## DIPHTHERIA CLINIC WED AND THURS. SPUR HOSPITAL

Since there is some diphtheria in and around Spur a Diphtheria Clinic has been definitely arranged at the Spur Hospital with Doctors Wiley and Hale doing the vaccinating. Free diphtheria toxoid has been secured from the State Department of Health and separate needles will be used on each pupil. By taking all of the Spur Public School children in a group to the hospital we can get the life-time toxoid for 50c per pupil. I understand that the price ranges from \$3.00 to \$3.50 per person when administered individually.

The vaccination at the clinic began yesterday at 9:00 A. M. and will close Thursday at 4:00 P. M. for all children that attend Spur Public Schools. If you wish to take advantage of this opportunity to get life-time inoculation against diphtheria bring your child and 50c to the Spur Hospital or send the 50c by the child and the teacher will take them to the hospital in groups.

The first begun yesterday at 9:00 A. M. and continue until the whole school has had an opportunity to get vaccinated.—O. C. THOMAS, Superintendent.

## School News From Over The County

### Seventh Grade Meeting

The seventh grade teachers of the county met in their second meeting of the year in the County Superintendent's office on Tuesday, December 3. Practically every seventh grade teacher in the county was present. The program is being entered into with unusual interest and enthusiasm. A splendid outline for the year's work is under construction by the teachers themselves. Every effort is being put forth to standardize each school in the county.

### Immunization

About 680 doses of toxoid have been received from the State Department of Health to be given to school children in the county, who have not been immunized. When diphtheria broke out in Spur a week or two ago, Mrs. Twaddell, the County Superintendent, had a survey made of the schools to see how many children needed it, and then wired Austin. The Health Department furnishes the toxoid free and the local doctors will administer it. Clinics will be arranged in the near future.

### Music in the Schools

Mrs. Madge D. Twaddell, Dickens County School Superintendent, is working to put over the biggest music program that our county has ever had. This year as part of the Centennial Celebration in Dallas, some fifty thousand children in Texas will sing the same songs at the same time. The plan is for every community to be represented in this momentous choir.

In order to have a county chorus each school must have the same training. With that goal in view, Mrs. McKnight, voice teacher from Spur and Music Director of the Dickens County Interscholastic work, has gone with our county superintendent into each school in the county to help solve the music problems. One night each week the teachers will meet for concentrated training in music needed to meet the music program. Mrs. McKnight will lead and instruct this group.

L. C. 3 months old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ted Goodwin, of East Afton, died Wednesday night at 9:35, at the Spur Hospital, where he had been receiving treatment for intestinal flu and complications of meningitis of the head.

## New Quota For Re- habilitation in Co.

The quota of rehabilitation clients of this county has been increased to where every farm family in distress will have an opportunity of working back to independence, according to information received by Dale S. Campbell of Dickens county, supervisor of the Resettlement Administration, who says enrollment of new clients will begin at once. Long-time farm plans will be worked out as rapidly as possible, but in the mean while, direct grants for subsistence will be made. All families accepted for either the permanent or the temporary program must be approved by the county advisory committee.

The supervisor will be hard pushed within the next few weeks to enroll the new clients, but he expects to continue working out farm plans with the object of getting all families started on a permanent program early in the new crop season. Making the loan is merely the beginning of the supervisor's job. He must see that the client grows his living at home and cans enough food to carry him through the winter—an average of 125 quart cans of food for each member of the family. Cash crops are permitted only after enough land has been set aside for food and feed.

Sixty-five families in this county were accepted for the program this spring, and most of them started at that time on standard farm plans. New families will be started on similar programs. They will be required to make their own arrangements for renting land, after which loans will be made by Resettlement.

The Texas Agricultural Association, represented by 1600 farmers from two hundred counties, at its meeting in Dallas last week, commended the Resettlement Administration and called upon Oklahoma farmers to join them in pushing through the Bankhead-Jones farm tenant bill, which would make an adequate sum available for purchase of farms and equipment for worthy tenants, without a down payment. Until some such legislation is passed, the Resettlement Administration is confining its efforts in most cases to loans for teams, equipment and supplies. These loans draw five percent interest and are repayable in one to five years.

### PATTON SPRINGS TEACHERS
