Incumbants unseated in Primary Elections

Runnels County Judge Bill B. Stultz, County Attorney E.C. (Judge) Grindstaff, and County Treasurer Bud Everett were all defeated in last Saturday's Democratic Party primary.

Michael B. Murchison defeated Stultz for the nomination for County Judge, 1,261 to 1,185.

Kendal Granzin defeated Grindstaff, 1,473 to 978, to win the nomination for the County Attorney's office, and Nora Halfmann defeated Bud Everett, 1,610 to 848, to win the Treasurer's office.

All three of the winning candidates are assured election to their respective offices since there are no Republican nominees for the posts.

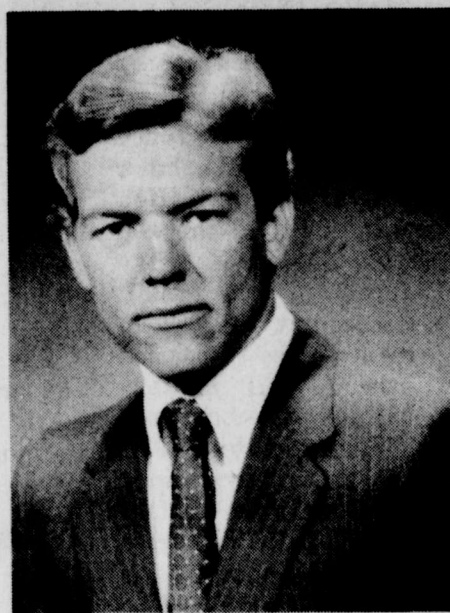
A run-off election has been called for June 5 to decide the winner in the race for Runnels County District Clerk. In the run-off Dorothy (Dottie) Smith will face Loretta Michalewicz for the District Clerk's office. In the Primary Mrs. Smith received 771 votes, Mrs. Michalewicz 744, Sarah J. Craig 678, and Joe C. Kreaeger 260.

In the race for District 65 State Representative, Jim Parker won the Democratic nomination with 1256 votes to lead Lee Haney with 721 and John Lee Blagg with 72.

In the race for County Commissioner precinct three, incumbent

David Carroll handily defeated challenger Ernest Cooke, 381 to 196.

The other races in Runnels County were uncontested with the exception of those on the state and federal level. A complete, box by box, break down of the voting can be found elsewhere in this issue of *The Enterprise*.

In the Republican Primary, Jim Collins led the race for U.S. Senator with 30 votes while Mengden received 19 and Richardson received 16. For Governor, incumbent Bill Clements received 55 votes and Embs received 4.

In the race for the Republican nomination for Comptroller Richards received 49 votes, Frank 16. For Land Commissioner, Glasscock 47, Jackson 8, and Gutierrez 1.

The Republican ballot also contained five non-binding referendum items and the voter response was in direct conflict with the actions of the state legislature in the past several sessions on most. The question concerning the legalization of pari-mutual horse race betting 35 persons voted for and 22 against. Referendum 2 concerned mandatory jail terms for persons convicted of driving while intoxicated and voters favored the question 49 to 8. The issue of initiative and referendum found 41 voters in favor and only 14 against. Only 8 voters were in favor of a ban on handguns and 49 voted against any control of handguns.

The question concerning abolishing the state's Sunday Closing Law or "Blue Law" also found disfavor among the county's Republican voters with 32 voting against the "blue law" and 24 voting for it.

Voter turnout was light in the county, especially in the Republican primary because of no local candidates.

In the Democratic Primary, about 41 percent of the registered voters went to the polls.

