They are still working on that little problem.

Late last week, representatives of the fire department went to meet with the Texas Forest Service in Lufkin. They brought back a complete pump unit, ready to go to work. All that was lacking was a truck to carry the tank and pump system that is of the newest technology.

Now the department has a truck, we had a picture of it. All is fine, you think. Not quite.

The department now has a truck and a tank and pump unit. The department also has another tank and pump unit ordered and delivery is expected very soon.

By using funds allocated for the purchase of a piece of firefighting equipment from the Forest Service, the fire department ordered the construction of a truck and pump.

Then the one that had been on the way for several years came along — minus a truck.

Now the department has two pumping units, complete with water tanks and only one truck.

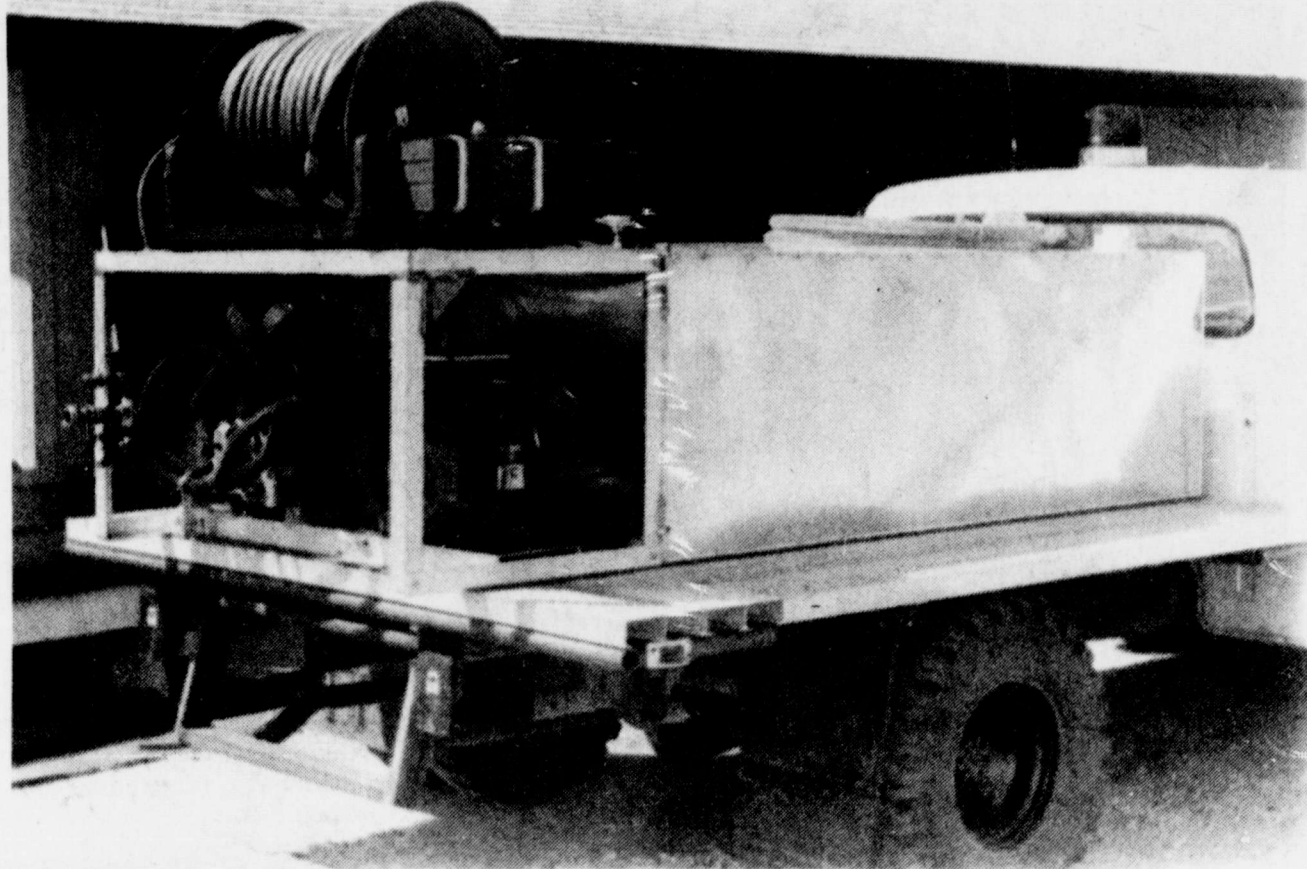
The department, it appears, has the opportunity to have two small, fire trucks. Trucks that can respond to any type fire, anywhere in the area.

