City Council may give old City Jail new life

The Winters City Council, in their regular meeting Monday, met with County Commissioners David Carroll and Robert Virden concerning the possibility of the county levying a fee for housing prisoners in the County Jail. Both of the commissioners told the council that such a charge might become necessary.

The city council, after hearing from the commissioners discussed

several alternatives to the use of the county jail, including pressing the old jail-type holding tank behind the municipal complex. The building, complete with bars on the windows and a sun deck, has not been used as a jail for many years. The council instructed administrator Glenn Brown to check with the Texas Commission on Jail Standards to see just what would have to be done in order to use the

facility.

The council also asked Brown and Councilman Ted Meyer to attend Tuesday's meeting of the County Commissioners Court to express the city's views on the proposed fees for lodging city prisoners in the county jail.

In other action the council gave approval to a suggestion that McMorris and Associates, the appraisal firm that just recently reappraised all property in the county, prepare the billing of the 1982 Ad Valorem Taxes. The city administrator said that the firm would do this for about 28 cents per tax statement, which would cost

Postmaster informs city of mail route changes

Changes will be seen soon along the city routes for post office deliveries within the next two weeks, according to, Winters Postmaster Ann McDorman.

To comply with U.S. Post Office regulations, a countrywide cutback to economize has been put in effect. The Winters Post Office will lose one of their delivery carrier trucks. As a result, the City Route 2 vehicle will carry all parcels. Previous City Route 1 areas, including Park Lane, Laurel Drive, and the 1000 block of North Main, will become a part of City Route 2.

The Winters Housing Project on North Grant will be a part of City

Route 1.

McDorman noted that carrier delivery times may be altered slightly. Some people receiving their mail in the mornings, may now begin receiving it in the afternoon.

Persons with questions, or needing further information may contact the post office, 754-4718.

New Lake swimming discouraged

The Winters City Council agreed Monday to post signs near the new boatramp and pier at the new city lake warning of the hazards of swimming in that area.

The council noted that it could not prohibit swimming, but voted to put up the signs in an attempt to discourage the swimming because of the dangers of boats using the pier and boat ramp. Council members said that also it could be very dangerous for youngsters to swim in the area because of the steep slope of the bank and very deep water.

Several persons had contacted the council members and expressed concern about swimming in the area along with some problems encountered with persons swimming on the boatramp and refusing to move when someone was attempting to launch or load a boat.

The councilmembers were in agreement that a swimming area was needed at the lake, but there area no plans in the very near future for a swimming area. The council also said that there was no area in the new park area that would be suitable for swimming because the entire area is on a very steep slope with very deep water near the bank.

City Administrator Glenn Brown told the council that although the city could not prohibit swimming in that area and could not enforce a ban on swimming, he felt it would be in the best interest of safety to attempt to prohibit the swimming.

Runnels County Jail issue settled

The Runnels County Commissioners Court, in a special meeting Tuesday voted to drop the idea of charging the City of Winters for holding prisoners in the County Jail.

The idea had been discussed by the commissioners for several weeks after County Auditor Price Middleton became upset over a bill submitted by the City of Ballinger

GenTel charging for information calls

Directory assistance operators are still giving out numbers these days...but now they're asking for numbers, too, according to E.O. Cambern, general manager-West Texas Division Operations for General Telephone of the Southwest.

Some customers are finding the operator's requests surprising, Cambern said and asking why. The reason, he explained, is a change effective August 1, 1982, which allows General Telephone to charge customers for calls to directory assistance.

The plan now in effect for General Telephone is the same plan Southwestern Bell had approved by the Texas Public Utilities Commission in June, 1977.

Camborn said, "Each call to directory assistance is recorded, and after ten calls from their number, charges will be made and will appear on their monthly bill. Calls are recorded during the billing period as reflected on customer statements."

Those calls that are recorded are

for water used in the county buildings and on the Courthouse Square. Middleton said that the water bill to the county reflected an increase of about 90 percent. The commissioners, apparently in an attempt to offset this increase, began looking for ways to recover that increased expense. The idea of charging the Ballinger for housing its city prisoners was brought up and the commissioners indicated at first that the fees should be charged to Winters just to keep things even.

