Stop me if you've heard this one:

The old man finally gave up his South Texas farm and moved to town. Seeking a way of making a livelihood, he began buying and selling eggs. He bought them for 40 cents a dozen and sold them for 25 cents.

One day a friend asked him: "Now just how do you make any money when you lose fifteen cents everytime you sell a dozen eggs?" "Well, I may not be doing so good," the old man replied, "but I sure beats farming."

Great discussion has been engulfing the land for the past decade on the terrific strain we all live under. Russia, guided missiles, atomic fallout, taxes, highway accidents, tornadoes and a multitude of other woes are ours to bear as we wish. Everyone is in a strain.

Like the man who quit his job sorting potatoes because there were too many decisions to make for the low pay involved, we often wonder if these problems aren't sometimes overestimated.

Why should anyone think the strain is any worse than that imposed on the caveman trying to escape from the hungry jaws of a Tyrannosaurus; the plight of the high-born in France during the revolution; or of our own pioneers in their fights with the elements and Indians.

We have always had tensions and conflicts and always will have. The man who sits out on his front porch in the late afternoon summer breeze with nothing on but his pants and undershirt may not show any cares, but from instinct, he probably feels he should worry about whether he will get a mosquito bite or not.

Worrying and fretting is as inborn as any of our senses apparently. Those who would laugh at a socialite who worries about whom she will impress with a party should remember that her worries are as important, in a relative sense, to her as their own.

Most everyone worries about losing their physical property—their business, their farm, their automobiles, their homes or anything else they may own, for this represents a degree of security and only total security brings relief from apprehension.

Instead of saying people shouldn't worry, we might consider that all of the world's major advancements came from worry—since it prompted men to hold what they had and to seek more. The man with nothing to lose usually worries the least so long as he has something to eat. And a man who doesn't worry when he can't pay his bills probably isn't a good credit risk.

In this time of intense worrying it might be well to consider such a thing as good instead of a burden to humanity.

Saturday we will have a bond election. It will be the culmination of much work by a few men and years of talk, wishing and hoping. If it passes Castro will take another of its many steps out ahead of other counties in this area.

And it appears at this time that it will pass. There are few people in the county who have not felt the need at one time or another for a county center. The new Exposition Building would be an answer to one of our most vital needs and we feel it should be approved.

The only dissention we have heard concerning the project has been that we should consider only the haydite block building and drop the metal building plans altogether. Apparently this is a universal opinion since it is felt that a metal building would not be near as permanent, would require more to keep up and would increase fuel cost, to say nothing of appearances.

This is all probably very true. The only reason the commissioners and Exposition Building Committee have considered two plans is that they cannot be sure of how much either will cost until bids are made. According to the best estimates they have received, the block building cost can be covered by the \$115,000 bond election with property purchase and parking thrown in to boot. But again, they cannot be definite until bids are received. Thus the alternate plan.

Every person in the county who will vote Saturday has more than likely already made up his mind on how to vote. As we said last year the tax increase on this building will cost the average homeowner or quarter-section owner \$3 a year. Everybody will have no cause to use the building facilities all the time, but everybody in the county will make use of it some time for sure. It would be a bargain and a tribute to the progressiveness of Castro County citizens for scores of years to come.

We can never remember a general bond election failing to carry in this county. It may have happened and we don't know about it, but it has been our experience that people in this county will go all out to improve their conditions, both on a personal and on a community level.

Bond Election to Decide Outcome of New Exposition Building Saturday

Castro County's qualified voters have been called to the polls Saturday in one of the first county-wide bond elections to be held in several years. They will be asked to decide whether or not the county will have its proposed new exposition building.

If approved the building will be used for the annual county fair, junior livestock shows, sports events, dramatic presentations, group and county-wide farm meetings, socials, and any other activity calling for any range in seating capacity and event. It will be a general county center and has been promoted by farmers and businessmen from all over the county for the past few months.

Two plans have been brought forward. One consists of a metal building and the other a brick and heydite block construction.

The masonry building has been receiving the most attention according to Mr. Wes Anthony, chairman of the exposition building committee. In talking to people over the county, he said, it has become apparent that almost everyone he has seen favors the masonry building.

Two plans were made, he explained, because the \$115,000 bond election could possibly be insufficient to cover cost of the masonry

building. This amount was set at the recommendation of consulting architects and no positive amount can be set until actual bidding begins.

The masonry building would have three to four thousand seating capacity and is planned for possible population increases in the county during coming years. There will be two small meeting rooms, two concession stands, a 30 x 40 kitchen, a large stage for play and speaker presentations, 900 stationary seats and it will contain 24,000 square feet of floor space. Outside dimensions will be 120 feet by 200 feet. It is expected that cost of the masonry building

will run about \$4 to \$4.50 per square foot. This will leave enough money to purchase property and pave parking areas.

For basketball games and other sporting events, there will be about 2,000 seating capacity while the permanent seats are designed primarily to afford a sale ring for junior livestock shows.

The committee is planning on a ten-acre site either just east of

Dimmitt near the Highway building, or north of town between Castro County Lumber Co. and the airport. Each of these would be satisfactory and it is not contemplated that the present fair grounds will be used due to the crowded conditions there.

If approved, this bond election will give Castro one of the best such centers in this area. In fact, there are few counties with such a building at this time in the Texas Panhandle.