The only problem, as it has been for a while, is money.

Estimates point to a need for a total of about \$8,000 to \$10,000 to purchase a second truck to carry the second pump and tank.

Ready to work — if needed

Although work is not complete, the Winters Volunteer Fire Department says that this truck can respond to fire calls if needed.

Pictured on the truck is a new WEPS tank and pump system built by the Texas Forest Service has a tank capacity of 500 gallons of water which, when mixed with a special chemical and compressed air, will have the effect of 5,000 gallons of

water. The truck, on which the unit is sitting, was obtained by the fire department to carry another tank-pump unit. The pump unit pictured is awaiting another truck, which the department hopes donations will enable it to purchase, thus giving the fire department two new trucks at a minimum cost.

Races set in school, city, hospital elections

The deadline for filing as a candidate for the school board, the city council, or the hospital board passed last Wednesday and contested races were set for the Winters City Council, the Ballinger City Council, the Winters Independent School District Board of Trustees, and for Ballinger Municipal Judge.

City of Winters
Three at-large seats on the Winters City Council will be filled in the May 7 elections. On the ballot are seven candidates for the council seats. The three candidates receiving the most votes will be seated on the council.

Incumbents Jerry Sims and Dawson McGuffin are seeking re-election to their council posts while incumbent Rick Dry is not running.

Other candidates for the at-large council seats in Winters include Charles Weardon, Lisa Nitsch, James Lincycorn, Gary Goff, and Gene Bernal.

City of Ballinger
The race for the office of Municipal Judge has drawn the largest number of candidates in Ballinger. Incumbent Judge Charlie Bradshaw said that he was not seeking re-election to the position he has held for a number of years.

Two women and two men are seeking the city judge's position. Edna Horn and Mrs. L. V. Johnson are on the ballot along with Doug Wadsworth and Bud Everett.

Two seats on the Ballinger City Council, Place 3 and Place 4, are on the May 7 ballot.

Place 3 incumbent Woodrow Hoffman is not eligible to seek another term on the council. The Ballinger City Charter prohibits a councilman from serving more than two terms.

Candidates seeking the Place 3 council seat are Cecil Darby, Jr. and Stan Bickle.

For the Place 4 seat on the Ballinger City Council, incumbent Weldon Brevard is unopposed for a second term on the

council.

Winters ISD
Two positions on the Winters Independent School District Board of Trustees are on the ballot. Incumbent Ronald Presley is unopposed in his bid for re-election to school board place 6.

For Winters School Board Place 7, incumbent Randall Connor is not seeking re-election to the seat. The position is being sought by Bob Prewit, Randall Boles, and Michael Deike.

Winters One Act Play places first

Decomposed body found near Ballinger

Officials in Runnels County are investigating the discovery of the decomposed body of a woman found northwest of Ballinger, said to be in the brush along a county road, late Tuesday afternoon.

Runnels County Sheriff's officers were not available for comment to *The Enterprise* late Tuesday evening concerning the grim discovery.

Department of Public Safety officials in Abilene confirmed that county authorities here were investigating the discovery of the body of a female, clad only in blue pants and brown shoes. The body was discovered in some brush on a ranch about 6 miles west of Ballinger about 5 p.m. Tuesday by a rancher.