Commissioner David Carroll, a Winters resident, told the county that he opposed such a charge to the City of Winters, that he felt it would be unfair. Carroll cited the use of the courthouse square by Ballinger and the revenue generated in Ballinger with none of the proceeds going to the county or Winters. He also asked if the county had investigated the prospect of drilling a water well to furnish

water for the lawn.

The cost of a water well would, according to County Judge Bill Stultz, be about \$11 per foot and that the water table was thought to be about 40 to 45 feet deep. The cost of pumping equipment and necessary pipe would run the total up to less than \$1,500.

The commissioners asked Auditor Middleton how much the county water rates had increased and the reply was about 90 percent. Middleton then produced a sheaf of papers containing figures representing bills from the City of Ballinger for water service. The bills ran from a minimum of \$6 for several months over the past two years to a high of about \$400 earlier this year. The auditor could not give exact figures for some recent months, saying he had apparently overlooked them in his records.

Local option bingo approved by voters

Voters in four Justice Precincts in Runnels County approved the legalizing of bingo games for charitable purposes as authorized by the Bingo Enabling Act.

The returns of the election, as certified Tuesday by the Commissioners Court, showed a total of 416 votes in favor of the bingo issue and 139 against.

In Justice Precinct 1, in Ballinger 122 votes were cast for the issue and 35 opposed it. In Justice

Precinct 2, 126 votes were for bingo while 88 were against the issue. In Justice Precinct 3, a total of 66 votes were in favor of bingo while 15 votes were against bingo. Justice Precinct 7 reported 102 votes for bingo and one vote against.

County officials said the voter turnout was very light with only 555 votes being cast in the election. In Runnels County there are 6,018 registered voters.

Following the official canvass of the returns by the commissioners Tuesday, there is a 10-day waiting period before applications can be submitted to the State Comptroller's office for licenses to operate the games.

Pre-registration August 24 for Winters students

An error in last week's *Winters Enterprise* stated that pre-registration for Winters school students would be scheduled for Tuesday, August 23. Pre-registration will be held on Tuesday, August 24, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

New elementary and junior high students should meet in the principal's office.

Parents of children who will be five (5) on or before Sept. 1 should bring birth certificates (hospital or church records) and immunization records. Those students not enrolled in kindergarten and who will be six (6) on or before Sept. 1 should also register for the first grade.

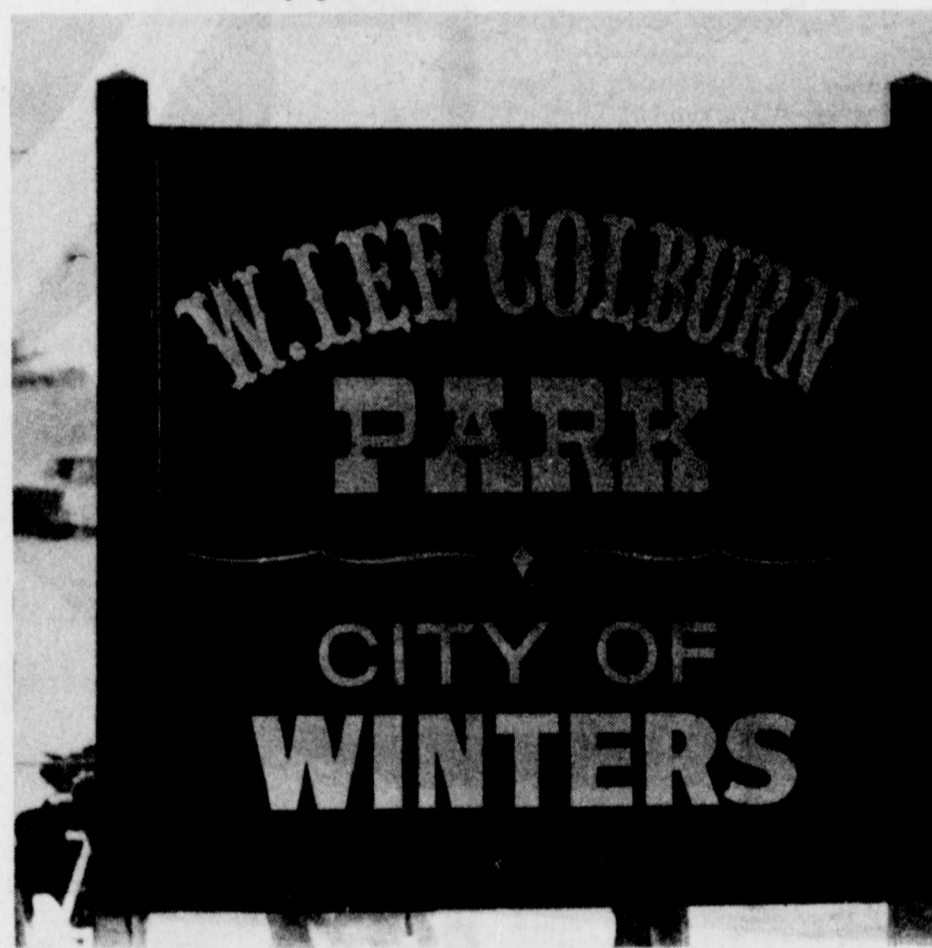
The child does not have to be present during registration.

