We're running a picture this week that should have appeared last week. Instead there was a two column by four-inch embarrassing white spot just above the outline telling what four youngsters had done with their scientific experiments at school. It seems someone— whoever made up the page— forgot to stick the zinc engraving down and when the inking rollers passed over it, the plate was flipped out of the page and down into the gloomy caverns of cast iron that go to make up a printing press.

Usually when something like this happens the plate flips out on top of the other type and when the press printing cylinder hits it, it is smashed into the rest of the type with umpteen tons of pressure, necessitating the tedious re-making of some of the page.

Anyway, if somebody hasn't failed to stick it down this time, it will be tardy, but it is in the paper this week.

Very little has been said about the horse-racing referendum coming before voters on May 5. Perhaps there is little need to say anything because the proposal will surely go down in ignominious defeat. However, this isn't necessarily a guaranteed fact. Twenty-four states—half of them—permit horse-racing and pari-mutual betting. It could come to Texas.

In Damon Runyan parlance, we've wagered a few quid on the bang-tails ourselves. We like horse racing and we'll go again sometime. But we'll vote against having it in Texas. It would be all right if humanity could practice moderation. But gambling devices—slot machines, casinos, horse racing and the like—inevitably cause the degeneration of many of the people it touches. No one can get hurt who goes to Raton or Dulosa once a year and places several bets at the \$2 window, especially when he knows he'll probably lose. The question of morality hinges on whether you consider this entertainment or gambling. You can spend more going fishing or in a lot of other harmless pastimes than betting six or eight dollars on the horses.

But the earnest gambler is wrong. If he places a single \$2 bet hoping for quick riches he has slipped over into the shady side of horse-racing that is occupied by all too many of the fans. Every race track eventually breeds a collection of these people, just like a row of illegal slot machines in Cook County, Illinois. They spend every dime they can or can't afford on horse-betting. Eventually they get hooked on it just like dope addicts. It is for these people that we prefer that all gambling be outlawed in the United States and be made to stick. Too many people can't control themselves. According to Leroy Collins, a former governor of Florida, where pari-mutual gambling is legal, "Gambling, legal or illegal, is insidious. It kills more business than it generates. Florida would be better off if it had no pari-mutual betting. Even if gambling is 'needed' to attract some customers, I say let other places have these customers. They bring more problems than prosperity."

Thomas E. Murphy of the Hartford Courant, did a study of pari-mutual gambling in his neighboring state of Rhode Island and said in part: "...The other side of the pari-mutual coin is deeply engraved with personal tragedies, delinquencies, embezzlements and suicides. Yet only 76,000 out of a total of 280,000 qualified voters bothered to vote on this question at all."

Another man who has had to face sore problems arising from gambling is Vergel A. Peterson, director of the Chicago Crime Commission, who said that "Gambling drains the salaries, savings and investments of a community into a business enterprise that serves no human need. Those who benefit from gambling profits are almost without exception members of the underworld who invariably control the gambling business."

Senator Alexander Wiley of Wisconsin said in one study that "The idea that legalized gambling will be a revenue-raiser is an illusion. Every dollar raised from such sources means five dollars spent in higher police costs, higher court costs, higher penitentiary costs and higher relief costs."

Most people in pari-mutual states can and do control their spending when they go to horse races, but the thousands who can't are the ones who provide the flies for the ointment.

Obviously the biggest arguments against betting should come from the pulpit. We make no claims to theological competence and base our arguments strictly on the modern-day sociological aspects of these situations which arise from time to time. Scripture may possibly be found which would keep a Christian from condoning "entertainment" betting—we don't know—but certainly serious gambling with a hope and belief in personal gain is not only foolish, it is immoral, un-Christian, illusionary, and degenerate.

We hope Castro County gives a 100 percent no vote in the horse-racing referendum.