The information was sent to law enforcement agencies in the area in an apparent attempt to discover the identity of the body.

It was not known if the Runnels County Sheriff's Department had any reports of a missing female within the suspected time period.

It is assumed that investigating officers will take the body to San Antonio for examination by the Bexar County Medical Examiner's office in an attempt to establish the time and cause of death as well as any information that might lead to the identity of the body.

Absentee voting to be held April 4

Absentee voting will be conducted April 4 through April 8 in the County Clerk's Office located on the first floor of the Runnels County Courthouse for the Second Primary Run-off Election to be held April 12, 1988. Voters may vote either Democratic or Republican.

Any qualified voter is eligible to vote absentee in person. There are no restrictions other

than to be a registered voter. Voters are asked to bring their white voter registration card if it is available.

The County Clerk's Office is open from 8:30 A.M. to 12 noon and from 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. Monday through Friday. Due to the short period of time for absentee voting, the law does not allow the office to open for week-end absentee voting.

The location of the clinic will be 100 Grant Street in the Professional Building, Suite 108.

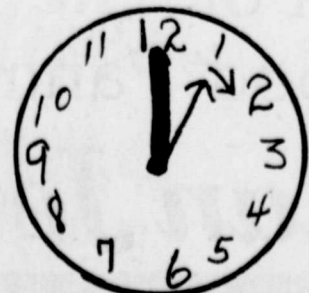

Ranching Heritage Tour

According to my brilliant deduction, those of us on the Young Farmer's tour of the Lubbock area took our naps soon after being served a courtesy luncheon in the main building of the Texas Tech Ranching Heritage Center.

Following the welcome and introductions we viewed films depicting the history of southwest ranching. The building was darkened and this was a restful interlude and believe me we needed it before making the lively tour that followed.

exhibits, administrative offices, and Cogdell's General Store.

Our guide, Phil Nickel, was introduced to us near the general store. It's easier to find the women there. Mr. Nickel said for us to call him Phil. He was an old time railroad man and came to Lubbock in 1921. He had made a study of the area, he informed us, and he tried to keep us in our places.

Nearly 30 historic ranching structures have been relocated to the Ranching Heritage Center and restored as closely

We saw the remainder of the Visitor Orientation Center before meeting our guide for the ranch tour. It houses the Edith Whatley McKanna Parlor, static

as possible to their original conditions. The buildings are protected by earthen hills or berms, to help visually block modern surroundings from the

historically landscaped settings, giving us the feeling that we were taking a walk through history. The one-room schoolhouse, the blacksmith shop, the dugout, the milk and meat house, the bunkhouse and the ranch headquarters—they are all there.

We began with the El Capote Cabin, 1838, typical of the primitive log cabin structures erected while Texas was a Republic. Michael Erskine, one of these building's early owners, was among the pioneers of trail

driving. In 1853 he delivered 1,000 head of cattle to the hungry gold miners in California. The cabin was originally located in Gonzales County.

Next in line was the Hedwigs Hill Cabin, built by immigrants to Texas in the 1850's, illustrative of German participa-

tion in early Texas ranching. The cabin was originally located on a hill overlooking the Llano River near the road between Fort Mason and San Antonio.

Joly Ranch Stone House and its out buildings (1875) were built by George Jowell, according to legend, after his log cabin had been burned to the ground while he was on a trail drive to Kansas. Such isolated ranch houses, along with unguarded herds on the North Texas frontier were inviting targets for Comanche and Kiowa raiders. The stone house, with one room above the other, actually a fortress with 16 inch thick walls. The bottom was an arsenal with only gun holes for windows. There was no visible means of reaching the upper floor where the family lived, possibly a rope ladder pulled up for safety, a stair-way had been built outside for visitors. The self-sufficient complex including a cooler building and cistern, was originally located in Palo Pinto County near the present Possum Kingdom Lake.

