

Bobcats Get Set for Hereford Friday

Local hopes for a perfect season or the Dimmitt Bobcats were shattered Friday night when they were trounced by Lockney, 12-8 in a thriller at Longhorn Stadium.

Despite excellent line work and hard backfield play, Dimmitt was hampered by a lack of speed that will probably remain a drawback all season.

The I-AA conference did not fare well during the weekend. Although Tulsa battered a hapless Sunray 47-8, Canyon lost to Hereford, 40 and Friona was trounced by Jains, 30-0. This string of scores drew any predictions into wild confusion. After the first game, Canyon had looked like the league leader this year, but it will take several more victories to reestablish themselves after losing to a Hereford team. Dimmitt still remains the dark horse, while Tulsa is developing quickly into formidable opposition for the remainder of the conference. Only Friona, one of two games in two starts, seems to be definitely bringing up the rear.

Hart Votes For Two Bond Issues

Hart residents last week approved bond issues to pay for the improvement of the city's water system and the installation of a sewer system.

The two separate issues passed easily. A \$95,000 tax bond issue to provide funds for the installation of a sewer system passed by a vote of 74 to 26. The passage of the issue means taxes will be raised from \$1.35 to \$1.50.

According to Mayor Ed Harris, the total cost of the sewer project which includes a new disposal plant, will be \$110,000. The project will cost Hart \$95,000 with the additional \$15,000 to come from a federal grant.

A \$70,000 revenue bond issue for the improvement and extension of the Hart water system was passed by a vote of 69 to 30.

Two 8 year old Dimmitt youngsters suffered broken legs late Tuesday in separate bicycle accidents.

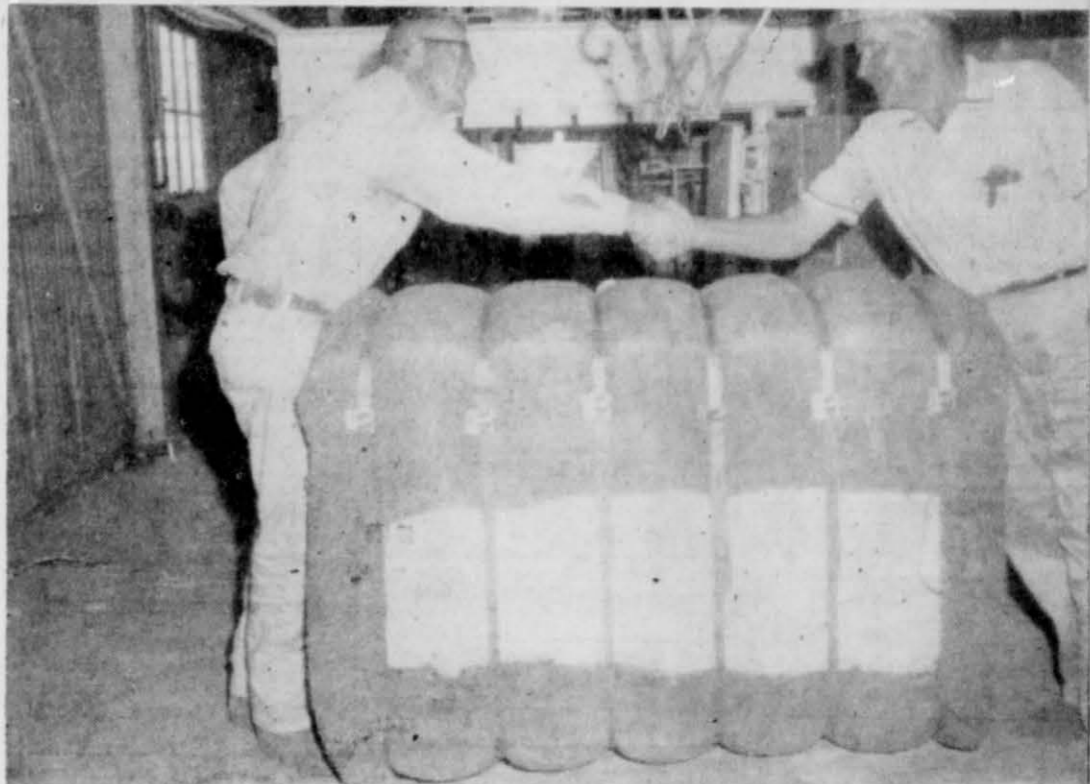

First County Cotton Ginned By R. J. Riley

The cotton harvest has started. Ray Joe Riley, who farms just north of the Sunnyside Community delivered the first bale to the downtown corner by the ASC office about 3:30 Wednesday afternoon to take the official honors for Castro County's first bale.

