Spur Schools To Begin On Sept. 2

(By Supt. O. C. Thomas) and the time is almost here to begin periment Station registered 64 hunanother term of school. With good dredths of an inch. Heavy rains crop prospects in view and the recent rain the Spur Public School is looking forward to a successful year. School will begin Monday, September 2nd. Many pupils from surrounding school districts have transferred to Spur High School. The enrollment in the high school promises to be the largest the school has ever had. All buildings are being cleaned and repaired. A new oak floor has been put in the Senior High School auditorium and this floor has been leveled so comfortable study hall conditions may exist.

The Spur Schools are happy to welcome the great number of pupils from the rural communities. It is the intention of the Spur School to add such courses as will train students to go into the world and make a living for themselves. The present trend in education is to train the pupil to do those things better that he is going to do after he leaves school. In accomplishing this purpose Spur High School is offering a number of elective courses with the required ones.

Vocational Agriculture, Home Economics, and Commercial Courses will be offered as in the past, and this year Public Speaking and Band will be added. In Science, Biology will be offeered instead of Physics or Chemistry. This change is made because so few students take either Physics or Chemistry and the per pupil cost is abviously very high Credit in Business Arithmetic and Civics will be required of all students before graduation. One-half year in Business Arithmetic is required because it is felt so many students graduate without a knowledge of the fundamentals of arithmetic. Naturally Civics is required so that the high school may do its part in developing better American Citizens. Only extracurricular credit in Band will be given this year, but a full credit will be given for a year's work in Public Speaking.

Miss Quanah Lewis, a graduate of the University of Oklahoma, will teach Public Speaking. Miss Lewis majored in this field and has taught this course in Sweetwater and Post High Schools. Mr. Burgess Brown. a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University, will direct Band and teach Science. A regular class in Band Music will be offered without cost to the student, and private lessons may be had for a small fee. Spur High School is especially fortunate in securing the services of a well trained band master. Mr. Brown has been with the famous Cowboy Miles and Hindman Band for several years while it was under the direction of Mr. Wiley who is now at Texas Tech.

President Supports Old Age Pension; And Insurance Plan

Washington, Aug. 10-Quick signing and inauguration of the Administration's vast social security program, enacted by Congress after months of maneuvering and turbulent debate is indicated by President Roosevelt.

The general expectation was that he would shortly set up a board of three members to administer old age pensions. States will handle the unemployment insurance, although the Treasury will hold the funds. The children's bureau will control disbursements to help handicapped mothers and children.

(Under the bill employers and employes eventually will be taxed 3 per cent each on wages up to \$3, 000 annually, to provide for age pensions. Benefits range from \$10 to \$85 a month.)

The bill also sets up a federalstate employment insurance system and calls for an appropriation \$100,000,000 next year by the Federal Government to provide for old age and grants to the blind, crippled children and needy mothers. addition. the Government will offer grants of \$15 a month, to be matched by the States, for needy aged not cared for under the contributory pension system.

The measure, which involves th largest tax ever approved by Congress, is designed to apply the old age and unemployment systems to 25,000,000 workers.

Many sections of the bill have been challenged as being unconstitutional, including that levying tax to set up the old age pension fund. This fund, it has been estimated, will total \$50,000,000,000



Press Censorship In Europe

When David Darrah, for seven years the Chicago Tribune's correpondent in Italy, sent his June 14 despatch from Paris, he called atention indirectly to the widepread press censorship in Europe, The Literary Digest reports.

Mr. Darrah, with two Germans and an Austrian, was the fourth correspondent to be expelled from Italy since March. Two days previously the New York Times had printed on its front page the news that The Times had been forbidden entry into Italy, not for what its correspondent, Arnolda Cortesi, had written but for an editorial published in The Times quoting Stanley Baldwin on Mussolini: "Mussolini has kept himself in power longer than most people thought possible, but the earth always trembles where he stands. Any day a great public catastrophe or a vast shaking off of Italian fetters in order to be free might leave him helpless on the ground, a shorn Samson."

Spread of Censorship

In Germany all pamphlets of J. R. Rutherford, published by the Watch Tower Bible & Tract society of Brooklyn, issues of The Times from June 2 to 5 inclusive, and The Manchester Guardian (previously banned in Italy) were included in the twenty-one publications which newsdealers had to surrender.

On information sent from Moscow by Walter Duranty, the only countries in Europe which have no press censorship are Great Britain, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, the Netherlands, and Switzerland. Another analysis by Bruce Blevin, of The New Republic, disclosed that two-thirds of the world's population live under a rigid censorship and only one-ninth under the degree of freedom existing in the United States and Great


