

Dimmitt ISD trustees voted unanimously Monday night to hire Mike Graham as middle school principal.

Graham comes to Dimmitt from similar jobs in Klondike and Andrews, said superintendent Les Miller. Graham spent a number of years in Andrews as an assistant middle school principal and for the past year has been K-12 principal at Klondike.

"It was his experience that drew us to him," Miller said. "We had about 28 applications. We narrowed it to six and interviewed those six and he clearly came to the top."

Peer Assistance Leadership (PAL) is an academic class that pairs selected seniors at Dimmitt High School with students at Richardson Elementary and Dimmitt Middle School.

The purpose of the program is to encourage young students to value school, make good decisions and react in a positive manner to situations they face.

The friendships that form between high school and elementary students are remarkable. PAL has been in the Dimmitt High School curriculum since 1991.

PAL students are trained in the summer and then for an additional six weeks in the classroom before they begin working with elementary students.

The program is coordinated with the guidance counselors and administration in each building.

This year there are 16 PAL students serving more than 230 youngsters. The sponsor/teacher for the program is Katie Ivey.



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COMFORT AND STYLE BOTH IMPORTANT WITH EYEGLASSES

You may want to buy a pair of glasses because they are the latest fashion, or you like the way the look adds to your appearance. They should also be comfortable, especially if worn on a regular basis. For example, you want to ensure that the frames are wide enough for your face, so the temples, or sides of the glasses, do not dig into the sides of your head as they extend backward toward your ears. Your eye-care specialist can provide many styles of frames that have varying temple lengths. Also, at the final eyeglass fitting, he/she can adjust the curves at the end of the temples so they fit comfortably.

The nosepiece of the glasses should also fit correctly. Many frames have soft, silicon nose pads that are adjustable for fit. If the pads cannot be adjusted, make sure they are secure without pinching the bridge of

When you try on your new frames, shift your head up and down and sideways. Also bend over to see how well your glasses stay in place. With the properly adjusted nose pads and temples, your eyeglass frames should remain comfortably on your face without

Dimmitt woman campaigns for Silver-Haired Legislature

Dimmitt's Libby Cleveland has announced that she is a candidate for election to the Silver-Haired Legislature from the Panhandle Region.

The Silver-Haired Legislature was first organized in Missouri in 1974 and has been adopted in 26 states. In Texas was started when the 69th Texas Legislature adopted supportive legislature in April, 1985. SLH members served two-year terms.

Election of members to the SLH will be from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m., May 25, at the local Senior Citizens Center.

Eligible voters must be 60 years of age or older by the fourth Tuesday in May of 2004.

"I would like to encourage development of programs that Dimmitt area; he lives in Fritch. would utilize seniors as mentors, advisors, etc. ... for Cleveland said in her campaign literature. She organized and leads aerobics and assisted in fund-raising for a local volunteer fire department.

The Wilderness or the Promised Land


Just as the Israelites had to choose when they reached Canaan, we also must choose.

If we fight the battle for the promised land, when we have fought the good fight and finished the race, we will receive the gift of peace, rest and eternity with God in heaven.



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
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Swifts deliver against Plains; Clarendon next

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

Without hesitation, he sold the Land Rover back to the dealer, opting to take the cash.

He paid on college loans, helped underwrite costs of a mission trip and with the money remaining, bought the lawnmower...

His good fortune brings to mind the story of a preacher who played golf one Sunday morning during an out-of-state

He was horrified when he made a hole in one, realizing there was no one he could tell about it... Destined to tell and re-tell the story of his good fortune, Wooldridge will make sure listeners understand that he didn't, doesn't and won't buy a lottery ticket!

One deacon congratulated him on his decision, indicating that it might be hard on a few people to see the pastor's parking space taken by a Land Rover. (Nope, all they'll see in their pastor''s parking spot is a pick-up, economy car or riding mower....)

My prediction?

A lot more preachers and others will move model homes way up high on their visitation destinations. If there's a drawing along with it, then that's a plus.

While there, the preachers will tell folks looking for new digs about possible church homes nearby after they get settled in... Texas Wheat production up, U.S. totals down

The 2004 Texas winter wheat crop is forecast at 118.8 million bushels, up 23 percent from 2003 and 52 percent higher than 2002. This forecast is up 19 percent from the Texas April forecast.

According to a May 1 survey conducted by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, statewide yield is expected to average 33 bushels per acre. This is up five bushels from last year, and up four bushels from 2002. Harvested acreage for grain for 2004 is estimated at 3.6 million acres, up 4 percent from 2003.