Right on his heels, and nosed out by about five minutes, was a bale produced by Mr. Clint McFarland who farms 3 1/2 miles East of Hart.

These were not the first bales ginned in the county, however. Mr. Travis Bundick, who lives six miles south of Hart in Lamb County, delivered a 450-pound bale to the Heart of the Plains Gin in Hart Tuesday. Another bale had been delivered Monday about 11:20 a. m. to Campbell Gin at Dodd in the Southwest corner of the County. Since only a part of the cotton was produced in Castro County, it did not qualify as a first bale. It was handpulled by G. Tellham of Rt. 4, Muleshoe, who farms right on the county line.

Grain Programs Mostly Unchanged For Next Year

There will be feed grain, corn, wheat and barley support programs in 1962 similar to the 1961 feed grain program, according to an announcement this week by Charley Hill, ASC manager.

The records executed to determine base crops under the 1961 feed grain program will be used to determine bases on other crops, since 1959 and 1960 are the base years.

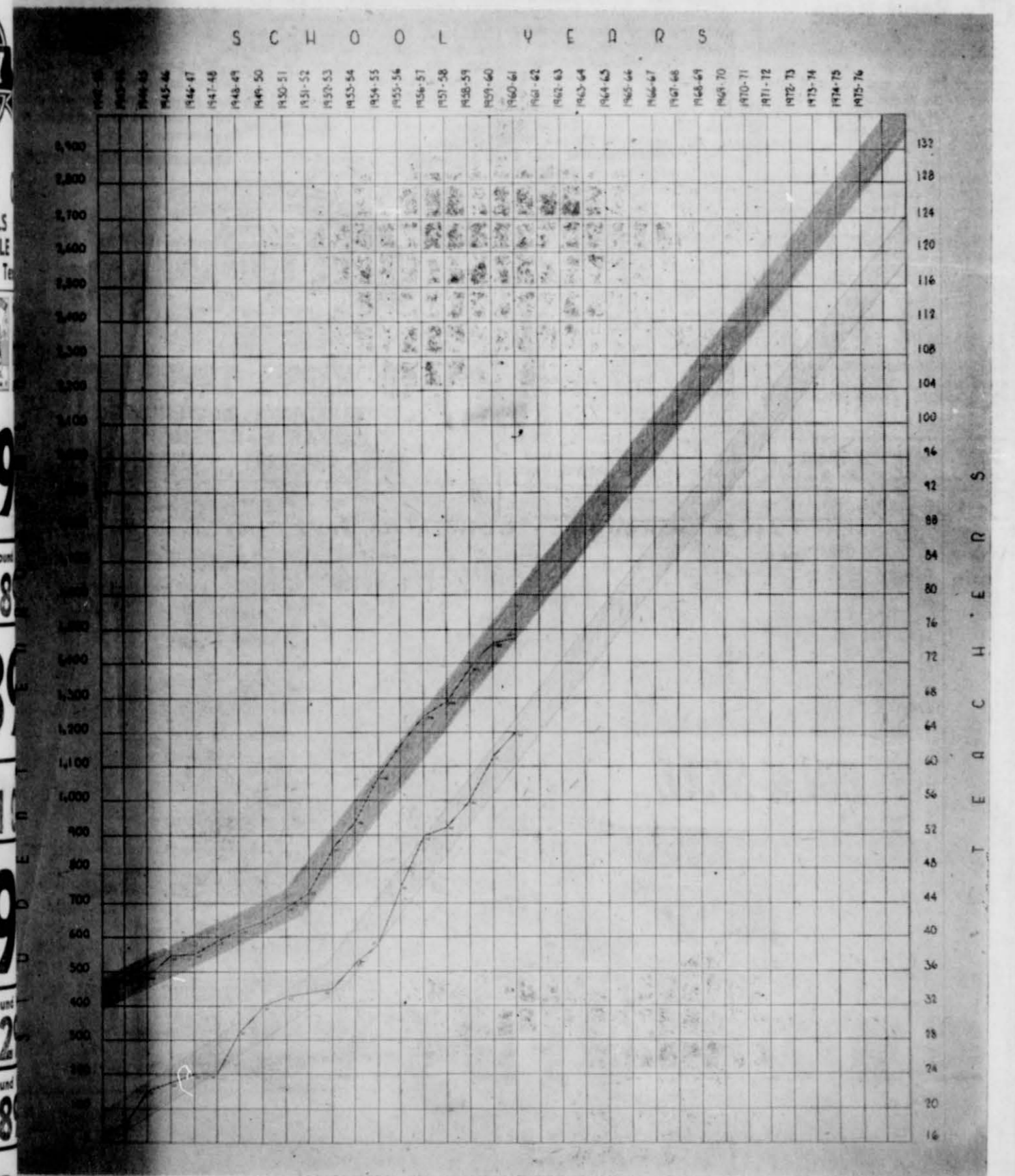
Farms that do not have a barley base and who plant barley this fall for harvest will not be eligible to participate in the 1962 feed grain program.