Registration for high school students and students who wish to make a change in their pre-registration schedule will be conducted in the high school principal's office, located in the shop building across the street from the gym and tennis courts.

High school students who pre-registered during April, 1982 need not register unless they wish to make a course change. New students are reminded to have a transcript forwarded from the last school they attended and should also bring their most current report card and/or grade slips and immunization record.

It is very important that all students be registered.

Winters Independent Schools will open officially for students on Tuesday, August 31 at 8:25 a.m. Teachers will begin school on Wednesday, August 25.

Headliner Speaker

Since Paul Harvey came to Winters in 1965 to help us celebrate the town's 75th birthday, some of us who met him personally, became more interested in what he has to say through his broadcasts and news columns.

My experience with Mr. Harvey was brought on by Grandson Perry who wanted me to introduce him. When I complied, instead of shaking hands, Perry opened his hand and showed Mr. Harvey a tiny toad frog. He laughed loudly and said "You can scare hell out of Mama and the girls with that!"

I had always wished that I knew more about Harvey's beginnings, but hadn't taken time to do any research until recently when I was cleaning out a suitcase of souvenirs left from Daughter Jeannine's Baylor University days.

With a habit of never throwing anything away until I've looked at it, I ran across an article about Paul Harvey in The Baylor Line, official publication of ex-students association, for October 1952. A headliner on the Homecoming weekend program was to be the first annual banquet of the Ex-Students Association with Paul Harvey of Chicago, Ill., Ace ABC newscaster and commentator, principal speaker at the banquet.

Harvey is expected to be one of the most popular speakers ever brought to the Baylor Campus," it was announced. "A sure instinct for news and a flair for presenting it with human interest and drama have

skyrocketed him into the front rank of the nation's newscasters."

"Although only 34 years of age, Harvey is an old hand in radio, having started his career in his native Tulsa, Okla., 15 years ago, at the age of 19.

"Harvey worked his way through the University of Tulsa, but left before getting a degree. He obtained one in 1952, when Culver-Stockton College in Missouri awarded him a doctorate of letters for 'distinguished service to his fellow citizens'.

"During the American Legion Convention in New York City in August, Harvey was given the Legion's first annual radio award for his 'militant Americanism'. He also received a citation from Disabled American Veterans, saying, 'Paul Harvey is to the veteran returned what Ernie Pyle was to the soldier in the field.'"

"Born Paul Harvey Aurandt on September 4, 1918, he dropped the Aurandt when people had difficulty in spelling it.

