## Telephone Rates Are Hiked

Winters City Council Monday night authorized General Telephone Company to increase the telephone service rates in Winters, effective with the March 1 billing.

The several different types of service offered will be increased separately, with the average increase over 8 percent.

Two-party resident charges received the lowest increase, a jump of 40 cents, with PBX service increased 2.89 or 12.5 percent per month. Also, pay telephone charges will be increased

from 10 cents to 25 cents. There are several pay telephones in the city.

Jack Goss, general manager for the company in the San Angelo area, met with the City Council to request the authority to increase the telephone rates. The company had requested an increase several months ago, but the Council had taken no action on the matter until the regular meeting Monday night.

While discussing the request for increases, Goss promised the Council that telephone service in

Winters would be improved. There has been considerable dissatisfaction with the service here, and city officials have shown concern that no improvements had been made and that many complaints had been made by local subscribers. Goss also said the company is working to provide true long distance direct dialing for Winters in the near future. Under the present system, persons making long distance calls contact an operator to complete the calls.

City spokesmen said the rates, after the increase, will be about the same as

those paid by telephone subscribers in other towns of comparable size.

Resident, 1 party, from \$7.60 to \$8.15, 55 cents, 7.23 percent.

Resident, 2 party, from \$6.30 to \$6.70, 40 cents, 6.2 percent.

Business, 1 party, from \$16.95 to \$17.95, \$1.00, 5.1 percent.

Key Lines, from \$16.95 to \$19.25, \$2.20, 23.9 percent.

PBX, from \$23.11 to \$26.00, \$2.89, 12.5 percent.

## Diabetes Drive To Be Held Here Saturday

A group of local headed by Randy Springer has decided to get involved, and do something about the problem of the increase of diabetes in the United States.

On Saturday, February 7, several volunteers will be canvassing the town to make the rest of their fellow citizens aware of the problem of diabetes, as well as giving them an opportunity to financially support the American Diabetes Association's programs of research and education.

"We are asking everyone in the Winters area to join us on Saturday to make "Defeat Diabetes Day" a meaningful start in conquering this disease," Springer said.

Diabetes is now recognized as this nation's third leading cause of death and affects more than 10 million Americans annually. Prevalence of the disease is increasing, according to the National Commission: between 1965 and 1973 diabetes increased by more than 50 percent in the U. S.

## Six Filed For Alderman

City politics began to warm up this week, as incumbents signed up for re-election, and others joined in the race for three seats on the City Council.

The City election will be held Saturday, April 3.

The three aldermen whose terms

will expire are James West, Buddy Miller and Clifton Poe. Miller announced last week that he would seek re-election, but did not file until Monday of this week. Poe and West also filed Monday for re-election.

Michael G. Briley filed for election to the City Council last week.

The slate of candidates for alderman increased in size this week as two others announced and filed candidates. E. J. Bishop filed Tuesday as a candidate, and Frank Arroyo filed Monday.

Deadline for filing for city office will be 30 days prior to the date of the election.

## County Races Developing

Monday was the deadline date for filing for county office on the May 1 Democratic ballot, and several Runnels County incumbents running for

re-election found themselves with opposition.

Races loom for sheriff, commissioner, Precinct 1; tax assessor-collector, and Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2.

County Sheriff Don Atkins had filed for re-election some time ago, and drew Hershall Hall as an opponent for the office.

Charles E. Bradshaw, incumbent Commissioner, Precinct 1, is seeking re-election. He is being opposed by James W. Little.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Jack Farmer will seek return to office. His opposition will be Mrs. VaRue McWilliams.

Incumbent Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2, in Winters, is a candidate for return to office. He is being opposed by Michael G. Briley of Winters.

Pat Pritchard, incumbent Commissioner, Precinct 3, of Wingate, is up for re-election, and will have no

opposition on the Democratic ballot.

John W. McGregor is a candidate for Runnels County Attorney. O. L. Parish, incumbent, is not seeking re-election.

In Precinct 7, Constable Clarence Goetz has no opposition.

The public has been invited to attend these services.