Persons who reported that barley was planted on their farm in 1959 and 1960 will receive a notice of the base acreage and the normal yield for their farm in a few days.

Persons who did not receive a notice of a wheat farm allotment and marketing exemption and who plant wheat for harvest will owe a marketing quota penalty of 65 percent of parity on the entire acreage planted. If operators wish to plant wheat for grazing they may sign a feed wheat agreement and plant as much as 30 acres of wheat for use on the farm.

Future Enrollment to force Expansion of Dimmitt School Building Facilities

From all indications, at least a 52 school year could yet increase even more calling for further stepped up expansion of facilities.

The lighter line on the chart represents the system's school teachers. Not only will more physical facilities be demanded, but a greater number of teachers will be required. The system now has sixty-four teachers the greatest number in its history. A maximum of 124 teachers, under the present trend, is expected by the 1977-78 school year, again just fifteen years away.

The number of teachers has almost tripled during the past fifteen years, keeping pace with the enrollment which climbed from 550 students to last year's 1,200-plus. During this period of time the Dimmitt Public School system built well over a million dollars worth of new school facilities in its North and South Grade Schools, not counting increasing its number of buses, additional athletic facilities, and remodeling. During the next fifteen years it is logical to expect that this rate of building must be increased to stay with the pace of students.

What does all this mean to residents in the District? Essentially it points out that as the school system grows it will require more and more expenditures, not only for buildings and teachers, but for the adjacent expenses of transportation, upkeep, expanded curriculum and the like. It means that the taxpayers will be called upon for more and more revenue as time goes on. There is no let up in sight. Each individual taxpayer's future role is uncertain, depending on the rate of property development, but at present he will be called upon to pay additional taxes to help support these ever-increasing educational needs of the community.

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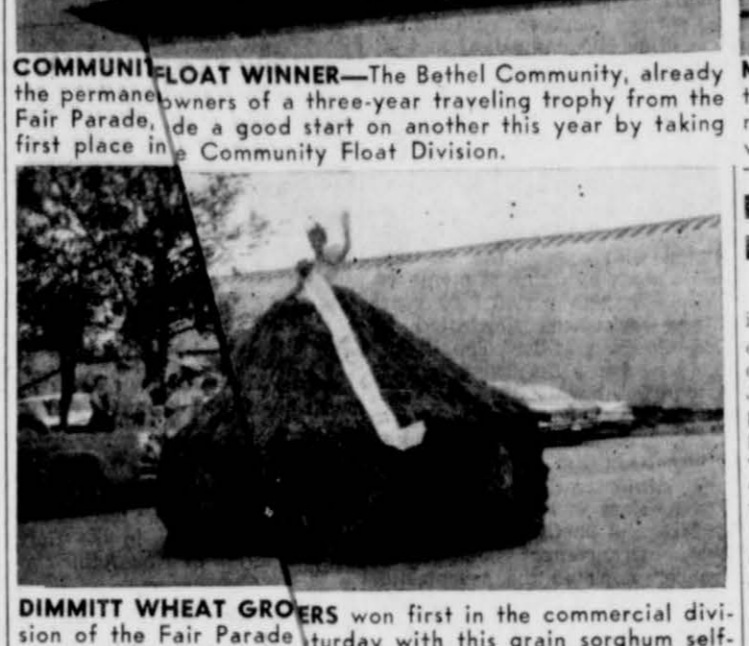
