Water case hearing over, interim rate set

Following two full days of take effect immediately. hearings, an interim rate for the City of Winters to charge North Runnels Water Supply Corporation has been agreed upon. A rate of \$2.56 per thousand gallons was recommended by the Texas Water Commission staff as a fair rate mony was given by Mike Mitchfor the city to charge NRWSC. Both parties agreed to the rate following a recommendation by Hearings Examiner Kerry Sullivan, pending a ruling by the Consulting Engineer. Commission.

The hearing on merits of the case began on Monday morning in Austin. The matter of the rate charged NRWSC by the City had been appealed to the Texas Water Commission by NRWSC in April, 1990. Since that time the parties had met several times in trying to reach an agreement on a rate, but before the full Commission. had not been able to agree.

nance, on April 18, 1991 set the new rate to be charged NRWSC effective April 22 at \$2.84 per thousand gallons. The hearing on merits of the case was to begin on April 22 in Austin, but a delay was obtained by North Runnels in order to combine the appeal of Commission to set an interim rate to be paid by NRWSC to the City until a final judgement was rendered on the two appeals.

The two days of testimony and cross-examination by attorneys for both sides was concluded late on Tuesday afternoon. Following the conclusion of testimony, Examiner Sullivan told the parties that he could not make a final ruling on the interim rate, but he would recommend to the Commission that the \$2.56 rate be set as the interim rate. If both parties would agree to that rate, it could



1991 WHS Honor Graduates




Keith Rives Gerhart Valedictorian

State Track Meet Results

Three athletes representing Winters High School traveled to Austin this weekend to compete in the 81st annual University Interscholastic League State Track and Field Championship. Representing the Lady Blizzards was Jamie Smith, and for the Blizzards it was Willie Belk and Johnny Rodriguez.

Belk was the first to compete on Saturday morning and the event was the long jump. He finished with a jump of 22 feet 3 1/4 inches,, a third place medal. The last of the trio to run Saturday night, he competed in the 200 meter dash and finished sixth with a time of

Johnny Rodriguez competed in the 3200 meter run. His fifth place finish in a time of 10 minutes and 4.2 seconds. This set a new Winters school record for the 3200 meter run.

Winters police make arrests

Carillo Inocensio Hernandez, of Winters, was arrested early Monday morning by Winters police officers. Hernandez is charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon following an incident in the 200 block of State Street in Winters. The victim and the accused shared a house at that address.

The victim was seriously injured with knife wounds and transported to North Runnels Hospital. Hemandez was transported to Runnels County Jail and bond was set at \$15,000 in the case.

Winters police also arrested Juan Vara, 17, of Wingate, on May 9 on a warrant from Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1. Vara was charged with aggravated sexual assault of a child and was taken to County Jail. Bond was set at \$25,000.

The arrest was the culmination of an investigation by Winters Police Department of an incident occurring on May 4.

Through some reading and independent study, I have come to a realization about the difference between the net consuming countries and the net exporting (oil) countries. In a nutshell, the two parties look at the world through two very different rose-colored eyepieces.

Since we can identify with the net consuming countries (the U.S. is one, obviously), we will examine their perspective, first.

A definition of a 'net consuming country' is in order, up front.

A net consuming country is one that imports petroleum because it is unable to produce enough of its own energy to keep pace with the demand for energy inside its borders.

From the perspective of a net importer, a stable supply is paramount. If a country has to depend on an undependable source, then that country is at risk to the whims of its suppliers. So, the importer must work to have a good relationship with a very stable and dependable source or sources.

Nothing wrong with that—it is good business and smart politics.

In addition, that importing country wants to have a strong domestic source, if possible, to keep dependence to a minimum. This practice also makes a lot of sense.

Now, some consuming countries don't always succeed at doing the above, but they usually try to the best of their government's ability.

What seems to pervade a consuming country's pattern of behavior is that the producing countries are there for the benefit of the consuming countries' economic well-being. This is usually premised on the thought that those net exporters are one-dimensional and depend almost solely on oil for their livelihood.

Now, for the net exporters' side of the story.

First, the definition: a net exporter or producer is one that makes and sells much more petroleum than it needs.

For the net exporter, the market is paramount. A stable market is much preferred, because it ensures a stable income. If a country who exports has to depend on a market that is unstable, then it is susceptible to risk to its livelihood.