"I'm a Kennedy Democrat," Candidate Don Yarborough Tells Local Audience

Don Yarborough, 37 year old Democratic candidate for governor of Texas paused a few minutes on the courthouse square in Dimmitt Tuesday and told the people about him that the State of Texas has fallen behind in industrial development because of weak leadership and that if he is elected as governor he plans to make every effort possible to bring an industry to every small town in Texas.

"I, as your governor want to return the government of Texas to Texas people," he told the group. Yarborough is an ex-marine and prior to his career in politics he has been engaged in insurance, banking and law practice. He is a graduate of University of Texas School of Law.

Continuing his speech he touched on various reforms he feels are mandatory toward effecting a sound economic growth in this state, such as attracting tourist trade, enticing industry to small towns as well as large, correcting impediments on small businesses and promoting their growth and establishment and by so doing promoting the free enterprise system.

"To save the free enterprise system I feel we've got to roll up our sleeves and get busy and show the federal government that on a state level we can meet our obligations."

Speaking specifically on the sales tax Yarborough had this to say: "As I have traveled from town to town through out Texas, I have seen the skeletons of small businesses strewn along the way. And now, the general sales tax threatens to push more small businessmen to the wall of bankruptcy because these businessmen do not have the time nor money to collect

this unfair and vicious tax." In the place of the general sales tax Yarborough advocated new taxes on interstate gas pipeline corporations, a substantial raise over the 8-day oil allowable to create more tax income and attracting new industries to Texas.

Continuing further on his general philosophies of government, Yarborough stated he would not be a "can't" governor pointing out that some individuals in government were of the opinion industry cannot be brought to Texas in general proportions. "I plan to be a fight'n governor, a progressive and vigorous governor, a governor not enslaved to any group but one who can listen to the voice of the people."

Other topics he touched on were education, the level of which he considers appalling and would improve through better and more teachers and better salaries for teachers; a better program for the care of aged people so that they do not have to live in abject poverty.

Yarborough added that he plans to be the kind of governor with whom the people can talk, in whose office a man may prop his feet on his desk and speak his mind and the door shall be open at all times.

Elections Fill School Boards Over County

One hundred and seventy-seven persons voted Saturday in the Dimmitt School Board election. Returned to the board were Jim Elder, 155 votes; and J. G. Davis, 118. A new member is A. J. Kemp who received 131 votes. John Nichols received 96 votes. Those eligible to vote for the Precinct 1 county board member gave George Sides 97 votes and Percy Hart 8.

A large number of people voted in the Harr election. Write-in candidate Charlie Martin received 77 votes to be elected with Glenn Reed who received 106. Other candidates were M. L. Aven, 67; and Verle Crick, 66. Receiving write-in votes were Theron Morrison, 67; Johnnie Clark, 4; Joe Newman, 3; and Jack Harris, 1. For the county school board, Percy Hart received 131 votes.

At Nazareth, only 27 votes were cast. George H. Book received 24 votes and Greg Hoelting, 26. Albert Gerber and Vincent Guggemos received one write-in vote each. Percy Hart received four votes for County trustee, Precinct 1.

Methodist Church Descended from Card Game?

(Ed. Note: This is another in a series of articles on Dimmitt churches by a former Bedford Street Church of Christ minister, D. C. Lawrence. This week begins a series in several parts on the First Methodist Church in Dimmitt.)

Methodism had a unique beginning in America. One evening in 1776, in the City of New York, a group of men were playing cards. A woman named Barbara Heck, with the passion of a zealot, seized their cards, threw them into the fire, and then preached a fiery sermon. Hurrying home, she then fired the enthusiasm of her cousin, Philip Embury. Shortly thereafter, he delivered the first regular Methodist sermon in America to a small congregation in his own home. Although Embury received the credit, it was more truly Bar-

bara Heck who preached the first sermon.

Methodists felt they had a divine message for all men. They pushed their way into the frontier and erected simple Churches or preached in private homes and established congregations. Texas, like other parts of the nation, saw much of the Methodist circuit rider in the early days.

