Not forgetting is not good enough

It did my heart good to see a really young face at the VFW Post 8056 Memorial Day breakfast on Monday. It was Alisha Womack, a high-school freshman.

Later, at Castro Memorial Gardens Cemetery, Womack was helping VFW and American Legion members put flags on the graves of veterans.

I asked why she'd gotten up early this holiday morning - the breakfast started at 7 a.m. - and her answer was simple.

"I wanted to pay my respects to those people who've served our country," Womack said. "I wanted to honor them."

The reason I was so happy to see a youngster at this affair is that I believe fewer and fewer Americans are truly aware of the sacrifices made by thousands of men and women since the 1770s, when we fought our most important war -The American Revolution.

Yes, I know it's taught in school, but only battles and names of wars are taught.

We need young Americans to know what a high price we've paid over the past two centuries to keep our country free. And while,

unfortunately, we'll probably always have Americans fighting and dying on some foreign shore, a whole generation - it's been called "The Greatest Generation," is dying out at the rate of 1,000 a week.

That generation is the one that fought World War II. It was a contest between good and evil and had the United States not have entered the war on the part of the Allies, we might all be speaking German (or Japanese) today.

That's why it's important for the kids and the 20- and 30-somethings to hear about from our veterans and understand that names and faces go with those battles and names of wars. Mothers and fathers lost sons and daughters. Every family has someone with an American flag on his or her gravestone, signifying just how personal wars are. And how costly.

The next significant date is June 6, which will mark the 61st anniversary of D-Day, the Invasion of Normandy, the first time the Allies stepped back onto the shores of France since Dunkirk. After that, it's Sept. 2, which will mark the 60th anniversary of the surrender



Cheers to consumers, producers in National Dairy Month

Prepare to uncap a jug of milk or dig into a big bowl of ice cream - just in time for the first uncomfortably warm Texas weather, June is National Dairy Month.

This is a time to thank the consumer for his or her support and recognize the state's dairy farmers for their hard work, day in and day out.

Milk and milk products have been an important part of our nation's diet and livelihood since the first cows were brought to Jamestown, Va., in 1611. Dairy Month has

been celebrated annually in the United States since 1939.

Much has changed in the industry in the past decades. More products are available now than ever before. And the products are safer than ever before, thanks to advances in refrigeration, technology and food packaging. Technology has also had a tremendous impact on milk production, although some aspects of farming haven't changed for generations.

With so many beverage, especially soft drink, options available to consumers, they still haven't lost their desire for milk, nature's most nutritionally perfect food. They also are continuing to eat plenty of butter, cheese and ice cream, even though more are turning to lighter or lower fat versions.

The most recent statistics available show that each of us annually consumes about 22 gallons of fluid milk, almost 1 pound of yogurt, 4.5 pounds of butter, 30 pounds of cheese and almost 27 pounds of frozen dairy products.

Of course, without the commitment of our dairy producers, the stores' shelves would be bare.

In Texas, about 800 dairy farmers produce more than 656 million gallons of milk a year, ranking Texas 12th in milk production nationwide. Those same producers (and their cows) also help make Texas the fourth leading producer of ice cream in the country.

These farmers also are contributing to the Texas economy as a whole, and even more to their local communities. The economic impact of the dairy industry on Texas is estimated at \$772 million in goods produced and 10,926 jobs.

Dairy farming isn't easy. Cows don't take a day off they always have to be fed and cared for. And the work isn't glamorous. These days, being a farmer also means coping with new technology, rising business costs and increasingly complex and stringent environmental regula-

Yet our farm families wouldn't choose any other life. The Texas Association of Dairymen thanks our farm families for their dedication to feeding our nation. And we thank those who drink milk and eat other dairy products for appreciating the fruits of our farmers' labor.

YOUR EYES APPLYING EYEMEDICATION

Do you know the easiest way to put in eye drops or intment? Most people don't. Consequently, they feel awkward, or worse, they don't get the proper of medicine.

Don't try to put in eye drops while lying down. You may get a drop in, but more likely, you'll just miss the eye itself. It's easiest if you work in good light. First, pull down the lower eyelid with your index finger. This will create a small "pocket" in this lower part of the lid. with your other hand hold the bottle of eye drops and gently squeeze the drops into this pocket. Eye ointment also can be squeezed into the pocket. Do your best not to touch the tip of the bottle to the eye. The drop or ointment will then spread

If you feel like you're "all thumbs" when using drops or ointments, it may be best to have someone do it for you. Don't be afraid to ask your eye doctor for help

I'm sure there are other summer activities for the young ones. If you are bored, check some of these activities out. Have a happy, safe summer.



79th Legislature gets failing grade


