The County Winner will receive a registered Jersey Heifer and will compete in the District Show at Amarillo Saturday, September 29. Other prizes in the County show will be:

2nd place—Gilt 125 Chicks or 63 turkey eggs or 32 Turkey Poults.
2nd place—Gilt, 100 chicks or 50 turkey eggs or 25 turkey poults.
4th place—Gilt.

The Show will be judged by E. D. Heath, registered Chester White breeder of Hale Center.

Sgt. Hill Gives Vie's On Airpower

Now that Japan has surrendered. Tactical Airpower will have to consider Germany and the European War as the payoff. The Japs evidently didn't want to be subjected to the attacks by Light and Medium Bombers and fighter bombers which would have resulted had the invasion of Japan been carried out.

The B-29's had almost completed their job of literally obliterating the Jap production centers. The scene was all set to shift the emphasis to tactical air power, close co-operation between fighter bombers and ground troops.

Actually, tactical planes had given the Jap homeland just a taste of what they had planned. Mustangs from Iwo Jima and Okinawa have smashed Jap airfields on the mainland, pinning down the Jap airforce. Had a landing been made by assault troops, we would have had Normandy repeated—only this time, instead of being born in battle, tactical airpower was ready as a tried, smashing force.

On D-Day Allied planes provided cover for the landings. When the stalemate came at St. Lo, air-ground co-operation was born. Pilots were put in tanks, and talked to planes flying overhead by two-way radio. The air-ground team began it's attack, and didn't let up until everyone was almost sitting on the Elbe river.

Being in the finance office, I'm naturally interested in figures, especially those released after VE Day by the 9th Air Force. Just to give an idea of the destruction, I would like to quote some. Ninth Air Force pilots in addition to destroying 4,288 enemy planes in the air and on the ground, and probably destroying another 3,104 scored the following successes against the enemy: 7,237 locomotives put out of action; 59,843 railway cars destroyed or damaged; 43,151 motor transport and horse-drawn vehicles rendered useless.

These results highlighted the campaign against enemy movement, a campaign which Field Marshall Von Rundstedt said, "completely immobilized the Wehrmacht and permitted movement only at night."

And those results will stand by themselves. Had the Japs not surrendered, tactical airpower would have had another chapter added to its story, and probably it would have been equally impressive.

Treat Small Grain Seed For Smut

College Station, September 18—Chemical treatment of small grain seed before fall planting is a cheap and safe insurance against losses from disease, says R. L. King, Castro county agent.

Wheat, oats and barley are subject to fungus diseases called smut. Under favorable conditions the diseases often cause reduced yields and further loss from dockage when infected grain is marketed.

Accordingly, King urges farmers to thoroughly clean and treat their planting seed unless they are certain that it is free from infection.

Wheat is affected by two types of smut disease. Stinking smut can be controlled readily by fanning the seed wheat or cleaning it by other methods to remove smut balls and then treating it with either two ounces per bushel of 50 per cent copper carbonate, or one-half ounce per bushel of ethyl mercury phosphate called "improved ceresan".

The grain may be treated in a commercial seed-treating machine or in a homemade container with a tight fitting lid. An oil drum with a pipe soldered diagonally across it each end to permit it to revolve and extending about one foot from easily will do the job. For small amounts any type of container will do. The important thing is to get the powder well distributed over each kernel.

The other type, called loose smut, cannot be controlled by chemical treatment. The best safeguard is to use seed known to be uninfected.

Barley and oats smut can be controlled by treating the seed with one-half ounce per bushel of improved ceresan. Another approved method is to mix one pint of commercial formaldehyde with 10 gallons of water at 60 to 70 degrees temperature. Sprinkle the solution uniformly over 40 to 50 bushels of one pile to another on a clean floor, or in a tight wagon box. Then pile seed while it is being shoveled from the seed and cover it with a wagon sheet for at least four hours or overnight. It then should be sown or spread out to dry, King says.

