### IN THE RUN-OFF Felix C. Gipson, FOR GOVERNOR County Pioneer, Died Friday, 27

Felix C. Gipson, pioneer farmer, rancher, and druggist, for almost 35 years identified with the progressive civic activities of Dickens and Dickens county, died in a Lubbock hospital Friday, July 27, at 12:40 o'clock His death followed an operation for appendicitis.

Mr. Gipson was born in Hunt county, Texas, on the 9th of March, 1872, where he spent the greater part of his boyhood. He came to Dickens county in 1899, after having spent about a year in Taylor county. Here, with his young wife, he farmed for about four years; later entering the drug business. For a time he was also engaged in the hardwar, business, and served two years as County Judge of Dickens county. Having progressed with his drug store endeavors since 1904, the pioneer Dickensite was a few years ago superceded by one of his sons, Jack, in the drug business, and since that time has spent the greater part of his time attending to his ranching interests.

A good citizen, progressive, sincere and fond of the liberal democracy of the astral clime, Mr. Gipson was respected and liked by all who knew him. He was a member of the Cuhrch of Christ.

Funeral services were held at the Church of Christ at Dickens Saturday afternoon at 5:00 o'clock, a trio of ministers, John T. Smith, Lubbock; Guy Woods, Kirkland: and Albert Smith, Spur, speaking the solemnities. Interment was made in Dickens cemetery.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NUMBER 16 Be It Resolved By The Legislature

Of The State of Texas Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to

hereafter read as follows: Section 1. Taxation to be equal and uniform as to real estate and to be equal and uniform as to all reasonable classifications of property; and occupation and income taxes; exemptions; limitations upon counties, cities, etc.

"Taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform. All property in this State, whether owned by persons or corporations, other than municipal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, which shall be ascertained as may be provided by law. The Legislature may by general laws make reasonable classifications of all property other than real property for the purpose of taxation, and may impose different rates thereon; provided that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform. Legislature may impose a poll tax It may also impose occupation taxes, both upon natural persons and upon corporations, other than municipal, doing business in this State. It may also tax incomes of both persons and corporations other than municipal, except that persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits shall never be required to pay an occupation tax. provided that Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture, belonging to each family in the State, shall be exempt from taxation, and provided further that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town for any year on persons or corporations pursuing any profession or business, shall not exceed onehalf of the tax levied by the State for the same period of such profession or business."

NUMBER 41 Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 5, of Article XI, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Cities having more than five thousand (5,000) inhabitants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose adopt or amend their charters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no charter or any ordinance passed under said charter shall contain any provision inconsistent with the Constitution of the State, or of the general laws en-;acted by the Legislature of this State; said cities may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their charters; but no tar for any purpose shall ever belawful for any one year, which shall exceed two and one-half per cent (21/2 per cent) of the taxable property of such city, and no debt shall ever be created by any city, unless at the same time provision be made to assess and collect annually a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund for at least two percent (2 per cent) thereon. provided further, that no ctiy charter shall be altered, amended or repealed oftener than every twelve (12) months."

The duration of all offices not fixed by this Constitution shall never exceed two (2) years, except that the elected officials of a city that has adopted and amended its Charter as provided in Section 5, Article XI of the Constitution of Texas may, by amendment to such city's charter, hold office not to exceed four (4) years; provided, that when a Railroad Commission is created by law it shall be composed of three (3) Commissioners who shall be elected by the people at a general election for State officers and their term of office shall be six (6) years; provided, Railroad Commissioners first elected after this Amendment goes into effect shall hold office as follows: One shall serve two (2) years, and one four (4) years and one six (6) years. their terms to be decided by lot immediately after they shall have qualified. And one Railroad Commissioner shall be elected every two (2) years thereafter. In case of vacancy in said office the Governor of the State shall fill said vacancy by appointment until the next General Election."
