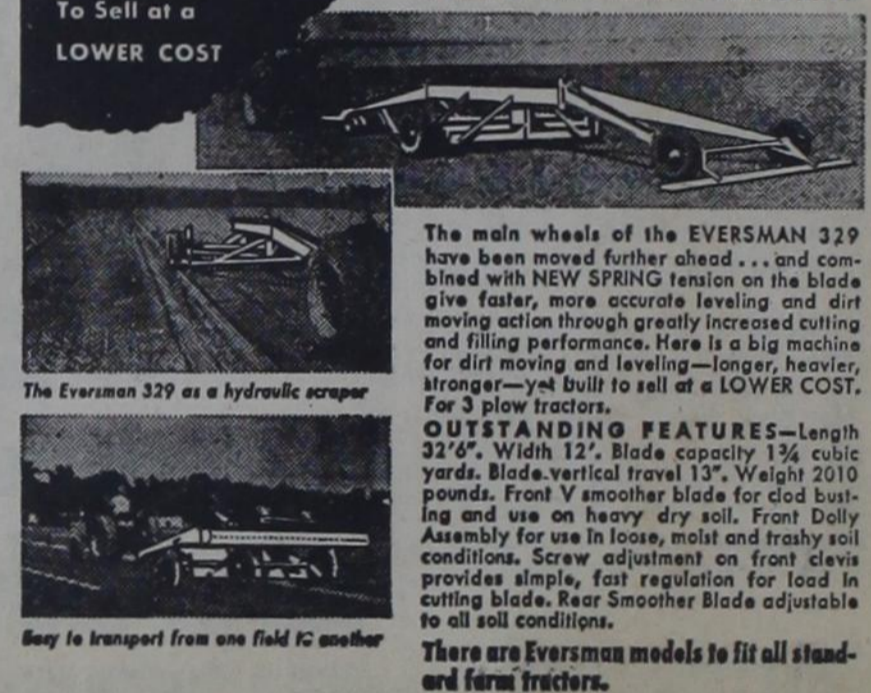

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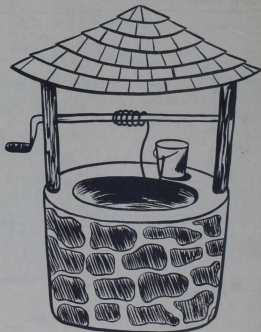

H-D Notes

4-H'ers Can Be Proud Of Their Parade Float

★ BEWARE OF instant flour. There's more in the cup than meets the eye. When baking with instant flour, take 2 level tablespoons out of each cup of flour called for by the recipe.

A full measure of instant flour in a cake or cookie recipe, designed for regular flour, may alter the shape, texture and flavor of the final product.

Instant flour is processed with steam or hot water after regular milling to make tiny granules stick together as larger particles. This takes up less space in a measuring cup. Therefore instant flour mixes more readily with water without forming lumps and

is a handy product for making gravy.

In baking, instant flour weighs more per cup and takes up liquid faster than regular flour, leaving too much flour for the dough in relation to the liquid. For example, in popovers, the batter doesn't contain enough for the product to "pop" properly.

The Agricultural Research Service suggests improving the paste and appearance of pastry by adding more fat to the dough. Some companies making instant flour suggest that extra fat be added to the product to help overcome the tendency of instant flour to soak up water.

Although a little extra fat helps, researchers warn that adding extra water to the dough is no solution. This destroys the proper balance between ingredients and tends to ruin the baked product.

★ HERE IS something about reducing that some of you maybe don't know. Potatoes aren't fattening! No food is fattening until your body's need for calories has been met. Surplus food from any source is changed to fat and stored in the body.

One medium-sized potato, five cunes, supplies 90 calories. This is about the same as a medium-sized apple, pear, grapefruit or orange, none of which is considered a high-calorie food.

Added fat and gravy, often served with potatoes, do increase the calorie count considerably. For example, fried potatoes may be two or three times as high in calories as the same weight of boiled or baked potatoes. And sour cream, butter or margarine added to the baked potato add up in the calorie category.

But, it's not the potatoes that add pounds, it's the surplus calories from other sources.

LEATHER BELTS are back on the fashion-go-round for fall, riding high, low — and even at the waist. Chief among belts are smooth, grained, waxy, harness and suede leathers. Widths vary from the skinniest strip to a fanciful five inches.

A woman can again show off her waistline, circled by one to three-inch leather belts. Grained, waxy or split cowhide styles accessorize a casual costume. The belts are brass-buckled or brightened with coins, studs and even over-sized zippers, running sideways around the waist. Also featured is the cyclist's friend with leather mini-purse clipped on.

