Prominent Citizen Of North End Dead

W. H. Nichols, of the Deer Lake community and one of the most prominent citizens of the county, died at the home of Francis Jackson, in Dickens, early Friday morning, April 14th. Appoplexy was given as the cause of death. Mr. Nichols was apparently in the best of health until Thursday afternoon when members of the family noticed that he was losing control of his voice and although no pain was evident, he rapidly became worse and was carried to Dickens for medical attention. Nothing could be done, however, to relieve his condition and death occurred at 2:30 the following morning.

Mr. Nichols was born in Coryell County, October 2, 1877, later moving with his parents to Stephenville where he lived until his marriage to Miss Della Jackson in 1903. To this union three sons were born, Barney, E. J. and Erert, all of whom are well known young men and citizens of this county.

Mrs. Della Jackson died at Fort Worth in 1913 and Mr. Nichols was later married to Mrs. Cora Pillow, who survives him, and who was a sister of his former wife. The family moved west, coming to Dickens County in 1917, and have made their home here since. To this later union two sons were born, William Harvey Jr., and Ross.

Funeral services were held at the Dickens Church of Christ, Friday afternoon at 5 o'clock, conducted by Ira Lee Sanders, Minister of the Church at Matador. Interment followed in the Dickens Cemetery.

CLOTHING EXPERT HOLDS SCHOOL

"The best pattern is the pattern that fits" said Mrs. Dora R. Barnes, Extension Specialist in Clothing in a two-day foundation pattern school held for the wardrobe demonstrators of the county, Monday and Tuesday. Ten demonstrators from seven women's clubs were present for the training. These wardrobe demonstrators will give the foundation pattern work in the clubs in May.

"In clothing work keep up with style trends; that means wear the thing that is becoming to you as an individual in line, color, design, and material," says Mrs. Barnes.

Foundation waist, sleeve and skirt patterns were made by each demonstrator using her own measurements. Then variations of the plain sleeve were cut and some work on collars. Tuesday afternoon Mrs. Barnes talked to a large group of club women on the wardrobe and showed women's wardrobes for the year that may be assembled for \$25, \$50, \$75 or \$100.

Texas To Vote On Beer Bill Aug. 26

The Legislature has the past week passed a measure submitting the question of legalizing beer to the voters in an election to be held on August 26th. The bill follows the lines of the Federal measure recently passed and would permit the manufacture, transportation and sale of beer containing 32 per cent of alcohol or less.

The bill also contains a local option clause and should it pass in the state wide election in August, counties known as "dry" counties would be required to hold local elections to determine whether the beverage could be sold within their borders. Dickens County is a dry county and would have to hold such an election before beer could be sold here legally.

Roosevelt Favors Money Fluctuation

The best news of the year was received Thursday morning of this week when President Roosevelt announced that America was off the gold standard and that silver would be acceptable in foreign trade relations. Also he recommended to Congress that he be given powers to fluctuate the currency and regulate the percentage of gold on which the dollar is based.

For two years or more this publication has advocated a regulation of the currency, both for deflation and fluctuation. It is a well known fact that the value of money goes up and down the same as wheat, cotton and other commodities. It is a further known fact that for the past three years the value of our money has risen all out of proportion to the prices of raw products and farm commodities. And we now believe that the new President has found the solution to the depression and one that will break it in a very short time. Particularly far sighted and astute is his proposal that a board be appointed with the power to make a regulation at any time of the gold and silver ratios. Such a regulation will protect economies of the nation from the evils of the other extreme, that is, too great a fluctuation and too cheap a medium of exchange.

Encouraging to the prospects of this policy being put into effect is the fact that representatives of agricultural states have recently joined forces (regardless of party lines) with the representatives of western states, who are anxious to see silver recognized, in demanding some sort of fluctuation. They have so far been unable to agree on any one plan, however, and this proposal of President Roosevelt comes at a most appropriate time.

It is also encouraging to note that J. P. Morgan, king pin banker of the east, has issued one of his rare statements to the press in which he favors the new Roosevelt proposal. It is not known whether Mr. Morgan's support of the plan has any connection with the recent clamor in the Senate to investigate his international banking activities of the past but regardless of his reasons for a concession to currency fluctuation, his support will be of immeasurable benefit in discouraging opposition in high financial circles.

The method of distributing the new monies is relatively unimportant. Personally we would favor a payment on the veterans compensation. But whether it is used for Federal employees and the army and navy, or a public works and reforestation program, or to retire tax-free bonds, or any other purpose; it will get into circulation, cheapen the dollar, raise the price of products, create employment, and in general bring on better times. The new President continues to surpass expectations. Viva, Roosevelt!

R. D. Baughman Painfully Burned

R. D. Baughman was seriously and painfully burned Saturday afternoon of last week when a bucket of paint that had been mixed with gasoline was ignited and set fire to his clothing. He and a fellow worker were painting the inside of a metal cistern on the Pitchfork ranch when the companion struck a match to light a cigarette and ignited the bucket of paint and gasoline. Before the two men could get out of the cistern and the blazing clothing extinguished, Mr. Baughman had been badly burned, most severely on the hand and upper part of the body. He was rushed here to the sanitarium and is being treated at the hands of Dr. Nichols, and at present we are glad to report, is showing improvement.

Spur Schools Will Have A Full Term

Following a meeting of the teachers of the Spur Schools held Wednesday afternoon, it was announced that the schools would continue for a full nine months term. The teachers unanimously agreed to continue teaching for the full term regardless of the shortage of funds and whether or not there would be money in the treasury sufficient to pay their salaries.

A recent shortage of funds caused a crisis in school affairs and it was thought for a time that the schools would be forced to close with a short term, and an appeal was made for the payment of school taxes by everyone able to do so. As a result of the campaign something over \$1100 was collected. This in addition to the remainder of the state appropriation expected is thought to be sufficient to cover current expenses and allow the schools here to complete a successful term without involving a debt.

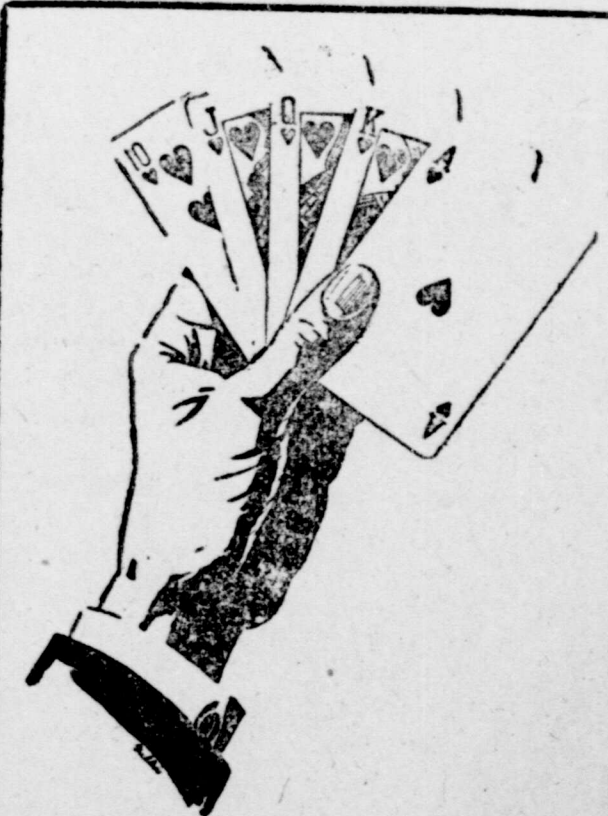