If this sounds familiar, you are right. It is amazingly parallel to the wishes of the net importer. But, now comes where the two parties diverge.

Not surprisingly, the exporters believe, very sincerely, that the net importers exist only because the exporters wish them to exist.

This is usually premised on the thought that the consuming countries could not function without the fuel they offer.

Kind of snobby, you say? Not any more snobby than the net consumers' attitudes towards the producers, I would venture to say.

The producers think that the consumers will depend on them basically forever, while the consumers think the producers will cease to exist when an alternate fuel takes over.

Neither view is exactly true, out both groups run the risk of becoming a self-fulfilling prophecy by not coming to grips with the realities of the market.

In my opinion, the 'realities of the market' are:

· net exporters have the reserves to outlast any net consumers domestic supply;




 as a result, producers must realize that petroleum will not be a perpetual money machine, and; · consumers must realize that

producers have the ability to make it perpetual if consumers don't develop alternatives. It all boils down to the market

pushing both consumers and producers to equalize the equation of supply and demand in the future. Any delays in realization of this fact by either party may delay this equilibrium, but, eventually, market forces in the form of higher energy prices will push the two participants into this equilibrium.

If both parties will open their eyes and ears a little wider to these realities, they should realize the value both parties have to offer at this point in time and what each can do to make the transition into the future—no matter how far away it is.



Although I was not raised here, I have deep ties since being marrid here in 1959. During my 25+ years employment elsewhere we always managed one to four trips here a year and finally moved here in 1984 after taking early retirement. I am a quiet person, enjoy my privacy, but when I have a job I do it with all my energy and to the utmost of my ability. Admittedly I do make mistakes, but am always eager to make corrections or amendments. My grandmother (widowed with seven children and self educated) schooled and raised all seven without help and left many impressions on me - one being "fools names and fools faces are often seen in public places." Anyway, I'm writing this letter - excuse me grandmother. I'm sorry that at an early stage

both parties could not agree to writing a new contract for North Runnels Water Supply Corporation. However, the filing by NRWSC with the Texas Water Commission forced both sides to hire an attorney, an engineer, and an auditor to represent each side. Since last September, the City has been most cooperative in retrieving all information as requested, and my working file which many of you have seen, consists of a full legal file drawer. Multiply this by all the copies duplicated, cross examinations, personal visits of all parties including the Texas Water Commission - you can imagine the time and expenses involved. In handling this matter, the City's outside fees will total approximately \$84,000 and that does not count our travel, etc., expenses or any of the time spent by me, the Mayor, Council, office help, water superintendent and others. This has been very disruptive to our daily operation and I know we should be pursuing those areas. Also, for an organization on a very tight and limited budget I surely would have preferred spending the money on a fire truck, street sweeper, or other badly

The caretaker was to keep off the club grounds all persons not entitled to be there. It was his duty to see that all boys have the authority to remain on the grounds. It was his duty to keep out all trespassers.

No person shall use or shoot any species of gun or pistol on the club grounds. No high heels were allowed on the putting greens or the tennis courts.

The club was closed on Sunday for all purposes between the Charles and Ralene Adami of hours of 9 a.m. and 12 noon, and from sundown until Monday morning.

> Things seemed to run smoothly until 1938 when amendments were added to their by-laws as follows:

Be it enacted by the Country Club and the Winters Realty Company, that all non-resident stock shall be assessed \$12.50 per year for maintaining and improving the club properties; also for the payment of taxes and insur-

Since many people had moved away only 44 of the 75 shares were active. At this rate the club would soon be automatically closed. The board felt, too, that it

was only fair that the non-resident stock holders share some of the expense of maintaining the properties.

It was reported that the club house, the keeper's cottage, as well as the grounds were in good condition and being well cared for. They were adequately covered with insurance. The administrative board reported it was doing everything possible to maintain the properties of which they all could be proud.

Evidently, not everyone complied with the request and some people were offered a price for their stock. One person was not happy about the offer and this reply to the board was written by R.T. Thornton, lawyer, of Fort Worth. It is so humorous that perhaps everyone will enjoy it.

April 13, 1938 Dear Lyle:

One of the requirements of the all-American game, known as baseball, is that the bases must be ninety feet apart. Tell me why it is that it takes a runner longer to run from second base to third base, than it does for the same runner to run from first base to second base?