The year 1817 found William Stevenson preaching on the Texas side of the Red River in the home of a Mr. Wright. The place seems to have been Jonesboro. Here a Methodist class was formed. It was several years later before any other Protestant denomination established work in Texas. So Methodists had the honor of being the first evangelical Church to begin

work in the State. In 1934 there were 550,000 Methodist members in Texas and a constituency of some 2,000,000.

In 1834 Henry Stephenson was placed in charge of all the Methodist work in Texas. The first effort by the Missionary Board to send missionaries to the State was made in 1837, when the Rev. Martin Ruter was appointed Superintendent of the Texas Mission, with the Rev. Littleton Fowler and the Rev. Robert Alexander as helpers.

At least one of Texas' great heroes was conversant with Methodism. In a letter, seven and one-half months before his death in the Alamo, W. B. Travis made an appeal for missionaries to Texas and showed his concern for the spiritual welfare of the people of

Texas. It was written August 17, 1835 to the New York Christian Advocate and Journal. He stated in part:

"We are very destitute of religious instruction in this extensive fine country."

Although the exercise of religion in any form is not prohibited here, but is encouraged by the people, yet but few preachers have come among us to dispense th tidings of salvation to upwards of sixty thousands of destitute souls. I regret that the Methodist Church, with its excellent itinerant system, has hitherto sent the pioneers of the Gospel into almost every destitute portion of the globe, should have neglected so long this interesting country....In sending your heralds to the four corners of the earth, remember Texas.

No records have been found of any church organization in Dimmitt before 1891, the year the Baptist Church was organized. The Methodists assembled with all religious groups as a "union Church," meeting in homes, since there was no church building in Dimmitt until 1904. The union Sunday School was organized in 1898 by Mrs. Judge Kerr, with forty-four enrolled. She was selected to serve as the first Superintendent.

Sometimes preachers were hindered from keeping their appointments. Adverse weather, long distances, and primitive modes of travel were major obstacles to an effective ministry. On one occasion, a critical member asked, "We all wonder why our Methodist minister wasn't here on the first Sun-

day. Brother Bennett, we dislike being disappointed down here, especially on preaching days."

The Methodist Church in Dimmitt was formally organized in 1905. Some "Old Timers" thought C. A. Clark, who was preaching in Hereford, Texas, was instrumental in organizing the Methodist Church in Dimmitt. The Methodists were conducting services twice a month, the Presbyterians and Baptists each holding services one Sunday each month. The charter members included Mrs. Sallie E. Ramey, Mrs. Etta Brashears, and Mr. and Mrs. John Smith. Mrs. Etta Brashears was the only living charter member who had never had her membership in any other church.

The new congregation enjoyed an increase in membership in 1906. Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Hastings of the Lakeview community, between Dimmitt and Tulia, Texas, moved their membership to Dimmitt. Mrs. Percy Estes and Mrs. Effie Jacobs also were identified with the church that same year. Then, for the first time, a parsonage was furnished for their preacher, U.H. Trammel. In the conference minutes dated October 21, 1908, W.P. Edwards, who followed Trammel, recorded an unusual aspect of the church property.

There is one church building and one parsonage in Dimmitt. \$108.00 has been paid on the parsonage this year in the way of improvements, and furnishings. The parsonage is valued at \$450.00, and the deed is recorded in bot; Castro and Swisher Counties, which is somewhat confusing to us.

The parsonage was situated near the northwest corner of the town section, Happy, in Swisher County, probably was under the jurisdiction of the Dimmitt Church at one time, which would account for the deed's being recorded in both counties.

Postal Inspector To Study Home Delivery Feasibility



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News from the Castro County ASC OFFICE

In 1962, as has generally been the case in recent years, the Commodity Credit Corporation is offering eligible producers a resale program on their more recent grain crops under farm-stored loan and is asking delivery of the balance of any loan grain still in farm storage from earlier crops.

This is a continuation of the policy of maintaining grain reserves, owned or under loan obligation to CCC, in or near points of production and at the same time keeping such reserves reasonably fresh through rotating out the older lots as never supplies come in.

