Croton School Receives Classification and Affiliation

A tremendous advance has been made in Croton School this past year according to a report received recently by Supt. N. C. Nibble from the State Department of Education wherein they were granted classification and affiliation in the following subjects; eighth and ninth grade algebras, plane geometry and general science.

At the beginning of the year the Croton School was an eight month unclassified school system. In order that the school could be put on an equal basis of other schools of the county, and recognized by the Department of Education it was necessary to vote an independent district. This enabled them to secure necessary financial aid to purchase the needed equipment and also maintain a nine month school term. This was made possible by the hearty cooperation of the school board and faculty with patrons of the community through a well organized Parent Teachers Association.

According to Mr. S. L. Porter, president of the school board, the outlook for the ensuing year is the most promising in the history of the school. Mr. Porter has been a member of the school board for the past sixteen years.

TO VOTERS

I come to Dickens County in 1890, and have been in the county the most of the time since, excepting the time spent elsewhere in school, have taught fifteen terms of school, fourteen o which has been in Dickens County. I was appointed to the office of County School Supt. October 9th, 1929. My records are open for the public at all times.

With the help of the trustees, teachers and patrons of the various schools of the County who have voted four Independent school districts, we received and have approved more than \$10,000 state aid. If the voters see fit to give me the office for this elective term, I shall be glad to help in any way possible to have better schools, giving all honor and credit to the patrons, teachers, trustees and pupils.—Frank Speer
