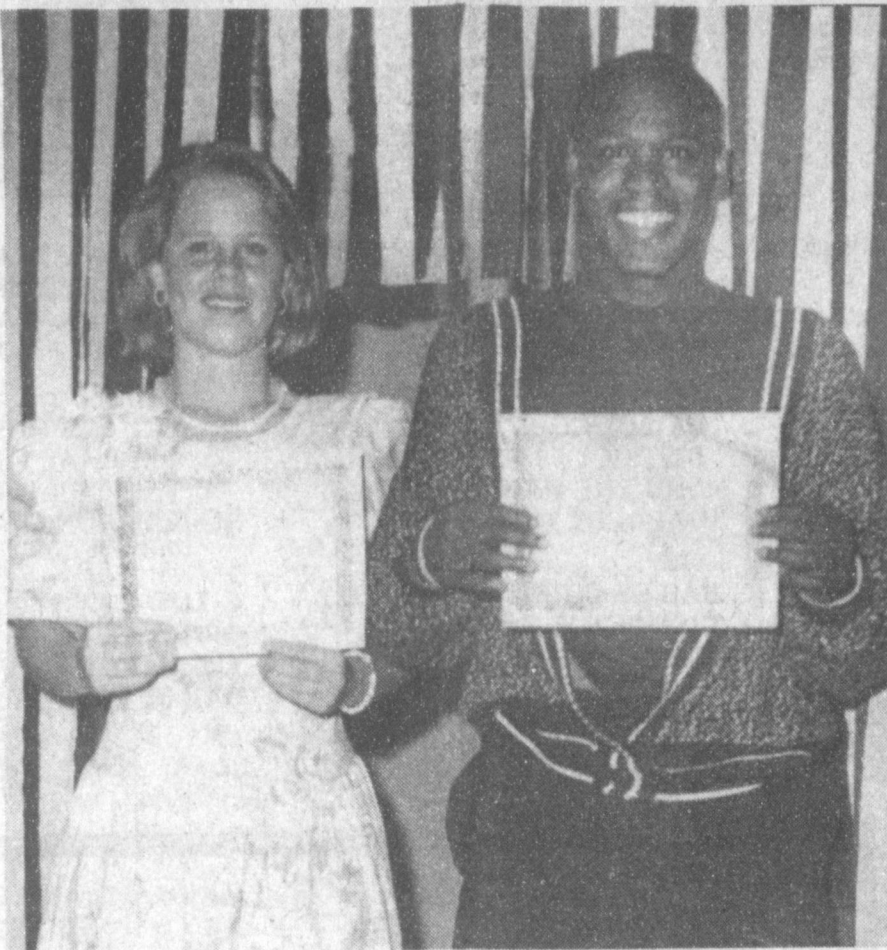
Pre-kindergarten students must be four years old by September 1, 1990.

Lyme Disease Possible Here; Caution Advised

Friday morning, William W. Rosser, DVM MA, who is Regional Veterinarian for Public Health Regions 2/12 was in Muleshoe to confer with both medical doctors and veterinarians in a conference at Muleshoe Area Medical Center.

Dr. Rosser talked to the doctors about the possibility of Lyme Disease spreading to this area.

He cautioned over and over that there is no reason to 'hit the panic button,' but wanted the area health providers for both animals and people to be aware of the possibility.

Lyme Disease was first diagnosed at Lyme, Conn. in 1975, and was believed to be caused by a corkscrew-shaped organism called a spirochete, and was first believed to be caused solely by ticks.

Infested ticks who live in and near wooded areas, tall grass and brush were first suspected as being the carriers of the organism, said Dr. Rosser.