In view of the resale opportunities for more recent crops, it appears that there would be re-filling of most, if not all, of the farm storage to be vacated by eligible producers through the forthcoming deliveries of the older grain.

At January 31, the total amount of corn, wheat, grain sorghum, barley and oats under farm resale amounted to almost 500 million bushels. Of this amount nearly 402 million bushels will be available for further resale.

Also at January 31, the volume of these crops put under farm-stored support loan from 1961 production had reached a total of more than 404 million bushels, with substantial further additions expected before the end of the loan period in the case of corn.

In short, it appears that the volume of these crops from 1961 production likely to be available for resale will far exceed the total amount of about 101 million bushels of older crop loan grain involved in the current resale terminations.

Information concerning resale loan programs available to producers in Texas is outlined in Texas Notice PS (General 60)-20 and Texas Notice PS (General 61)-10.

The fact that a producer may not have complied with the 1961 Feed Grain Program does not affect his eligibility for resealing crops of 1960 or earlier years.

Meantime, farmers who sign up for participation in the 1962 Feed Grain Program may use their diverted acre payment-in-kind certificates (or the cash equivalent thereof) to buy back at market price some of their own feed grain from under 1961 or earlier loans.

As the older resale grain is delivered by producers to CCC, it will be inspected and such lots as fail to meet CCC requirements may be immediately sold locally. The accepted lots will then be moved directly to a purchaser or held temporarily in a warehouse until load-out can be arranged against a sale. It is not possible, of course, to indicate in advance where any given lot of take-over grain will eventually go because it is not customary to forward lots on an identity-reserved basis.

The farm storage resale program was inaugurated some years ago largely to deal with the critical space problem arising out of the failure of the adjustment programs then in effect to stabilize production. On the assumption that more effective programs one day would again be undertaken, a program of resealing on farms was justified as minimizing both the construction of costly commercial ware-

house storage which might not be needed in the future and also the purchase of additional Government bins.

The farm storage resale program was not intended to be used by producers in a major way as a source of income, especially through the indefinite continuation of the resale privilege. These payments at present are in line with commercial rates under the Uniform Grain Storage Agreement and are made in relation to the period of time under resale, whether the loan grain is redeemed by the producer or delivered to CCC.

A policy of not extending resale on loan grain for more than two or three years is held to be a protection of farmers' interests as well as that of CCC. Danger of deterioration increases each year, even though the grain might continue to meet official market standards.

If extended storage is accompanied by deterioration of the grain, the producer becomes liable for a substantial deficit on the final loan settlement. The grain involved in resale loans is still the property and responsibility of the producer until delivery.

Without reasonable limits on the resale period, some producers also might be encouraged to expand their storage facilities beyond actual future needs as further supply adjustments take place under Federal programs.

Current continuation of the policy of terminating the resale program on the older farm-stored stocks does not represent a lessening in the Department's efforts to encourage the construction of NEED-ED farm storage facilities.

The facility loan program, with the liberalized down-payment provisions inaugurated in the spring of 1961, will be continued in 1962. Under these provisions, farmers requiring space for price support purposes may borrow up to 95 percent, as compared with the previous maximum of 80 percent, of the outlay for facilities costing 40 cents or less per bushel to build.

As a result of the encouragement afforded by these provisions, a record total of 129 million bushels of additional farm storage space was constructed in 1961, representing an increase of more than 100 percent from the previous year.

At the same time, care is being

taken to prevent excessive use of the price support and facility loan assistance. In general, borrowers are limited on facility loans to such additional capacity as required to store eligible crops from two years production.

It is recognized that over-expansion of farm storage primarily to earn storage payments would invite serious public criticism of producers comparable to that leveled against large private warehousing operations, especially in view of the current effort to reduce Federal expenditures for storage on CCC holdings.