Tentative plans call for temporary livestock stalls to be installed during fair time just below the lower ceilings on both sides with

a judging ring in front of the permanent bleachers in the center of the building. The building would be insulated throughout. No stage lights, curtains, or fittings are included in the immediate plans. The floor would be finished concrete and adequate heating, lighting and plumbing has been planned.

While it has been called an exposition building during the preliminary work, the building is expected to be used more in general gathering nature than for fair and livestock purposes.

Both the metal and masonry buildings would be adequate for their planned use, although the

masonry plans call for a somewhat larger structure.

"According to what we have been able to find out," Mr. Anthony said, "we can easily build the masonry building with this bond election besides buying the land and paving parking areas. But we do need the metal building plans to fall back on just in case and that is why we have them. If the bond election passes we will naturally follow public demand and it looks like the masonry building is favored at this point."

The Saturday, June 29th bond election was called at a special session of the Commissioner's

Court on June 3 after presentation of the petition by a unanimous vote. On the ballots will be: (FOR or AGAINST) the issuance of \$115,000 exhibition building bonds and the levy of taxes in payment thereof.

Voting places will be: Precinct 1, County Clerk's office; precinct 2, Commissioner's court room; precinct 3, Brockman home at Nazareth; precinct 4, Hart Legion Hall at Hart; precinct 5, Summerfield elevator; precinct 6, Sunnyside Community Building; precinct 7, Arney Church; precinct 8, Frio Church; and precinct 9, Easter Community Building.

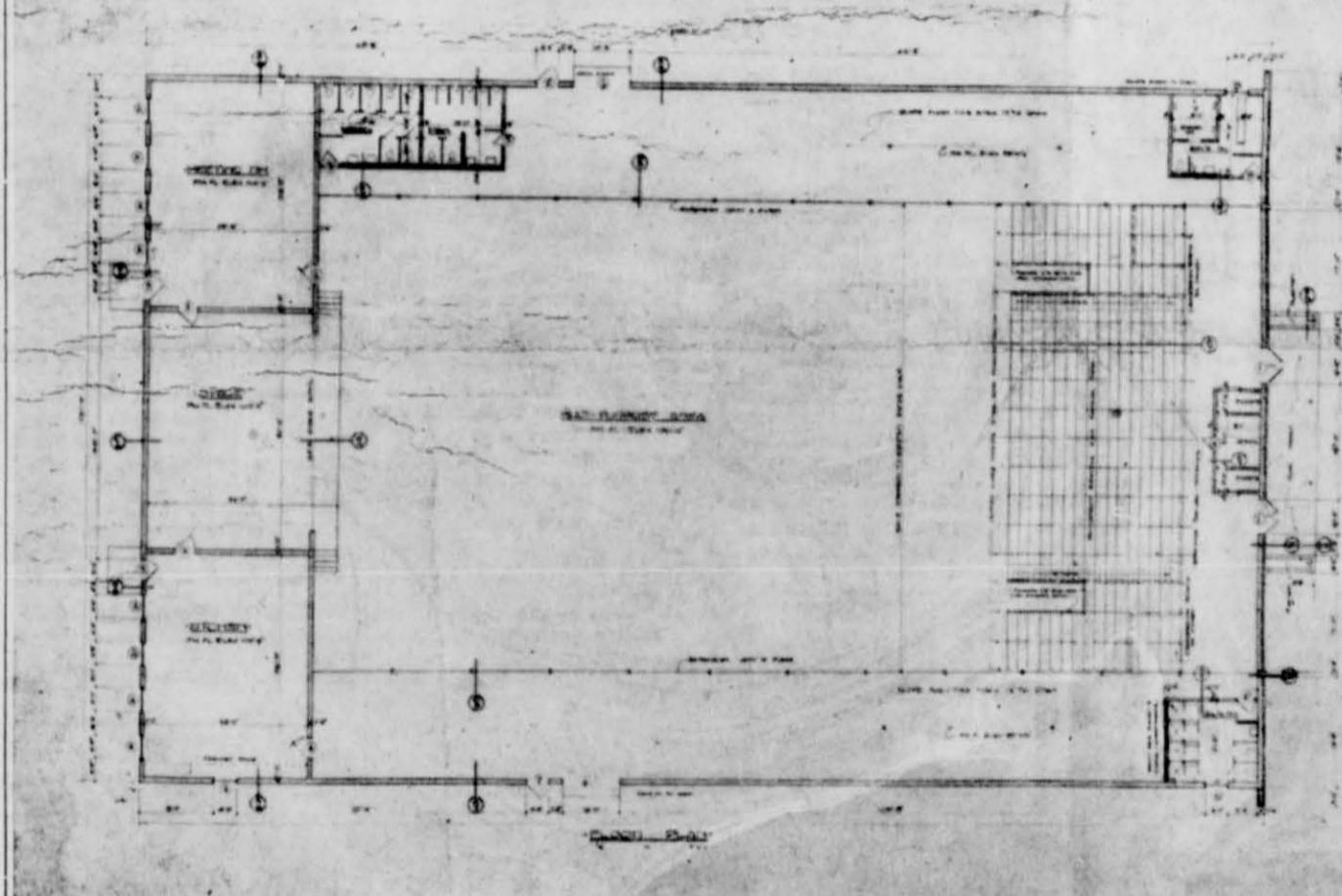

Other survivors include two brothers, Jay Lee and Ronnie McAfee, both of Dimmitt, and a grandfather, J. A. Mayhew.