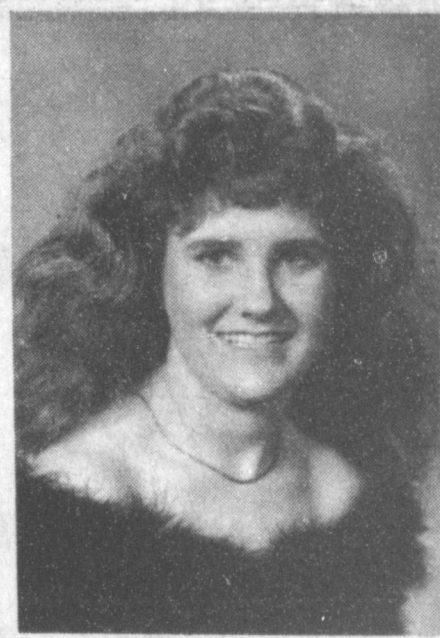
Now, however, the disease is slowly spreading across the nation, and Dr. Rosser believes the organism can be spread in this part of the country through fleas.

He said there is a possibility that Lyme Disease can be spread from the diseased fleas to domestic animals, and to

SCAC Club Continues Community Activities

(Editor's note: The following story was written exclusively for The Journals by Christine Dew Cox, a student in the Mass Communication Department at Texas Tech University, Lubbock. This and other stories are made possible by a grant from the Reader's Digest Foundation.)

When 10 Muleshoe High School students decided they wanted to try and help save the old Santa Fe Depot from being torn down in 1982, they never thought it would evolve into a club vital to the Muleshoe community. But that is how the Student-Community Action Club (SCAC) was formed.

The Student-Community Action Club is a club consisting of high school students in their junior or senior year, who help serve as a link between the school and the community. The students must be voted into the club by officers, and must fill out a membership form to apply to the club. SCAC usually consists of about 20 members, but has expanded the membership to about 40 due to student demand.

"SCAC looks for reliable students who are good workers and interested in improving the Muleshoe community," said SCAC sponsor, Jean Allison.

SCAC works very closely with the Muleshoe Heritage Foundation, and between both of these organizations, preserving and restoring old buildings in Muleshoe has become very important to them.

SCAC organizes many money-making projects and all of the money goes to the Heritage Foundation to help on restoration in Muleshoe.

The first money-making project that SCAC organized, was to save the Santa Fe Depot. This proved very successful, and the Depot soon became a landmark in Muleshoe and is currently used for many community functions.

"The Depot has become an important landmark to the people of Muleshoe and all of us are very proud of it," said Allison.

SCAC is now working on restoring the Janes Ranchhouse, which is an unusual two-story home formerly located east of Muleshoe. The owner, Jim Kassahn, donated the house and \$10,000 to move it to its present location, which is beside the Santa Fe Depot. "Once restoration is completed, SCAC and the Heritage Foundation hope to turn it into a museum, thereby making the Ranchhouse

KMUL boys' track awards went to Clay Van Sandt and for the girls, it was Monica Clemmons.

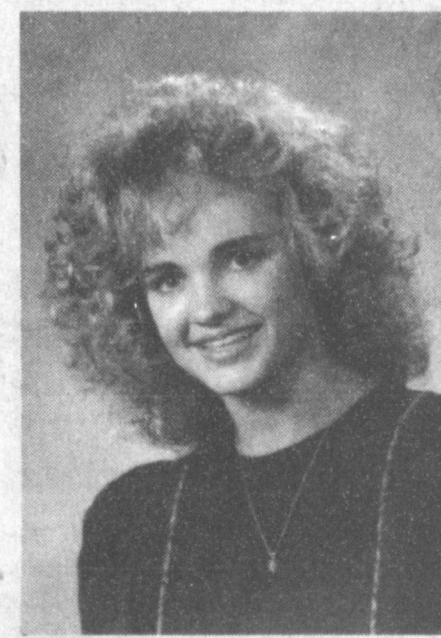
Channel 6 Golf awards were given Jason Box and Heather Hutton; while the KMUL tennis awards went to Shonda Strahan and Brian Bush.

Also, Channel 6 baseball award was presented Ricky Orozco.

