We built a reading table using two orange crates with a board across the top. The chair for the reading unit was an old bottomed one that we covered with cretonne that has pink flowers in it to harmonize with the wall paper,

The dresser and bedstead were very unattractive and I wanted to paint them over. We first had to remove the old paint. I did this with a strong lye water. They were then painted a light ivory to help make the room that much lighter. The window curtain was made of unbleached muslin trimmed with a pink scolloped border. The bedstead is pink so my room is pink and cream.

Since the woodwork was in fairly good condition we did not do any thing for it at this time.

I have a chifferobe in my room for storing folded clothes. One drawer is for bedroom linens. did not add any linens for we had a good supply.

Sister and I share our room and she has helped to improve it. We are quite proud of it.

THE STORY OF MY BEDROOM

(By Evelyn Ham, Afton 4-H Club) room demonstrator for our club. wondered what room I would use. I decided on the room that had been our guest room. The room had fresh paper on the walls and the floor had been varnished. The room contained a bed, two old trunks, an old machine, several floor pillows and pictures.

There was a built-in closet. mean, there was space but no rod or shelves in it. We put five shelves in one end, one for hats, three for folded clothes and the bottom one for shoes. Then we put up a rod for hangers and last a pocket on the door for hose.

I took out the old trunks and floor pillows. I made a cover for the machine and curtains for the windows of unbleached muslin trim- Ivey. med in rose gingham.

The bedstead was enameled a walnut finish. I used a pink spread on it to harmonize with the trimming of the curtains and the flowers in the paper.

We built a reading unit of apple boxes making three shelves with the top one serving as a table. It was stained and varnished a dark walnut too. The two lower shelves make a place for books and magazines. We made stools for the coom from discarded chairs that had broken backs. These are cover-