"For a time he managed a radio station in Salina, Kansas, also 'announcing, selling and sweeping out at night'. He did news broadcasts in Oklahoma City, and then went to KXOX in St. Louis as special events director.

"There he did first-hand reporting on a Red River flood and other spot news events, and had such experiences as describing the mock bombing of a bridge while riding in a Navy plane at 500 miles an hour.

"His most important experience in St. Louis, however, was meeting Evelyn Cooper, now his wife. Known as 'Angel', she is a Phi Kappa graduate of Washington University in St. Louis, and sometimes helps him with his scripts.

"Harvey went to Hawaii for special broadcasts when the Navy concentrated its fleet in the Pacific in 1940. Miss Cooper joined him there, and they were married June 4, 1940, in Honolulu. They were on a ship returning to the mainland, two days out, when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor.

"Harvey did radio work for a time for the Office of War Information in Michigan, and then enlisted in the Air Force. He received a medical discharge in 1944 and headed for Chicago.

"The Harveys were down to 'one meatball sandwich', he recalled, when he joined the WENR-ABC newsroom in Chicago during June, 1944. His rise was meteoric.

"Harvey has hammered hard at inadequacies in government and other fields, but always, he has been fighting 'not against men, but against ideas which destroy men.'

"Nine of his broadcasts were placed in the Congressional Record within a 15-month period. He has been cited by the Freedom Foundatin for 'outstanding defense and extension of the American way of life.'

"Harvey's own way of life includes a pleasant apartment in Chicago, where he lives with his wife and four-year-old son, Paul Harvey II, called 'Happy'.

Paul Harvey continues to be a popular commentator and columnist. He endeavors to explain some of the "gobblegook" that economists talk. He says they don't understand nor agree with one another in a column written for the *Abilene Reporter-News* on August 9. He asked a friend, James Evans, who has written the book, *America's Choice*, to explain supply-side economics in six words "Unproductive government saps strength from productive people."

Clements challenges NGA to tackle drug problem

Texas Governor Bill Clements has issued a challenge to the members of the National Governors' Association. The Governor is urging the leaders of every state in the union to tackle the number one law enforcement problem in the United States . . . illegal narcotics.

