Tony B. Maxey, after serving meritoriously as county attorney of Floyd county for the past three years, is offering himself as district attorney of the 110th Judicial District composed of Floyd, Briscoe, Motley and Dickens Counties.

During the period he has served the county, beginning in January, 1931, Maxey has been called upon to handle a tremendous amount of work for the county in addition to the regular work of the county attorney's office, and has handled the job quite satisfactorily. Among the matters which have required his attention were the salvaging of the county funds from the failed depository and acquisition of some forty miles of highway right-of-way through the county. He has represented the county in all its litigations since taking the office.

Mr. Maxey is 36 years of age, married and has two daughters. He is a lifelong democrat. He comes to Texas from Tennessee. His legal and political background includes study under the guidance of his father, who was an attorney before him, and service as the youngest member of the Tennessee House of Representatives in 1923-24. He has been practicing law since 1919, a period of fourteen years.

He plans soon to begin an active campaign for nomination for the office, when he will make formal announcement of his candidacy.—Hloyd County Hesperian.