Dessert bake-off set for Mayfest

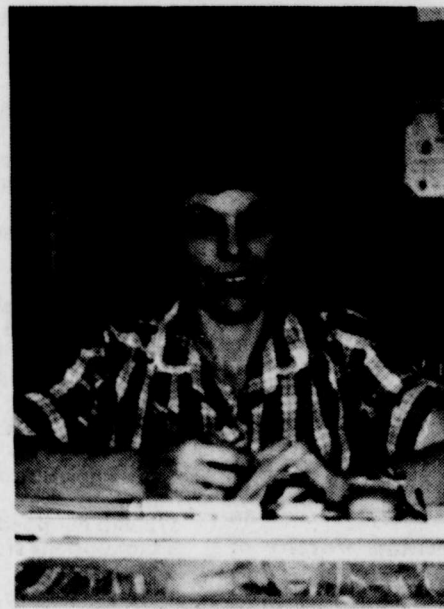

Local representatives of the band and parents are contacting law enforcement agencies in that area as well as the places the band stopped in an effort to locate the missing instruments.

Bruchmiller appointed County Clerk

The Runnels County Commissioners Court, meeting in a special called meeting last week, appointed Linda Bruchmiller to fill out the un-expired term of County Clerk.

County Clerk Frankie Berryman submitted his resignation, to become effective May 1, to the commissioners several weeks ago. Mrs.

Bruchmiller, who has served as chief deputy in the clerk's office for over 13 years was the only person to apply for the position.

Mrs. Bruchmiller will serve in the appointed position until the end of this year at which time she will begin her first full term as

county clerk after being elected in last week end's primary election.

Berryman told commissioners that he was going to travel and enter into private business related to the oil industry.

The application of Linda Bruchmiller was unanimously accepted by the commissioners following the motion by Robert Virden and a second by David Carroll.

Police to check on motorcycles

Winters Police Chief L.C. Foster said that all motorcycles being operated in the city will be checked to see the cycles and their riders, meet all legal requirements.

Foster said that the motorcycles must have current registration or license plates, a valid motor vehicle

inspection sticker, and proof of liability insurance. Riders must have a valid driver license with the proper motorcycle endorsement. Foster also said that the state's helmet laws will be enforced, the law requires riders under 18 wear

an approved safety helmet while riders over the age of 18 are not required to wear the helmets.

While helmets are optional for riders who are 18 years of age and over, the police chief reminded riders that passengers on motorcycles who are under 18 must wear helmets just as riders who are 18 or under.

Foster said that in the past several weeks there has been an increase in the number of motorcycles on the streets and that several of the motorcycles are being ridden by youngsters who are not old enough to ride the cycles and that there are also several bikes being ridden on the streets that do not meet license or inspection requirements.

The police chief said his department will be strictly enforcing the traffic laws concerning the operation of motorcycles in the City of Winters.