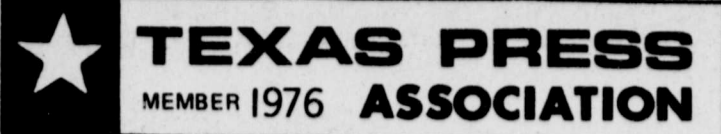

The Emmanuel Baptist Mission stands as a living memorial to Rev. I. M. Lopez who preached in homes and store buildings for seven years until a church building was finally erected in 1947, when Rev. L. L. Trott was pastor of the First Baptist Church.

Rev. Lopez was ordained as a minister of the Rotan Baptist Church in 1939, a year before moving to Winters. As he continued to preach, his efforts were brought to the attention of the First Baptist Church members who were instrumental in getting the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention to provide funds for the Latin American people to have a church.

Rev. Ortiz of Abilene preached for the mission until Rev. Epifanio Salazar was called as pastor. Rev. Lopez continued his interest in the mission and assisted with all phases of church work as well as preaching as long as he could be active. He was also ordained as a deacon. He died in 1969, at the age of 92.

I. M. Lopez was born April 27, 1877 in Brackettville, Texas, son of Jesus Lopez and Justa Maldonado de Lopez. He lived the early part of his life in Mexico where he attended school and was studying to become a doctor, but his ambition was never realized because of the Revolution when Carranza became the leader of the people. After the Revolution his family moved to San Marcos, but his education was never completed because he didn't speak English. His later years were spent in reading and writing poetry.

In the year of 1900, Mr. Lopez met and married Tamasa Caso and to them two children were born. His wife died in 1907. Their children were Isidro Caso Lopez, who died in 1953, and Maria Lopez, presently living in Laredo, Mexico. The daughter-in-law, Ophelia Lopez, continues to live in Winters. There are also three grandchildren here, Isidro, Adam and Evelyn Garcia, whose son, Tony, Jr., is pianist at the mission. Evelyn is Language Missions director of the Runnels Baptist Association and is also employed to assist Spanish speaking children in the Winters Public schools.

Lois Castro of Lubbock, the oldest granddaughter, is pianist in the Arnett Benson Baptist Church where she is a member. She is director of the Methodist Kindergarten in Lubbock. Her wedding was the first in the old building. Her oldest daughter is graduating from Texas Tech this year.

Elida Rodriguez of Oklahoma City has a daughter who plays the piano in her church. Lydia Maldonado plays the piano where she attends church in El Paso. Other grandchildren are Elizabeth Mercer of Irving and Obed Lopez of Grand Prairie.

The Emmanuel Mission struggled along through the years, principally due to the lack of full time pastors and a fluctuating population, but has continued to grow nevertheless. Rev. Cresencio Rodriguez has been the pastor for the last several years. Rev. George Herrera has been pastor since the first of the year. In 1964, when B. T. Shoemaker was pastor of the First Baptist Church, educational space was added to the mission. Since the members of the First Baptist Church were responsible for the upkeep of the property, they accepted a deed from the Home Mission Board for the property in Sept. of 1958. Since that time the Mission members have continued to assume more responsibility for their own work.

While spending six years in the U. S. Navy, on several occasions I assisted Naval Intelligence on narcotics sur-

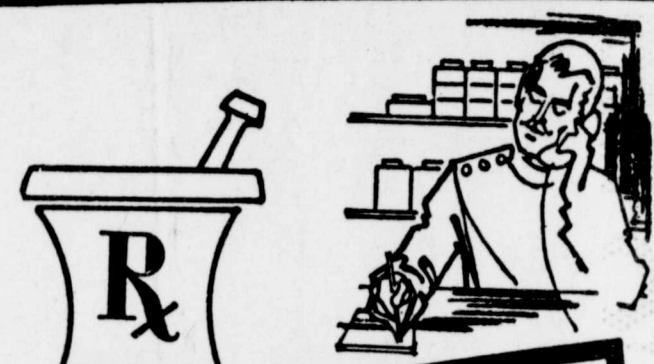
vellence. I am a disabled Vietnam veteran.