The Matador Half Dugout (1891) is a common architectural form adopted by early ranchers on the plains because trees were scarce and lumber had to be freighted long distances by wagon. After lumber became available, structures of this type continued to be used as line or

fence camps located on the outer perimeters of ranch boundaries. Built by J. C. Davis and traded to the Matador Ranch when the ranch enlarged its boundaries in 1916, this structure was formerly located in northern Dickens County.

Phil told us that the Matador land was bought for ten cents an acre—one cowboy rode one way on his horse and another rode the other way, and all the land was bought between the two cowboys. It covered four counties according to our guide.

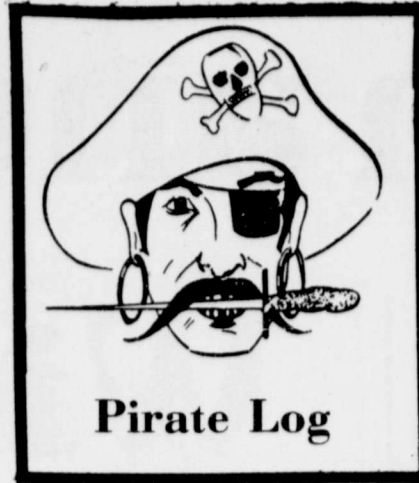

**Educators pass
AIDS resolution**

More than 700 Texas teachers voted March 10 teachers should have the right to know if they have students with AIDS in their classrooms. The resolution was passed at the eighth annual convention of the 45,500-member Association of Texas Professional Educators (ATPE), the largest independent educators' association in the country.

The convention was held

March 10-12 in the Corpus Christi Bayfront Plaza Convention Center.

In related action, the delegates voted down a provision stating that teachers should have the right to refuse to teach students with AIDS, and they approved two resolutions that would require age-appropriate sex education taught by trained teachers.

The delegates also approved a resolution stating that student test scores should not be used as a part of teachers' or administrators' performance evaluations.

A highlight of the convention was the keynote address by state Senator Carlos Truan (D-Corpus Christi) on March 11. Truan discussed the recent court ruling that Texas' school finance system is unconstitutional and proposed possible solutions to the problem. That ruling is currently under appeal.

The educators also elected new state officers for 1988-89 and honored members and others who have contributed significantly to the improvement of education over the past year.

ATPE has more than 45,500 members and represents classroom teachers, administrators, paraprofessionals, education students and retired educators. ATPE remains the only Texas educators' group that allows all the members of the education community to participate.

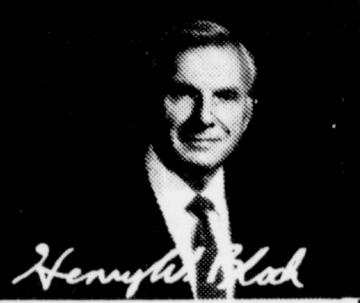

Railroad Commission names committee to advise on natural gas rules changes

Railroad Commission Chairman James E. (Jim) Nugent pointed out two unique aspects of the advisory committee and its task. "Gas consumers will be equal partners with producers and pipelines as the committee begins its work, recognizing their importance to the overall gas picture in Texas," he said.

"We've also asked the committee to recommend ways we can simplify our rules as we improve them," Nugent said. "You shouldn't have to hire experts to understand our rules."

Kent Hance noted that the committee will report to the commission by May 1 and stressed the need for quick action by the Railroad Commission. "We need clear, understandable rules to guide the industry in production of natural gas—one of Texas' most valuable natural resources," Hance said.

The committee was also asked to develop a consensus position among gas consumers, producers and pipelines on revised RRC gas production rules to satisfy requirements of state law while ensuring market demand for gas is met.