Walter Rogers' WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

H.R. 10977
On March 28, 1962, I introduced the following measure in the House of Representatives:

A BILL
To provide that certain information relating to the national security shall be made available to the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that, notwithstanding any other provision of law, of any Executive order, or of any rule or regulation, whenever the head of any department, agency or instrumentality of the United States determines, as the result of information developed in the course of any investigation, that any officer or employee of the United States or any person seeking employment as an officer or employee of the United States is a person whose retention or employment as an officer or employee of the United States would not be consistent with the interests of the national security, he shall transmit all information developed in such investigation to the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Sec. 2. The Speaker of the House of Representatives is authorized to make available, for purposes of possible legislation, all or any part of the information transmitted to him under this Act, to such of the committees of the House of Representatives and to such of the Members of the House of Representatives as he determines necessary in the interests of the United States.

This bill was referred to the Committee on Post Office and Civil Service and requests have been made of several departments of government for full reports and recommendations concerning it. As soon as these reports have been prepared, I hope to request hearings on the subject matter and ask for passage of the bill.

Some have expressed doubt as to the need for such a measure. They have taken the position that this is a matter presently within the jurisdiction of the FBI and the other security agencies of this nation. It is argued that the files as to present and prospective employees of the government are kept secret in order to protect the particular individual from possible unfair conclusions with relation to certain fact situations.

Certainly no one wants to be unfair or to create a cloud of suspicion over an American citizen simply for the satisfaction of gossip mongers. However, this is a matter having to do with the safety and interest of this country, and it is my opinion that every possible opening for a Communist or Communist sympathizer or one subscribing to an ideology conflicting with ours to get into government employment should be closed.

Contrary to the general belief, the FBI does not issue clearances or nonclearances or express opinions regarding the suitability of persons for employment with the government. Nor does it make recommendations regarding the hiring, firing or retaining of applicants or employees of other Federal agencies. I must confess that for a great number of years I have been proceeding under the false impression that the FBI, the body charged with the internal security of this nation, made recommendations as a result of facts gathered by it concerning the employment or retention in employment of Federal employees. Having discovered the contrary, it occurred to me that under a true representative form of government, the duly elected officials of the people should have information on the subject. Primary responsibility for the preservation of the United States of America rests in the hands of the Congress. Unless that body has full access to information concerning the employees of this government whether they be civil Service employees, Foreign Service employees or purely political appointees, this responsibility cannot be effectively carried out.

As the matter presently stands, the FBI gets together facts and submits them to an official of the Federal government who has been appointed rather than elected and who, along with others, makes the decision as to whether or not the particular individual is to be employed. H.R. 10977 simply permits the duly elected members of the Congress of the United States to know what is going on in the executive branch of the government, as well as the judicial branch of the government, with regard to employees. It will provide a most effective bulwark against possible infiltration of undesirables regardless of ideology.

Sesame Harvester Nears Success At Muleshoe

The Houston Hart Farm 4 miles West and 1 South of Muleshoe was the proving ground last week for a machine that will go a long way toward mechanizing the harvest of Sesame crops for Plains farmers.

The machine is a self-feeding combine attachment that picks up a dry Sesame shock and flips it onto a slowly moving conveyor chain. The conveyor chain feeds the Sesame bundles into a vicious looking string cutter that reduces the bundles into nice bites for the combine.

Roy Wrinkles Welding Shop in Muleshoe is building the self-feeding unit for Texas Sesame Growers Inc. of Muleshoe and Paris. It is designed to operate on any standard self-propelled combine, and makes Sesame harvesting a one-man operation. Present harvest methods require a four-man labor crew plus the combine operator.

Texas Sesame Fieldman, Ray Hodges, has guided the project and was at the controls of the combine on its successful test run last week. "It's mighty late in the season for harvesting Sesame" said Ray, "but Mr. Hart and Bill Whately kindly left us about an acre of shocked Sesame so we could keep testing the new attachment." Ted Allen's 101 International combine has been used throughout the test which started last October.

