Luther Jones for Sheriff and Tax Collector

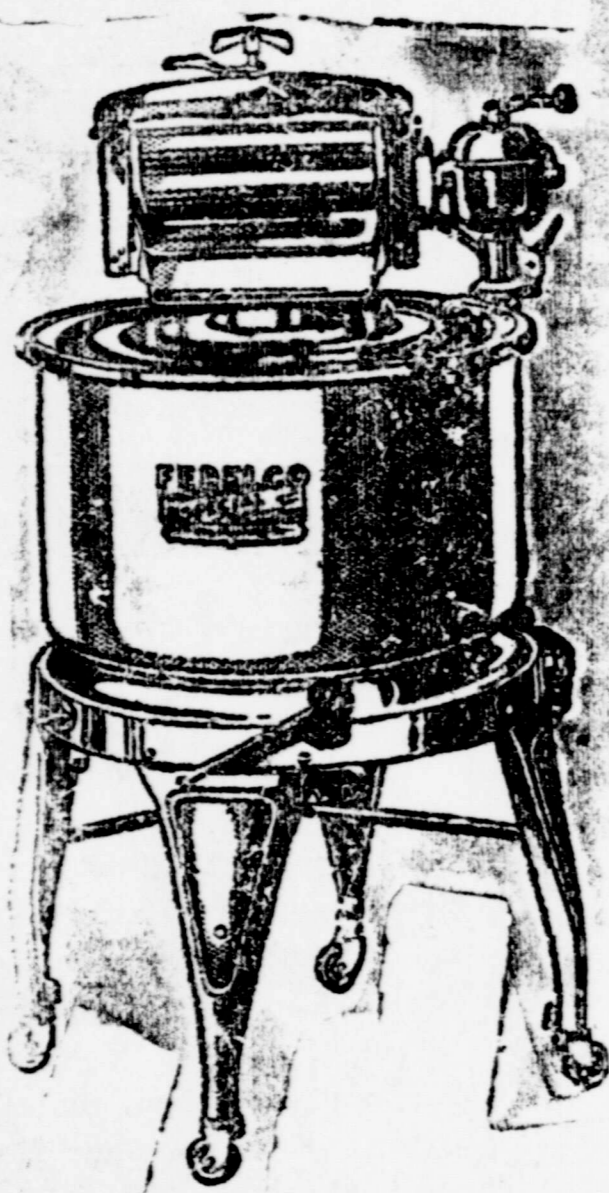

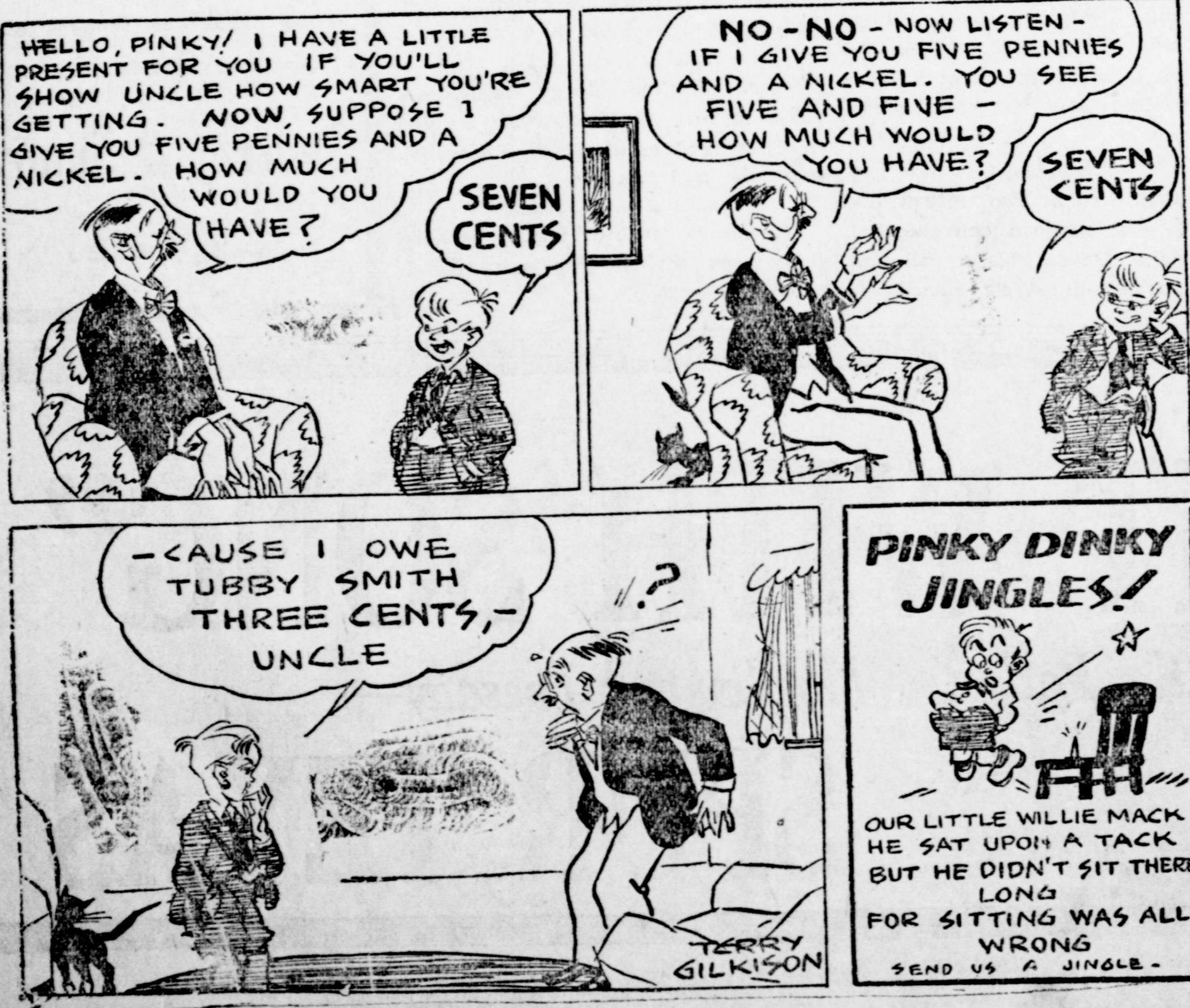

TURKEY INDUSTRY GROWS IN NEVADA

U. S. Expert Finds It Easier With Small Flock Unit.

Nevada is building up a solid turkey producing industry in a logical way, in the opinion of H. L. Shrader, extension poultry specialist of the United States Department of Agriculture, who recently paid a visit to this state.

The growing of the holiday bird in Nevada is on a farm flock basis, the expert stated, with from 150 to 300 birds, as a rule, being raised along with other crops. It is easier with the small flock unit produced in co-operation with other crops, according to the federal man, to raise the type of high-grade bird for which Nevada is becoming known.

Two of the best feeds for turkeys are milk and alfalfa, and these, Shrader said, being produced on the farm with the turkeys, afford good feed at a low cost. With such small flocks, he said, the farm wife can take care of a good share of the work, thus cutting costs, as otherwise extra labor might have to be hired.

The outlook for expansion in the industry in Nevada is good, the specialist stated. Nevada conditions, he believes, are well suited to turkey production.

"Turkeys and chickens should never be run together," he declared, explaining that parasites, little harmful to chickens, but deadly to the bronze birds, are carried by the chickens. Turkeys should be kept far from the farmhouse, he believes.

Sanitation in another means of keeping turkeys disease-free, he stated.

Buy Tested Cod Liver Oil for Laying Fowls

The use of cod liver oil in feeding laying hens during winter months and in raising young chicks during the early spring is one of the recent developments in poultry production. Practically every one who has used a good quality product has found that it has been helpful in keeping up the vitality of the flock, preventing leg weakness in chicks and securing a better texture of shell with eggs.

The reason for the value of this product is largely due to the vitamin D which it contains. Vitamin D is the substitute for sunshine. It helps fowls to properly absorb the minerals which they consume. Without vitamin D or sunshine, fowls will fail properly to absorb minerals, even though they may be abundantly supplied.

The popularity of cod liver oil has encouraged the use of many substitutes. The fishy odor which is characteristic of many of these products is not a guarantee that they are of any particular value from the standpoint of being a substitute for sunshine. There is even a good deal of difference in the efficiency of cod liver oil, so it is well to buy a product that is either tested for vitamin content or guaranteed to give satisfaction.

