disarmament by this country. Anyone advocating such a policy is either mentally unbalanced or seeking the overthrow of our government. I know of no Member of Congress who would give a second thought to a suggestion of unilateral disarmament. They would consider such a suggestion completely and utterly silly. Hence since the affirmative action of the Congress is required before any such action could be taken, it is a foregone conclusion that the fuzzy-headed thinking of a few unrealistic dreamers is not going to have the slightest weight. Documentary proof of this lies in the fact that Congress has just recently passed the largest de-

in the fact that Congress has just recently passed the largest defense authorization and appropriation bills in our peacetime history. Other outlays have been made in the space program, which will soon become our first line of defense. This means that 60 cents out of every tax dollar going to the Federal government is closely and directly identified with the defense of this country in refining old weapons of war and in building new ones. Add to these figures the costs of past wars for which we are still paying, and we find

that approximately 75 cents of every Federal tax dollar is directly associated with "war." This should prove to the most skeptical that the United States of America is not seeking war but is ready, able and willing to take on any country or group of countries that thinks we are soft. It would do any of these countries well to look at the facts before listening to the talk of some soft-heads. This country has never lowered its guard, nor will it so long as there are aggressors in this world who C preach peace and practice con-

Man has long looked upon multilateral disarmament of the major powers as the best method of securing the peace of the world. This has been a major concern cevery civilization since the Ston Age. It has been the subject of conferences between sovereig powers since the beginning of time. To date, no satisfactory so ution has been found, although the conferences and discussions cortinue. As each new weapon of wa has come into being, the probler has become more complex. The advent of nuclear power increase the problems and complexitie many thousand-fold. It made messary a complete re-evaluation of the studies, the research, the coordination of activities and the preparation for management

participation in international negotiations on the subject. In short, it created a situation where the slightest lack of knowledge from a technological or scientific standpoint could spell disaster.

For a number of years, activities and research with relation to disammament negotiations had been carried out in our government in a rather loose and uncoordinated manner. This method of operation had apparently been satisfactory prior to the coming of nuclear power and hence was continued. How ever, in the past several years the lack of some basic scientific and technological information on the part of some high officials in this country, due primarily to the uncoordinated efforts of the several agencies and divisions charged with this responsibility, created some very dangerous pitfalls. It was these near-tragic experiences that shocked our government intercognizing the need for absolute coordination of all of our facilities in further negotiating on this age-old issue.

age-old issue. Thus came into being the Arms Control and Disarmament Act which is an act designed for the purpose of coordinating all phases of these activities under one head in order to center the responsibility and to avoid any possibility of breaches in security clearance research and development and all other sensitive areas including scientific and technological activities. Primary purpose of the agency created by this act is to provide the essential scientific, economic political, military, psychological and technological information upon which realistic arms control and disarmament policy must be based. It does not have the power in any degree to bind this country in the field of disarmament or otherwise contrary to the Constitution and laws of this nation. In order to doubly assure that there would be no misunderstanding in this particular, several of us in the Congress prepared on amendment and secured its adoption. This amendment specifically spelled out a prohibition against disarmament or arms limitation not approved by the Congress in accordance with the Constitution. Hence, anyone reviewing all of the facts, even the fuzzy-heads, can readily see that the United States of America is continuing the Motto "Don't Tread on Me" and is fully capable of reforcing the warning.

The wool growers of Castro County are to vote here on marketing promotion. "The referendum of wool and lamb producers coming up in September is to determine their approval or disapproval of a new agreement to continue financing ment to continue financing ment of the continue financing ment of the continue financing ment to continue financing m

He emphasized that the outcome of the referendum will not affect continuation of the wool incentive payment program, which was extended for 4 years urder legislation enacted last summer.

The advertising, promotional, and related market development activities to enlarge or improve the market for wool and lamb are carried out under terms of a greement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the American Sheep Producers Council, Inc., as authorized by law.

Under previous agreements approved by wool growers voting in referendums in 1955 and 1953, the deductions from producer wool payments to finance the market-development program have amounted to 1 cent per pound for shorn wool and 55 cents per hundredweight for lambs. Under the new agreement, the deductions cannot exceed these rates.

Ballots will be mailed September 7, to producers in Castro County, and all ballots should be received by September 10. The voting will take place over the 2-week period starting September 10, and all ballots must be received by the ASCS county office not later than September 21 in order to be counted.

Producers eligible to vote in the referendum are all those who have owned sheep or lambs, 6 menths of age or older, for any one period of at least 30 days since January, 1, 1962. Each producer will report the number of sheep and lambs on his ballot. Approval by producers having at least two-thirds of the volume of production represented by votes in the referendum will be required if the agreement is to be extended.








Dear Fellow Texan:

Of the 50 states in the Union only five still charge admission the voting booth. Only five deman a poll tax. Texas is one of the five. The others are Arkansa.

I co-sponsored a Resolution that if adopted, will make it possible for the people of this country to do away with the poll tax once and are all the poll tax.

This proposed amendment to the Constitution was passed las March by the U.S. Senate, and i passed the House on August 27th with 163 Democrats and 132 Re publicans voting in favor of it.

If 38 of the 50 state legislatures ratify this proposed amendment no poll tax will be required if Federal elections. Of course, look forward to the day when the poll tax will also be outlawed if the poll tax will also be outlawed in the poll tax will also be outlawed at a lections. But our proposes amendment applies only to feder al elections— elections of the President, Vice-President, U. S

Fellow Texan, the road to the ballot box should be a freeway-

not a toll road.

I hope that the Lone Star State will be the first state to ratify this amendment to the Constitution—this amendment in favor of the rights of man.

We have passed the halfway mark of the 20th century. The tim has come to treat the right to vote as one of the great democratic rights of Western man, likthe rights to freedom of speech freedom of religious worship an freedom of the press.

This new amendment, if retified by three-fourths of the states, would not apply to elections for state, county, city, school district, or any other local office. That would be a state matter. But I believe the people of Texas will follow through and do away with the poll tax altogether in their state elections if we adopt this national amendment to do away with the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting in national elections. Texas voters showed in the state Democratic and Republican primaries this year that they oppose the poll tax. Both Democrats and Republicans oppose it in Texas. Anybody who ever tried to sell

## Water District Seeks Income Tax Deduction

The main brief in the ground water depletion case, styled Mar vin Shurbet, et us x, v. The Unit ed States of America, was file on August 6th with the U.S. District Court in Amarillo, Texas The suit is being sponsored as a test case by the High Plains Un derground Water Conservation District.

On August 27th, attorneys for the Water District filed with the Court what they term a "reply brief." This brief is a reply to the Government's main brief.

The suit seeks to establish ground water in the Southern High Plains of Texas as a depletable natural resource within the definition of the term as used in the Federal Internal Revenue Service's tax code.

Should the Court rule in favor of Shurbet, and such ruling is upheld on appeal, then he and other ground water owners throughout the area will qualify for a federal income-tax deduction during those years when a decline in ground water levels is experienced. Only those who can show a cost in their water and who are using the water to produce income would be alicible.

The Water District will make public additional information concerning progress of the case as

Some people say the poll tax keeps only a few people from voting, so it should not be taken seriously. That's not true. Suppose, Fellow Texan, you applied that false theory to freedom of religion, and said, "Nobody can pray unless he gets a permit from the government." The theory wouldn't stand up, would it? No. The poll tax is a shackle on full citizenship, and I hope the new amendment is ratified as soon as possible and that this barrier is swept away as a shackle and a servitude of the past.