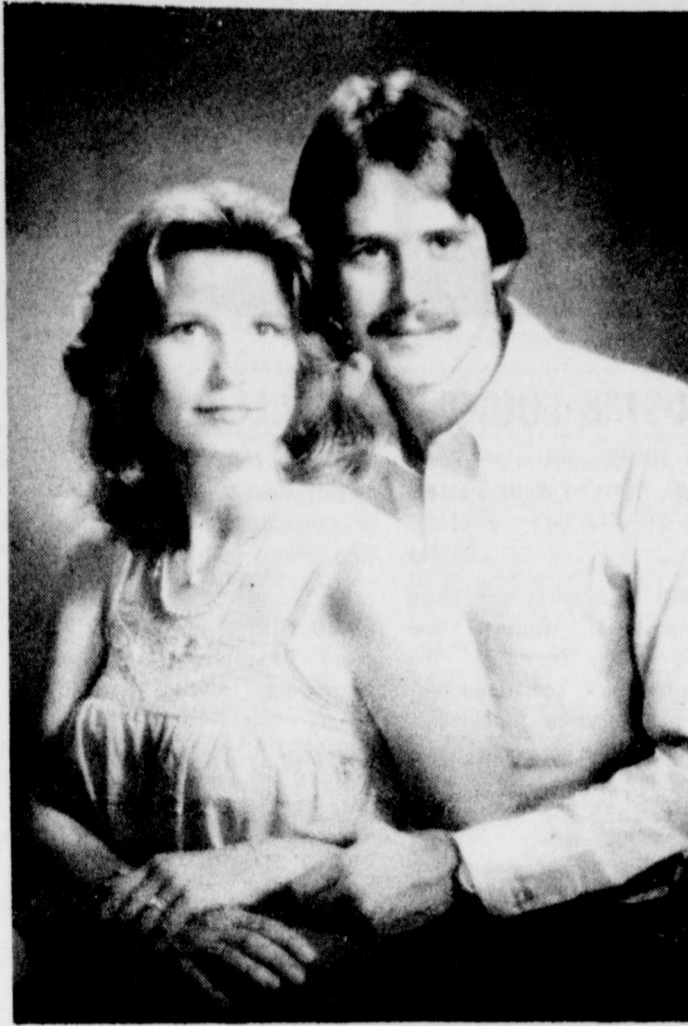

Strake Talk

FREE EDUCATION AND THE UNDOCUMENTED WORKER

On June 15, 1982, The Supreme Court ruled, 5-4, that Texas and other states must provide free public education for the children of undocumented workers—people in this country illegally.

Our current Lt. Governor, Mr. Hobby, was happy with the decision, praising it as the "only rational decision" the court could have made.

On the contrary, I think it was a wrong decision that defied both law and logic.

One of the principal derpinnings of an orderly society is that one should not benefit from breaking the law. All around the world, thousands of people stand patiently in line at our embassies, waiting for legal entry into this country. By its recent ruling, the Supreme Court told these people that, if they are smart, they will ignore our immigration laws, find some other way to enter, and then there's a good likelihood all manner of taxpayer-supported benefits

will be open to them and their families.

We can all feel sympathy for people driven to emigrate by desperate economic conditions. And I believe we should be compassionate toward the children of undocumented workers who are here through no fault of their own. We have been told we must educate these children and we will: it is our duty.

But I am deeply concerned about the effect this will have on our school systems and the quality of education. We have only a certain amount of dollars and cents with which to address the problems of educating Texas' children.

The court was essentially establishing social policy under the guise of ruling on a constitutional question. The result was bad law and bad social policy. It should now be up to the Federal Government to help pay for the mess they have created by not properly policing our borders.

