**'Rule' Preached by Many**

It's odd and depressing how ethno-centric most people are; they actually believe that the Golden Rule was invented and promulgated by Jesus, and that the "superiority" of Christianity over other religions rests upon a creed or maxim of this sort.

They would be surprised to learn—and perhaps disbelieving—that the oldest recorded religions incorporated the Golden Rule, or that Jesus himself borrowed it from his Hebrew heritage and added not a jot or tittle to it. It is expressed this way in the New Testament: "All things, whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them; for this is the law and the prophets."

And this way in the Old Testament of the Jews: "What is hurtful to yourself, do not to your fellow man. That is the whole of the Torah, and the remainder is but commentary."

Buddhism puts it more briefly: "Hurt not others with that which pains yourself."

In Islam it reads: "No one of you is a believer until he loves for his brother what he loves for himself."

Confucianism tells us this: "Is there any one maxim which ought to be acted upon throughout one's whole life? Surely the maxim of loving kindness is such. Do not unto others what you would not they should do unto you."

Hinduism: "This is the sum of duty—do naught to others which if done to thee would cause thee pain."

Jainism (which carried this doctrine to such extremes that the Jains were veiled over their faces in order to avoid accidentally swallowing an insect and destroying a life) puts it this way: "In happiness and suffering, in joy and grief, we should regard all creatures as we

Also open for election are four Justice of the Peace offices and the post of County Surveyor.

Persons wishing to file for these positions for the Democratic Primary must contact Donna Glass, County Democratic Party Chairperson, in Miles to pay their filing fee and sign the formal documents.

To run in the Republican Primary, candidates must file

with Bill Cervenk, Republican Party Chairman, in Rowena.

By late Tuesday there had been no filings for any of the offices.

Incumbants are: County Judge Michael Murchison; County Clerk Linda Bruchmiller; County Treasurer Nora Halfmann; Commissioner Pct. 2 Johnnie Wilson; Commissioner Pct. 4 Marvin Salling; District Clerk Loretta Michalewicz; Justice of the Peace Pct. 1 Wilbur Davis; Justice of the Peace Pct. 2 J.C. Hodnett; Justice of the Peace Pct. 6 Dorothy Granzin; Justice of the Peace Pct. 7 Gregg Lange; and County Surveyor Felix Itz.

County Democratic Party Chairperson Donna Glass said

that she would not be a candidate for re-election to the post.

She said that, along with the county chair post, the precinct chairmen must also seek re-election.

Filing fees for the offices have increased for this year. All county office candidates must pay a \$600 filing fee. Candidates for Justice of the Peace and surveyor must pay a \$300 filing fee.

## Two felony assault charges filed here

Two people were arrested in separate, but related assault incidents in Winters late Sunday evening and early Monday morning.

Charges of aggravated assault were filed against Ricky Ortiz in connection with an incident in which another man, Eloy Rodriguez, received severe head lacerations.

A 33-year old Abilene woman, Mary Silva was arrested and charged with aggravated assault on a peace officer after she became violent and struck and scratched deputy Ron Young on the face, neck and chest.

Both Ortiz and Silva are free on \$5,000 bonds on the charges.

Officers said that Winters police were called to North Runnels Hospital to investigate a man who was brought to the emergency room with knife and glass wounds to his head.

Police said the Rodriguez had apparently been cut on the head and face and struck in the head with a bottle.

A short time later sheriff's officers and Winters police officers arrested Ortiz at his residence on Wood Street on the assault charge.

Officer Richard Hawkins said that it was thought that a juvenile had also been involved in the fight. That information was turned over to juvenile authorities.

A short time after that arrest, police officers Tim Dexter and Richard Hawkins and deputy Ron Young were contacted by several family members about Ortiz' arrest. Officers said that, during the discussion, the woman became violent striking Young in the face, clawing his face and striking him in the neck and chest also.

The woman was then placed under arrest and transported to the Runnels County Jail.

Information on the assault charge against Ricky Ortiz and the assault on a peace officer

charge against Mary Silva will be presented to the grand jury later this week.

## Now is the time to return questionnaires

The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department reminds landowners in Runnels County who were issued antlerless deer permits or antlerless deer tags for the 1985-86 hunting season that now is the time to return their deer harvest questionnaires. The questionnaires, which are attached to the front of the permits or tags, should be completely filled out. The number of antlered permits were obtained should be recorded. If none were killed, "O" should be marked in the appropriate blank. All cards should be returned as soon as possible following the close of deer season. Questionnaires should be returned by the end of January 1986.

Each postcard questionnaire is self-addressed on the back and should be mailed to the Waco Regional Office. Information obtained from these harvest questionnaires will be used to help estimate total deer and turkey harvest for the 1985-86 regulations. The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department will appreciate your prompt reply.

## Deceptive business and felony theft charges filed

Runnels County Sheriff's officers say that a warrant has been issued for a man thought to be from Sweetwater in connection with an advertising scam used on merchants in Winters and possibly Ballinger.

Deputy Ron Young said that the man, identified as Gwin Neatherlin, contacted ten businesses in Winters soliciting advertising on a clock. A total of \$890 was said to have been collected by the suspect from these sales.

The sales contacts were made in November and it was promised that the clock, or clocks, would be in place in early December.