Turkeys Thrive While Roosting in the Open

It is unnecessary to provide a house for turkeys though it is the part of wisdom to have a shed handy into which they may be driven on extremely stormy nights.

As a usual thing they will do better roosting out in the open even in quite severe weather.

Where only a small flock is kept 15 females may be mated with one male if he is unquestionably vigorous. If a flock of about 25 or 30 is kept, two males will be needed but they should not be allowed to run with the flock at one time.

One should be allowed to run with the flock one day and the other the next.

The reason for this is that where both are allowed to mingle with the flock at the same time, they will fight until one of them becomes boss, after which he will do most of the mating and the flock will be very little better off so far as the fertility is concerned than if it had a single male.

Eliminate Bedbugs

The best method of eliminating bedbugs from a hen house is to first thoroughly clean the entire house, getting out every little speck of both dust and straw. After this thoroughly cleaning, the walls and perches should be painted with carbolineum, and the rest of the house sprayed with a 20 per cent solution of soluble stock dip. If this application is done thoroughly, it will eliminate all of the live bugs, but probably will not affect the eggs. The second application is necessary.

Yellow Corn Best

Yellow corn is especially valuable for winter feeding on account of its fattening qualities and vitamin content. If possible, at least half of the grain feed should be yellow corn. If white corn, wheat, kafir, or other farm grains are fed instead of yellow corn, alfalfa should be added to the rations to help supply vitamins. Alfalfa leaves or alfalfa meal will replace the vitamins of yellow corn if the latter is not available. The winter ration must contain protein.

DAIRY FACTS

BACTERIAL COUNT IMPORTANT TEST

Necessary That Milk Dealers Be Able to Judge Quality.

"It is just as necessary for the dairymen to understand the significance and application of bacterial counts in the production of sanitary milk as it is for them to understand the use and significance of the milk fat test," said Robert S. Breed of the Geneva experiment station.

Doctor Breed cited two uses of bacterial counts in New York state that affect the dairyman's pocketbook intimately and directly. "One of these," he said, "is the use being made by public health control officials and less frequently by milk dealers to judge the sanitary quality of milk. When results of these laboratory examinations are unsatisfactory, they are used as a basis for bringing pressure directly or indirectly upon the dairyman to improve his equipment and methods of handling milk. The second use touches the dairyman's pocketbook directly inasmuch as premiums are being paid at many grade A milk plants for milk having bacterial counts of less than 25,000 or less than 10,000 per cubic centimeter. Failure to meet these standards causes the loss of premium money that really represents the greater part of the profit to the dairyman."

"Dairymen should familiarize themselves with laboratory methods whose use affects their business so intimately. Payments of premiums for high class milk is sound providing the basis used in determining premiums is fair and equitable. No more satisfactory system of paying premiums has yet been devised than to pay them on the basis of bacterial counts."

Milk Fever Treatment Given by Nebraska Man

Inflating a cow's udder with sterile air from a regular milk fever outfit when signs of milk fever first appear, and tying the teats with broad tapes just tight enough to retain the air is the most effective treatment known for milk fever, says Dr. L. V. Skidmore, Nebraska College of Agriculture, Lincoln.

Never drench the cow with any liquid or allow the tapes to remain on the teats more than 20 minutes, is a precaution to those administering treatment. The drench may go into the cow's lungs and the tapes may cause the teats to slough off. The theory that some dairymen have tried adding a little molasses to the cow's ration four to six weeks before calving has been found to be effective in some cases in preventing milk fever.

The characteristic position of the cow affected with milk fever is lying down with her feet extended forward under her body and her head turned backward toward her flank. There is generally a crook in the animal's neck resembling the letter S. Later the cow will become unconscious and stretch out full length on her side if she is not properly treated.

Calf Scours Is Usually Caused by Indigestion

Calf scours is a common disease of the digestive tract and is usually caused by indigestion. The calf that scours easily in life may be seriously handicapped and of course sometimes dies. Prevention is best but not always possible. Care should be taken that the calf is not overfed, that the milk is always fed warm, and that the milk is uniformly sweet and fed from clean buckets. If scours occur, cut the milk down one-half and give a dose of one to three ounces of castor oil or of mineral oil. Raw eggs may be used to correct the trouble. Two or three tablespoonfuls of lime water in the milk is sometimes effective.