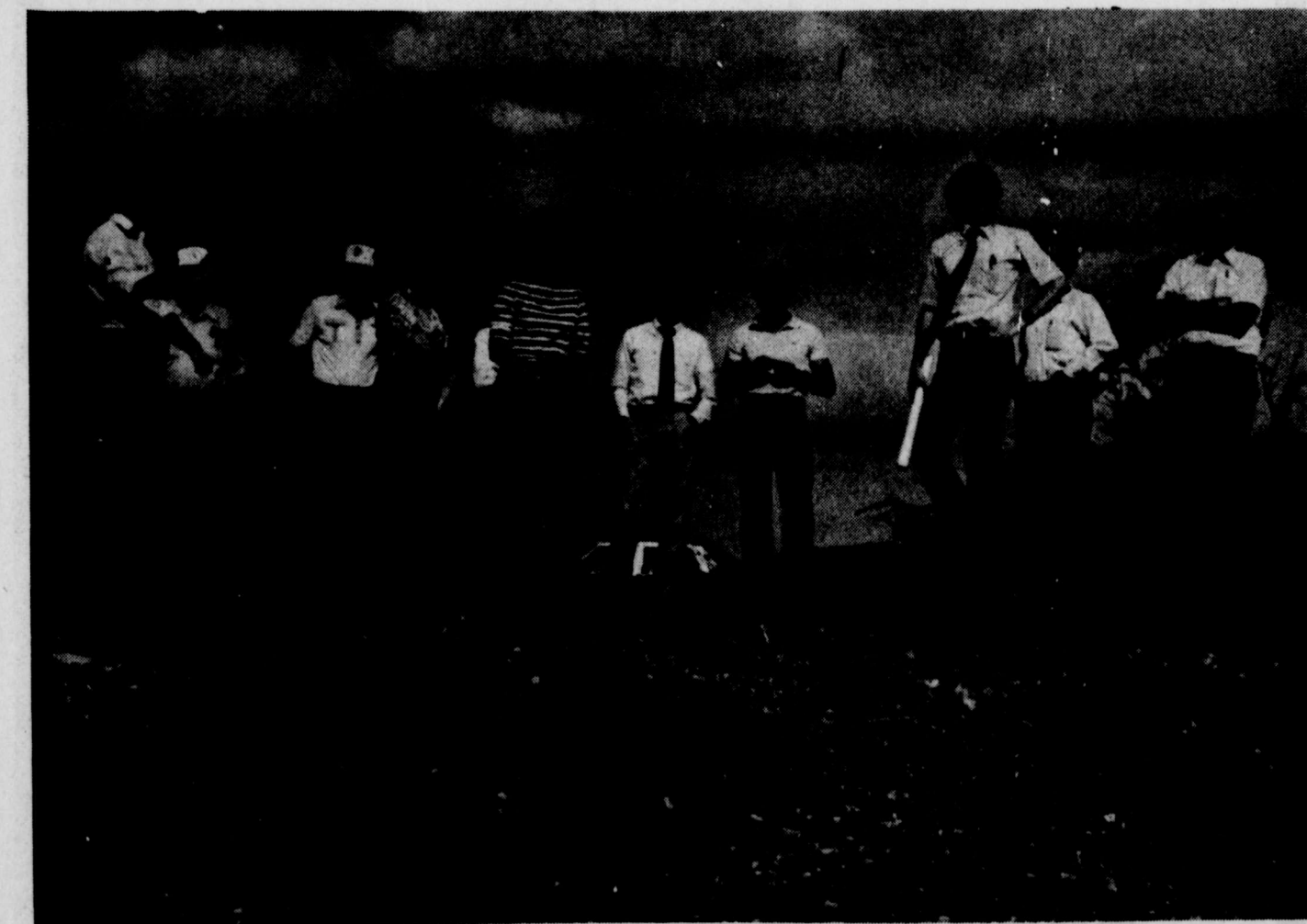
Police officers investigate theft, burglary

Winters police officers are investigating an apparent attempted break-in at Mansell Brothers farm equipment company over the week end and the theft of over 1,000 large bolts from the old Chicksha grain elevator that is being re-fitted.

Police Chief L.C. Foster said that the burglary attempt at Mansell Brothers occurred either late Friday or early Saturday and that apparently no entry was gained to the building. Officers said that a chain link fence had been cut and that a door had been damaged in the attempt.

At the grain elevator, where new grain bins are being installed, approximately one thousand bolts, one-half inch by one inch, were taken either sometime late Sunday or early Monday.

Foster said that his department has no suspects in either case at this time but that several leads are being followed.



New boat ramp will go here

Members of the Winters City Council tour the site of the proposed new park and boat ramp at the new Winters Lake. Also on hand for the tour were representatives from the City of Ballinger and

representatives from the engineering firm of HDR and Associates of Austin. Engineer Ken Choffel points out the area where the new boat ramp and park area will be constructed.

City will build park at lake

Members of the Winters City Council were treated to a tour of the almost completed new city lake Monday and updated on the progress of the long awaited project.

While on the tour, the members of the council toured a site selected by engineers for a proposed park and boat ramp for the new lake.

At the park site, a boat ramp is being planned and will be partially funded by the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife.

The council was also given a close-up look at the intake and pumping facilities at the lake as well as the overflow works about midway across the 5,000 foot long structure.

