Winters man held on assault charge




decorated in a Thanksgiving theme. It is located in a cement stucco structure, one of the first historic buildings in Wingate.

The Barker home is the renovated Mazeland School building.

Mazeland was founded in 1903 when a post office and store opened on A.B. Hutchinson's ranch. The community was probably named for the maize which grows in the area. A one-room school was built one mile west in

The O'Neals' continued adding improvements and built in cabinets. They later sold to the King Barkers.

The Barkers finished the restoration. They covered the living-dining area and all the bedrooms with carpet in an orange, green and brown pattern. The entrance halls and utility rooms are laid in a harmonizing mosaic tile pattern of mother made the quilt 50 years linoleum.

Paneled walls are accented with mirrors and short windows. off-white drapes with gold chairs and a brown and gold sofa make the living room inviting.

Mrs. Barker, an experienced drapery maker, made all the drapes throughout the house. She followed this trade for 22 years until retirement.

The three bedrooms are called the blue room, the yellow room and the green room. There is no lack of space in this home


that has a sewing and ironing room in connection with the bedrooms. There are two baths, also a pantry and utility room off the kitchen.

The school served both places and in 1910 was replaced with a twostory building and remodeled in 1915. A one-story concrete building replaced the wood structure in 1923. The school was consolidated with Winters in 1947.

The Barkers', along with their two children, attended the Mazeland School. King Barker was one of the four graduates in 1926. Their children are Betty Newhart of San Angelo and Bill of Kerrville. There is also a granddaughter and a greatgranddaughter.

Mr. and Mrs. Jay Murphy bought the building and acreage in 1968 and started the restoration, later selling to the Alton O'Neal family.

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
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
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
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Please allow me to do a brief follow-up on the very controversial mandatory seatbelt law and its apparent net effect. As you will recall, this legislation became effective on September 1, 1985, and the Department of Public Safety has indicated they would commence enforcement on December 1, 1985.

Since the media has recently reported that up to 75% of people, when surveyed, professed no knowledge of such seatbelt law, I suppose I should state, for those of you who have been "out of touch" since the last session of the Legislature, that I refer to the law making seatbelt use mandatory for front seat passengers in all cars and in pickups with a load rate capacity of less than 1500 pounds. Polls, surveys and test

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samples would indicate that a surprisingly large segment of the population quite simply ignores the seatbelt law. As would be expected, the incidence of use is much higher in urban areas than in rural areas, with some surveys showing a figure of less than 5% use in some rural areas of the State. Col. James Adams, Director

of the Department of Public Safety, has promised a "fate worse than death" to those persons stopped by his troopers without a seatbelt. I wouldn't be surprised if a few of the "old hardheads," like you and me, get a ticket bofore we learn our lesson. I just cannot believe, and never have been able to believe, that DPS is going to be able to effectively enforce the legisla-

Selective Service reaches milestone

The Selective Service System reaches an important milestone in the registration of young men on January 1, 1986.

Beginning on this date, men who were required in 1980 to register with Selective Service will be turning 26. Selective Services does not have the authority to accept registrations of men after they turn 26. Men who failed to register will have permanently forfeited their right to certain Federal student aid and job training benefits as well as Federal employment. 








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Varsity girls beat Brownwood


The Winters varsity girls basketball team were merciless on the Brownwood team on December 6, banishing them 46-15.

Their record now stands at 3-2. Pruser was high scorer for Winters with 15 points. Poehls with 10 and Belk with 7 were other scorers for the Winters team.



Ortiz had been charged with first degree murder in connection with the death.


State District Judge Curt Steib accepted the plea-bargain and allowed Ortiz 30 days in which to seek a new trial or to begin serving his sentence.

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
