Dr. S. P. Brooks Died Past Week

Dr. S. P. Brooks, noted educator of Texas and president of Baylor University at Waco, died at a hospital there Thursday, the past week from cancer. Dr. Brooks carried on until the very last, insisting upon signing as many of the University Diplomas as possible before death overtook him, even though doctors advised against it.

In his passing Texas loses one of its best known and most loved men as well as one of its greatest educators.

Patients who are entering the hospitals now are men who are breaking down for the first time, an after result of the hellish grind which he endured over there. They may receive the \$40 pension, but there is usually a delay before that comes. Hence the need of taking care of them during this period—and the poppies, little red emblems of sacrifice, are given to them to make.

Next week, ladies and children of the American Legion Auxiliary will be on the streets selling poppies. Help them to make this sale a great success.

Some Section Of County In Need of Rain For Wheat

Wheat crops over the county are generally in need of rain, some farmers having cut and baled the crop preparatory to planting other crops, and others are planning to do so if dry weather continues. The rainfall up to May 20 is 1.60 inches below the 17-year average.

Previous rains, however, have been slow and effective, and this coupled with the moisture secured from the general rains falling during October, November and December, 1930, gives carry-over of moisture in the upper three feet of soil that is above normal for this period of the year and prospects for big fall crops are excellent.

Following is a table of this year's rainfall taken at Spur Experiment Station, together with a 17-year average of the same period.

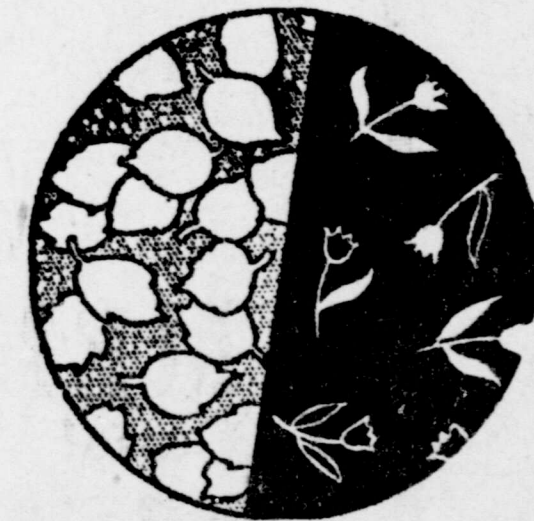
