#### National Farm Security Week

By proclamation, President Har-

which would keep men away from work. All labor, especially for farm work, is so scarce this year that the President urges everybody to use the greatest caution againts accidents which would further reduce the !imited supply of man-

Accordingly, he requests all persons and organizations working with agriculture and farm life to use all possible means to encourage and help farm people to guard against hazards which might lead to accidents. At the same time he asks people to help build a nation wide determination to stop the needless waste of farm manpower and property which cannot be replaced during wartime. He also urges that farm people everywhere Marines Meet make National Farm Safety Week the opportunity for a safety check On Okinawa in their homes and on their farms.

The President empahsizes the lives each month, and that one bundred and twenty-five thousand others suffer injuries. He believes that this waste of human life, as well as of time, is not necessary.

Endorsing the President's views, M. R. Bentley, agricultural engineer for the A. and M. College Extension Service, believes that most accidents on farms can be avoided. Being careful, he says, generally will prevent cuts, bruises, broken oones and, perhaps, permanent injury. For example, a farmer shouldn't make adjustments on a motor-driven vehicle without first turning off the power. Store all sharp tools in a safe place; never climb a shaky ladder; keep chimneys tight, and don't locate the oil

#### Huseman Jersey Herd Classified

Castro Counties first herd of registered Jerseys to be officially classified by the American Jersey Cattle Club is owned by Frank Huseman of Nazareth. In order for a herd to be eligible for classification the entire number must be registered by the American Jersey Cattle Club.

Classification of the Huseman herd was done by J. W. Ridgeway of San Antonio who is considered one of the outstanding Jersey judges in the nation as he has judged many of the nation's finest Jersey shows. Classification is based upon a score card prepared by the Jersey cattle club in order to standardize the type of cattle in the club. The highest classification is Excellent, and then on down to Very Good, Good Plus, Good and Fair. A Jersey that classifies Excellent is near a perfect speciman of the breed, and there are not many Jerseys that will so classify.

Mr. Huseman had four cows classify Very Good, 9 Good Plus, and 2 Good, which is a very high classification for the first time. Mr. Huseman started building

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

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**Our Country Needs Still More Used Fats...And We're the Folks** to Save them!



N between the good news about the war these days, careful readers of the paper will see grave words about a serious national shortage that has a direct bearing on military and civilian production schedules.

Our domestic supplies of fats and oils will be approximately one and one-half billion pounds less than last year. Yet thousands of tons of fats are still needed to help make countless essentials for the battle- and home-fronts.

While country people have been doing an even better job of saving fats than the city folks, we must remember that, because of the meat situation, we are in a better position to save. That's why we can't afford to miss a trick.

So, let's save not only the big amounts from frying and roasting, but also meat trimmings, plate scraps, and scrapings. Melt them down once a week and add the liquid fat to the salvage can. Skim soups and gravies. Scrape every pan. Every drop is important.

When your salvage can is full, take it to your butcher, and get 2 red points and up to 4¢ for each pound. If you have any difficulty, call your County Agent or Home Demonstration Agent.
