



The underlying principal merits the thoughtful consideration of all county citizens. It is pointed out that it would streamline our county road system and make for more efficient management.)

ART. 6716-1. THE OPTIONAL COUNTY ROAD LAW OF 1947

SHORT TITLE

Section 1. The short title of this Act shall be "The Optional

ADOPTION OF ACT

Section 2. By a majority vote of its qualified voters, any county co-ordinated under one man who must fulfill Optional Road Law, but little has been done in this State, at any election held for that purpose, may adopt the provisions of this Act for the construction and maintenance of county

"For the Optional County Road Law of 1947"; or

"Against the Optional County Road Law of 1947."

If there be a favoring vote at such election, the provisions of this Act shall become effective with the official proclamation of the results of such election. In like manner, a county having voted to come under the provisions of this Act may vote to abandon the privisions of this Act, but no election on the questions of adopting or abandoning the provisions of this Act shall be held oftener than every two (2) years.

COUNTY ROAD DEPARTMENT

Section 3. The constuction and maintenance of county roads is vested in the county road department which shall include the Commissioners Court as the policy-determining body, the County Road Engineer as the chief executive officer, other administrative personnel, and road employees.

ON BASIS OF COUNTY AS WHOLE

Section 4. The construction and maintenance of county roads

COUNTY ROAD ENGINEER

Section 6. The County Road Engineer shall be appointed by the Commissioners Court. He shall be a licensed professional engineer, experienced in road construction and maintenance, who shall meet the qualifications required by the State Highway Department for its county engineers.

SALARY OF ENGINEER

Section 6. The County Road Engineer shall receive an annual salary not to exceed Seven Thousand Two Hundred (\$7,200) Dollars, the exact amount thereof to be determined by the Commissioners Court, and said salary shall be paid in twelve (12) equal monthly installments out of the Road and Bridge Fund of the county.

TERM OF ENGINEER: REMOVAL

Section 7. The County Road Engineer shall hold his position for an indefinite term and may be removed by a majority vote of the Commissioners Court. Removal shall not become effective until thirty (30) days after he shall have been notified in writing of the intention of the Commissioners Court to remove him, and until after a public hearing on the question of his removal shall have been held, if such hearing is requested of the Commissioners Court in writing by the County Road Engineer.

ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER

Section 8. In the absence of inability of the County Road Engineer to perform his duties, the Commissioners Court may designate a qualified administrative officer to perform the duties of County Road Engineer during such absence or inability.

POWERS OF THE COUNTY ROAD ENGINEER

Section 9. The County Road Engineer shall be responsible to the Commissioners Court for the efficient and economical construction and maintenance of the county roads. He shall have the power to appoint for an indefinite term and to remove all county road department personnel, subject to the approval of the Commissioners Court. He may authorize certain administrative personnel to employ and remove subordiantes or employees under their respective direction.

Were Red Peace Proposals In Good Faith?

The Communist frame of mind in Korea is think when he sees the actual pictures and unfortunate. Even as cease-fire negotiations are being made in Kaesong, the Reds are trying to turn defeat into victory through propaganda.

And the sad part is, though we know the propaganda attempts are humiliating, that we can do nothing about it. The United Nations want peace to save lives and material and are understandably ready to take any measures to stop the carnage.

To carry out their propaganda plan, the Reds have brought an armed force into Kaesong. The purpose of this is to take pictures of the five unarmed UN negotiators landing among the "conquering" peoples' army, a face-losing incident to the Chinese. But what can the UN do? For once they placed enough faith in the Communists to send an unarmed delegation among them for a humanitarian cause. From our brief knowledge of world history comes no remembrance of such a peace

putrid propaganda set before him? It will undoubtedly give a shot in the arm to Communist war plans, for the people of those countries will believe we are easy to defeat. And they will overlook the fact that Joseph Malik was the first to make peace overtures diplomatically.

The five-man UN armistice team headed by Vice-Admiral C. Turner Joy, landed at Kaesong Monday (our time). Shortly before leaving, Turner wrote: "We are proceeding in good faith, prepared to do our part to bring about an honorable armistice under terms that are satisfactory to the United Nations." The word honorable, was underlined.

There seems to be little we can do at this time, but we wonder if stronger demands on the Reds would not take some of the air from the Communist balloon. If the negotiators were to lay down the law it might be possible to verbally force all Communists from Korea and get every peace settlement the United Nations ever wanted. Just a hint about the possible bombing of Manchuria, the A-bomb, Hydrogen bomb, and bacteriological warfare could well render the Reds to the role of the physically and morally defeated.



Section 10. Except for the purpose of inquiry the Commissioners Court shall deal with the county road department's administrative personnel and employees through the County Road Engineer.


"It took a lot of dimes in 1950 to take care of Texas polio pa-tients," Ralph Frede of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis declared today.

14,105,640 of them, to be exact. County Chapters of the March of Dimes organization spent \$1,-410,564 for patient care in 1950, \$65,943 more than was spent for this purpose in 1949.

Assisted directly with hospital and other bills were 1,645 polio patients stricken before 1950 and 1,196 who contacted the disease during the year. Chapters ended the year owing \$306,326 to hospitals and doctors in Texas.

Frede said that total receipts from the 1951 March of Dimes approximately equalled the amount spent for patient care. Figures on expenditures, he noted, did not included money spent by the National Foundation's state and national offices for iron lungs and other equipment, for training of