University Agricultural Extension Service poultry specialist, Dr. David Mellor says a recent study in the *Poultry Science Journal* showed that hard-cooked eggs stored at room temperature spoil in less than a week. But eggs put in the refrigerator after two days at room temperature keep for three weeks. Hard-cooked eggs kept in their shells and stored the whole time in the refrigerator show the least bacterial growth, he reports. "It's best to remove the Easter eggs from the basket as soon as possible, refrigerate them and use them within a few days," according to the specialist. "If your children like to carry their Easter baskets around for days include some plastic eggs for play and refrigerate the real eggs that the family will eat," Mellor advises.

Refrigerate your Easter eggs

If you're tempted to color baskets and baskets full of eggs for Easter, remember to store them properly or to not eat them, says a Texas A&M

A tribute to Grandmother

I am writing this letter to you because I want you to know several things about my grandmother, what she was like, and what she means to me.

This past Sunday a visiting chaplain delivered a message. He said even though God loves the new and fresh and innocent, He prefers the old and broken because He can heal them. He went into different ways that God can heal, and not all of them happen on our level of existence. In this manner of thinking, God healed my grandmother.

After the initial shock of hearing of her passing, my first feeling was of relief for her; a type of celebration that she was finally out of her pain. I saw visions of her, no longer trapped in her aged body, joining her husband and others who have gone before. I then became worried because I wasn't crying. As my thoughts raced back through time, the tears came.

She loved her family and nothing made her happier than when all her family was together. I can recall visits when I was a child. She would always have some sort of "surprise" for me, whether it was taking me out to the cotton field and letting me fill a little pail with cotton bolls, allowing me to gather eggs all by myself, or putting together a little playhouse. A very vivid memory in my mind was almost nine years ago when all her children and their spouses, her grandchildren and great-grandchildren gathered together for a reunion. She was delighted the whole wonderful weekend. After our daughter was born 13 years ago, she could hardly wait to have a photograph taken of the four generations. Of course, none of our family gatherings would have been complete without gathering around to sing. We would sing "old church songs," Nana would always sing as loud and strong as the rest of us. At times I think we rivaled many a church choir.

She had a deep belief in God and Jesus. I can remember many things she told me that were very comforting as I was growing up. One day when I was small and homesick for my parents, she told me that next to my parents, Jesus was the very best friend I had. She understood a small child's need for comfort coming from a tangible source and extended it to a more abstract form. This must have made quite an impression on me because it has come to mind many times during my life. In the last few years she would talk about going "home" to be with Papa (her husband) again.

She loved children—not just her own—but any child. She had a special love for them. When our son was born nine years ago, she was 90 years old. At first it concerned me when she wanted to hold him because she was not as nimble anymore. But the look on her face as she held him dissolved all my doubts. She became very capable as she cradled him in her arms and he responded by lying still and not crying.

She loved plants. I can remember her lovingly showing me different plants when I was little. Perhaps this had a big influence on my love of plants now.

She had a great sense of humor, and was always able to look on the bright side. I can fondly look back on one particular time when I was unsuccessfully trying to drive a standard and she and my younger sister were in the back seat giggling as the car went jumping down the road.

Before our children were born, my husband and I would visit with her occasionally. My husband has remarked several times that no matter what time we would arrive, she would have dinner ready and waiting in the oven for us.

My grandmother was always happiest when she could be doing for others. After she became blind and bedridden, she was just not the same Nana that I had loved and respected all my life, and this would make me sad. Perhaps that is why I had the initial feeling of celebration for her—God had truly healed her in a way that never could have happened in our present life.

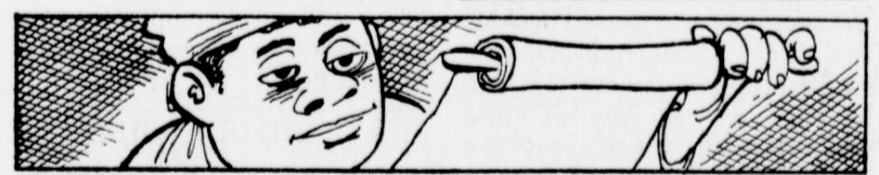
