The 64th District Court Grand Jury returned felony indictments against five persons Friday.

Appeals court upholds Baldivia's conviction

The State Court of Appeals in Amarillo this week affirmed the conviction of Ruben Naranjo Baldivia.

Baldivia was convicted by a Hale County jury and sentenced to serve 75 years in prison and pay a \$5,000 fine for his part in the June 1985 house burglary that led to the death of Robert Glenn Ballard, 51-year-old farmer.

Baldivia was acquitted of the murder charge by a Swisher County jury in April 1986.

The Castro County Grand Jury indicted Baldivia the following month for the burglary offense.

Baldivia's defense attorneys challenged the burglary indictment on grounds of double jeopardy, but District Attorney Jimmy Davis was successful in persuading the Amarillo Court of Appeals that the action of the Castro County Grand Jury was not prohibited by state or

Trial on the burglary charge began in Plainview in August 1987. During four days of testimony, the jury heard evidence of the burglary, of Ballard's attempt to investigate, and of Baldivia's past criminal record. Ballard's death was not specifically alluded to in the Plainview trial because of the previous "not guilty" verdict returned by the Tulia jury in the earlier murder trial.

The Plainview jury convicted Baldivia on the burglary charge and assessed the 75-year, \$5,000 sentence. Baldivia's attorneys appealed

Baldivia started serving his sentence in the Texas Dept. of Corrections in 1987 while awaiting the decision of the appellate

Davis appeared in the Amarillo Court of Appeals again in October, urging that the conviction be sustained.

This week the appellate court panel held unanimously that the evidence in the case was sufficient to uphold the conviction, and that trial procedures had not kept Baldivia from receiving a fair trial.

Jail escapee draws 'stacked' sentence

Danny Nathan Pevehouse, 26, of Hart, received a five-year "stacked" sentence and a \$5,000 fine after pleading guilty in 242nd District Court this week to five felony

The "stacked" sentence ordered by Judge Marvin Marshall means that Pevehouse's five-year sentence will not begin until he completes his sentence for a burglary conviction assessed against him in November 1987 by the same court.

Pevehouse was returned here from the Texas Dept. of Corrections in November to face charges of aggravated sexual assault, two burglaries of the Castro County Recreation Association and felony theft by check, all of which occurred before his November 1987 sentencing. While awaiting legal action on those charges, he escaped

from the county jail Nov. 5. Sheriff's officers recaptured him the following day.

Pevehouse pleaded guilty to all five of the new charges.

In other 242nd District Court action this week, a seven-woman, five-man jury acquitted 39-year-old David Michael Cooper on criminal mischief charges.

Two property owners testified that their rental property had been damaged during Cooper's residency. Testimony indicated that the property involved had been approved previously for federally subsidized rental payments.

Cooper, testifying in his own defense, admitted a federal conviction from Iowa but denied the accusations of the local property

At their Monday night meeting, the Dimmitt Aldermen began the process for an assessment paving project in Dimmitt.

Northwest Fifth Street north of Halsell will be included in the project, in accordance with the city's agreement with the contractors who are erecting rental housing for senior citizens in that area.

"We want to include as many unpaved streets in the city as possible on the original project plan when we call for bids," Mayor Wayne Collins said. "Then if some do not work out they can be dropped, but no additional streets can be added once the project is started."

City Manager Reeford Burrous was directed to prepare a map of all unpaved streets and present it at the next meeting of the aldermen.

In an assessment paving project, property owners must pay the cost of the paving or it will be added as a lein to their property. Usually a company comes in and arranges a pay-back program, so that property owners can pay the cost over a number of years, rather than in one lump sum.

A public hearing is required to garner public comment on the assessment paving project, and complaints should be based on whether the cost of the paving will exceed the amount of benefit or improvement to the property.

Burrous reported to the aldermen that the city permit issued to Joe's Pool Hall on East Bedford had been revoked last week, causing it to be shut down.

He said that after studying the number of police calls due to disturbances at the establishment, it was judged to be in violation of city ordinances governing public nuisances and disturbing the peace. Several city policemen also gave comments about the situation.

Officers said there was no effort to control the amount of drinking that took place and no effort to eject any who were unruly until the police were called.

Owner of the establishment, Joe

Ortiz, did not appear at Monday's meeting to protest the closing, although city attorney Jack Edwards said he could make an appeal at any time by offering to make changes in its operation.

The aldermen accepted the sealcoating bid submitted by Appian Corporation of Hereford, offering 54.9 cents per square yard for a total of \$27,340.20 with a 45-day completion date. The seal-coating will be done in late spring or early

Other total bids received were for \$28,884 from Ronnie Zahn Paving of Lubbock, \$30,876 from High Plains Pavers of Plainview, and \$34,760.40 from L.A. Fuller & Sons Construction of Amarillo.