Also highlighted on the tour was the emergency spillway works that would handle any major flood type over-flow from the lake.

Two representatives of the City of Ballinger, the mayor and the city manager, also made the tour. Ball-

inger recently approved a \$6 million bond issue for construction of a new lake there. The same engineering firm, HDR and Associates of Austin, are working with Ballinger officials on their project.

Following the tour of the lake, the council began their business

session and approved the construction of the park area on the east side of the new lake along with the boat ramp. Approximate cost of the project is estimated to be \$55,000. Of that amount, \$15,000 will come from the state and the remaining \$40,000 from the City of Winters.

City Administrator Glenn Brown said that park project will include dirt work in clearing and leveling the area and adding topsoil, construction of a 30 foot wide boat

Poe's Corner

Academy of Freedom

Recently, the Triple L Club members took a trip to Brownwood in the First Baptist Church van for a tour of The Douglas MacArthur Academy of Freedom at Howard Payne University.

Our guide introduced himself as John Hill and we felt quite at home with him when we learned that he was the grandson of Omar Hill of Winters.

There is no admission fee for regularly scheduled tours, which require about an hour, but the complexity of the academy's message requires that visitors be escorted by trained guides who are on the staff or who are advanced students in the Academy of Freedom program.

The inception of the Douglas MacArthur Academy of Freedom came from the mind and heart of Dr. Guy Newman, who was then president of the University. From his youth he had desired to make some contribution to the greatest republic the world has ever known, and one that had given him the opportunity, as well as other young people, to achieve something worthy of mention.

The academy, dedicated in 1969, is rapidly gaining the hearts of freedom loving Americans and people from around the world. Each year it draws thousands of visitors who are seeking to relive the story of man's quest for freedom.

Following an interview with General MacArthur on April 12, 1962, Dr. Newman was granted permission to use his name in adding this new department to Howard Payne. In the conversation, Dr. Newman told the General of the plans to use Old Main on the Daniel Baker campus, a former Presbyterian College, united with Howard Payne in 1952 by action of the boards of both colleges.

Visitors enter the beautifully renovated building from the front, where stands a statue of Gen. MacArthur. They assemble as a tour group in the three-story Hall of Christian Civilization, where the walls are ablaze from the Wall of Light with the largest mural in Texas, a pictorial representation of man's relationship with God. It begins with the creation of man and shows his progress through the ages. The guide said that 1,100 pounds of paint was used by the artist in creating the story of mankind.

Next, we entered the Mediterranean Hall, replete with Egyptian statuary. These statues were covered with glue and then sandblasted to achieve the look of ancient figures. A facsimile of the famed Rosetta Stone, and a scale replica of the Parthenon also represented this first great civilization.

The Magna Carta Hall was next, a recreation of medieval European castle great hall with 17th century weapons, armor and furnishings dominated with a portrayal of the signing of the Magna Carta. This was followed by Independence Hall, a copy of the Philadelphia original with its peg floor, and twin marble fireplaces. We sat in the Windsor Chairs at small tables covered with heavy green cloths that hung to

"You've Got A Friend In The Hospital, Partner", the theme of Texas Hospital Week

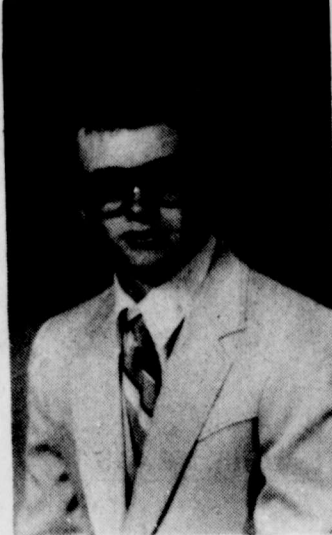
reflects the role of hospitals and their staffs as friends in helping community residents stay healthy.

In addition to the formal presentation of information, a lengthy question and answer session is planned.