For business wear, suede or "hair-on" calf leather belts are good. The latter is stenciled as leopard, tiger or zebra. These dress belts may sport nail-heads, leather-covered or gold buckles, bows — or even a watch that actually runs.

New hip-clinging belts accessorize perfectly with this season's popular long-torso line. These "hippies" come in narrow or wider (waist-to-hip) styles, decoratively buckled, alternating leather ovals or squares with brass links or in braided leather stripping and chain. Hip belts feature leather in the smooth, waxy and suede textures, according to the clothing specialist.

For after five, a leather cummerbund may be worn between waist and bosom. Or leather sash belts, buckled or bowed, give a feminine look.

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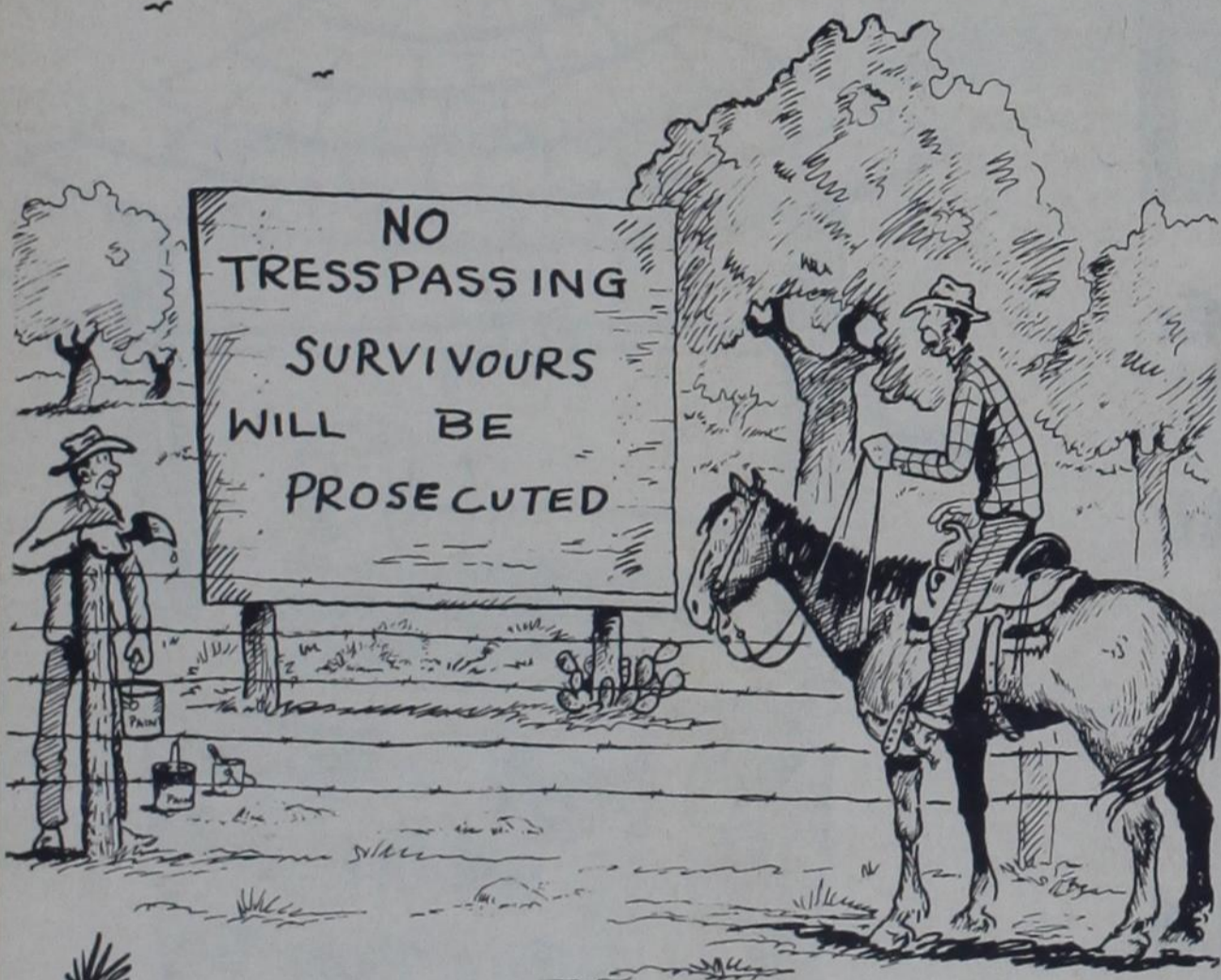

New Ground Rules for Drivers Will Go Into Effect Monday

A new set of ground rules for the state's 5 1/2 million licensed drivers will go into effect Monday when a major portion of the new traffic safety laws become effective.