Glenn Sparkman, representative of the city's engineering firm of McMorries & Sons, examined the bid specifications and confirmed

that Appian's met all requirements and was the best bid.

The aldermen gave their approval for changes in the city personnel policies and procedures manual to bring it into compliance with the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act. Burrous said the changes were minor, and had been approved by the department heads.

The new ordinance spelling out policies for the city landfill operation was approved by the aldermen. Fines for violations were set "not to exceed \$200."

The bid from Jack Cartright for \$1,500 for Lots 3 and 4 of Block 25 was accepted by the aldermen, with proceeds from the sale to be divided proportionally between the city, school and county to apply toward back taxes.

Burrous told the aldermen that Blue Cross-Blue Shield informed him that the city's premiums are going up 29%. Burrous said he is checking with Texas Municipal League to see if better rates can be obtained.

Action was tabled on a complaint from Carl King at the Texas Corn Growers office. Burrous said that King has complained about the fire siren that is on a city warehouse near King's office. King asked that the siren be moved, but Burrous said a local firm estimated that it would cost \$625 to mount the siren on the water tower, where it would be higher and aimed in a different direction.

Hance is new RRC chairman

Republican Kent Hance, a native of Dimmitt, was sworn in as Railroad Commissioner Tuesday and was also selected to preside over the regulatory agency for the next two years.

Democrat Jim Nugent, a 10-year veteran of the commission, and Hance, were sworn in and pledged to work for the betterment of the state's economically troubled energy industry. Following the swearing-in ceremony, Nugent passed the chairman's gavel to Hance.

A former state senator and congressman, Hance has attended several meetings of the OPEC oil ministers in the past year and said this country is an industrial giant, but must have an abundant supply of inexpensive energy to maintain its status in the world.

"We will try to do everything we can to stabilize (oil) prices," Hance

Hance, son of Beral Hance of Dimmitt, was appointed to the commission by Gov. Bill Clements in August 1987 to replace Mack Wallace. Hance was elected to the office in November 1988 and is the first Republican to serve on the commission.

Mason to step down at Nazareth


Supt. Johnny Mason, who helped guide the Nazareth Public Schools to "Top Ten" academic status in the state last year, has announced that he will retire in June.

The Nazareth School Board this week started its search for a succes-

Mason will complete 39 years as a teacher, coach and administrator, the last 11 of them at Nazareth.

Mason served in Dimmitt (1973-78) as junior high principal and special services director before accepting the superintendency at Nazareth. He and his wife, Gloria, live in Dimmitt.

Mason also has taught and

Plainview, and has been a school administrator at Kress, Quitaque, Lockney and Dallas.

"My experience at Nazareth has been excellent," Mason said. "I told the board in my letter that my service here was one of the highlights of my career."

Last year, Nazareth High was named one of the top 10 schools in the state academically, based on students' scores on the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) tests. NHS also ranked nationally in the Science Research Associates examination, "which is really a little more difficult than the TEAMS test," Mason

In explaining his school's academic success, he said, "There are several factors, and it's hard to put down in words. I think the high expectations the parents have from their kids, the high expectations of the teachers, and good attendance all are factors.

"Also, it's important that the kids have been successful in other things," he said. "Success in one field stimulates success in others."

NHS's state academic rating followed a decade of record-setting athletic success by Nazareth students, including state championships in girls' and boys' basketball, tennis and cross-country racing, and regular trips to regional and

state in literary events. "Our teachers and coaches really

teach and coach," he added, "and they expect the kids to achieve

Mason grew up in Hereford and Plainview, and graduated from Plainview High School in January 1944, during World War II.

He went into the Navy right out of high school and served two years in the South Pacific as a motor machinist.

After the war he came home and married Gloria, his high school sweetheart, then accepted an athletic scholarship to Abilene Christian College, where he played football and ran track with his older brother, Mick, and his younger brother, Tim. (Another brother, Mick's twin, Wick, was killed in action during the war.)

After receiving his BS degree, he coached and taught at Lamesa, Kress and Plainview, then returned to Kress to accept his first administrative job, high school principal, in

He earned his master of education degree from West Texas State University 1955 and later served as superintendent at Quitaque and

(Lockney High School was the only other North Texas school to make the state's academic Top 10 last year. The present superintendent there was hired by Mason originally as the junior high principal, succeeding Joe King, who later preceded Mason as superintendent at Nazareth.)

Mason came to Dimmitt from Dallas Christian School, where he had served a year as superinten-

Two of his most "unnerving" experiences had to do with integrating the schools at Kress in 1955 and at Ouitaque in 1965.

"I was the high school principal at Kress in '55," he recalled. "We did not have any blacks in our school, or a school for blacks. We



The Corn Growers

The Texas Corn Growers Association and the Texas Corn Producers Board held their 16th annual meeting last week.