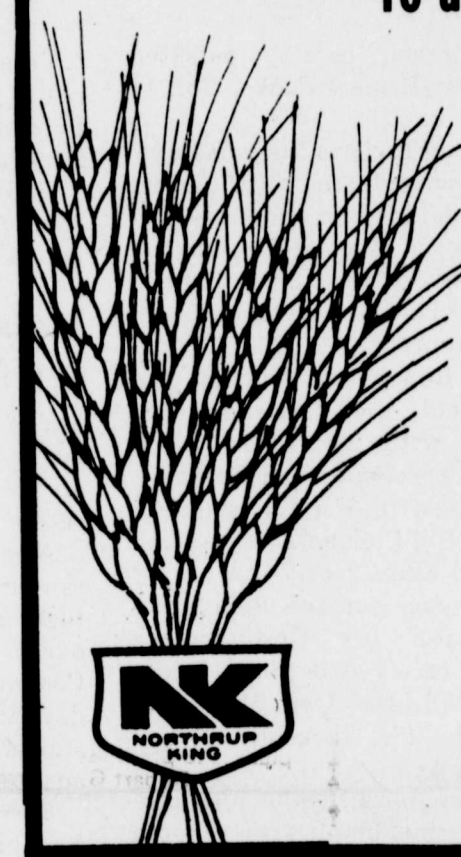

PEACHY PECAN SHORTCAKES

Pecan Shortcakes (below) 3 or 4 fresh peaches, sliced, or 2 packages (10 ounces each) frozen peach slices, thawed and drained
 1/4 cup powdered sugar Pecan halves

Bake shortcakes. Beat whipping cream and powdered sugar in chilled bowl until stiff. Split warm shortcakes; spoon peaches between halves and over tops. Top with whipped cream and garnish with pecan halves, 6 servings.

the floor. John Hill said that the long table cloths were used to keep the men's legs from getting cold as they wore silk stockings and short breeches buckled below the knee. Appointments on the table were pewter ink wells and quill writing pens.

In Constitution Hall we saw great floor-to-ceiling maps of the Pacific Theatre of War that traced the activity of our troops in that area. We also heard the story narrated. Our last stop was in the MacArthur Room, to examine the original memorabilia of the great soldier-statesman. Many of these keepsakes had been contributed by Mrs. Douglas MacArthur and included a number of his pipes, caps, books and other articles. She was also present for the dedication.

The theme of the Freedom Academy program is built around MacArthur's last public address given to the young men at West Point. "Duty, honor, country, these three hallowed words reverently dictate what you ought to be, what you can be, and what you will be. They are your rallying point to build courage when courage seems to fail, to regain faith when there seems to be little cause for faith, to create hope when hope becomes forlorn."

After our tour of the academy all of us were ready for some of Underwood's barbecue.

The day was still young so we drove out to the Baptist Encampment grounds and found the buildings painted, the grass mowed and a lake full of water. Everything in readiness for summer visitors. The bluebonnets covered the roadsides in many places. The entire day was a delight and the van load of travelers can recommend a tour of the Academy of Freedom at Howard Payne for anyone wishing to take a short vacation.

Randy is a 1979 graduate of Winters High School and is a pre-medicine major at Angelo State University in San Angelo. He will attend Texas Tech University this coming fall.