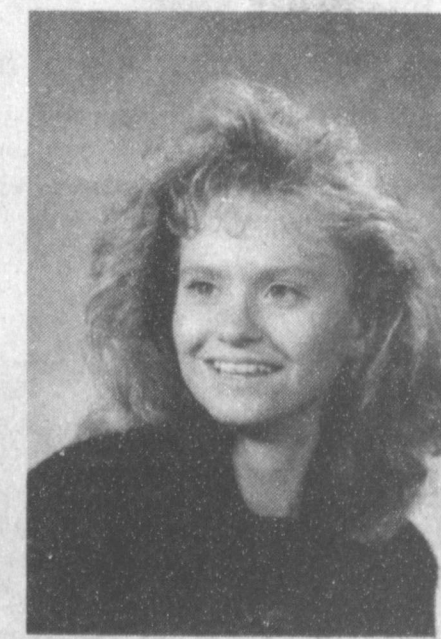
The West Texas Ranger Cross Country awards went to Amy Harrison and Ricky Diaz.

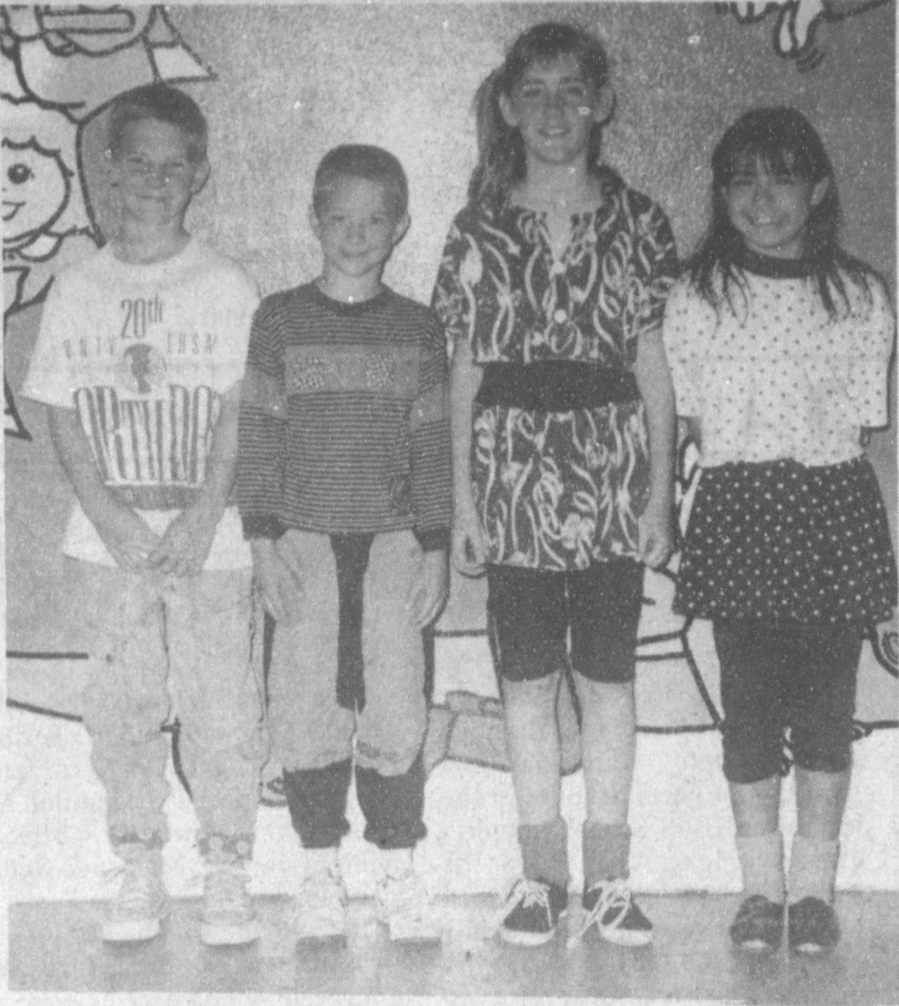

MICROWAVE TIPS

Most microwave users know they can microwave bacon on paper.

He also said Lyme Disease is not transferred person-person or animal-animal.

