He was king of the traffic and I doubt he made more than \$200 a year and the regalia he wore was more than likely promoted from some army color guard supplies. But it was a sight. The Orient, or what we saw of it, had lots of these fellows.

The only local county race is between Raymond Hance and Noble Armstrong for commissioner of precinct 2. John Stork was elected Precinct 4 commissioner in the first primary May 5.

Polls will open at 8 o'clock and will stay open until 7 p.m.

A local man, B.M. Nelson, publisher of the Castro County News, is in the runoff with Bill Clayton of Springlake for the post of state

Representative, 91st Legislative District. Eliminated from this race in the first primary was Bill Milten of Bailey County.

Voting precinct chairmen will be elected in number 11 and 15. Running for the post in precinct 11 are Irvin Ott and Mrs. Thomas G. McKinney and in precinct 15 Mrs. W.A. Epperson and Mrs. John Burnett seek the post.

Another controversial state race that has drawn considerable fire is for Lieutenant Governor. In this race are Preston Smith of Lubbock County and James A. (Jimmy) Turman of Fannin County.

For Attorney General are Waggoner Carr of Lubbock County and Tom Reavley of Travis County.

Woodrow Wilson Bean of El Paso County and Joe Pool of Dallas County are battling it out for congressman-at-large.

There will be no local Republican runoff primary according to a party spokesman.

Voting places will be the same as in the first primary.

## First '62 Wheat Cut in County Near Nazareth

Farmers anxious to get into their wheatfields this week saw their crops rapidly turning to their golden hue as the hot May sun and winds prodded the normal ripening process along.

The first load of wheat for the year was delivered Tuesday afternoon to the Nazareth storage unit of Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc. The same firm also took in Dimmitt the first load of barley early Tuesday morning.

The first load of wheat weighed 6,440 pounds and was cut by F.P. and Edwin Schacher on their farm three miles east of Nazareth. It was dryland wheat and had a moisture content of 14.82 and weighed 56 pounds per bushel. It had received light hail on the part he was cutting Tuesday, and F.P. Schacher estimated the early Wi-

cuta was making about twelve bushels per acre. It was planted about the middle of September on Summer tilled land and about 40 pounds of anhydrous ammonia were applied per acre.

The first load of barley was delivered by Robert Yates and the production was off the E.L. Ivey place south of Dimmitt. It weighed 48 pounds per bushel and had a 12.98 moisture content. The first load was 12,000 pounds and had been watered three times. After suffering about a 10 percent hail loss, the grain was producing about 50 bushels per acre. It was New Mexico Winter Barley and was planted in September. It was cut late Monday afternoon about five o'clock.

Roy Pyeatt delivered Hart's first load of 1962 wheat to Hi-Point Grain and Fertilizer at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday. It weighed 57 pounds per bushel and had a moisture content of 13 percent.

Availability of combines is expected to be sufficient, although dryland wheat to the east and north is expected to mature quickly causing a possible slight shortage there.

Hail last week caused serious damage to many wheat crops in the country. Here and there over the county are patches of almost 100 percent destruction alongside slightly to undamaged wheat. However, the hail should not have affected county production more than five to ten percent. Unless more hail comes soon, wheat here this year will generally fare better than the past few years hailwise.

Miss Lanelle Blanton daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Blanton is one of eight women chosen to participate in the opera chorus at Central City, Colorado. The Central City Opera Company, whose season runs from June 10 to July 23, is located in a small, picturesque town about 40 miles west of Denver. Leading stars of the opera and concert stage will play the major roles. This year's operas are "La Boheme" and "Girl of the Golden West," both written by Puccini.

Miss Blanton is a sophomore voice major at West Texas State College. She is a member of Mu Phi Epsilon, music sorority, Tau Beta Sigma, band sorority, and Alpha Chi, honor fraternity. During the past year she played the leading role in the comic opera, "The Telephone" and was the leading lady of W.T.S.C.'s box-office sell-out, "Showboat." She was also chosen alternate soloist with the Amarillo Symphony.

