
Bigger, even, than what was used on either of the Abilene schools winning.

Winters is no longer the end of the line

A big part of Winters' history is literally being picked up and hauled off. Work crews were busy this week taking up the tracks of the old Abilene & Southern Railroad line.

The line, which at one time connected Abilene, Winters and Ballinger and joined with the Sante Fe line in Ballinger is no longer.

A number of years ago the tracks between Winters and Ballinger were taken up leaving Winters at the end of the line.

About 13 years ago, residents rallied together to oppose the closing of the rail line and were

At that time, the railroad was used by a number of shippers hauling farm equipment, grain, and other merchandise.

In the ensuing years the need for the railroad dwindled and when notice was received early this past summer of the railroad's intent to close the line, there was no opposition.

The last train to, or from, Winters ran in October.

In a few short weeks the only reminder of a bygone era will be just the road bed, no rails or ties. Just a pile of rock and gravel stretching the 35 miles from Winters to Abilene.

Former residents injured in Hill Country wreck

Two former Winters residents are hospitalized in Kerrville's Sid Peterson Hospital and a third in San Antonio Methodist Hospital with injuries sustained in a Friday evening accident near Ingram.

Chris and Omega Gehrels and Mitzi Hudson were all passengers in a late model Toyota that ran off a roadway and crashed into a tree.

Investigating Highway Patrol Trooper Travis Hill said that the car, driven by Mitzi Hudson, was east bound on state highway 39 when the accident occurred. Hill said that the driver was "trying to turn on the dome light in the car" when the headlights went out.

All three were taken to the Kerrville hospital for treatment and later Omega Gehrels was transferred to the San Antonio hospital for surgery.

Nursing personnel at San Antonio Methodist were unable to give any report on Omega Gehrel's condition late Tuesday.

Family members said that all three received multiple fractures and lacerations along with internal injuries.

Mother Poe Told It Like It Was

My husband's mother-Mother Poe- never minced children six quilts when they words. She let them roll out without bothering to sweeten or soften them. Her tongue was as sharp as the buttermilk she drank three times a day. It took me a long time to learn that underneath that rough exterior, she had a heart of gold.

For starters, when George and I were married she was away from home. She wrote a letter, reminding us of her

custom of giving each of her were married. She ended her letter by saying, "Go over to the house and get your quilts, but don't take anything else."

My next confrontation occured the first time George and I were invited to dinner at Mother Poe's house. When the fried chicken was passed I took the back - my favorite piece. Immediately Mother Poe blurted out in her deep bass voice.

'That's my piece of chicken. Put it back!" Needless to say, I did. George later explained that with 10 children in the family, each one had a designated piece of chicken because after once around the table the dish was

empty. She spoke her peace regardless. When a newspaper printed an article about tuberculosis, she wrote the editor, "I've been told that exposure brings on tuberculosis, and if you don't call the modern way of dressing children 'exposure' then I don't know what you would call it."

Mother Poe's opinions were well known by all-whether they wanted them or not. She often rebuked women for wearing short dresses. "Your ankles are showing," she would say. Or, "You ought to sew a ruffle on that dress." And a woman smoking brought forth her strongest condemnation, "You ought to be hung by your toenails!"

Not all her words were so cutting. Mother Poe had many sayings that made a lot of sense once you thought about them. She made all the family's clothing, cooked, raised chickens, and tended a garden. She often commented, "The only rest I ever get is sitting down to churn, reading the paper, and nursing a baby.'

She and her husband pioneered in West Texas, sodding the land and working the farm, yet she reared 10 children without any modern conveniences. When asked how she did it, she replied with a question, "Did you ever watch an old hen with one chick? She spent as much time scratching for it as the hen with a whole brood."

She complained when her body ached, "I feel like I'm dead and rained on." If her back hurt she often groaned, "My getworser hurts." But these things, even in old age, never stopped her from making bonnets to sell in stores. Because of her gifts to Boy's Town in Nebraska, she was awarded a lifetime membership.

Her speech may have been candid, but her hands were always ready to help. Once, as a young farm wife, I faced a crisis. Eighteen farmers had arrived to harvest our oat crop with a thrasher. I was expected to prepare dinner for them on a two-burner kerosene stove. In marched my mother-in-law, wearing her bonnet and apron, carrying two large pots of food. She then helped serve it and stayed to help clean up afterward.

Mother Poe was considerate of others and continued using the surrey every Sunday to go to church because their 1911 Buick scared the teams in the churchyard. And, of course, she always brought the preacher

home for dinner.

