HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUB NEWS

DEMONSTRATOR IS PLEASSED WITH YARD

"We like our yard better every day. We are so happy over it. All the plants we put out are living and we are hoping we can keep them growing. The spirea bloomed profusely when it had been set out only about a month. I'm glad we enlarged the lawn and put out more trees; the grass in the new lawn is growing nicely," says Mrs. M. D. Ivey, yard improvement demonstrator in the Spur home demonstration club.

"The first thing we did was to have the home demonstration agent draw a planting plan for our yard. We followed the plan in putting out trees, foundation plantings and grass. We used privet, evergreens, and flowering shrubs in the foundation plantings. Foundation plantings are the plantings around the base of the house to break harsh angles and corners and make the house blend into its surroundings. We removed three mulberry trees that dotted the lawn making it appear smaller than it was; then we moved the privet hedge along the drive. That added spaciousness to the lawn, too."

"We have enjoyed learning about the new plants we have used and are looking forward to their first blooms," she finished.

Quoting from Miss Ines Derryberry, who was Extension Specialist in Landscape Gardening, every farm home in Texas can be made lovely with a little time and effort given to it. "Rest, peace, and quiet; a farm home surrounded by a green expanse of well sodded lawn a background of lovely trees, foundation plantings of shrubs that gracefully tie the house into the surrounding—this is what landscape gardening can do for a home. With the unlimited amount of space, good soil, and native shrubs which Texas farm people have, there is ample opportunity for all to have a lovely farm home," says Miss Derryberry in her bulletin, "Beautifying Country Homes."

ENTHUSIASM FOR CLOTHES CLOSETS SPREADS

"My clothes closet has resulted in two others being built," said Mrs. Clark Forbis, wardrobe demonstrator for the Chandler home demonstration club. "The man who built my closet went home and built one for his wife and now has finished one for my sister-in-law. I believe our club is going to be one hundred per cent on building or improving the clothes closet. That is what we are working for," she added with

club pride. With the 4-H and home demonstration clubs working toward the goal of improved clothes closets it is quite the style to have a new closet or to put a hanging rod or shelves or hat stands and shoe racks in the old closet. Are you in style?

GIRLS CONTINUE WORK ON BEDROOMS

"I don't see how we got along without the clothes closet before we built it and to think it cost only twenty-five cents, too," is the comment of Mrs. C. W. Taylor, mother of Wanda, who is bedroom demonstrator for the Dickens 4-H club. Besides building a clothes closet which provides storage space for the whole family's clothes, Wanda has given her bedroom furniture a new coat of paint and plans to paper the walls and stain the floor.

The county contest in the bedroom work for girls ends the last of May when the girls' rooms are scored for a second time. The girl making the greatest improvement in proportion to the money expended will enter the District contest and will receive a trip to the Short Course in July.