Japanese envoys, formal but visibly shaken, brought a gift of melons to Commodore V. F. Grant USN, Commander of the advance occupation unit, during preliminary negotiations.

James O. Ayers Gets Promotion

LUBBOCK ARMY AIR FIELD, Lubbock, Texas, August—James O. Ayers, son of Mr. and Mrs. James O. Ayers, Box 16, Dimmitt, Texas has been promoted to the rank of Sergeant.

As an advanced twin-engine pilot training school LAAF graduated 7,008 pilots between February 23, 1942, when the first class of aviation cadets arrived, until February 1, 1945, when the 30th and last class graduated. Since that time LAAF has trained nine classes of combat returnee pilots in all instrument flying, and at the present time is teaching the specialized instrument course to Air Transport Command pilot destined to carry men and supplies safely wherever they are needed for the swift conduct of the Pacific war.

Operating with the famed Third and Fifth Fleets and Task Forces 38 and 58, she bombed Wake Island, participated in air strikes on hurling her might into the assaults on the island, she bombed the island and Tarawa took three hits at Bougainville, Saipan, Tinian and Guam.

At Mindanao, she sank 3,000 tons of shipping and assisted in the destruction of another 3,000. At Bougainville, she blasted four Jap planes out of the sky and scored hits on 11 others.

Following the battle of Leyte Gulf, the Birmingham was damaged for the second time. She had gone alongside the USS Princeton to battle fires resulting from a direct hit. The ships lay in a trough of the rough waves separated by about 50 feet when a terrific blast from exploding bombs and torpedoes in the Princeton rained death on the decks of the Birmingham.

After three months for repair, the Birmingham steamed out again to take part in the Iwo Jima operation and the battle for Okinawa.

The Birmingham struck at Okinawa targets six months prior to the landings and gave fire support to minesweepers clearing the approaches to the island. During the campaign she sank thousands of tons of shipping.

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Project Underway To Light Local Football Field

Brother of Mrs. Alldredge Gives POW Experiences

The following news story appeared in the Fort Worth Star Telegram under a date line of September 11, and was written by Robert Wear, Star-Telegram's own correspondent in the Pacific.

ABOARD USS BENEVOLENCE, YOKOHAMA (By Press Wireless)—(The first several paragraphs were given to Texas Merchant Marine Engineer's experiences in Jap prisons.)

In another ward aboard the Benevolence, I also found Lt. Ralph Palmer, USNR, Helldiver pilot from the carrier Ticonderoga, who made a forced landing on Formosa last January 9. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Palmer, Alameda, and brother of Mrs. J. H. Alldredge of Dimmitt. His wife lives at Pawtucket, R. I.

"My target was Toyahara air field at Taiwan that day" he said, "but in shifting superchargers, the plates stuck and my plane settled gradually to 2,000 feet, not enough altitude to clear the 8,000 foot mountains. I got the plane to a full stall 10 feet off the ground and settled in a potato patch. My radio gunner was with me. We were both unhurt, and he is also out of prison now."

Palmer said they were beaten but the Japs relented in that because they were in such a hurry to question them, demanding to know the name and size of the carrier, the complement, and everything else they could think up. After 12 days at Taiwan, both were flown to Tokyo's Ofuna Prison, where they worked pulling weeds, cleaning barracks. Palmer said he lost nearly 40 pounds, was always hungry, and was forced to go through straining exercise. He was kicked and his teeth knocked out.

Palmer was a basketball player at Alameda High School, then attended West Texas State College, Canyon.

The NITRO carried shells and bombs for warship and planes installations in the Philippines, at which hit enemy ships and shore Formosa, Iwo Jima and Okinawa. Her crews worked day and night during the final stages of the war, passing ammunition to be dumped on targets in the Japanese home islands.

The 25-year old ship was at Normandy on D-Day and in the Mediterranean during the invasion of Southern France.

WAC Cpl. Billie L. Callihan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P. H. Dyer, will embark September 29 for home from Europe. Cpl. Callihan has been in England, France and Germany for the past thirty months.
