

30 Cars Wheat Shipped From Here

Thirty cars of wheat had been shipped from this county over the Wichita Valley Railway up to Tuesday night. This totaled 41,000 bushels and was weighing out from 60 to 63 pounds to the bushel. The average price paid was 90 cents a bushel.

Approximately 25 percent of the wheat under the cap rock has been harvested according to authorities. A small amount of grain has been cut on the plains but the harvesting of the crop around McAdoo was expected to get started today. This section has been delayed by rains the first of the week and a hail Monday night was spotted with insurance men estimating the damage at 5 to 15 per cent.

Spur has had three active buyers for the past two weeks with a number more stating that they will start buying and loading out here this week end. This many buyers has created an active market with the price in many instances above that of neighboring towns.

Farmers of Plains Section Hear Day Speak on Farm Bill

South Plains farmers were usged by Cliff H. Day of the Texas Agri cultural association, to let representarives and senators know how they stand on proposed agricultural legislation, in a talk in the district court room at Lubbock Wednesday. About 90 farm leaders from 10 or 12 counties in this section were present and there seemed to be unity in favor of the proposed measure, which is to be given Con-

gress. The talk was punctured throughout with questions about phases of the program, by interested farmers.

Wants Letters Written

Day made a plea for the association leaders to not only write both Texas senators, Congressman Geo. Mahon of this district, Congressman Marvin Jones of the 18th ditrict and chairman of the House Agricultural committee, but also Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace, "And the President too," he added.

Particular attention was given to the cotton angle of the bill. Its provisions were outlined and its appli cation to both voluntary coopera ors and others explained.

A parity price would be set and cotton payments based on a parity paid as well as soil conservation payments. Only 85 per cent of the parity would be paid producers. Control features of the act were discussed. The secretary of agricul ture would allot production to producers and 20 per cent of the allotment would be put into storage. 



Mahon Asks For ROTC Unit At Tech

Washington, D. C .- Congressman George Mahon appeared last week before the Senate Appropriations Committee urging that funds and officers for an additional ROTC unit at Texas Technological College be provided. The item would be included in the War Department appropriation bill which is under consideration by the Senate Committee at this time. He had previously presented the matter to Major General E. T. Conley, Adjutant General of the Army.

Texas Tech was given a Senior Engineering ROTC unit last year, and the work which har almost been accomplished has received high recognition by War Department officials. The report of the ROTC Inspector from Fort Sam Houston, headquarters for the Eighth Corps Arca, made March 1 this year, recommended that an additional unit be established at the College, preferably a Field Artillery unit. This type of unit woud make the training available to about 1200 students at the College who are ineligible for training in the existing Engineering unit which is open to engineering students.

The outcome of the matter will depend upon the disperition by the House and Senate of the proposed appropriation item for funds and personnel. The War Department ad-1 vised Mr. Mahon that the Texas Tech application for such a unit was in excellent standing.