"Earlier in the year we were looking at having half a crop, now we may have the best crop we've had in 3 years," said Texas Wheat Producers Board Executive Vice President, Rodney Mosier.

Production on the Northern High Plains is forecast at 52.0 million bushels, up 26 percent from 2003.

Winter wheat production on

the Low Plains is forecast at 25.5 million bushels, up 12 percent from last year. The Cross Timbers' production is estimated at 7.0 million bushels, up 64 percent from last year.

Production in the Blacklands is forecast at 20.5 million bushels, 17 percent more than

The U.S. winter wheat production is forecast at 1.55 billion bushels, down 9 percent from 2003, according to the National Agricultural Statistics Service. Based on May 1 conditions, the U.S. yield is forecast at 44.2 bushels per acre, 2.5 bushels less than last year.

U.S. harvested grain acreage estimates total 35.1 million acres, down 4 percent from last season.

Hard Red production is down 14 percent from a year ago to 910 million bushels. Soft Red is up 5 percent and totals 399 million bushels.

Stenholm tours Hale County facilities


Recently U.S. Congressman Charlie Stenholm (TX-17) toured the Cactus Feedlot in Hale Center and the Excel Packing Plant in nearby Plainview, to learn about the latest advances in food safety practices. Stenholm visited the facilities with other members of the Congressional Food Safety Caucus.

Animal identification, cattle health and plant safety were among the issues discussed during the tour.

"I take my responsibilities as the Ranking Member on the House Agriculture Committee very seriously, and that is why I maintain such a strong interest in food safety. We already live in a country that has the most abundant and safest food supply in the world that comes at the lowest cost to the consumer. I intend to keep it that way," Stenholm said.

"I look forward to learning about the latest technologies 'designed to keep our animals and the food supply safe," Stenholm said. "Still, any regulations we impose on the industry in the future must be based on sound science. I believe we can make great strides in food safety by implementing new technology and new techniques that will minimize pathogens in food processing facilities.

"I have visited Excel several times, and I am always impressed by the facilities and their efficiency. I always feel like I leave the plant with new, useful knowledge," Stenholm said.





TDH raises vouchers for WIC program

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) announced today that because of recent jumps in wholesale and retail milk prices, it has increased the amount of money allocated on vouchers issued to WIC nutrition program clients for milk and cheese. But vouchers issued before today's change may not cover the increased prices when presented at supermarket checkouts.

TDH raised the maximum amount WIC will pay for a gallon of milk from \$4 to \$4.50 and the maximum amount for a pound of cheese from \$4 to \$4.50.

"We had a choice of cutting back on quantities of milk and cheese for the clients or increasing the amount we would pay for those products," said Mike Montgomery, chief of TDH's nutrition services bureau. "For now, we're choosing to try to pay."

WIC clients are issued vouchers used to pay for milk, cheese, infant formula, cereal, juice, eggs, peanut butter, beans, tuna and carrots at participating grocers. Grocers then bill the WIC program the shelf price of the item or the voucher amount, whichever is

The new coverage changes were made to a TDHcontrolled database today.

The database is periodically downloaded by local WIC clinics, which produce and issue the paper vouchers to clients.

Vouchers usually are issued to clients for a 90-day period.

Because vouchers already issued cannot be reissued, Montgomery said WIC clients have vouchers that may not cover the shelf prices of milk or cheese.

In such cases some grocers will waive the difference, or the client has the option of shopping at another store where prices may be lower.


WIC clinics are being directed to download the revised database, and vouchers issued by the clinics after the download will reflect the new maximum amounts.

Montgomery said TDH are asking the United States Department of Agriculture for money to cover the estimated \$12 million it will cost to cover the increased expenses between now and the end of the WIC fiscal year Sept. 30.

USDA is the federal agency that administers the WIC program. Congress awarded additional funding to the USDA to help state WIC programs deal with increased expenses from food price increases and growing caseloads.

The \$657-million-a-year Texas WIC program serves some 866,000 low-income pregnant women, new mothers, infants and young children a month through more than 600 local WIC clinics. About 2,500 stores, supermarkets and other WIC vendors participate.

of us think of a gratuity or tip as a voluntary payment, A. Whether the creditor has which may vary in amount. As far as the law is concerned, however, the restaurant may charge whatever it wants, and your option is to accept its terms or eat somewhere else. In fact, most restaurants include "force" you to pay. the gratuity on a table of six, or more. As long as the you are not going to pay the restaurant discloses the fact that a 20 percent gratuity is included, you are bound to pay if you order.