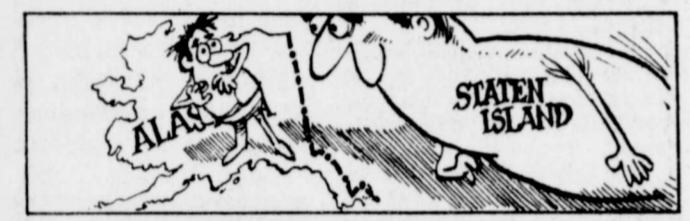

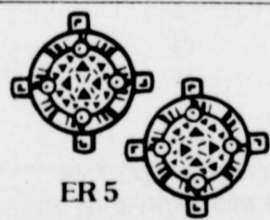

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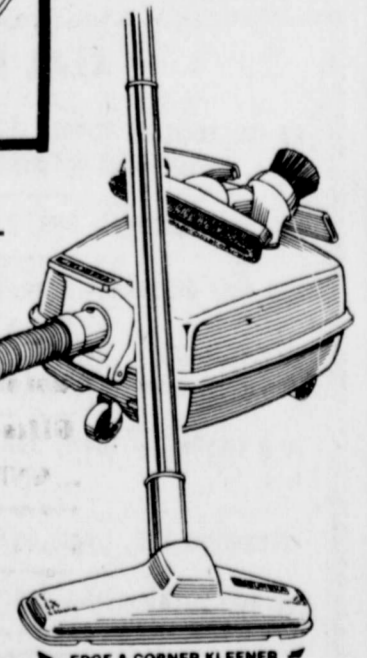

Dyess AFB Open House and Air Show, May 8

The U.S. Navy precision 10-man parachute team, "The Leapfrogs", will be the star attraction at the Dyess AFB Annual Open House and Air Show scheduled for May 8.

The Leapfrogs are a part of a full schedule of military demonstrations and displays that will be awaiting all visitors as Dyess opens its gates from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The day will begin with the Third Annual Civilian Fly-in and Safety Seminar, co-sponsored by Dyess and the Abilene Aviation Safety Committee. According to 96th Bombardment Wing Safety officials, more than 100 civilian aircraft are expected to fly-in to Dyess, with more than 300 participants expected at the Safety Seminar. The seminar will include such topics as accident prevention, crash survival, and inflight crises.

The gates to the base will open at 9:30 a.m., with the official start time of the Open House scheduled for 10 a.m. Dozens of military aircraft will be on display, including Dyess' own B-52D, C-130H, T-37, and KC-135A, plus the 96th Bombardment Wing's first

B-52 H-model, set to arrive on station May 3. Aircrew members will be available at each aircraft, to answer any questions.

More than 20 squadrons and organizations plan professional displays and refreshment booths. Major displays include the 96th BMW Aircrew Life Support, a U.S. Army machine gun display, a rotating model of the Space Shuttle Columbia, three NASA panel displays, the 96th Security Police Peacekeeper vehicle, and a Soviet small arms display.

A six-piece country and western group from Lackland Air Force Base's "Band of the West" will perform two one-hour shows during the day. The 81st School Squadron Drill Team from Goodfellow AFB will perform a 20-minute show also.

The 96th Security Police Squadron's military working dogs will perform, as well as an Army Green Beret team demonstrating special forces capabilities.

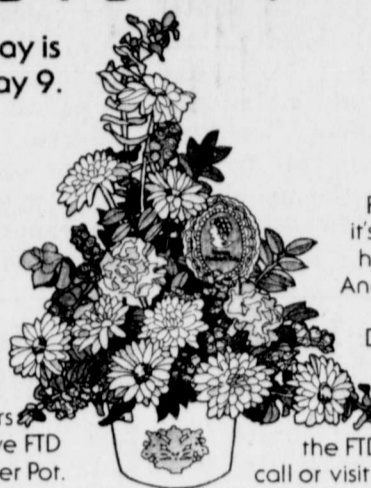

Brown said that bids for the park area will be opened in a special meeting of the council set for May 21.

In other action the council agreed to again advertise for bids for the bulk purchase of gasoline for the city. The bulk purchasing program was initiated almost a year ago and officials estimate the city saved between \$2,500 and \$3,000 by purchasing the fuel in bulk rather than by credit card purchases.

The city administrator informed the council that at the next meeting of the council representatives of the Winters Independent School District would ap-

pear to discuss the possible use of the Community Center to house classrooms next fall while the school renovation project is being completed. Brown said that because the item was not on the agenda for the meeting no action could be taken and he advised the council of the pending request to give members more time to consider such a proposal.