AFTER MONDAY, conviction of driving while a drivers license is suspended or revoked will carry with it a jail sentence of 72 hours to six months, plus a fine of \$25 to \$500.

Motorists who do not bother to get a driver's license will be faced with fines up to \$500 plus the possibility of jail sentences ranging from 72 hours to six months for habitual violators.

New minimum driver licensing ages will also go into effect. After Monday, 18 years will be the minimum age for a regular drivers license unless an approved course of driver education has been passed by the applicant. With driver education, operators licenses can be issued at 16.

There are two exceptions to this provision. A license may be issued at 16 if an approved course of driver education is not taught

at the school regularly attended by the applicant. This exception was put into law to give the school an opportunity to offer driver education to all Texas teens, and will remain in effect until June 1, 1969. A drivers license may be issued at 15 when certain severe hardship conditions exist.

An instruction permit may be issued by the Department of Public Safety to persons 15 years of age who have satisfactorily completed the classroom phase of driver education and have passed all but the "behind the wheel" part of the driver license examination. This provision is in the law to permit the beginning driver to legally get "behind the wheel" driver training. When a driver with an instruction permit is driving, a licensed operator who is at least 21 years old must accompany and sit beside him.

The new law makes changes in other types of driver licenses. Minimum age for a commercial or chauffeur's license will be 18 unless the applicant has completed

an approved driver education course and in that case it will be 17.

Provisional drivers license will be issued to all persons under 21 years of age.

The new law permits the Department of Public Safety to have re-examined any person believed to be incapable of safely operating a motor vehicle. A drivers license may be denied to a person with a physical or mental disability, or disease, that prevents him from exercising reasonable or ordinary control over a motor vehicle. A license may not be issued to a person unable to understand highway wording or direction signs in the English language.

Whey Is Enjoying New Uses in Food

Little Miss Muffet ate the whey along with the curds, as every good nursery rhyme lover knows. And, America's homemakers may soon be feeding their families this nutrition-packed food in larger amounts.

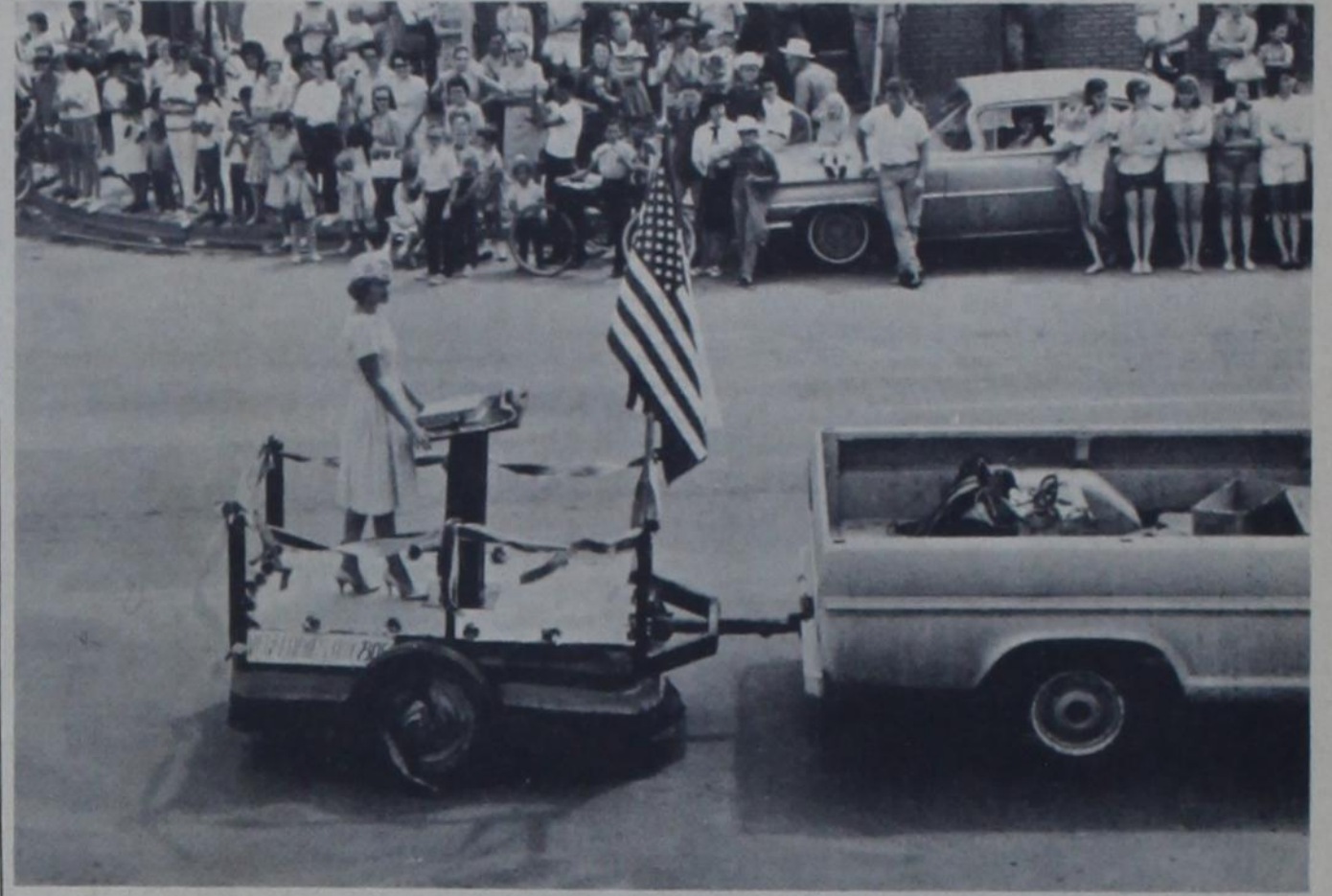
JENOYCE DOUGLAS, Extension food and nutrition specialist, Texas A&M University, reports that whey, sometimes referred to as the "ugly duckling of the dairy industry," may soon spread its wings and take flight.