"Excessive hand labor at harvest time has limited Sesame production on the Plains more than any other factor", according to Robert L. Parker of the Sesame Growers Organization. "This new self-feeding combine attachment will completely mechanize more than half the Sesame harvest operation, and will make Sesame production much more attractive and profitable for Plains farmers."

Area men who have watched the machine in operation speculate that with some modifications, it can be used to harvest other important seed crops from the shock, such as millet, sudan, or sorghum.

Texas Sesame is making color movies of the combine attachment in operation to show to interested farmers. Plans are also under way to build more of the attachments, to be ready for the 1962 fall Sesame harvest.

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
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
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

Mercury Capsule To Be Exhibited At Lubbock

A giant Mercury capsule will be exhibited for Texas Tech students and the public at the 30th Annual Texas Tech Science and Engineering Show April 13 and 14. The capsule is similar to that in which Lt. Col John Glenn recently made three orbits around the earth.

Viewers will be permitted to climb inside the capsule and investigate its interior. An engineer from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) will be stationed at the level of the escape hatch in order to answer questions from people inside the capsule.

The capsule—which is 26 feet tall, 6 feet in diameter and weighs 750 pounds—will be erected in the foyer of the West Texas Museum unless technical difficulties arise, according to Kenny Abraham, junior industrial engineering major and general manager of the show. Congressman George Mahon and the Air Force co-operated in arranging the display of the capsule at the Engineering Show.

A Minuteman missile will also be displayed behind the Museum along with various weapon supplied by the Air Force, Abraham said. The minuteman is a solid-fuel giant rated second to the Atlas. Numerous other exhibits will be at the Engineering and Science Bldgs. The latest scientific and engineering developments of the following departments will be shown: electrical, chemical, industrial, petroleum, textile, civil, air science, military science, allied arts and architecture, physics, geology, and agricultural engineering.



A rising tide of hepatitis, sometimes called "yellow jaundice", engulfed 3,155 Texans last year, a 38 percent increase in cases compared to the 1960 rate.

Cases of both serum and infectious hepatitis are included in those figures.

Infectious hepatitis has been rising throughout the Nation for the past two years. In Texas, cases reported during 1961 exceeded any other 12-month period since the State Department of Health began keeping records on the affliction in 1952.

The reason for the present upsurge is not known. Public health physicians say the disease seems to attack relatively large numbers of people—mostly youngsters and young adults—in regular cycles.

The elusive hepatitis virus attacks only humans. No other animal is known to be susceptible. Infectious hepatitis—the virus of which is present in both blood and body wastes of patients—is usually spread by close contact with patients or carriers, and perhaps in contaminated food or water. Serum hepatitis produces almost identical symptoms but the virus is found only in the patient's blood.

Most cases of infectious hepatitis occur among children and young adults, but people of all ages are susceptible. Fortunately, the disease is rarely fatal. Doctors report that the death rate seldom exceeds two percent, even in epidemics.

Victims usually begin feeling sick three or four weeks after exposure. They usually lose their appetite, feel fatigued and weary. They might be severely nauseated, and will feel achy and sore. A sensation of heaviness may be felt in the stomach.

One of the most prominent symptoms is a yellow discoloration—known as jaundice—of the skin and whites of the eyes. But some persons never show such discoloration and children sometimes contract the disease without showing any of the typical symptoms.

Having one bout with infectious hepatitis usually, but not always, insures against a second one. In any suspected case, a physician should be called at once. Bed rest and adequate diet are necessary to an uncomplicated recovery.

The most efficient tools for preventing infectious hepatitis are good personal hygiene, handwashing before eating or preparing food, and a high level of community sanitation. Contacts of known cases should see their family physician as promptly as possible after exposure to see if injections of immune serum globulin are advisable for passive protection.

Tommie Allen Honored At Texas Tech's Recognition Ceremony




After all of the specified issues have been considered, the meeting will be opened for a brief question and answer session. At this time, members of the audience may direct questions on any campaign issues to the candidates.