Off-Flavored Milk Due to Bacteria in Pails

Bitter and off-flavored milk is generally caused by bacteria that enters the milk after it is drawn from the cow. A careful sterilization of every utensil that comes in touch with the milk will probably eliminate the trouble.

It is suggested by the University of Kentucky, in case of bad flavored milk, that a sample of normal flavored milk that has soured, be added to the bucket at the time of the milking. This will enable the normal bacteria to gain the supremacy in the milk and will again bring it back to its normal flavor.

Stimulate Milk Flow

When cows are stabled much of the time the udders and rear quarters usually become more or less soiled. This can be prevented in a measure by clipping the long hair around those parts but even then frequent washing is necessary. If the best quality of milk is to be produced the udder should be washed before each milking. One man should go through the barn with a soft cloth and a pail of warm water doing this just before milking is started.

Six months later they had to call out police reserves to quiet five thousand women who crowded the doors of a theatre where Rudy was making a personal appearance.





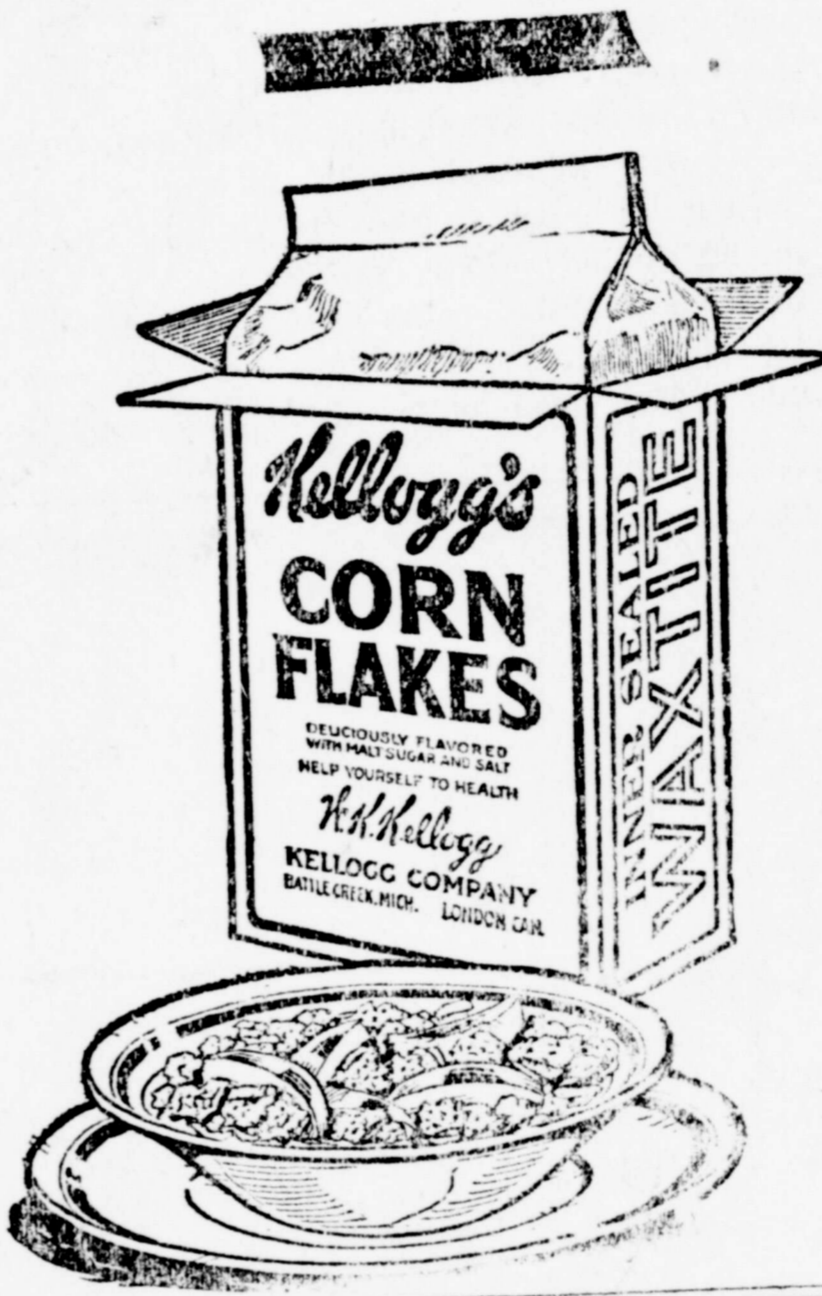

Blackhead is Turkey Raiser's Bugaboo

The bugaboo to turkey raising is that dread disease Blackhead. The name itself is misleading, for it does not describe a symptom. In other words the head of the turkey does not necessarily turn black.

First we must get clearly in mind that there is no cure for blackhead. That is a hard thing to say, but it is true nevertheless. Someone bobs up every day with a new "cure" and we are glad so much interest is being manifested in the subject. The day will come perhaps when a real cure will be found. But right now we are interested in a far more valuable

movement, that of prevention. For after all prevention is the best cure in the world.

Blackhead is an infectious disease. It is caused by a germ that affects the liver and the blind gut or caeca. If you have a microscope that will magnify several hundred times you may see that germ. But you don't even need glasses to see its effect, which is even more important. Young turks are most susceptible, although it affects the grown as well. The germ enters with the food and is found in infected ground, where droppings from birds that have had blackhead or droppings from chickens contaminate the soil.

The blackhead germ attacks the liver first and from the diseased tis-

sues of the liver these germs pass through the bile duct and into the intestines, from which they complete their deadly circuit by returning to Mother Earth via the droppings.

It takes from ten days to two weeks for the disease to show itself after infection. The greatest source of danger of course is for the young turkeys to run with chickens or to be exposed to older birds from flocks that have had the disease and on ground that has been contaminated. That is about as close to turkey suicide as you can come.