Until recently, US cheesemakers have used only limited amounts of this low-cost by-product of cheese manufacturing. More than one-half of the seven billion pounds of whey was discarded. The rest was used to feed hogs, fertilize fields or dried as dried skim milk substitute.

Now, however, Miss Douglas points out, whey is being added to specialty foods. The nutritious product is being used in hot roll mixes, pop tarts, instant cheese potato bakers, frozen vegetables with cheese sauce, sour cream sauce, candy and cookies, frozen cream pies, instant western omelets, frozen fish sticks and frozen macaroni and cheese. Dried whey in enriched white bread gives the bread a golden color when toasted.

Agricultural Research Service scientists reported on the use of dried whey in ice pops. Including only 2.6 percent whey in the mix reduced acidity of the pops to a level which British researchers found effective in reducing tooth decay caused by eating the water ices.

Miss Douglas also reports that Agricultural Research Service, state and industry researchers are looking for the best ways to fit whey into the diets of children in the Far East and South America. Thus, little Miss Muffet may some day be joined by people all over the world, at least when eating her whey.

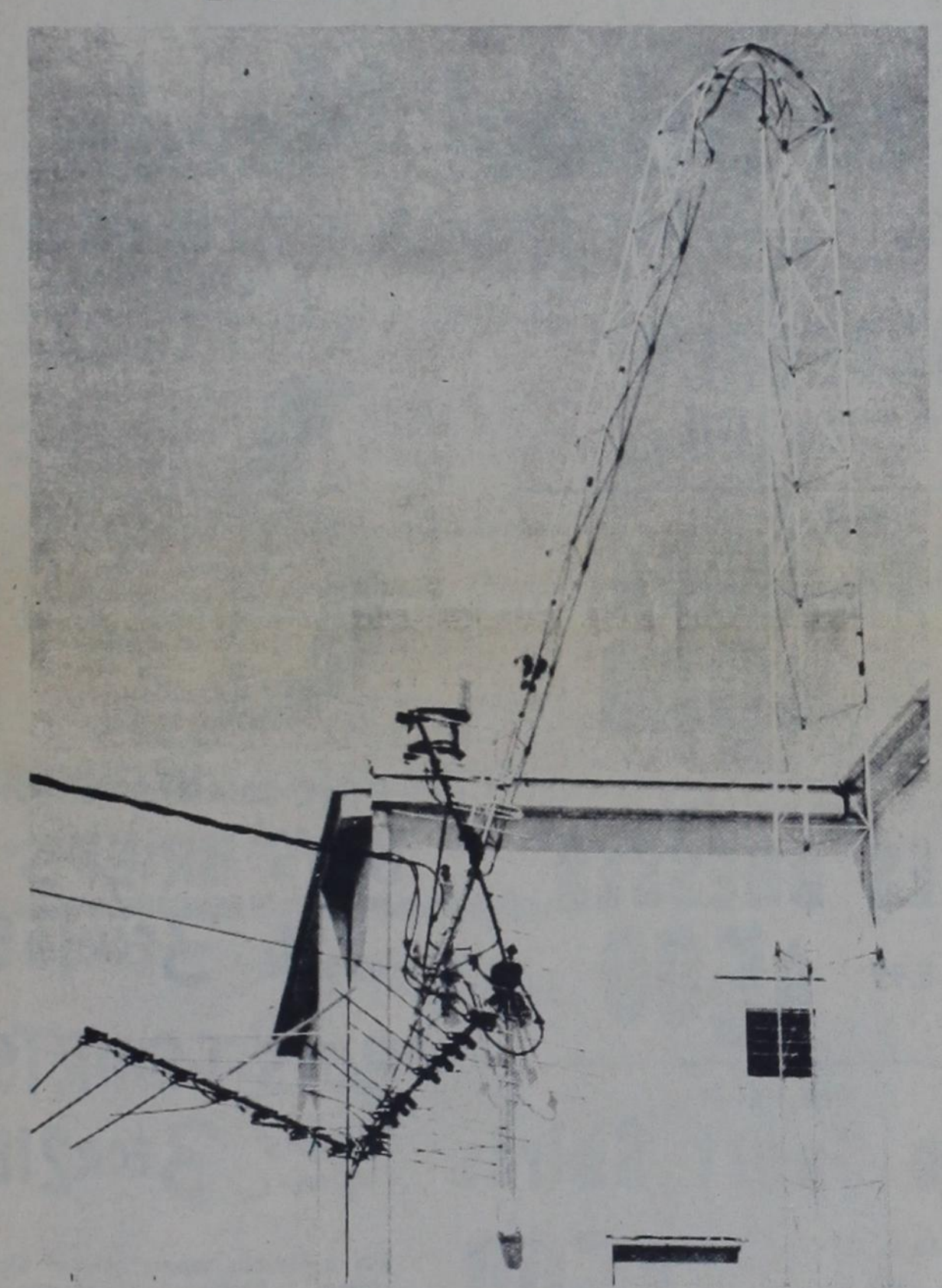

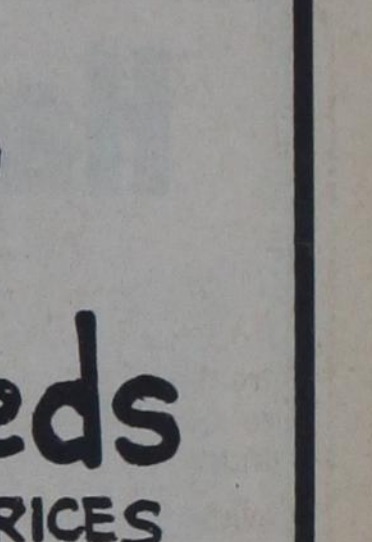

Get Soil Samples Now On Winter Wheat Land

The time is once again approaching to consider plans for fertilizing wheat to be planted this fall. Since most soils vary in their ability to supply plant nutrients, the most logical starting point for determining fertilizer needs is the soil test, says Charles Hottel, County Agricultural Agent. By sampling early, the report will be received in time for making the final decision as to what kind and how much fertilizer to apply.

