

## WT Student Body Starts New Year With Bill Hunter as President

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The ensuing article appeared in The Prairie, official news organ of West Texas State College. The News is reprinting the article for the benefit of its readers as the story deals with a well-known Dimmitt High School graduate who was elected president of the West Texas State student body in May of this year.)

West Texas State appears to be headed for another good year as Bill Hunter of Dimmitt takes over the reins as president of the student body for the coming year.

Bill, who is a junior this year, has been very active in campus activities having served two years as a student senator. With this type of background he is well qualified to represent the stud-

ents.

Prior to coming to WT Bill attended Dimmitt High School where he participated in football, basketball and track. He also served as editor of the school paper and was elected the "Best All Around Boy" of his class.

The new president is 20 years old, single, and a pre-law student. Actually he plans to enter the University of Texas Law School upon completion of his work here.

Even though the school year is just getting underway our new president has several projects under way and plans are being made for more activities during the year. Among the activities already being planned are the Homecoming events and the Personality Pageant. Included in the Homecoming plans is the election of a Homecoming Queen as well as a boomer parade to Amarillo, talent show, a bonfire, and of course the traditional barbecue which will be served by the students and prepared by the faculty.

Bill reported that some of the relatively new organizations on the campus, such as the Town and Country Clubs, will be used extensively this year and he is interested in using the Advisory Council to promote closer student relations and to provide better student representation.

President Hunter has drawn up a proposed eight man Coordinating Board. If utilized it would provide for closer cooperation between the faculty, the students, and the administration in planning any activity undertaken on the campus. The board would consist of two members of the Ex-Students Association, two members of the Administration, two students, and two members of the faculty.

In summing up the prospects for this school term the president for 1954-55 said, "I appreciate the support and cooperation of all the students on the campus and the help of the Senate this fall and during the past summer, and I feel that if the students' interest and support stays as it is now we will have a good year."

## Mexican Nationals Pour Into County

### 900 Signed Up to Help With Harvest

Mexican Nationals are pouring into Castro county this fall at an almost unprecedented rate to help with the cotton harvest.

A check by the News Monday with the Texas Production office or local farm labor office showed that 200 Mexican Nationals arrived in Dimmitt Saturday night and were signed up Sunday. A total of 900 were signed up in the last three weeks, according to John Robertson, to help pull cotton and shock feed.

The Nationals are coming in from El Paso from just across the Mexican border. Robertson said the farm laborers would be recruited and signed up here as they are needed.

With 65,000 acres of land seeded to cotton in the county and the cotton harvest just barely underway, many of the laborers will be needed from now until the harvest ends in January.

Most cotton handled by gins in the county at present is being sold and is testing middling 29 to 31 seconds staple. Cotton going into government loan is bringing 33 to 34 cents a pound while that being sold, providing it is of good quality, is bringing \$5.00 to \$7.50 per bale over loan value.

## Rites Held for William Branson

Funeral services for William H. Branson, 89, retired farmer who died Sunday evening at Innisfail, Alberta, Canada, will be held Friday in Griggs Funeral Chapel in Amarillo. The Rev. Raymond Van Zandt, pastor of the Dimmitt Methodist Church, will officiate and interment will be in the cemetery at Claude.

The father of Mrs. Vern Lust and Mrs. Earl Lust of the Bethel community, Mr. Branson lived at Innisfail for the past 35 years. He was born Dec. 17, 1864, in Harrison county, Iowa, and moved to Claude in 1909. His wife died in Claude in 1911, and he moved to Innisfail to live in 1919.

Besides two daughters from this county, Mr. Branson leaves a son, R. H. Branson, Innisfail, and another daughter, Miss Lois Branson of Alhambra, California. He is also survived by a brother who lives at Nampa, Idaho, 15 grandchildren and 13 great grandchildren.

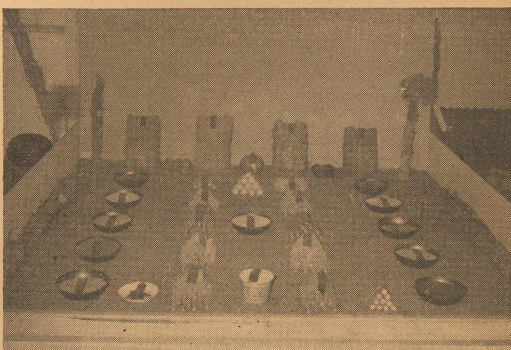

## 50 From Here See Bridge Ceremony; New Name is Suggested for Route

Fifty persons from Dimmitt were among the some 1400 Highway boosters on hand Sunday afternoon to witness the dedication of the Canadian River bridge between Vega and Channing. The ceremony was highlighted by talks by E. H. Thornton, Jr., chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, and Kim McAbee, president of Highway 51 Association.

Celebrating the completion of another link in the proposed international park highway which stretches from the Big Bend country to Canada, Thornton suggested that the route be named "The American Boy Highway." He also assured the large group in attendance that the six miles of unpaved road in the Canadian River breaks would soon be paved.

The speaker said that money had been appropriated and that contracts to pave the road had been let. Thornton thought the name appropriate as the highway passes by Boys' Ranch.