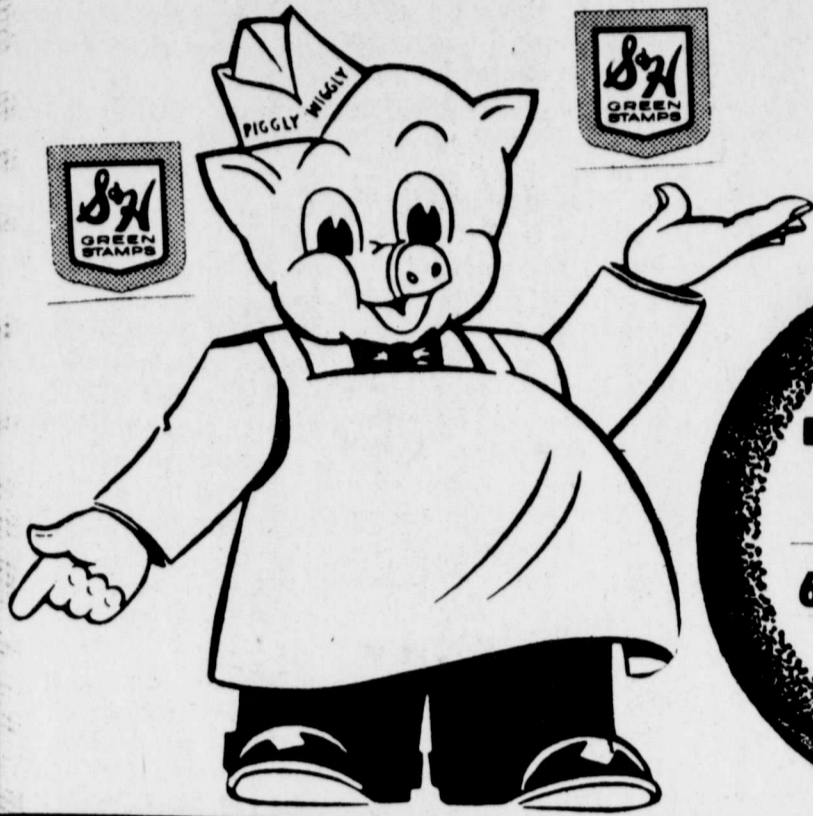

## Sales Tax Receipts Up

Winters' city one percent sales tax collections have climbed 27 percent since the first full calendar year that the tax was collected here.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock released information last week showing how collections by Texas cities of the city sales tax—which has always been one percent—have skyrocketed in recent years.

Winters' sales tax became effective with the last quarter of 1972. The first full calendar year's collection was \$39,471.30. The last calendar year's collections totaled \$50,167.54, or an

increase of 27 percent. The report "shows what we've known all along," Bullock said, "that the city sales tax has become a cornerstone of the City Hall budget."

While the Comptroller conceded some of the increase is due to inflation, he said "Nobody could read this story of mushrooming retail sales and conclude Texas has anything other than a prosperous business community."

Some cities reported increases ranging up to 1,539 percent. Only 30 cities showed a decline in rebates.

## KRUEGER'S KOLUMN

### The Public Works Employment Act

Last week the House voted on the Public Works Employment Act, which, like most bills, has strong and weak points which I should like to discuss with you in this column. You may recall that a bill with a similar title was vetoed by the President last year, a veto I voted to sustain.

But I voted to support the bill we passed (321 for-80 against) last week because of some important differences from the previous bill. The authorization for the extension of the Jobs Opportunities Program was cut in half. The extent of authorization for the interest subsidies in the working capital loan program was cut from ten years to the end of 1976, giving us an early opportunity to evaluate the program's effectiveness and the state of our economy. Those of us who voted against the bill last time have worked hard to encourage a fiscally responsible program to ease the economy toward health while avoiding the inflationary pressures of typical public works projects. Although the restrictions are not as strong as I urged, no public works grants will be made until applicants can assure that on-site labor can begin within 90 days of project approval. This will help greatly to reduce the long lead times that result in high cost-overruns and irresponsible project development.

An important addition to the bill in its present version is the Senate-added increase from \$75 million to \$200 million for the working capital loan program for businesses. It is designed especially for small-business growers faced with unusually high interest rates; the interest subsidies provide financial assistance to business in particularly troubled parts of the country; but

the legislation is designed to end in 1976, when we expect interest rates all over the country to be stabilizing. We will not be asking the taxpayers to continue to pay for programs ten years beyond a demonstrated need for those programs.