ment likely to be in shortest supply, points out Hottel. Organic matter as measured by soil tests is one of the guides for determining how much nitrogen will be needed. However, such factors as the amount and stage of decomposition of previous crop residue, physical condition of the soil, ability to irrigate adequately and intended grazing practices will all influence the nitrogen need of the crop.

Data at the South Plains Research and Extension Center clearly indicates that where wheat is grown on Pullman soils for grain only, the time of nitrogen applications is of little importance. However, adds Hottel, when wheat is to be grazed, all or part of the nitrogen should be applied preplant to stimulate early growth. Adequately fertilized wheat forage can contain 20 percent protein or three percent nitrogen on a dry basis. **INSUFFICIENT phosphorus** can also limit wheat production, the agent points out. Profitable response has long been evident on many of the sandy and mixed land soils. Yield increases have also been noted on Pullman soils

shown to be deficient by soil testing. Since phosphorus does not move appreciably with soil moisture, it must be placed in the soil where it will be within reach of the permanent roots. Therefore, pre-plant application is recommended. Wheat plants utilize much of the phosphorus when they are young. **HOTTEL URGES** all wheat growers to send in soil samples as soon as possible. Complete information on sample collection and mailing is available at the County Extension office.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor. **BE IT RESOLVED** BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which have been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than

par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold heretofore shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder to comply with his bid and accept and pay for his bid or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund hereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School

Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, at such prices and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board, may be used by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board (a 'series of bonds' being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds hereafter issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-

tirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also author-

ize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property-taxpaying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

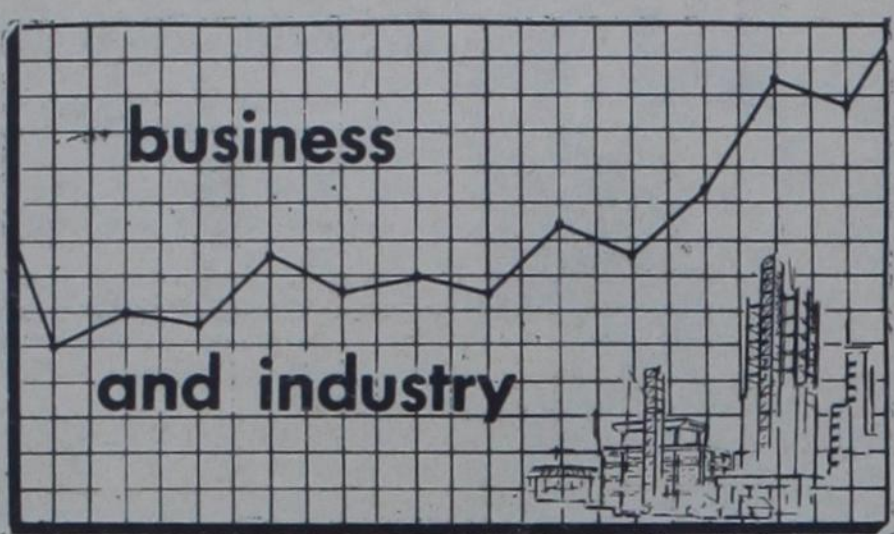

Belts, Wheels and Steering Added to Car Inspection List

Inspection of seat belt accessories, steering mechanisms and wheels and rims are added to the items to be inspected on all Texas vehicles beginning Monday, along with an increased minimum fee of \$1.75 for inspections.

THE NEW items were added to the inspection law by the last legislature, and the Department of Public Safety has instructed all vehicle inspection stations in regard to the type of inspection to be made on each item.

Inspections for the 1968 sticker will continue until April 15, the usual deadline.

Under the new law, front seat belts are required on every motor vehicle in which seat belt anchorages are a part of the manufacturer's original equipment. For most American-made vehicles, the anchorages are standard beginning with 1962 models. The vehicles may be rejected during the inspection if: (1) the seat belts are not installed, (2) the belts are unsafe or unserviceable from the wear or damage, (3) the attachment fittings are damaged or loose, or (4) the buckles are loose or inoperative.

STEERING will be checked on all vehicles, including those with power steering. Vehicles are to be rejected if: (1) the steering wheel has more than two inches of lash measured on the outside periphery of the rim (lash is defined as the condition in which the steering control can be turned through some part of a revolution without front wheel motion), (2) if it is impossible to turn the wheel from full right to full left without jamming, or (3) if the fluid in the power steering is below the recommended level. Vehicles with power steering are to be checked with the power on.

