### **TWO MINUTE SERMON**

### (By Thomas Hastwell)

THE INFLUENCE OF LITTLE THINGS: We were riding on a train recently which ran along a river for some distance. In some places the road bed seemed to be at the water's edge. At such places small piers on jetters of stone were built. Their purpose was to deflect the current of the river and turn it away from the railroad bed. It seemed remarkable that these piers as small as they rere could turn and change the entire current of the river. It occured to us that human life is not unlike the current of a river. How often in every man's experience things which at the time appear trivial and of little consesuence will change the whole course of a life. A decision or a condition coming up in the day's routine will completely alter the course and direction of a life. It isn't the big things that happen to us that bring about the greatest changes. More often it is the little things, the quiet influences that result in the biggest changes in the course of life. The boy who comes home from school and throws down his books and decides he will go to school no longer, may by this act and decision completely change the course of his whole life as well as its contracts. The girl by her attitudes and decisions decides what kind of a woman she will be. How important it is then to be aware of the value of the little things that have to do with the virtues and the fundamentals of life. How important it is that the home in its earlier contracts with the boys and girls instill into them the right attitudes, that right decisions may be naturally and habitually made that will lead and direct the future course of life into the ways of the greatest happiness and usefulness.






