## Mayor answers charter queries

Referendum gives the people the right to get unwanted laws removed from the books, even if the
council is unwilling to do With recall, the people can throw out the mayor and the whole council if they want to, also through a petition process.
On the subject of annexation, I explained that it is a power the city
would have, but I feel it would be used wisely-not to grab up a lot of additional -not to grab up a lot of development of the City of Dim-
Also, I pointed out that annexation is different from the right of eminent domain that the city has had for many years, through state
law, and will continue to have under the charter. Cities have the right to acquire property for public use at a fair market price, but there are procedures that have to be
followed under state and federal followed un
guidelines.
She had the idea that individual She had the idea that individual
freedoms would be denied under freedoms would be denied under same amount of individual freedom, plus the additional options of having more of a hand in their city government. Petitions in the areas of initiative, referendum or recall
can come under consideration with can come under consideration with
only $10 \%$ of the registered voters signing them, and thus making it possible for an issue to be brought before all of the voters.
NEWS: What other concerns the proposed charter? the proposed charter? asked about whether the charter would provide more effective means to deal with the monopolies that operate in the city. I would say yes, this charter will give the city
the maximum power allowed under state law in dealing with franchises. We will have a few more options in dealing with cable television, for law.

## Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about: - the value placed on your property - exemptions that may apply to you - cancellation of agricultural appraisal; - whether your property is taxable; which local governments should be taxing your property; or

- you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

Informal Review: If you have any questions concerning your appraisal, please contact the Appraisal District at 204 S.E 3rd (Rear), Dimmitt, Texas or telephone 806-647-5131.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a
protest form from the appraisal district protest form from the appraisal district
office at 204 S.E. 3rd (Rear), Dimmitt, office at 204
Texas 79027

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires you to sign an affidavit saying
that you haven't done so before the ARB that you haven't
hears your case.

Review by the Distrit Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at $\$ 1,000,000$ or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order