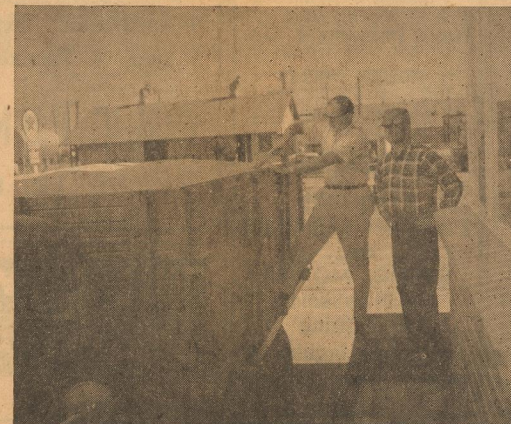

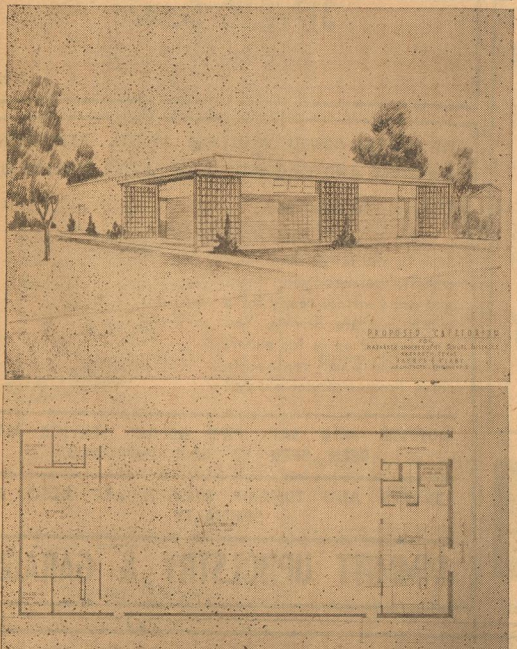

Working for Texas

Meet a fellow Texan: Preston Smith.

Preston Smith's story is in the best Texas and American tradition—a farm boy who worked his own way to an education and a place of honor in his business and community life.

Born in the heart of Texas, at Georgetown, he moved with his family to Dawson County in 1923 when he was 10 years old. He went to school at Sunset, Lamesa, and Texas Tech. In his adopted home town of Lubbock, with his wife Ima and their two children, he now carries out the full responsibilities of a typical Texas business and civic leader.

## About Your HEALTH

A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health.

A person can live three weeks without food, three days without water, but only three minutes without air.

Would you know what to do if a member of your family or neighbor became unconscious and stopped breathing and there was no doctor around?

In just a few minutes anyone can learn the technique known as mouth to mouth breathing. This method has been known to man since biblical times but has recently been proven much more popular than any other method of artificial respiration.

This technique may be used to revive all unconscious and non-breathing victims of drowning, electric shock, smoke or gas inhalation, drug or chemical poisoning, injuries to head, chest, neck, and abdomen, convulsions, cardiac arrest, and other causes.

Mouth to mouth rescue breathing starts with clearing the mouth of any foreign objects such as tobacco, food, seaweed, toys, loose teeth or other small objects.

Then, with one hand grasp the victim's chin, placing the other hand on top of the head and with a rotating motion tilt the head backward. A roll of clothing or blanket placed under the victim's shoulders will help keep the neck in favorable position.

Insert the thumb of one hand between the victim's jaws. Grasp the lower teeth and pull the jaw forward. Never let the victim's chin sag or let his head return to normal, relaxed position. Stop air leakage through the nose by pinching the nostrils closed with the thumb and index finger of the other hand.

Next, take a deep breath and place your mouth over the victim's mouth as firmly as possible in order to prevent air leakage. Keeping the mouth open wide breathe deeply into the victim's lungs.

As soon as you see the victim's chest rise you have delivered adequate breath. You must then remove your mouth so that the victim may exhale naturally. Repeat rescue breathing about once every three or four seconds, about 12 to 20 times a minute, until the victim breathes naturally or until a doctor arrives. If the victim is an infant or small child breathe gently using only small puffs from the cheeks and throat.