There are some serious weaknesses in the bill. The bill intends to provide anti-recession aid to state and local governments to maintain basic services during these times of high unemployment. If there were a way to assure that federal efforts could be coordinated with state and local efforts to maintain only essential services, and if we could be sure that federal monies would not be spent irresponsibly on programs which then can be maintained in the future only with more federal funds, I would be more optimistic about the short-term value of the "counter-cyclical funding" section of the bill.

The major reduction in the civilian force recently announced for Kelly Air Force Base has dealt a heavy blow to San Antonio's economy. The short-term bill we passed last week should help San Antonio to adjust as the responsibility for employment passes from the public to the private sector. Our next effort in Congress should be to find more effective ways to help the private sector to re-hire workers it has had to lay off, rather than looking to the public sector for a bail-out. The strength of this particular bill is that federal funding is tied in several important ways to the redevelopment of the private sector.

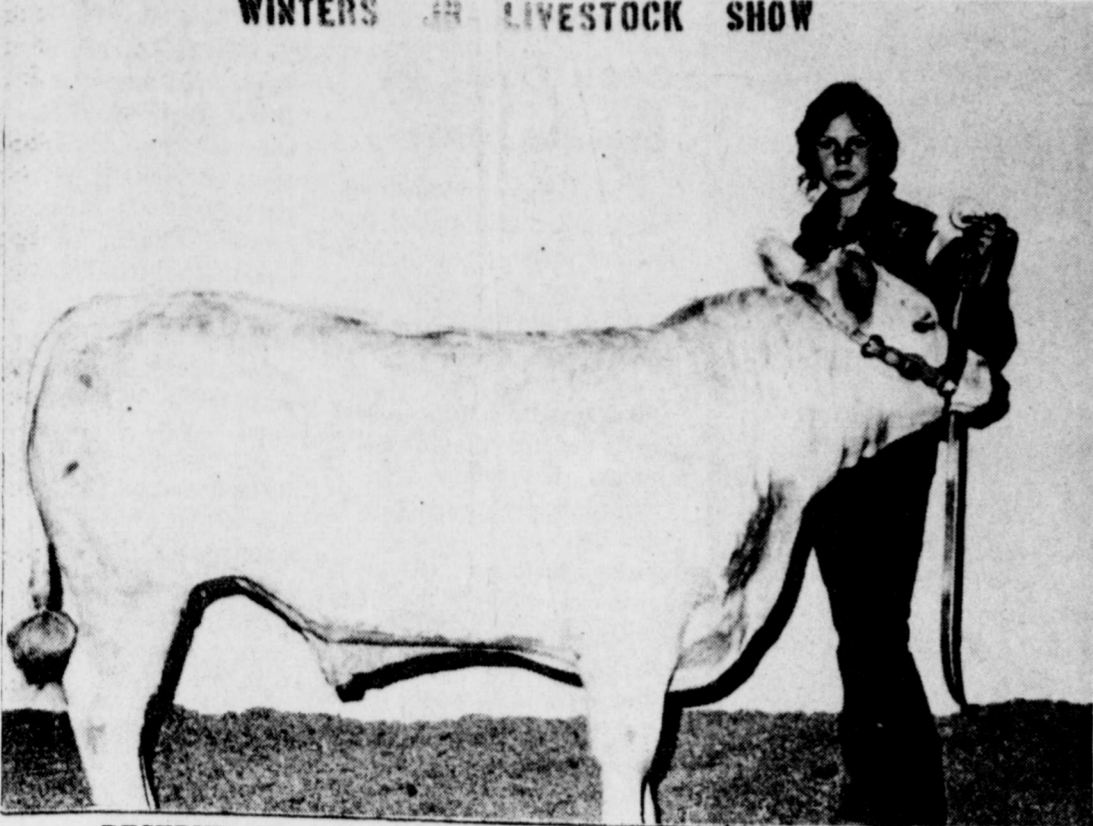