If this is your "favorite" restaurant, I suggest you let the management know you object to its policy. Perhaps enough customers

will make the gratuity optional.

Q. If credit card debt is more than ten years old and they have not contacted you in that length of time, can you be forced to pay the debt? We are getting calls every A. You are correct that most day from a debt collector. Thanks for your help.

Cotton Report

Trading was slow this week on the New York Cotton Exchange as market observers were cautious ahead of Wednesday's release of the latest supply and demand report compiled by USDA. Although the May report was the industry's first look at USDA's projections for the upcoming season, market sources said the report was not surprising. However, many analysts called the world production figures for 2004-05 "bearish."

USDA's first projection of 2004-05 world supply and demand suggested a carryover of 36.46 million bales which would reflect an increase of 3.8 million bales from the 2003-04 crop year. The increase is attributed to an increase in world cotton production coupled with only a modest increase in world consumption.

For 2004-05, world production is estimated at a record 102.5 million bales as growers expand the area planted to cotton in response to higher prices, and major cotton producing countries recover for the ill effects of the weather experienced last year.

Worldwide cotton consumption was projected at 99.0 million bales which also would be a record but still would not be enough to offset USDA's anticipated increase in cotton production.

Minor changes where made to U.S. supply and demand this marketing year bringing carryover stocks to 3.6 million bales. U.S. production has been projected to drop to 3.6 percent to 17.6 million bales for the 2004-05 crop year based on March planting intentions and historical abandonment and yield information. Additionally, continued pressure on the domestic textile industry has prompted the department to lower mill use to 5.8 million bales while exports are expected to drop to 11.5 million

In other news, USDA reported net export sales of U.S. cotton for the week ended May 6 totaled 143,300 bales. The figure was 10 percent more than the previous week and a 7 percent increase from the four-week average. Major buyers for the week included China, Indonesia and Ireland. Sales of 78,700 bales for delivery in 2004-05 were primarily to Mexico and Thailand.

Export shipments of 290,200 bales for the same week were 3 percent more than one week earlier, but 19 percent less than the four-week average. The major destination was China with shipments totaling 120,900 bales, followed by Turkey and Mexico who received 35,500 and 27,000 bales respectively.

On the spot cotton scene, trading increased considerably during the five trading days ended May 13 as Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers sold 3,330 bales online compared to the previous week when 246 bales were sold.

Meanwhile, USDA reported 45 percent of the intended 2004-05 U.S. cotton crop had been planted as of May 9 compared with 41 percent at the same time one year ago and the 43 percent five-year average. Seven of the main cotton producing states have reached or surpassed their normal planting averages for this time of year.

Texas cotton producers had planted 30 percent of their anticipated acres by May 9 compared with 30 percent planted at the same time last year and an average of 26 percent. Thirty-four percent of the crop was in the ground by May 9 in Oklahoma versus an average of 23 percent.

hospital beds, wheelchairs - basically, anything that a person might need in order to stay home rather than the hospital, as well as athletic supplies for schools.


DME also offers Response Ability - abemergency call system, so if you need help in an emergency, all you have to do is push the button and help is summoned.

Social Security Q&A

QUESTION: I have a have to demonstrate that he is friend who got a disability discharge from the Navy. Then he went to work for the city for seven years and eventually qualified for adisability retirement from them, too. Because two government agencies have classified him as disabled, will he automatically qualify for Social Security disability benefits?

ANSWER: No. Most disability pension systems have different sets of rules and guidelines for deciding if a person is "disabled." And Social Security's disability criteria are very specific. Essentially, your friend will

unable to do any kind of work. The fact that he's been declared disabled by two other agencies will not, in itself, help in his efforts to get Social Security disability.

QUESTION: I applied for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) disability benefits and was just told my claim has been approved. Will I get Medicare coverage with mySSI checks?

ANSWER: You won't get Medicare, but you probably will qualify for Medicaid. Stategovernments manage the Medicaid program, and in most states, youautomatically qualify for Medicaid when

you get SSI. Your local SocialSecurity office, or your state social services office,

can give you more information. QUESTION: I am 67 years old and get Supplemental Security Income (SSI). I was told that any money I make will reduce my SSI. I am taking a one-day-per-week job that will pay me only \$50 per month. Is this going to come right off the top of my SSI check?

ANSWER: No, it won't. Although most income does reduce an SSI check, we can disregard the first \$65 you earn each month, plus onehalf of anything you make over that limit.