But even on fresh ground, if the young birds are allowed to be with the older birds that are infected the danger may be almost as great. Young turkeys have ravenous appetites. They pick at everything in sight. Fresh contaminated droppings contain the blackhead germ in its liveliest, most virulent stage.

To show you how insidious the disease is, turkeys have been known to contract blackhead when placed with incubator chicks. Infected ground that has been plowed and seeded has been known to carry the lurking danger. Hens are carriers of the parasite, and when allowed to roam with turkeys may infect them. Your bots will carry the germ from infected ground into the new, fresh yard.

It is easy to spot the first appearance of the disease in a flock of turkeys if you are at all observant. When poults appear lazy and lag behind the rest of the flock, look out. They are not lazy at all, but ailing. As this weakness grows, they take on a droopy appearance. They walk with slow measured tread, head down and wings dangling. Loss of appetite and weight are the inevitable results.

In the adult turkey the symptoms are practically the same except that they do not appear as quickly as in the young birds. And they die in a few days after you note they have it.

Put your flocks on clean, uncontaminated ground, clear away from your other poultry yards. Above all keep your turkeys away from your chickens. Don't make the mistake for instance of building our brooder house with a cement floor so that it can't be moved. You want that brooder house as far away as possible from the farm buildings. It's a splendid thing to give growing turks a change of ground and pasturage every few weeks. Alfalfa, sweet clover, or a plot of rape that is away out on the farm is the finest thing in the world to prevent blackhead during these dangerous early growing weeks.—Dr. L. D. Legear, V. S.

CURB DISCOVERED FOR ONION PEST

Surest Way to Prevent Flavors in Cows' Milk.

Although onions and garlic appear early in the spring and soon disappear, they last just long enough before the grass gets well started to cause considerable trouble to milk producers. Observation has shown that if a cow eats a pound of onion tops, about two hours must elapse before her milk will be free from undesirable flavors.

It is not difficult, says F. H. Button, assistant professor of dairy industry at Rutgers university, to perceive how some cows might get even more than a pound of onion tops in a day's feeding, and thereby require probably four hours before her milk becomes normal in flavor.

Many dairymen believe that the surest remedy for preventing onion and garlic flavors in milk and cream is to keep the cows in pastures where the obnoxious plants do not grow. Where the infestation is small in area some men eradicate the plants by spraying with orchard heating oil.