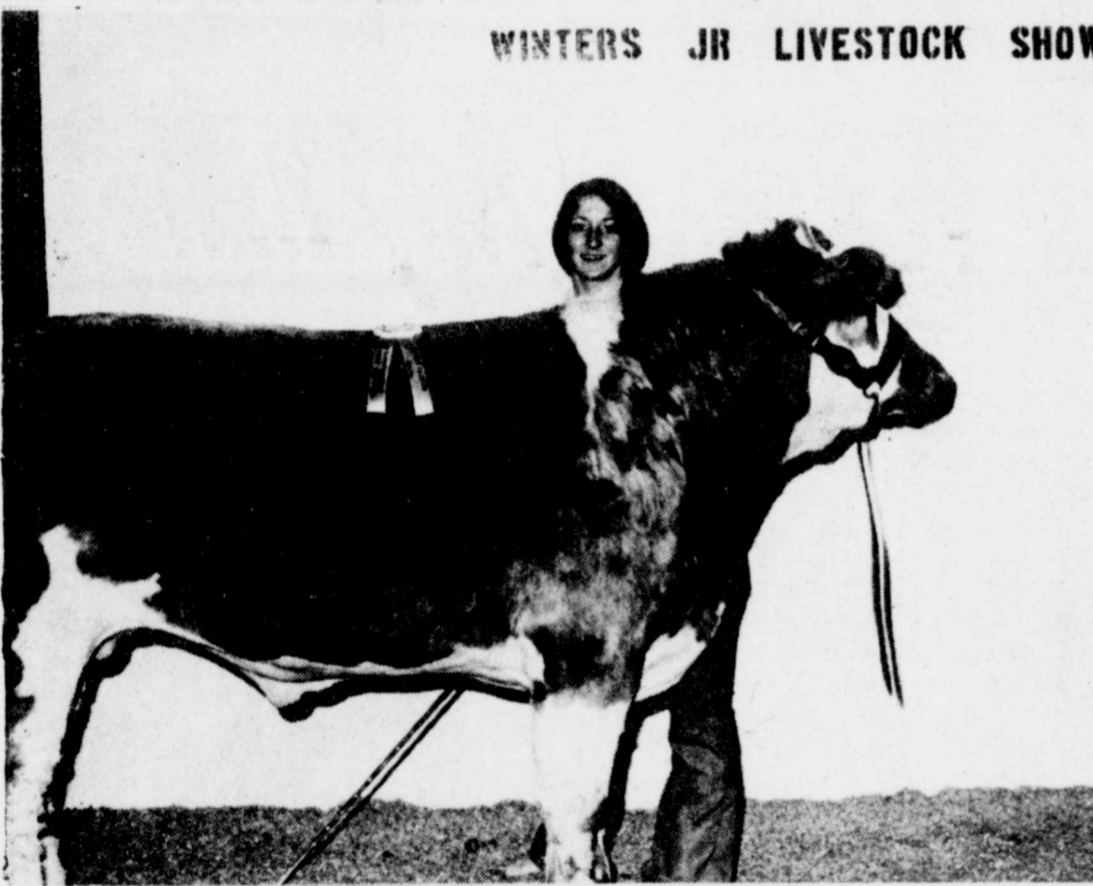
RESERVE—The Charolais steer shown by Rhonda Carter in the recent Junior Livestock Show took the reserve championship.

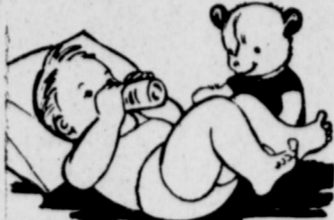


RESERVE—Blake O'Dell showed the reserve champion steer in the Hereford class in the Junior Livestock Show recently.

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**Wallace Murray Reports Record Net Income From Operations**

Wallace Murray Corporation reported that net income from continuing operations amounted to a record \$12,885,000 in 1975 as compared with \$8,092,000 in 1974. Sales from continuing operations were \$283,563,000 down 3 percent from 1974 revenues of \$292,360,000. The Company reported that a provision in the fourth quarter for the losses related to discontinued segments of

business. Net income for the year, including the operating results of the discontinued businesses as well as provision for loss or disposal, amounted to \$8,397,000 versus \$8,094,000 for 1974.

Earnings per share on a primary basis from continuing operations amounted to \$3.65 in 1975 compared with \$2.08 the prior year. Net earnings per share on a primary basis, after giving

effect to the loss related to discontinued businesses of \$1.47 per share, were \$2.18 compared with \$2.08 in 1974.

