As has been announced previously the much discussed road from Spur to Dickens is to be paved at last. The Highway Commission has along with other counties of the state appropriated funds for immediate expenditure on the roads in this county. Dickens County's appropriation calls for the hard surfacing of the road from Spur to Dickens and specifies that the road shall be properly graveled and topped with one layer of asphalt. \$37,= 000.00 has been appropriated for this purpose and on the ten miles to Dickens \$3,700 per mile should be enough to make a permanent and excellent road.

Following is the letter concerning this matter that County Judge Newberry received from the department.

Hon. O. C. Newberry, County, Judge Dickens, Texas Dear Sir:

Please be advissed that the following Minute was passed by the State Highway Commission on April 12th, making appropriation for surfacing Highway No. 18 between Spur and Dickens:

"It is ordered by the Commission that \$37,000.00 be appropriated for the surfacing of that section of Highway No. 18 in Dickens County between Dickens and Spur on which unit it has previously been constructed, such surfacing to be vravel of minium satisfactory thickness and topped with sinble bituminous surface treatment, work to be tone by contract." Minute 5804.

FOR TAXES IN MISS. Jackson, Miss., April 14.— Hammer of sheriffs in nearly

every county of Mississippi fell on auction blocks yesterday, beating out news that approximately 25 per cent of the state's privately owned property was under sale for delinquent taxes.

State Land Commissioner R. D. Moore said one-fourth of the state's private property was involved. The figures exceed any year in the state's history.

Reports showed 39,699 farms, or 16.2 per cent of the agricultural acreage of the state, went on the block, while 12 per cent of the city property was forfeited for non-payment of 1931 taxes.

Since the state already possesses from 15,000 to 40,000 forfeited acres in each county, Commissioner Moore estimated that if the present lands revert to the state, it will have more than one-fourth of its property off the tax rolls two years from now when the redemption period

Where Our Money Goes.

We often consider the debt ridden condition of foreign countries and pat ourselves on the back because the United States is not in the same boat. But if the trends of recent years continues,

it won't be long until we are. In 1900 the per capita cost of the Federal government was \$7.29 and it increased 10% in the next 16 years. In 1931, the per capita cost was \$34.37-an increase of 500% in 15 years. According to a Treasury estimate, the combintd deficits of 1931, 1932 and 1933 will increase the Federal debt by the neat sum of \$3,250,000,000. bringing the total debt to the staggering total of \$19,240,000,000.

It is a favorite political practice to blame all this on the war To a certain extnet, that is fair enough. But it is likewise true that many departments of the Federal government has proven inept, inefficient and wasteful. The Farm Board spent the greater part of \$500,000,000 in an effort to maintain prices on certain commodities-and made a failure. Two hundred millions more is being poured into Boulder Dam The postoffice is one long deficit The government operates ships at a loss-the shipping board appropriation in 1930 was \$11,494,000. 