The oil destroys the plants entirely. Large areas of infested land, however, are usually cleared by fall or spring plowing and then cropping the land for three or four years with such crops as corn, potatoes, soy beans and cowpeas.

Another common practice in the production of milk free from onion flavors is to leave the cows on infested pasture only for limited periods each day until the grass advances to such a extent that it supplies the wants of the animals.

Different Essentials of Profitable Ratio

Dairy cows are equipped with a large stomach, divided into four compartments. Nature intended this large compartment as a store house for roughages and gave the cow the power of rechewing the food that has been hurriedly collected in its amounts. Concentrates were not fed in the cow's original bill of fare.

Alfalfa, clover and ensilage are three farm roughages that will furnish more pounds of digestible nutrients per acre than can be produced by any other crops. Since the dairy cow was designed to handle large amounts of roughage let these bulky feeds furnish the basis of her ration. Such roughages as there are the basis of economic feeding.

Bulkiness should also be considered when making up the grain ration. Have the mixture made up, in part, of bulky grains. When feeding large amounts of grain to heavy-producing cows keep the ration bulky. It is better to feed more pounds of a light weight feed low in protein, than use too heavy protein feeds. When grain rations are heavy, weigh more than one and one-quarter pounds to a quart. It may be desirable to feed the grain with some bulk feed such as ensilage, beet pulp or sliced roots.

Dairy Hints

A dairy barn should be washed at least once a year.

Pure breeds of good quality do better in the feed lot than scrubs or common stock.

There are more dairymen who have been using soy beans this past winter than ever before.

A goal of 8,000 to 12,000 pounds milk per cow is a reasonable aim for the average dairyman.

Off-flavor in milk can usually be avoided by milking the cows before feeding them instead of after.

There never was a cow so scrupulous as to feed her calf oleomargarine. How some humans have degenerated.

Dairy herd improvement association records are becoming more and more necessary to the successful sale of surplus females.

Pails and cans after they are washed and sterilized should be inverted, drain and dry in a clean place, preferably inside the milkhouse.

Cows show their appreciation of good care by increased production. Provide plenty of bedding, balance and abundant rations, a supply of water.

The cream screw of the farm separator should be adjusted so that the cream will test about 35 per cent fat during the winter months. Cream that is too thick is difficult to handle and sample—especially when cold.

At the Massachusetts experiment station the addition of a balanced ration containing increased milk production. The conclusion was that raw milk from dairy cattle up to 25 per cent fat per head was both economical.

How to Play BRIDGE

ARTICLE No. 14

A number of maxims have been coined for Bridge players to follow, and one of the most common of these is: "Always cover an honor, if possible." This maxim, like many of the others, is only of value when the exceptions are properly understood. The following examples should make this clear:

The simple case is where the declarer leads the knave, you have the queen and dummy has the king. The cards in the particular suit are as follows:

K, 5, 3
Q, 7, 2
: Y :
: A B :
: Z :

Z leads the knave, and A must play his queen upon it. There are but few exceptions to this rule, but the point I particularly want to make is that, if the lead is from dummy, and there are two touching honors in dummy's hand, you should not cover the first time. Here is an example:

Q, J, 9
: Y :
: Dummy :
: A B : K, 7, 5
: Z :

If the queen is led from dummy, B should not cover with his king. If the queen wins the trick and the knave is then played from dummy, B should then play the king. Nothing can be gained by covering the first time, but something may be lost if one does so. Suppose the cards are as follows:

Q, J, 9
: Y :
: Clubs - A, K, Q, 9
: Clubs - A, 8, 3
: Diamonds - K, 7, 3
: Spades - Q, 9, 8

Hearts - 7, 4, 2
Clubs - 6, 5, 2
Diamonds - J, 10, 5
Spades - 7, 6, 3, 2

Hearts - 8, 5
Clubs - Q, 10, 9
Diamonds - 8, 6, 3
Spades - A, K, J, 10, 4

No score, rubber game. Z dealt and bid one spade. A and Y passed and B doubled. (Informatory). Z, the dealer, with a very strong hand, bid two spades over the double and all passed. A opened the jack of diamonds and A B were thus able to win the first three tricks. At the fourth trick, B,