She served leftovers on Sunday night which she called her "woodpile" supper.

If someone slept late she'd say, "No need gettin' up for the little piece of day that's left!"

When she later moved into town, she visited all newcomers to the neighborhood and carried food to the ill. But she never sent flowers to a funeral. She believed flowers ought to be given while folks were alive and could enjoy them.

She never used terms of endearment or showed signs of affection, but her love for her family was unmistakable. On her 86th birthday, when all the family gathered again for the first time in 34 years, Mother Poe had her picture made with her youngest son, George; his son Dennis, the 26th and youngest grandchild; and this grandchild's son, Clifford, the youngest great-grandchild.

Her last illness hit suddenly. Knowing her daughters were living far away, she asked, "Are my boys here?" When assured they were, she died peacefully in her sleep-the first thing she had ever done quietly in her life. ModernFrom Living, November 1988. Copyright 1988 Sunday School Board of



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



Roasting a turkey simple as 1-2-3

Turkey is one of today's best plastic or acrylic cutting boards and should use. meat buys, both nutritionally to prepare poultry. and economically. Whole the processing plant, no hands touch them until time for kitchen preparation.

A defrosted whole turkey requires only six minutes to prepare for roasting (without stuffing).

If stuffing is desired, I suggest it be prepared separately, placed in a covered casserole and cooked with turkey during last hour of roasting time.

Follow label instructions for roasting or use these simple directions to obtain a beautiful golden brown, ready-to-carveand-eat turkey.

Thawing: (if turkey is not frozen, begin with step two.) DO NOT THAW POULTRY AT ROOM TEMPERATURE. Leave turkey in original packaging and use one of the following methods:

No hurry: Place wrapped turkey on tray in refrigerator for 3 to 4 days; allow 5 hours per pound of turkey to completely thaw.

Fastest: Place wrapped turkey in sink and cover with cold water. Allow about 1/2 hour per pound of turkey to completely thaw. Change water frequently. Refrigerate or cook turkey when it is thawed. Refreezing uncooked turkey is not recommended.

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
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"Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses..." (Hebrews 12:1)

I read those words to my congregation Sunday morning, as the lectionary Epistle text. Lately I have been experiencing what the author of Hebrews is writing about.

God has worked it out to call me to serve two rural congregations thus far in my ministry. In both churches one of my predecessors was a man named Pastor Meier.

I wrote about Pastor Meier in the "Goldfish Bowl" on Maundy Thursday of this year. Because of this "coincidence," I have felt a special kinship with him. The stories that parishioners tell me about Pastor Meier always spark a little extra interest.

It is almost like he were my patron saint, if Lutherans had such a thing.

A couple weeks ago, I found a letter in my mail box from Cuero. When I opened it, I discovered a letter written by Ernest Meier, Pastor Meier's son, who has retired back to Cuero and is seeking information about his father's ministry. He knew that he was born in the Winters parsonage in 1918, but was wondering if I knew anything

about his father's pastorate. Boy, did I have some stories for him! I almost feel like I know Pastor Meier, even though he died when I was two years old and had never heard of the Lutheran Church. We have begun to communicate, sharing our stories about his father. It doesn't sound very exciting

I found out that his name was not Edwin, but Eugene. Which is not so surprising. Back then nobody called the pastor by his first name. I had also thought that he had been educated in the seminary in Switzerland, but discovered that he came to this country with his folks from Switzerland at age 19. He received his seminary education in another foreign country, Dubuque, Iowa. This is all just to set the record straight and maintain historical and journalistic integrity, in case I ever need some sort of recommendation Charlsie.

When I visualize my own cloud of witnesses, I imagine that Pastor Meier is on the front row, cheering me on in my Christian journey and ministry.

The author of Hebrews wrote of this cloud of witnesses as a comfort and source of strength to people going through a rough time. When the going gets tough, we are not going it alone. There is a whole grandstand full of fans who have retired from actively playing the game. They are rooting for us. Cheering us on.

The Spirit of those who have attained the Church Triumphant are with us.

A lot of folks in rural America are going through tough times. A battle for survival and personhood. It is good to know that we are not alone. Even if we feel that way sometimes. Helps us persevere.

In the second verse of this text, Hebrews' writer gives us even more specific advice as to how to get through hard times. "Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfector of our faith.'

I believe that is exactly what that cloud of witnesses is cheering for us to do. They know something that we don't. Thanks be to God for