## Winters Council meets in routine session

A short agenda faced members of the Winters City Council for their meeting Monday.

The council authorized the issuance of Notice of Award of Contract for the construction of the new Water Treatment Plant.

This action gives the contractor 10 days in which to secure adequate bonding and a to provide a certificate of insurance.

City officials are hopeful the much-needed project can get underway in the first part of March of this year.

In other action, the council authorized the city administrator to advertise for bids for the sale of two surplus police cars and one surplus tractor from the city street department. Bids for the vehicles are to be

**Young farmer solves puzzle**

Randall Conner is the winner of the Texas Sesquicentennial Trivia Quiz published in last week's *Winters Enterprise*.

It is fitting that a young farmer should receive this award for January is the month that our agricultural program is being highlighted on the calendar of Sesquicentennial events. The annual Winters area Livestock Show for 4-H and FFA Chapters will be held on January 10-11.

Conner was born on the farm where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Conner, continue to live and where he now farms 700 acres. The farm is used mostly for seed production which is sold through his store, Winters Seed Company.

After finishing Winters High School in 1967, Randall attended Texas Tech at Lubbock where he finished in 1971 with a major in agricultural engineering. The following year he married Susan Patrick of Farnell, also a graduate of Tech, with a music major in piano. Then followed two years in the Army with most of the time being spent at Fort Huachuca, Arizona. He then took a second bachelors degree at Tech in crop science.

Late in 1974 the Conners came back to Winters and he began farming in 1975. Three years later he opened the store, primarily selling seed and agriculture chemicals. He has an office in the same building with Bradley Grain Storage Systems.

The Winters Seed Company is the seed cleaning facility and the store is sales. The biggest volume of business is wholesale in a radius of 125 miles from Winters. Seed is also distributed for some larger companies. Together the Bradley and Conner firms maintain five warehouses.

Conner is a member of the Young Farmers and served as president in 1976. Susan maintains a music studio and serves

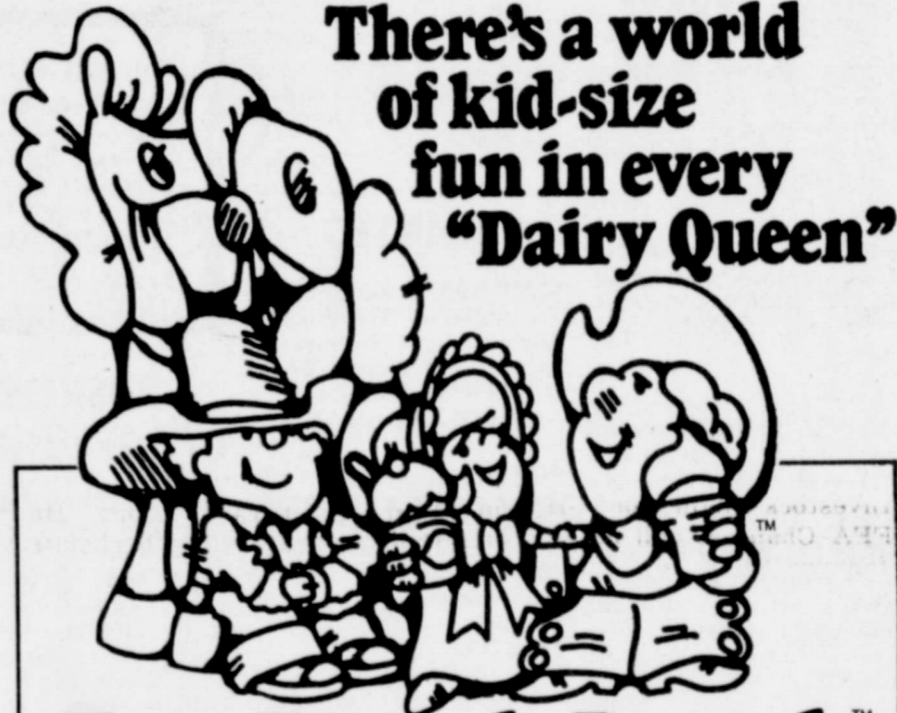

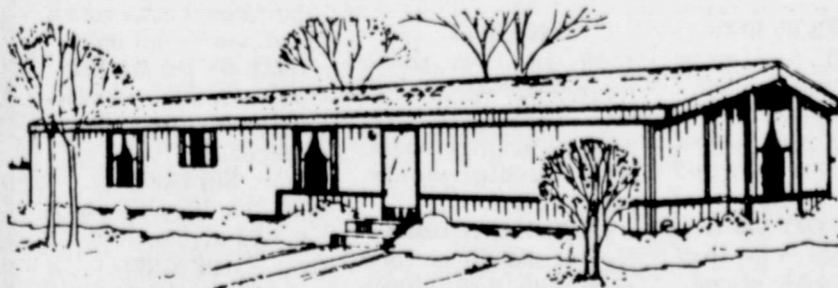

Try not to make phone calls from Europe to the U.S. without checking the costs. Hotels in Europe add a surcharge, sometimes as much as 100 percent, to phone calls made from a guest's room. Often, it could be cheaper to dial a quick call home, and have the U.S. party call you back. It could save half the usual cost.