As I peruse your tender letter, I can not but think of the above mathematical question. The reason it takes a runner longer to run from second base to third base, than it does from first base to second base, is that there is a "short stop" between second and third. There must be a short stop in the minds of your board. Never do I expect to see more dire desecration than such act. Never did I expect to see in black and white, that those men whom I have honored and respected, "sell Winters

As I again read your letter, to be sure my eyes do not deceive me, large salty tears roll down my cheeks, shame wracks my body, parents, Mr. and Mrs. Byron D.

Roosevelt should hear of this. In my fifty years of stumbling around on this old earth, only once have I been more shocked, and that was when someone attempted to change the name of Arkansaw to Ar-Kansas. I feel just like that man who wrote that famous poem, "change the name of Arkansaw

My pride in Winters will not permit me to shame it by offering my stock for 1/24th its value. Well do I remember the Chamber of Commerce slogan, "the biggest little city in the Southwest," I notice that you give the full names of all parties connected with this offer, except one. Who is this man? He has a reason to hide his identity, his shame.

For my share just set me out two acres in the northwest corner of the club, as I wish to put in an auto wrecking yard. This would attract attention to the club and make it more valuable.

I had always thought that my one share of stock in the Winters Country Club would make me rich, and here I find that the country has gone bankrupt. The grim reaper never struck a more deadly blow than your board did, when it offered me \$5.00. Gone are my beautiful dreams, my memory pictures of those big stalwart men with hearts of gold who would give you their shirts, only to find that they want my shirt.

Alas and alack, my heart runs over and words fail me.





PROPERTY TAX PROTEST and APPEAL PROCEDURES

The law gives property owners the right to protest chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you actions concerning their property tax appraisals. receive the ARB's order. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property; exemptions that may apply to you;
- cancellation of agricultural appraisal; whether your property is taxable; which local governments should be taxing your
- you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

Informal Review: Taxpayers are encouraged to make an appointment with an appraiser to discuss their property value. This may be done by calling (915) 365-3583. They should bring information to substantiate why they feel their property value is incorrect. The appraiser will discuss their property and may recommend an adjustment to the Appraisal Review Board. If the taxpayer is satisfied with the adjustment, he does not have to appear before the Appraisal Review Board.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you have your case heard by the appraisal review board. The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal.. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 6th and Strong, Ballinger. Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members

the ARB hears your case. Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the



RATE CHANGE REQUEST Notice is hereby given that Coleman County Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the "Utility") intends to change rates for electric utility service effective August 1, 1991, or as soon thereafter as may be permitted by law. Based upon a test year ending September 30, 1990, the increase requested over actual test year revenues is \$280,756, or 5%. The changes are applicable to all areas, all customer classes, and all customers served by the Utility.

The Utility proposes to change all rates for residential, irrigation, small commercial, large commercial and cotton gin service, including customer, demand, energy, minimum and other charges. The proposed changes are expected to affect the classes as follows: for the 4,930 customers in the residential class, the proposed increase will be \$167,926, or a 7.50% change in revenues; for the 110 customers in the irrigation class, the proposed increase will be \$2,811, or a 7.50% change in revenues; for the 2,541 customers in the small commercial class, the proposed increase will be \$90,683, or a 4.20% change in revenues; for the 49 customers in the large commercial class, the proposed increase will be \$17,163, or a 3.77% change in revenues; for the 3 customers in the cotton gin class, the proposed increase will be \$2,173, or a 5.15% change in revenues. No change is proposed for the 1 LP special customer, Santa Fe Pipeline Company, or

the 1,248 security lighting customers. The Utility also intends to change its service rules and regulations, including rules relating to obtaining service, line extension, line extension charges, the provision of electric service, service fees, and discontinuance of service. Information concerning the proposed rate changes, including the proposed revisions of tariff and schedules is available at the General Office of the Utility, located at 200 west Live Oak Street, Coleman, Texas 76834. The Utility is required to give notice of the percentage increase in base revenues which is 12.11%. The percentage increase in base revenues is not an indication of how much your bill will increase. Rather, it is a measure of the increase needed by the Utility for its own operations, excluding payment for the cost of power purchased by the Utility from its wholesale power suppliers.

On or about June 1, 1991, the Utility will file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, a Statement of Intent to Change Rates, specifying in detail each proposed change.
