Cotton Reduction In Dickens Co. Nears Completion

The cotton reduction program in Dickens County is nearing completion as far as the work in the County is concerned. The contracts will be submitted to the State and District Board for their approval. When approved, they will be sent to Washington for final acceptance and issuance of checks, which is hoped, will be made by the last of April.

The total number of contracts offered to the secretary is 761, representing 31,471 acres, with an indicated average planting of 8,551 acres through the base period 1932-33.

Motley County News Absorbed by Tribune

A deal was consummated Wednesday morning whereby the Motley County News, owned and published by G. C. Mitchell, sold its name, subscription list, business and goodwill to the Tribune Publishing Company, owned by Douglas Meador and Howard Hamilton. The two publications will be merged under the name of Matador Tribune after this issue of each paper. The entire plant equipment was retained by Mr. Mitchell, and will be moved to another location.

Mr. Mitchell has been editor and publisher of the Motley County News for over eight years. The paper, under various names, has been established over 35 years.

The Matador Tribune, which was formerly the Roaring Springs News, was moved to Matador last December.

The entire circulation of both papers will be combined in complete coverage of Motley county. The Matador Tribune is now the only newspaper published in the county.—Matador Tribune.

Interest In Corn- Hog Reduction Shows Increase

Interest in the Corn-Hog reduction program has made a noticeable increase in that 77 contracts have been signed up to Saturday, March 17th. The 77 contracts represented 3558 head of hogs and 262 acres of corn. The reduction effected will be 889 hogs and 52 acres of corn. There are several contracts which have not been accounted for, which will bring the total number up to 85 or 90 contracts in the County and which will represent some thousand head of hogs to be reduced in the two-year average production for Dickens County.