Every annual meeting of the two organizations has been held in Dimmitt, because this is the headquarters of the Texas corn industry. These two organizations have made it so. We're proud of that.

The Texas Corn Growers Association (TCGA) was founded in Dimmitt in 1972, not long after corn became our major crop. The father of the organization is Carl King, who still serves as its president.

Other officers of the TCGA are Jim Dowty of Dumas, vicepresident, and Jo Beth Shackleford of Hereford, secretary. Board members are Marion Garland of Sunray, Gene Heath of Hale Center, Jay Boston of Hereford, Doug Higgins of Hart, Bert Williams of Farwell, Harold Bob Bennett of Hart, Lois Wales of Dimmitt, Dan Heard of Dimmitt and Ray Joe Riley of Hart.

The TCGA was founded as a political organization, to represent the interests of Texas corn growers with the state legislature, the US Congress and the many regulatory agencies that affect our state's corn industry.

The Texas Corn Producers Board (TCPB) was established in February 1980, after corn producers in a seven-county area of the High Plains (where most of the state's corn is grown) voted in a referendum in favor of a check-off fee to support research, development and promotion of Texas corn. As a state-sanctioned commodity producers' group, the TCPB is non-political, and administers the fund created by the check-off fee. The check-off fund may be used to develop and carry out programs of research, disease and insect control, predator control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing and use of Texas corn.

Weldon Davis of Hart is president of the TCPB board. Directors are Raymond Schlabs of Frio, Harold Bob Bennett of Hart, Jerry Don Glover of Muleshoe, Doug Higgins of Hart, Carl King of Dimmitt, Bert Williams of Farwell, Joe Reed of Kress and Ronnie Sherrod of Hale Center.

These two organizations have had quite an impact.

The TCGA has been quite influential with the Texas Legislature, Congress, the USDA and the EPA as it has fought and lobbied for regulations and legislation to benefit our corn industry.

Research funded by the TCPB has helped improve Texas corn to the point that it is certifiably about the best anywhere, and TCPB-funded promotion programs are helping get that word out to the rest of the world.

Veterans should beware of insurance dividend hoax

A GI insurance dividend hoak aimed at veterans for more than 25 years is again plaguing the Veterans Administration, this time with a new target - the Vietnam era veteran.

The VA reports it is getting nearly 15,000 applications a week for a non-existent dividend at its Philadelphia insurance center and many of the letters are from Vietnam era veterans.

"We've had some inquiries from veterans here and our accountant, Bea Jones, contacted the VA insurance representative in Austin," said Lewis Heck, quartermaster of the Castro Memorial Lodge, VFW.

"The representative said that what this amounts to is that someone has sold your name and address and you've wound up on their mailing list," Jones said. "He said it's nothing but a hoax."

VA's legitimate dividends are eagerly awaited each year by policyholders. More than three million veterans this year are sharing in an annual dividend distribution of nearly \$935 million. Payments are automatic to those who continue to pay premiums, usually on the anniversary date of the policy. No application is needed.

The World War II veteran has been the principal victim of the hoax since the early 1960s," said Robert W. Carey, director of the center. "We've been telling them for years that despite what a bogus mimeographed flyer says, the VA does not pay dividends on lapsed National Service Life Insurance policies. Now we have a new generation to contend with."

The mysterious applications promise dividens "whether or not the insurance is still carried," and announce that payments for as much as several hundred dollars are due. The announcements attribute the bogus dividend to recent legislation passed by the Congress.

"There has been no such legislation," Carey said, "and there is none pending. I have no idea how these forms started, but they've been with us for years.

In addition to the expense in labor and mailing costs borne by the VA, thousands of inquiries are received by the agency's other 57 regional offices across the country. Most are from wary veterans seeking confirmation of the dividend. Others are irate callers who want to know what the VA is doing about stamping out the erroneous infor-

Applications are printed in wellmeaning but misguided magazines, newspapers and newsletters. Contacted by the VA, editors are quick to public retractions, but the interim periods are sometimes weeks and







City shuts down local pool hall

Hall last Thursday.

Acting on a complaint by Police Chief Gary Thurman, City Manager Reeford Burrous revoked the pool hall's operating permit, claiming the business at 605 E. Bedford St. was "disturbing the peace and tranquility of the neighborhood."

In his complaint, Thurman said that since Jan. 1, 1988, the Police Dept. had been called to the pool hall 13 times and had made 28 arrests for public intoxication, assault and disorderly conduct.

"I believe that this is a clear indication that the establishment is ill-governed and disturbs the peace and tranquility of the neighborhood." Thurman said.

