Ginning Report Shows 13,592,104 Bales of Cotton Ginned

Washington, Jan. 23.-Cotton of the 1930 crop ginned prior to Jan. 16 was announced Friday by the Census Bureau to have totaled 13,-592,104 running bales, including 513,364 round bales, counted as half bales and excluding linters. To that date last year 14,176, 936 running bales, including 558,-984 round bales, and in the previous year 13,888,972 running bales were ginned.

I feel sure that the thing to do is to feed all these bolly seed that are in the country or sell them and buy good seed to plant. And the only way to get good seed at a reasonable price is to throw together and bring them here in
