President Roosevelt has ordered that all gold over \$100 held by individuals be turned in to the Federal Reserve system by May 1st.

In the same executive order the Secretary of the Treasury was authorized to issue licenses permitting the use of gold in necessary domestic and foreign trade transactions. For violation of the order the President decreed a maximum fine of \$10,000 and imprisonment of ten years, or both.

In planting sudan for grazing, 10 pounds of seed per acre in 30 inch rows gives the best results. Grazing should be started when grass reaches a height of 15 to 18 inches. Alternate grazing is the best system to use if the pasture can be divided by fences. If the grass gets stemmy. it should be mowed, and stock kept off for a few days which will give opportunity for new shoots to furnish fresh grazing.



## HOME DEMONSTRATION **CLUB NEWS**

'We like our yard better every day. We are so happy over it. All the plants we put out are living and we are hoping we can keep them growing. The spirea bloomed profusely when it had been set out only about a month. I'm glad we enlarged the lawn and put out more trees; the grass in the new lawn is growing nicely," says Mrs. M. D. Ivey, yard improvement demonstrator in the Spur home demonstratino club.

"The first thing we did was to have the home demonstration agent draw a planting plan for our yard. We followed the plan in putting out trees, foundation plantings and grass. We used privet, everygreens. and flowering shrubs in the foundation plantings. Foundation plantings are the plantings around the base of the house to break harsh angles and corners and make the house blend into its surroundings. We removed three mulberry trees that dotted the lawn making it appear smaller than it was; then we moved the privet hedge along the the lawn, too."

"We have enjoyed learning about the new plants we have used and are looking forward to their first blooms," she finished.

Quoting from Miss Ines Derryberry, who was Extension Specialist in Landscape Gardening, every farm home in Texas can be made lovely with a little time and effort given to it. "Rest, peace, and quiet; a farm home surrounded by a green expanse of well sodded lawn a background of lovely trees, foundation plantings of shrubs that gracefully tie the house into the surrounding-this is what landscape gardening can do for a home. With the unlimited amount of space, good soil and native shrubs which Texas farm people have, there is ample opportunity for all to have a lovely farm home." says Miss Derryberry in her bulletin, "Beautifying Country