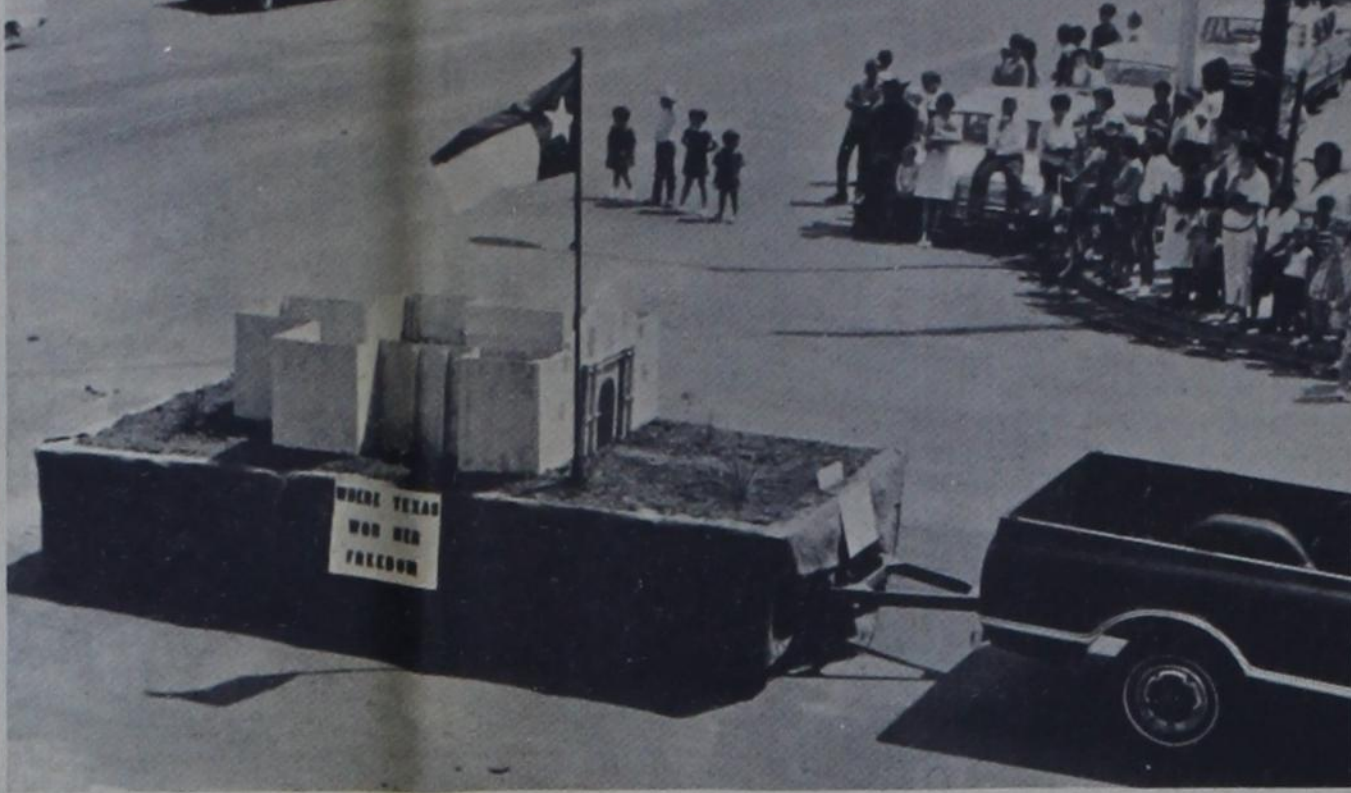
Wheels and rims are to be inspected without being removed from the vehicle. The vehicle will be rejected if: (1) the wheel has defective or bent rim flanges, or loose or missing bolts, nuts or lugs, or (2) rims have defects and cracks to the extent that they might impair the safe mounting and proper retention of tires.

There are approximately 5500 vehicle inspection stations in Texas, and each displays the official vehicle inspection station sign.

Little Scratches Can Become Serious if Lockjaw Develops

(Reprinted from the Texas Health Bulletin, by request of the Castro County Migrant Health Office.)

With the return of outdoor activities comes once again the hazard of minor accidents, cuts and scratches. Most often these are

not serious and will heal quickly if properly cleaned and protected.

But sometimes these little scratches can be more serious. Sometimes they are the channel through which you could get tetanus (lockjaw).

Tetanus-producing spores lie dormant in the soil of your garden, the dirt in your garage, and the dust inside your house. These spores can infect you through the tiniest wound — a pin scratch, a bee sting or a small cut.

Tetanus spores may remain in your body for long periods without producing the disease. Or, they may produce poison effects in five to 14 days, even though the wound has healed.

FIRST SIGNS of tetanus are irritability and restlessness. Muscles rapidly become rigid, eventually causing a clenched-jaw leer that gives tetanus its nickname — lockjaw.

When symptoms appear, the outlook is grim, even with the best treatment. To avoid the deadly consequences, be sure you are immunized, your body manufactures antibodies that will fight tetanus toxin. A booster is needed every 10 years and whenever you are injured.

If you aren't protected, in an emergency there is no time for immunization. If you have no built-in immunity, your physician may inject tetanus antitoxin. This emergency measure, however, is not always effective, nor an innoxious procedure.

YOUR ONLY long ranged guarantee against tetanus is immunization with tetanus toxoid. Only one of every four Americans has this protection.

