

# **City Election** Next Tuesday

The voters of the City of Spur will go to the polls next Tuesday to select a Mayor and two Commissioners to serve for the next two years. Only qualified residents in the city limits can vote, a 1936 poll tax receipt being required. For the first time in many years

a choice will be given the voters between two men for mayor, Judge E. J. Cowan, incumbent, and M. A Lea.

Since Judge Cowan has been mayor citizens of Spur have receiv ed a material reduction annually in taxes. At the same time improve ments have been carried on. The Swenson Park with City operated swimming pool was completed last year with the City furnishing the material. This park was constructed without additional taxation.

The project that will benefit the largest number of people and that will save the taxpayer more than enough to pay the costs, is the re building of the city water system. The new water system is nearing completion, furnishing more people with water and at the same time making it possible for future ex pansion at less cost.

In addition to these two large projects the current affairs of the city have been carried on in an able manner from month to month. The next big project with the Federal government paying the major costs is the paving of a large percent of the streets. Careful management

is needed to carry on this work. M. A. Lea, resident of Spur for many years, is well known to the voters. He is a property owner and is known as a reliable and good business man. He is capable, effic ient and would render the citizens of Spur good service. G. H. Snider for Street Commiss ioner and Dr. M. H. Brannen for Water Commissioner are unopposed for re election.