At onset, the disease is flu-like, said the veterinarian. He said fever often accompanies the early stages, along with a red rash, clear in the center, that moves around on the body. However, 25 percent of Lyme Disease patients do not get the red rash, he said.

Lyme Disease is known as "the great new imitator." It very often is mis-diagnosed as other illnesses or disease, such as juvenile arthritis, multiple

sclerosis, arthritis, Lou Gehrig's disease and others.

One possible case from near Muleshoe is being checked, and blood work is being conducted at this time, said Dr. Rosser.

"We also have several people who have 'something,' but at this time we do not definitely suspect Lyme Disease."

The veterinarian said he will be trapping some small selected rodent wildlife to check for infected fleas. He said if he finds a situation that needs to be presented to the public, he will immediately notify the proper authorities.

"People need to apply common sense," he said. "After all, there are 150 diseases that can be transmitted by ticks and fleas. People need to keep fleas under control on their property and pets. They need to use a control product manufactured specifically for controlling ticks and fleas. Control should be carried out in residential areas including yards, in houses and on all pets."

Dipping the animal on a regular basis is the best control method said the veterinarian, although a new spray on the market kills adult fleas and prevents eggs from hatching.

Also, Dr. Rosser said parents should check their children after they have been outside playing, adding that a tick bite, even if the tick is infected with any disease, doesn't instantaneously transmit the disease. He said the flea usually feeds slowly for several hours before falling off, and there is a good opportunity to remove the flea without it transmitting any disease to a child or pet.

When in wooded areas, such as on camping trips, Dr. Rosser suggests that people wear proper clothing, use proper repellents and do not set up tents in wooded areas which are full of small animals.

If a tick is found, Dr. Rosser suggests the easiest method to remove the tick is to carefully pull the tick out with forceps (tweezers.) No other method is as effective for removal, he said.

Then the tick or flea bite should be washed with soap and water immediately, and an antiseptic used.

Muleshoe Animal Clinic will have current, up-dated information for your pets, and Terry Hutto at Muleshoe Diagnostic Lab will also have current information for precautionary measures for people.

Dr. Rosser said, "I cannot emphasize enough that there is no reason to panic, but people need to be aware that we may have a few, isolated cases of Lyme Disease in this area."

eligible for state grants.

Treasurer At Meeting At A&M

One representative of the Bailey County treasurers' staff took part in the 18th Annual County Treasurers' Seminar at Texas A&M University, April 16-19.

In the group was Dorothy Turner. The training focused on the theme, "Each Treasurer is an Architect of the Future--It's Up to Me."

More than 30 speakers addressed the seminar. Subjects ranged from alternative funding for county health plans to how to handle a claim under workers' compensation, time management and media relations.

Concurrent round table discussions also were a part of the program, with county groupings planned by population size.

John Gilmartin, coordinator for the V.G. Young Institute of County Government, a part of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said this training was the third to be offered by the Institute this year for elected county officials.

The county judges and commissioners received training in January, and the county and district clerks in March.

People attending the seminar for county treasurers participated in a brisk-paced three days of training, as well as a banquet where entertainment was provided by the Singing Cadets of Texas A&M University.

Joe M. Rothe, seminar program chairman and an Extension Service specialist with the institute, said each treasurer who attended all sessions was awarded 20 hours of educational

credit by Texas A&M's Office of Continuing Education.

The treasurers are required to complete 20 hours every two years according to state law, he explained.

The County Treasurers' Association of Texas cooperated in planning and implementing the training.

Computer Skills Can Be Enhanced

Persons wanting to improve their computer skills with spreadsheets or to learn to use an inexpensive, checkbook based record keeping program may still be able to enroll in two workshops here May 15-17.

Each course will run from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. May 15 and 16, and 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. May 17. Computers and the necessary software will be provided for the training. Fees will include three meals, example disks and workshop materials.