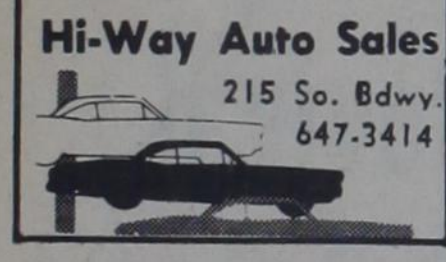

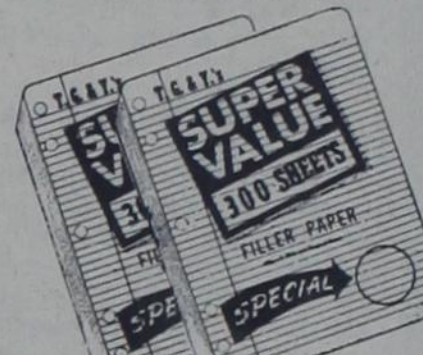

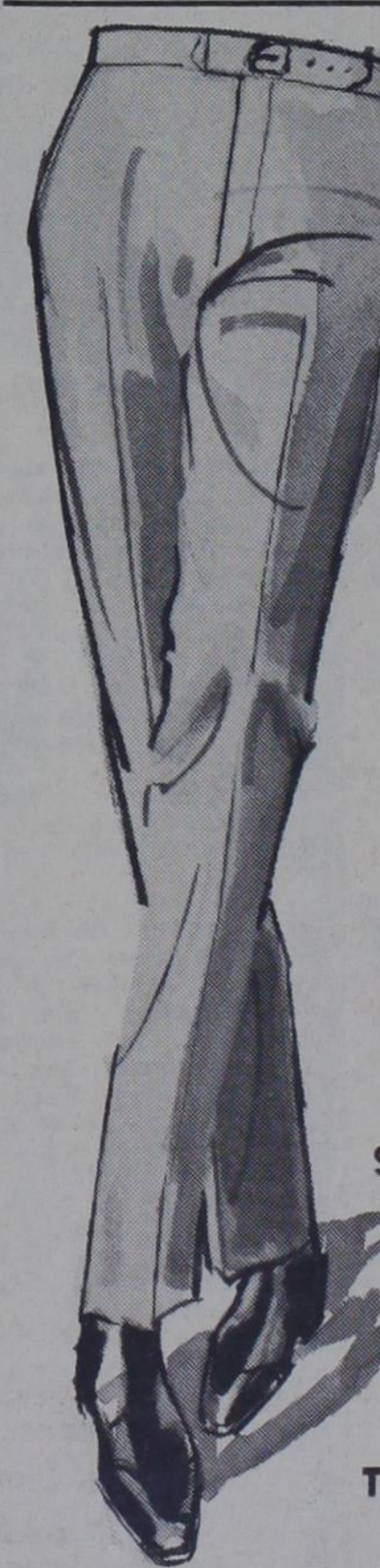

Friday Is Pre-Schoolers' Day

Friday will be Pre-School Day at Hart's elementary school. Students who will be 6 years old before Sept. 1 will meet in the elementary school building from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. They must bring birth certificates, smallpox vaccination certificates and health certificates.

On pre-school day, pupils should also bring 25 cents for lunch at the school cafeteria that day. Parents will leave their children at the school after "checking them in" with the teachers.

School will start at 8:30 a.m. Monday.

HART'S SCHOOL board has approved a 1967-68 school budget of \$404,395.02.

The new budget is \$27,421 higher than last year's, which was \$376,973.79. The increase is due to a rise in overall cost of materials and supplies, and to the natural growth of the schools and an expanded curriculum, board members said.

The state required teachers' pay raise is expected to cost Hart Schools only a slightly higher amount due to a local fund adjustment which the school will receive, based on county revaluation.

IN OTHER action, the school board hired these teachers: W. E.

Washburn Jr., high school math; Keith Huggins, high school math; Glynda Gragg, first grade; Rev. Fred Brown, attendance officer. Supt. Arly Gardenhire said he expected to complete his faculty soon.

The school board will take bids for gasoline and petroleum products at its Sept. 11 meeting. Bids should be submitted to Supt. Gardenhire at the school office before that date.

Today (Thursday), the board will consider cafeteria milk bids. All interested suppliers should submit their bids to Supt. Gardenhire.

The school board appointed Schaeffer and Harden, Certified Public Accountants, to conduct the Hart Schools' annual audit.

DUE TO THE change in the driver education law, which now allows only 16-year-olds to take driver education, Hart Schools' car program with Clyde Mace Oldsmobile and Buick Agency in Plainview will be discontinued as of Sept. 1.

Board president Ralph Futrell appointed a committee to study the bus garage equipment and draw a list of supplies needed to replace the equipment lost by fire earlier in the summer. This committee will also study the refrigeration needs of the school cafeteria and make a recommen-

tion. Hart Schools will receive a new 60-passenger school bus by the middle of September.

On Sunday, the First Methodist Church will have "Rally Day" for attendance emphasis and the promotion of pupils to other classes. Children, who, due to class rating in the Hart Public School have attained another grade, will also be promoted in Sunday School.

The "Rally Day" sermon will be preached by the local pastor, Rev. Fred Brown.