**VOTING**

Voting is the keystone of democracy. Unless one conscientiously exercises this right of franchise, a full and complete expression of the electorate is absent. If less than a majority exercise this right, the result of the election is not a mandate of the people, but a mandate of a majority of a minority. As has occurred on several occasions in our history, a controlled and influenced minority can wield great power. In fact, it can thwart the

will of a disorganized majority. It could be argued successfully that there are times when the best interest of the country can be served if such a minority, influenced by good, can prevent great damage and danger to an uninformed majority. All of which points up the fact that the best interests of this country will be most fully served if the electorate is informed and if the electorate votes.

In recent years, there has been much controversy as to the electoral college method of electing U. S. Presidents. As a matter of fact, during Senate hearing this year, the observation was made by one Senator:

"Originally adopted as a compromise, the electoral college resulted from a distrust of the people and conditions of geography and communications which no longer exist. Despite its confusion and

uncertainties, by sheer luck it has managed in most instances to elect a President who reasonably reflected the choice of a majority of the people. But this good fortune has lulled us into inaction after each election and the system has continued from one election to the next. Every 4 years the electoral college is a loaded pistol pointed at our system of government. Its continued existence is a game of Russian roulette. Once its antiquated procedures trigger a loaded cylinder, it may be too late for the needed corrections.

"We cannot assume that U.S. Presidents for the space age can continue to go into office in the oxcart furnished by the electoral college."

This would indicate to some that the Senator referred to was not exactly happy with the electoral college system. However, this particular Senator has been quite controversial on several subjects.

It should be pointed out that there are 14 separate resolutions sponsored by 26 Senators which would change in some way the Constitutional method of electing the President. The Subcommittee on Constitutional Amendments of the United States Senate divided these

into four basic plans: (1) direct national election, (2) the proportional system, (3) the district system, and (4) perfection of present system.

(1) Direct National Election—This proposal would completely abolish the electoral college. Under it, the President would be elected by nation-wide popular vote. A majority of the total popular vote would be required. This means that if any one candidate did not get a majority of all the votes cast in the first instance, a run-off election would be held between the two top aspirants. This proposal has been defeated three times in the Senate. In 1934 by a vote of 59-29; in 1950 by a vote of 63-28; and in 1956 by a vote of 66-17.

(2) Proportional System—This system would retain electoral votes but divide each State's electoral votes among the candidates in proportion to their shares of its total popular vote. Presidential electors would not be listed on the ballot. The people in each State would vote directly for candidates for President. There are several Variations on this proposal. One of these provides that a plurality of electoral votes would be sufficient for election. Another would provide for nominations by primary elections. Another would provide that the electors in each State would be regulated by its legislature but authorized Congress by law to make or alter such regulations. Another would require a division or proportion of a State's votes only if the minority candidate received at least one third of the popular vote. Other variations include qualifications for voting, regulations of elections, provisions for the District of Columbia, and so forth.

(3) District System—The district system retains the electoral college but changes the method of choosing electors. Two electors from each State are to be elected by a plurality of the popular vote from the State at large. All further electors are to be elected from single-electors districts. The original district system proposal did not anticipate that the electoral districts would be as Congressional districts. However, in recent years other proposals have been made that would require that the electoral districts correspond to the Congressional districts. Under either system, a majority of the votes in that district would determine the winner of the electoral vote. A majority of electoral votes would be required to elect a President. Otherwise election would be by joint session of the House and the senate.

(4) Perfection of Present System—Under this system, the individual presidential electors would be eliminated and the people would vote directly for President and Vice President. Electoral votes in each State would be awarded automatically to the candidate winning a plurality of its popular vote. Other resolutions have differences. Under one, only 35 per cent of the total electoral vote would be required for election. If no candidate received 35 percent, election of both the President and Vice President would be by a majority of the house of Representatives.

The number of different types of proposals plus the lack of a firm solution to date indicate that the problem is a tough one and is continuing. Let us hope our generation will produce statesmen of stature equal to those who met the same types of challenges in another day.



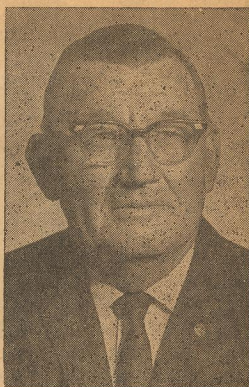