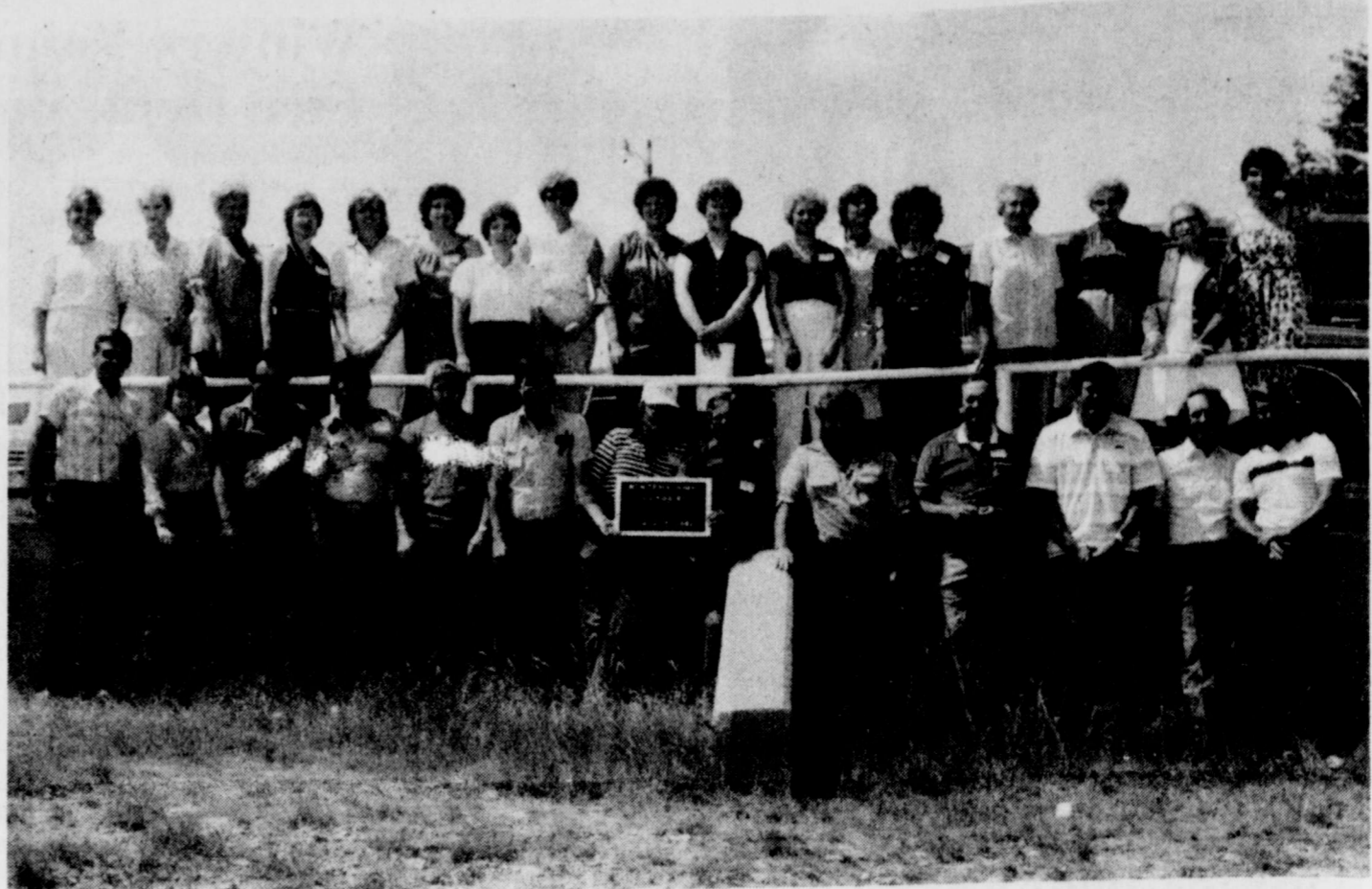
Former Winters resident dies in Odessa

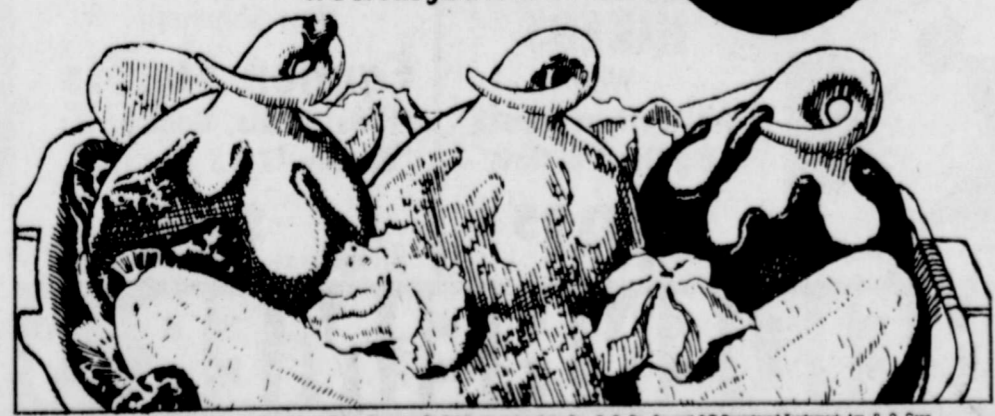

Some upcoming events which you may want to place on the calendar by the icebox: Lamb and wool producers will have the opportunity to vote for the referendum Aug. 16-17; and Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association will sponsor a membership team roping and barrel racing at the Southwest Texas Junior College in Uvalde, Aug. 14.

Also, Aug. 28 is the kickoff of the Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children for 1982. The barbecue supper at the Hoolihan Acres at Mertzon will be followed by a cattle sale in Abilene on Sept. 27 and special sheep and goat sales in Junction and Coleman in October. The annual CRCC Horse Sale will also be a part of the round-up.

In Del Rio the other day, the bankers were discussing the "again devalued peso." Running out of dollars for the second time in six months, the Mexican government freed its weakening peso to float to a sharply devalued level in free trading.

