## Services Held Here Wednesday For Mrs. M. McKnight

Services were held here Wednesday for Mrs. Myrtle McKnight who died in a Wichita Falls hospital on May 29. She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Garner, a pioneer family of this section and for a number of years made her home here and one of the largest crowds ever to gather at the local cemetery, were present to pay their respects to the deceased.

Mrs. McKnight was born September 18, 1877 at Cowan, Franklin county, Tennessee, and moved to Texas with her parents in 1881. In 1890 the family moved to Dickens county where she was married to A. McKnight, who died November 1920. To this union five daughters were born, four of whom survive. They are Miss Bee McKnight, Dallas; Mrs. Sam Bond, Loyalty; Miss Esther McKnight, Wichita Falls; and Mrs. J. L. White, Waco.

Her Praents, Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Garner and five sisters and a brother also survive, all of whom are residents in this vicinity. Sisters are Mrs. W. L. Hyatt, Mrs. Hamp Collett, Mrs. M. L. Jones and Miss Ella Garner, city and Mrs. Bud Morrison of Red Mud. The brother, Will Garner resides in the Red Hill community east of the city.

Services were held at the H. T. Garner home, Rev. R. C. Brown, pastor of the First Christian Church reading the rites; and interment followed in Spur cemetery under direction of Webber Williams.

Mrs. McKnight was converted about 25 years ago and united with the Methodist church. Later she transferred her membership to the Christian Church of which she was a member at the time of her death. The many friends of the Garner family join in offering condolence and sympathy in the loss of their daughter and sister.

## Final Topping Be Placed On Road To County Line

The Highway Commission last week made an order for several road improvements which included Crosby, Dickens, and King Counties.

The Crosby county project is for a little more than eight miles of bituminous seal coat from 3.1 miles east of Crosbyton to 0.8 miles east of the Crosby-Dickens County line on Highway 24 in Crosby and Dickens counties.

In Dickens and King counties, instructing highway engineers to prepare plans for the first unit of Highway 24 from present end near county line to connection with present road in Dickens county, 7.5 miles, and another section to connect with present road in King county; these to be included in projects for early consideration on condition that counties furnish fence right-of-way—Crosbyton Review.

Coach Wadzek was formerly a student of the Spur High Schools and has numerous friends in this section.

## Southall Elected As Head of Dist. No. 22 North Part County

Supt. O. C. Southall, for the last seven years head of the schools at Seminole, Texas, has been elected to head the schools of the newly consolidated District No. 22 in the north part of Dickens County.

Mr. Southall comes usually prepared for the work in this county, having consolidated thirteen districts into one to form the present Seminole Consolidated School of which he has been superintendent and business manager. Under his leadership the Seminole school has progressed from an unaffiliated, unclassified school to a first class four-year high school with 20 units of affiliation. More than half of the children in the school ride to school each day on busses. At present the district has an area of 660 square miles—probably the largest school district in West Texas.

He has many friends and acquaintances in Dickens County as he formerly lived in the eastern part of the county and taught 18 years ago at Wichita just prior to entering the army as one of Dickens' county quota. Southall states that he is very anxious to get on the ground and go to work on the many problems that must be solved in the development of the new school, which will be the second largest in the county.

## Paul Muni Coming To Ritz in Comedy

"A newspaper story that's different."

Mr. McClain stated that the gun had been kept handy to use on cats and other animals depreeding on his chickens at night, but that heretofore he had unloaded the gun and was shocked and grieved that he had failed to do so this time.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock and interment made in the Cemetery at Red Mud.

Fail To Locate 3 Victims of Gulf

Galveston, May 28—Coast guardsmen searching for the bodies of two men and a woman believed drowned in San Luis Pass at the western end of Galveston Island had found no trace of them tonight.

Names of the trio, missing since a Sunday afternoon swimming party were given as Mrs. Dean Forrest, 26, employe of a Houston insurance company; J. C. Thompson, about 35, Houston oil man, and F. P. Etheridge, about 40, oil man, whose home address is unknown. A fourth member of the party, whose name was given as Mrs. Sylvia Eggert of Houston, remained on the beach when the others entered the water. 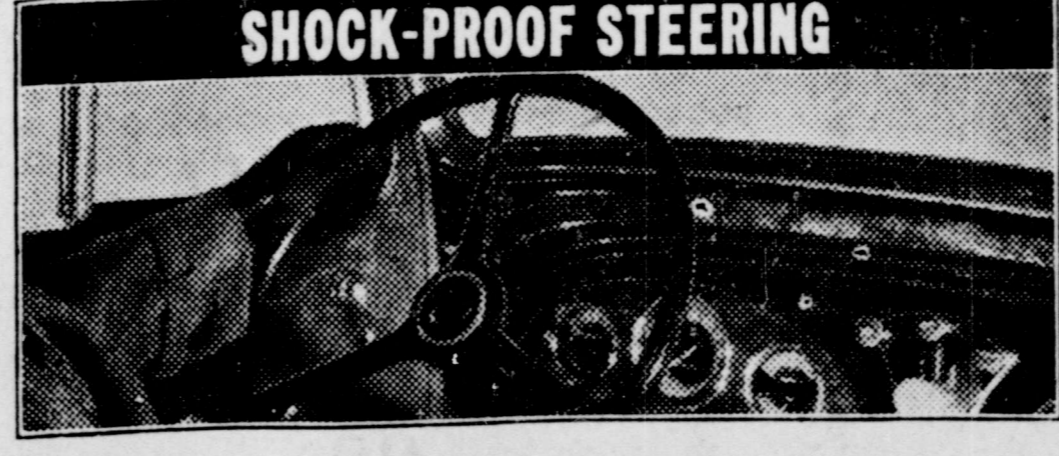
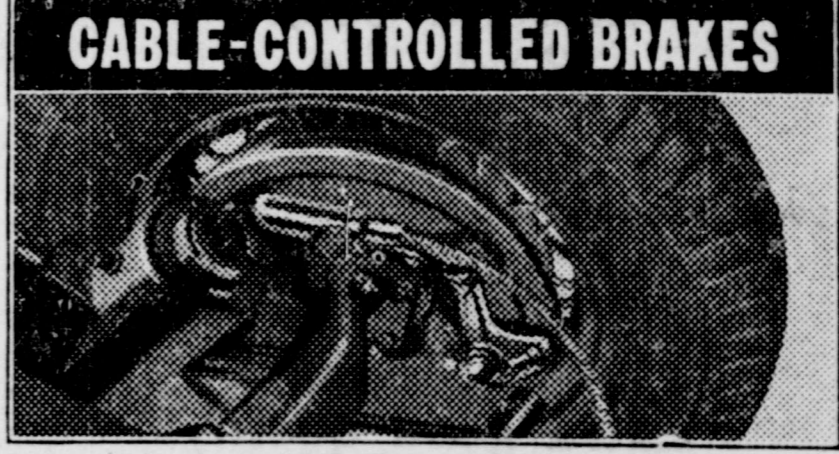