Earnings per share on a fully diluted basis from continuing operations amounted to \$2.62 versus \$1.64 last year. Net earnings per share on a fully diluted basis, after giving effect to the loss related to discontinued businesses of 91 cents per share, were \$1.71 as opposed to \$1.64 in 1974.

Net income from continuing operations in the fourth quarter was \$4,426,000, up

235 percent from the \$1,322,000 earned in the fourth quarter of 1974. Sales were \$78,253,000, up 5.6 percent from the like prior quarter of \$74,129,000.

Earnings per share on a primary basis from continuing operations in the fourth quarter amounted to \$1.31 in 1975 as compared with 29 cents the prior fourth quarter.

Earnings per share on a fully diluted basis from continuing operations for the fourth quarter amounted to 90 cents versus 17 cents last year.

The losses from discontinued businesses described above relate to the discontinuance of the Corporation's operations in the industrial abrasive and metal stampings businesses. Wallace Murray has sold all of the assets of its Simonds Abrasive Division in the U. S., except for the division's plant in Philadelphia, to Unicom Industries Limited of Windsor, England, and has closed the Philadelphia plant in December. Wallace Murray has an agreement in principle to sell its Canadian abrasive operations to Unicom subject to approval by the Canadian Foreign Investment Review Agency. In addition, the Company has announced its intention to close and dispose of its Scranton, Pennsylvania plant where its metal stampings business is located.

Commenting on the year's results, Charles V. Myers, president and chief executive officer of Wallace Murray, cited as major strengths not only the Company's ongoing programs of cost reduction, selective selling and cash management, but also singled out the continuing strong demand for industrial gears and components of heavy duty, off-highway equipment. He noted that industrial and residential metal chimneys and fireplaces experienced increased volume as did the demand for the Corporation's industrial fiberglass products. Mr. Myers also indicated a recent encouraging pickup of orders in each of the Company's building products divisions.

**Cong. Krueger Forecasts Action On Revenue Sharing Legislation**

Congressman Bob Krueger (D-Tex.) has reiterated his support of the Federal Revenue Sharing program, noting that Congress will need to act on a new revenue sharing plan before the present one expires in December of 1976.

"Revenue sharing is of tremendous benefit to small Texas communities and to the state as a whole," Krueger said. "I would like to see Congress re-enact the program; it allows states and communities to spend their money as they see fit, rather than letting the federal government do it for them."

Krueger also emphasized the need to have minimum levels of aid which jurisdictions could receive. "As is often the case," Krueger said, "small communities, particularly in West Texas, could be overlooked or excluded altogether unless the federal government recognizes their importance and includes this important provision."

"We must remember," Krueger noted, "that most of the projects for which revenue sharing monies are spent

benefit the community at large, so a per-person measurement of cost is not accurate in representing a project's overall benefit."

The legislation is currently in the Government Operations Committee of the House of Representatives, but Krueger and other supporters are hopeful that it will soon reach the full House for consideration.

Krueger added that he has spoken with community leaders in Texas who strongly support the revenue sharing program and will urge his colleagues to support the legislation when it comes before the House.

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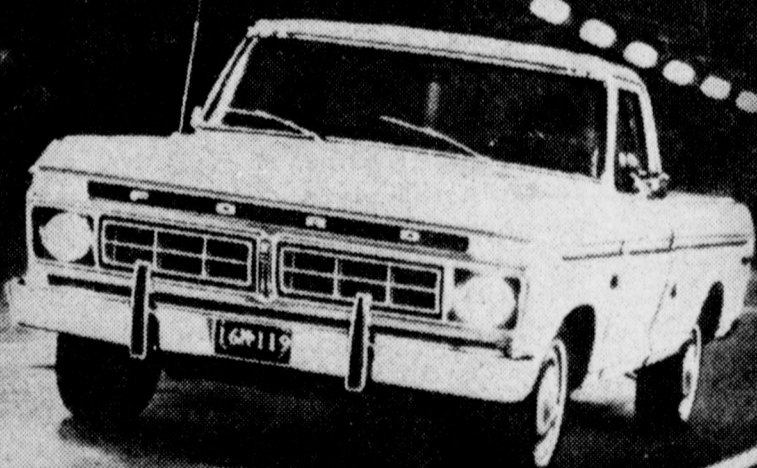