In the latest incidents, a man was stabbed at the pool hall Dec. 18, and on Jan 7 a woman reportedly pulled a knife on two police officers after they had placed a male friend of hers under arrest for pub-

The city shut down Joe's Pool lic intoxication. The officers said they had to draw their weapons to disarm her.

Joe Ortiz, the pool hall's owner, told the News he will wait until the first of the month before deciding whether to appeal the closure to the City Board of Aldermen or hire an attorney and challenge the city's action in co ..

Ortiz, who also owns Joe's Liquor Store and Joe's Beer & Wine adjacent to the pool hall, said the closure "is hurting my business

"I hate to get into trouble with the law, but I know that what they've done is not right," Ortiz said. "I don't think there was any reason for them to close it up. The trouble wasn't my fault; I wasn't doing anything wrong there myself. If people come there and make trouble, the law ought to pick them

(Continued From Page 1) transferred all our black students to Tulia.

"One day the superintendent at Tulia notified us they could no longer take our black kids, and we woke up in mid-semester with 25 black students. As far as I know, that was the first integration in this whole area.

"We had only one incident between black and white students: that occurred on a school bus and not in the hallways," he said.

"At Quitaque, we had a black school with one teacher, and we integrated the schools in 1965, more for economic reasons than anything else-we didn't have the money to keep operating two systems. We really didn't have any problems there; the kids all knew each other.

His coaching days have left him with a lot of memories, too.

Mason especially remembers three athletes he helped coach: Don Maynard of Lamesa, who later became a wide receiver for the New York Jets; Billy Houghton of Plainview, who became a receiver for Green Bay and Dallas; and Bobby Hawkins of Lamesa, who was a top half-miler at Texas Tech.

While at Quitaque, he had the thrill of seeing his daughter Cheryl and three other students go to state in tennis, and the boys' basketball team make it to state.

All his memories of athletics aren't happy ones, though.

"Probably the two most devastating things that have happened to me was to have two coaches die of heart attacks while working for me," he recalled. "James Roberts at Quitaque was only 25, and he died while playing a baseball game. And J. L. Martin at Lockney was just 40 when he collapsed while calling a Little Dribblers game. He died the next day."

While serving at Plainview and Kress, Mason put in eight years as a referee, and officiated many of Dimmitt's football and basketball

"Some of the worst problems I got into as a referee was when Dimmitt was playing Sudan," he said. "That was a pretty hot rivalry back then.

"I was in the shower after one game and heard the Sudan coachhis name was Smith-cussing me out in the dressing room, in front of the kids. I was about 25 years old, and decided I wasn't going to put up with that. I got out of the shower and confronted him. He backed

"Later, I was in Dimmitt to referee a game and was talking to John Blaine in the gym when Smith walked in. He saw me and said, 'I won't play with him here.' Blaine said, 'I'll hire the referees here. If you don't want to play with him here, you'll just have to go home.' And he stayed and played."

As an administrator, Mason has helped many others get their start.

"One thing I'm really proud ofand I have this on a plaque-is that 18 whom I hired have moved into school administration," he said. "I have always prided myself in that. I've always had good people."

In retirement, Mason said, "I'll probably continue to work in the educational field as a teacher evaluator or something similar. Also, we have a mobile home and we plan to travel, and maybe take our grandkids."







The board elected SPS President W.R. Esler to the additional post of chief executive officer, formerly held by Ballengee. Ballengee remains chairman of the board.

The SPS board also elected John L. Anderson, director of personnel, as a vice president. Anderson will have responsibility for the company's employee development programs, employee benefit programs,

Separately, on Jan. 9, the boards of directors of SPS's two wholly-owned subsidiaries, Utility Engineering Corporation and Quixx Corporation, made several officer changes.

Each board elected Esler as its chairman, replacing Ballengee, who remains a member of the boards of directors of the subsidiaries.

Albert A. "Pete" Smith has been elected president and chief executive officer of Utility Engineering. He has previously served as vice president and chief operating officer

Utility Engineering provides design, engineering and constructionsupervision services to a variety of companies. Its recent projects include two power plants for other electric utilities in Texas and a busmanufacturing facility in New Mexico.

Monroe "Hub" Floyd, who had been president and chief executive officer of Utility Engineering, becomes vice chairman of the board of the company. He has also been elected president and chief executive officer of Quixx.

Quixx provides telecommunications and data processing services and finances the sale of heat pumps to customers.

"The increasing activity and re-

sponsibility of the two subsidiaries makes these moves appropriate," Ballengee said. "Quixx will benefit from the experienced leadership of Mr. Floyd, who helped launch Utility Engineering to the success it is now enjoying. Utility Engineering is poised to build upon its fine record under the direction of Mr. Smith, who has been a key officer in the subsidiary since its beginning."

Corporate headquarters is in Amarillo.
