Don't sell your cotton seed. Do a little investivating, it may not be too late to plant cotton. It has been reported that many of the farmers of this area are afraid it is too late to plant cotton, they just might be wrong. Your columnist is an authority on cotton culture in Bell county, but our experience in this area has been extensively limited, in fact I think I mentioned in this space once before that cotton caused us to turn to printing as a method or rendering a service to our fellowman. I do have a little observation to make howhowever, in regard to the planting of cotton, for the benefit of farmers of limited experience. You plant the stuff in rows, far enough apart so that a mule can walk between them, and it should be thick enough to shade out the weeds so that you won't have to do much hoeing. About the lateness of planting we don't have a precedent to go by in this particular locality but I remember back in 1941 and 1942, when it rained so much in the spring, farmers in Lamb county finished planting their cotton on June 20 and made a good crop. That could have been an exception however, it should be safe to plant cotton during the first week in June. For further information and verification consult another expert on cotton.

Cotton comes up quicker and grows of faster if it is planted after the soft has warmed up to a certain temperature. County Agent McLeroy might tell you just what the soil temperature should be. There is still plenty of time to make a bumper cotton crop. Two weeks ago you were notified through this column that there would be sufficient moisture in plenty of time. Our predictions are right so much of the time that it gets to be monotonous.

J. W. Skipworth ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH, AND DECLAR-ING AN EMERGENCY.

BE -IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DIMMITT, TEXAS: Section 1. No person, firm, company, corporation or association shall cast, throw or fire any squib, rocket, torpedo, grenade, gun, revolver, pistol, cap or cartridge, or other combustible fireworks of any kind in the City of Dimmitt.

Section 2. No person, firm, company, corporation or association shall exhibit or have in his possession with the intent to give away or sell or offer for sale or sell within the City of Dimmitt, any squib, rocket, cracker, torpedo, grenade, gun, revolver, pistol, cap or cartridge, or other combustible fireworks of any kind in the City of Dimmitt, provided however, that this section shall not apply to the sale of any such article or articles by wholesalers to each other or to the sale of any such article or articles at wholesale to merchants conducting business entirely without the City of Dimmitt, or to the sale by wholesalers for private or public demonstration as hereinafter pro-

Section 3. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to apply to the sale, storage or use of railroad track torpedoes, or other signalling devices used by railroads, nor to the sale, storage or use of flashlight composition by photographers or dealers in photographic supplies or prevent any public or private demonstration or display shall be of such a character, and so located, discharged or fired, as in the opinion of the said Chief or the Fire Department after proper inspection, shall not be hazardous to property or endanger any person or persons.



Environmental Sanitation Necessary For Good Health

AUSTIN, TEXAS - "Environmental sanitation is the public health term for clean, safe housekeeping whether it applies to a private home and its surroundings or to towns and cities. Among other things, it insures safe drinking water, proper garbage and sewage disposal, the safe service of wholesome food including milk, rat and insect control, and general cleanliness of the premises. However, for invironmental sanitation to be effective, it is essential that not only public health officials but the citizens living in their respective homes or operating establishments serving the public cooperate wholeheartedly, declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Consider, for example, the seasonal housefly hazard. It has been determined that 120 eggs are laid by a single female at one time and that a generation is produced every ten days at summer temperature. Thus, the possibility of reproduction during the warm months of a single fly runs into the millions. While the housefly does not bite, it is dangerous because it breeds and feeds upon ooth filth and food.

"Again rats are the source of several diseases of man including plague, typhus fever, infectious jaundice, and trichinosis, to mention some of the more important ones. Homes can be made comparatively ratproof by removing rubbish and garbage accumulations, and by closing avenues of access. Approved poisons and traps should be employed when a real problem presents itself.

"Removal of containers of stagnant water such as tin cans and barrels will do much to eliminate the mosquito for householders. The householder needs to devote