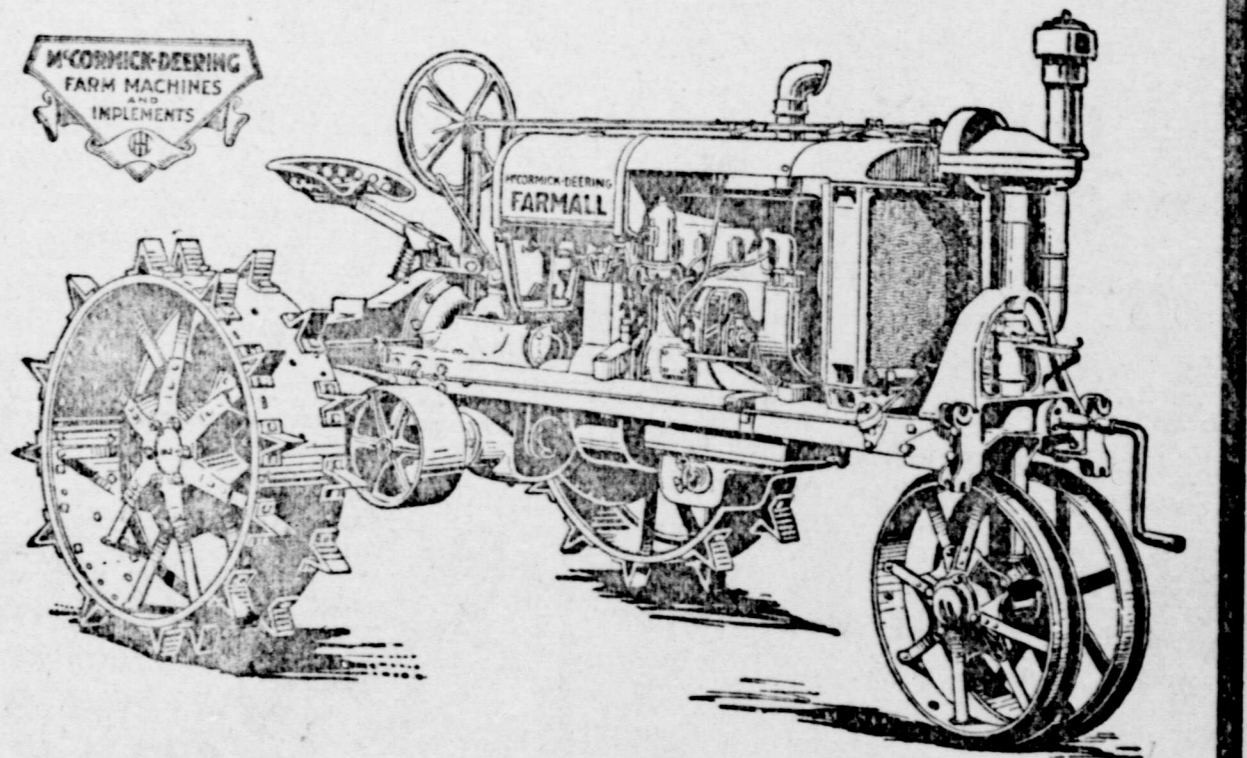

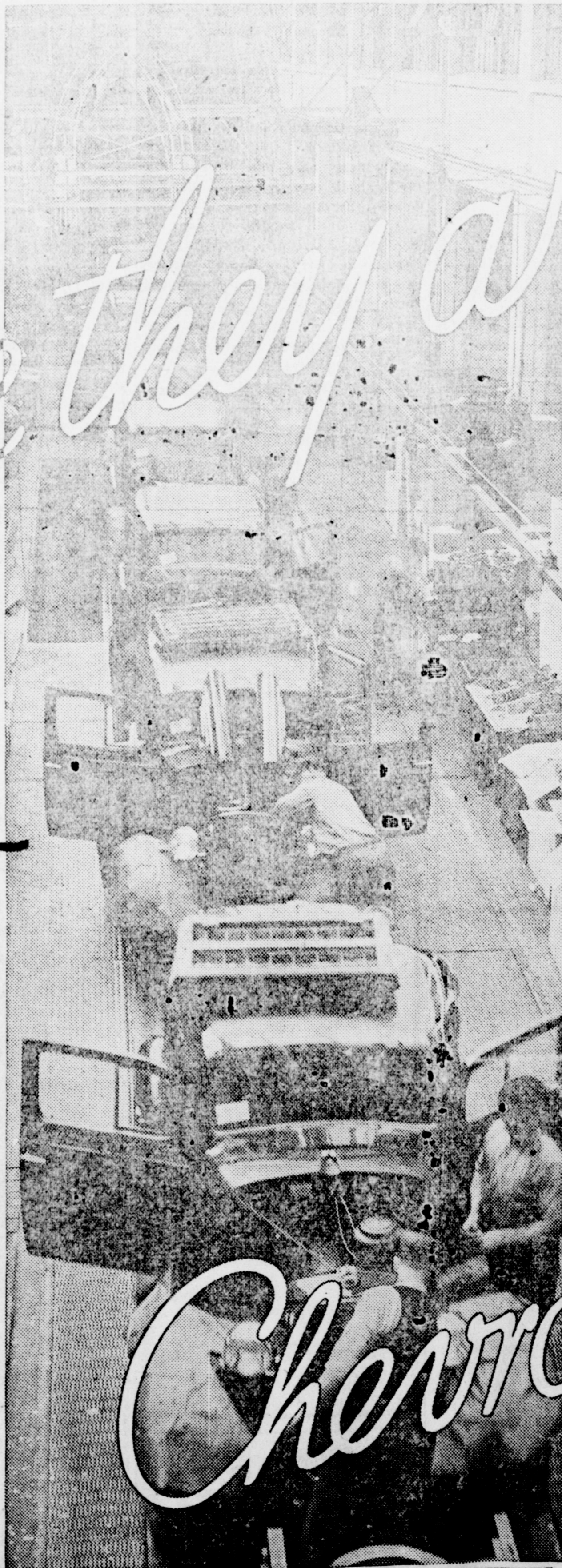

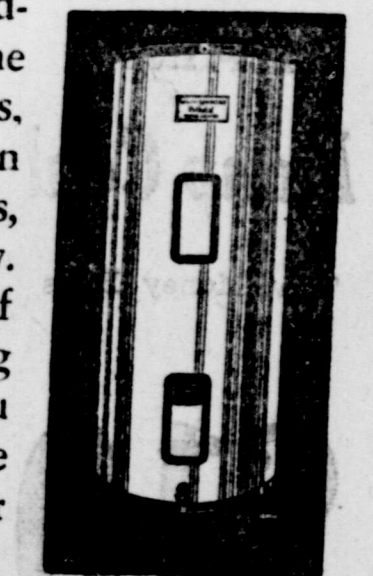
