## Mother of Judge Percy Estes Died Last Sunday Nite

Funeral services for Mrs. John Estes of Hereford, who died Sunday night at her home in Hereford were held Monday at the Deaf Smith county home. Mrs. Estes was a pioneer Plains woman, and the mother of County Judge Percy Estes.

She had been ill for about six months.

Mrs. Estes was 84 years of age and the wife of the late John Estes, pioneer rancher and cattleman of Deaf Smith county. Mr. and Mrs. Estes settled in Deaf Smith county many years ago. After retiring from the cattle business Mr. Estes engaged in the real estate business. He died in 1926.

Surviving Mrs. Estes are nine children. They are: Judge Percy Estes of Dimmitt; Mrs. J. C. Roberts, Lubbock; Mrs. Ruth Baker, Tulsa, Okla.; Mrs. L. A. Howell, Abernathy; Mrs. Carl Gilliland, Hereford; Mrs. E. L. Keeth, Lubbock; Mrs. A. W. Nicks, Hereford; Miss Johnnie Estes, Hereford and Cliff Estes of Hereford.

Funeral services were held at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon at the Hereford Baptist church with Rev. V. M. Cloyd officiating. Grandsons of Mrs. Estes were pallbearers.

## Call Examination For Dimmitt Postmaster

The United States Civil Service has announced competitive examinations for the local postmastership. It is expected that appointments will be made as a result of this examination unless it is found in the interest of the service to fill any vacancy by transfer or promotion. This is not an examination under the Civil Service Act and rules, but is held under an Executive order of July 12, 1933, providing for such procedure.

The date for assembling of competitors will be stated on the admission cards sent applicants after the date for the close of receipt of applications and will be about fifteen days after that date.

Veteran preference will not be granted unless documentary evidence is submitted.