The spreadsheet course, Advanced Electronic Spreadsheet Development and Applications in Agriculture, will use the Lotus 1-2-3 program. It is for previous short course participants or individuals with considerable experience in Lotus 1-2-3 spreadsheet development. Advanced topics associated with data base use, integration of multiple spreadsheets and macros will be discussed. The fee is \$125.

The second course, Farm and Ranch Cash Record Keeping with Microcomputers, will teach the use of Quicken 3, a computerized record keeping system.

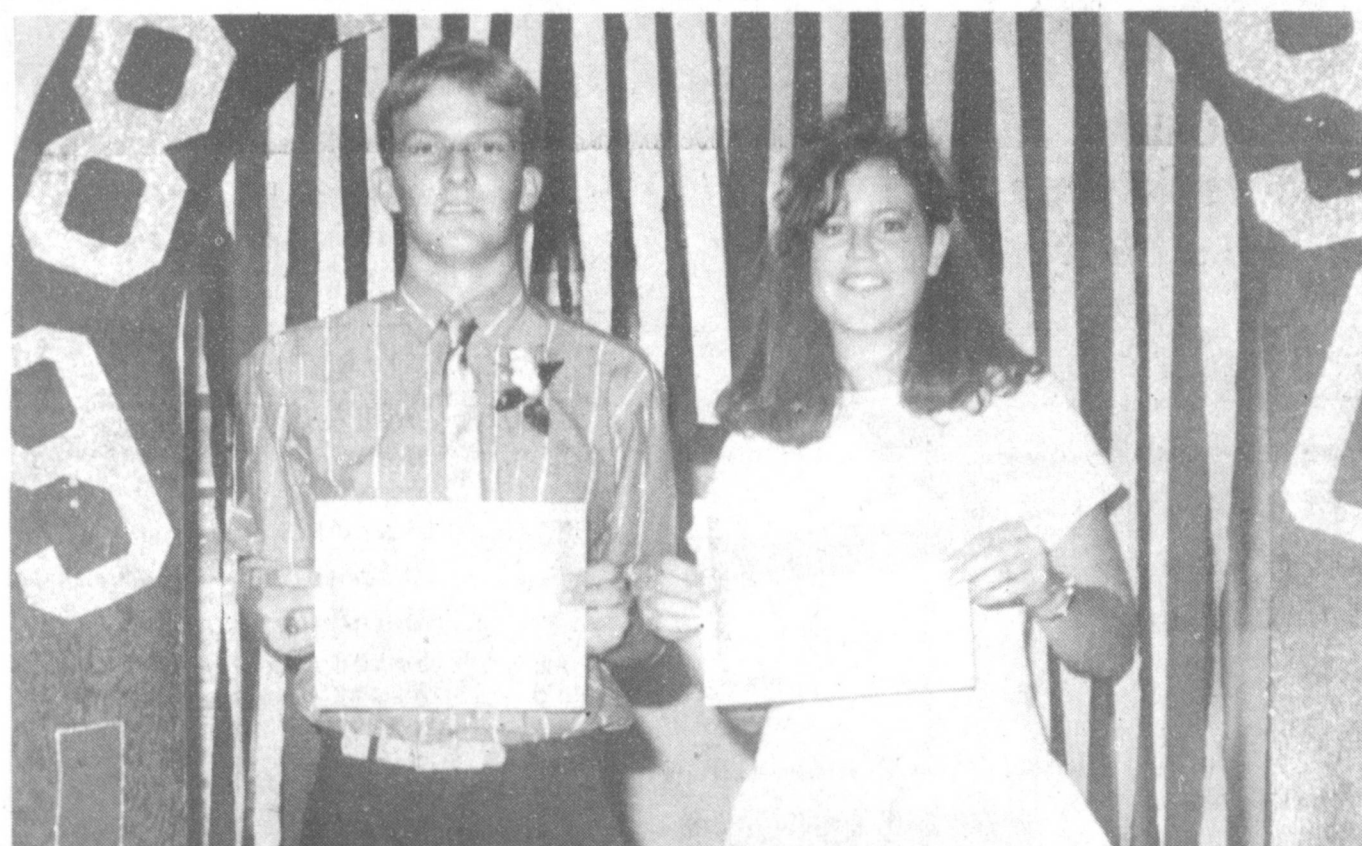

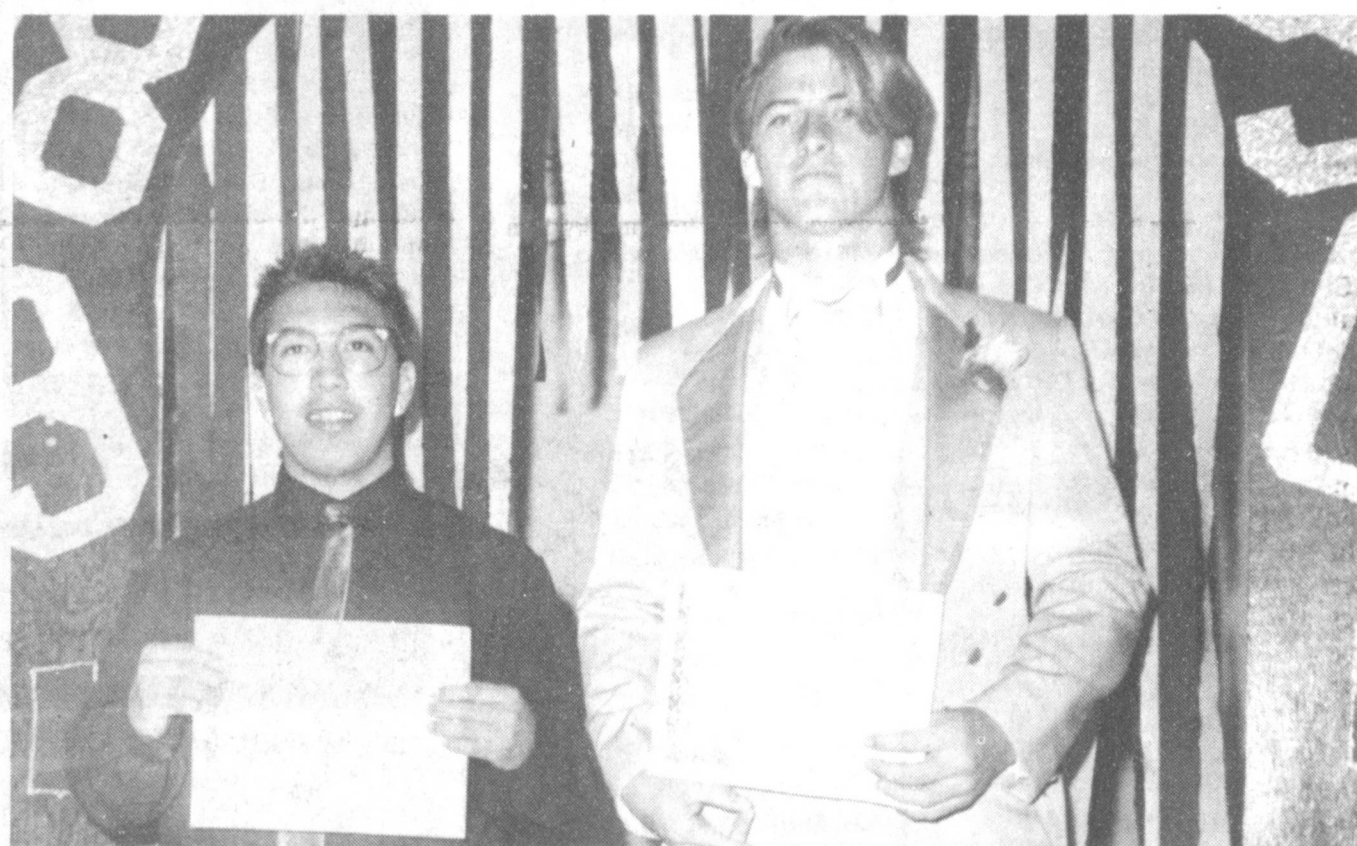