Mexico's last major devaluation, in mid-February, brought the peso from 27 to the dollar to 45. Banking analysts expected the peso, pegged at 49 to the dollar last week, to plunge to around 80 to the dollar.

The devaluation will hurt U.S. businessmen near the border who depend heavily on retail purchases by Mexicans, whose pesos will buy fewer dollar-priced goods.

Following the sharp price last week, increases were realized for bread, tortillas and gasoline. It was expected to push Mexican inflation for above the current 60 percent a year rate.

Prevent pecan weevil damage

The pecan weevil, one of the most damaging pecan pests, will soon begin laying eggs in developing pecans throughout Runnels County, states Eddie Beene, Ass't. County Extension Agent. To prevent pecan weevil damage, the adult female weevils must be controlled before they deposit eggs in developing pecans. Once the eggs have been deposited, control measures will not be effective.

In order to prevent this

infestation, the 20th of August has been set for the spraying date for pecan weevils. Checking for pecan weevils population can be accomplished by placing a large sheet under a tree and jar the limbs with a padded pole. Weevils will drop to the ground and remain motionless for a short period of time.

If weevils are found, an insecticide application of 80% Sevin (R) at the rate of 2 lbs. per 100 gallons of water will give an effective control. If there is a

(GTE from page 1) calls placed from residences, businesses, and mobil telephones. Businesses with PBX trunks are allowed ten calls per trunk. Customers may obtain two separate numbers each time directory assistance is required. Calls will also be recorded if the number requested is not listed or is a non-published number.

Cambern urged customers to:

-First check their directories before calling directory assistance for numbers.

-Make a note of the number if a directory assistance call is required and record the number in their directory. This will

help the caller avoid exceeding the 10-call per month allowance on directory assistance calls.

Charging for directory assistance will help keep basic monthly rates lower than they would be without the charge, Cambern said. He added that studies show approximately 9 percent of the total directory assistance users make nearly one-half of all calls to directory assistance.

Cambren also said calls for which no charge would be assessed for calling directory assistance are those made from coin telephones, hospitals, by certified handicapped persons who cannot use a telephone directory, and

calls for long distance directory assistance in the customer's area code which are offset by a long distance call to a number within their area code. Long distance directory assistance for numbers outside the customer's area code are not subject to the charge.

Handicapped persons may be exempt by providing a certified statement of their handicap. The statement may be from a doctor, state agency, or a service agency which deals with their handicap. The statement must be delivered to General Telephone's business office, and when received, the customers records will be noted.

Meyer and City Administrator Glenn Brown represented the City of Winters at the meeting and Brown told the commissioners that although he could see a need for covering the cost of prisoners being lodged in the jail, he felt that the measure would be unfair. Brown said that the City of Winters does not charge the county for fire calls made in the county by the Winters Fire Department. He said that the majority of the fire calls handled by the Winters department involved fires outside the Winters city limits.

Both Glenn Brown and Councilman Meyer agreed with Sheriff Hershall Hall that there was a near perfect harmony between law enforcement agencies in the county and the City of Winters.

Commissioner Carroll suggested that if the county were to begin charging for holding prisoners, that possibly the county might reimburse Winters for incidents in which persons were arrested on county court charges by Winters officers and transported to the county jail at Winters expense. Carroll said that so far this year 51 prisoners had been placed in the county jail by Winters authorities and of that number, 26 were cases in which the fines were paid into the county and not the City of Winters. The commissioner also said that of the cases in which the fines would be paid to Winters, the maximum fine could

not exceed \$200, and that the maximum fine was levied in the majority of cases that resulted in someone being placed in the county jail already.

Following more discussion, Commissioner David Carroll made a motion that the Commissioners Court drop the idea of charging for housing prisoners and try to keep everything running smoothly. Carroll's motion was seconded by Commissioner Robert Virden, who emphasized that Ballinger and South Runnels County were both in need of the proposed new lake for Ballinger. With a motion and a second, Commissioners Carroll, Virden, and Marvin Salling voted in favor of the motion. Commissioner Gilbert Smith was
