For the past six years we have watched a national administration make every effort to destroy the to assist agriculture. There is no doubt that the program of price supports and production controls was not perfect, but they were step in the right direction. If instead of trying to destroy the system of supports and controls Secretary of Agriculture Benson, with the blessing of the administration, had honestly tried to improve the program and administer it for the benefit of the farmer, the agricultural picture would be much different today. Under Benson's sliding support scale the national farm income slid from \$15.1 billion in 1952 to \$12.1 billion in 1956 and on down to \$10.8 billion in 1957. Benson's declared policy was to lower the farmer's income and in so doing reduce ceeded in one phase of his program only, he lowered the farmer's income while on the other hand surpluses have continued to grow. During this same period while farm income declined about 30 percent, his cost of production and living expenses increased about 25 percent. The only solu tion that our well-known Secretary of Agriculture has advanced i for farmers to move to town and get a job. Looks like the Secre tary of Labor would have an ans wer for that one he has already had industrial unemployment or his hand to worry about for several years without adding more farm ers to the labor market.

## Array of Fine Speakers and Specialists on Soils Day Program



JACK BARTON

Jack Barton is a native of Kaufnan County, Texas. He is a 1949 graduate of Texas A & M College with a B. S. degree in agronomy. He served in the U.S. Army from 1943-1948 with 18 months in the ETO. He enlisted as a private and vas discharged a captain.

His first Estension appointment came in 1949 when he was named assistant county agent in training or Bowie County. He was transferred a short time later to the position of assistant county agriultural agent in Gregg County where he served until 1951 when e was transferred to Lamar County as county agricultural

In 1952 he was appointed, assistant agronomist, with headquar ters at Weslaco and as a joint emlovee of the Extension Service and Texas Agriculaural Experiment Station, he conducted demon strations and research work in the South Texas area with both field crops and grasses, Soil and water onservation were important parts of this work.

In September 1955, Barton was transferred to the headquarters staff as specialist in soil and rater conservation. He works with ounty extension agents and other agencies and groups in conduct ing soil and water conservation programs. He has given major emphasis to land judging. For a period of several weeks, this past spring and early summer (1957) he was in charge of the soil testing laboratory at College Station Barton works closely with the Soil Conservation Districts of the state and has authored many popular type stories on subjects in his field as well as publications for general distribution,