McAbee praised the many Highway 51 Association members who worked toward completion of the bridge and recognized delegations from Oldham, Hartley, Deaf Smith and Dallam, who made the bridge possible.

Before the dedication, some 800 persons were served a delicious barbecue by the famous Odessa Chuck Wagon Gang, directed by Joe Cozby.

Serving as emcee for the dedicatory program was Cal Farley, founder of Boys' Ranch. Rev. D. W. Brashear of Dimmitt offered the invocation. The Amarillo Air Force band was on hand to provide music for the occasion.

Heading the large Castro county delegation was Mayor E. B. Wright, Chamber of Commerce Manager Glen Youst and Dimmitt businessman T. A. Singer.

Other dignitaries present for the dedication were: Congressman Walter Rogers of Pampa; Julius Cox, Oklahoma State Highway commissioner from Boise City, Texas; Highway Commissioner Robert Potts of Harlingen, Marshall Formby of Plainview, Lawrence Hagy, former Amarillo mayor, Harold Dunn, president of Shamrock Oil Company; and V. P. Patterson of the First National Bank of Amarillo.

## Broom Salesmen Take to Streets

### Lions Sell Brooms For Texas Blind

Members of the Dimmitt Lions Club were divided into teams at a meeting of the organization Tuesday noon and assigned sale areas as last minute preparations were made for the big Lion Club-sponsored broom sale designed to raise funds for the blind school at Fort Worth. Twenty-five percent of total proceeds will go into the club operational fund and the balance will go to the blind.

It was pointed out at the meeting how successful the worthy broom sale projects have been in other towns. The small town of Spade, for example, sold \$556 worth of brooms and other items offered for sale by the blind while Lockney Lion Club members raised \$1300 through this medium.

Lion club members were to canvas the business district and residential areas selling such items as brooms, mops, ironing board pads, dust cloths and cup towels.

A report to the News late Wednesday indicated that club members raised \$540 from the project after a sale of only one afternoon duration. The club originally was to spend one day on the project but due to late notice and preparations was compelled to settle for a half day. President Buck Cleavenger indicated the sale was a big success considering the limited time given the project.

After the business session was adjourned club members saw a film on how the oil industry has helped to revolutionize living standards in the U. S. Dr. F. B. Faust, guest of the club, made the film available.

## Ten Enrolled in Negro School Here

Ten Negro students have enrolled at the colored school now in operation in northeast Dimmitt, according to W. E. Reisdorph, principal of the local grade school. More students are expected to enroll and are urged to apply for enrollment as soon as possible.

Two wood frame buildings were moved to a location in northeast Dimmitt recently and will serve to accommodate any colored children desiring to attend school in the area.

Enrollment at the grade school here has jumped to 750, an increase of about 50 during the past week, Reisdorph disclosed. Crowded conditions still exist in the grade school and will be alleviated only slightly when the new wood frame unit is completed in the rear of the school building. The sudden influx of Mexican laborers into the area account for most of the rapid increase.

Smarting from their first defeat of the season, the Dimmitt Bobcats have been undergoing stiff workouts this week in an effort to regain their winning stride Friday night at the expense of the Abernathy Antelopes.

Tutored by Coach Royal James, the Antelopes are a double A team and despite losses to Oton and Sundown are capable of furnishing strong opposition when the going gets rough. Only last Friday night the Abernathy team pushed across two markers against Sundown and threw a scare into the visiting team before the game was over.

The Antelopes, according to Assistant Coach Alvis Fuquay, who scouted them Friday night, run from the split T formation and have speed to spare in the backfield. Fuquay was impressed with Lawrence Barron, 140 pound right half as well as Oscar Lopez, 150 pound quarterback. George Willis, 157 pound fullback, also drew the attention of Fuquay. The assistant coach noted the fast running and successful passing of Roy Sons, 150 pound left half, and labeled him as a player to watch Friday night.

The Bobcat line has a slight weight advantage over the Antelopes while the backfields weigh in about the same.

This will be Field's first time to meet the Antelopes as they were booked out the Dimmitt schedule this year after several years of football inactivity lapsed between the schools. Fields remarked during an interview Wednesday, "I think it'll be a hard ball game but I believe it will be a

## 1954 Construction Zooms To New High In September

September construction in Dimmitt, which is headed by a new 20-unit motel now underway near the south city limits, reached its highest peak of the current year with the disclosure that permits calling for residential and commercial building totaling \$125,450 was issued by City Manager E. B. Noble during the past 30 days. This is the largest figure for one month since August of 1953 when total construction amounted to \$163,100 and emphasizes the fact that Dimmitt is now enjoying its greatest period of growth in history.

The new drive-in theatre now under construction in north Dimmitt will cost \$50,000 or more than any other single project started in September, but it is not listed among city building permits as it is being erected just outside the city limits. This modern new, outdoor drive-in will boast a wide, panoramic screen and will accommodate 300 automobiles. It is slated for completion by mid-October. H. H. Carlile is owner.

The new motel, which will be located on the east side of Highway 51 south just inside the city limits, is being constructed by Joe Thompson, who also owns the service station just across the highway. E. L. Calhoun is serving as contractor for the concrete block, all fire proof material structure. The 20 units will be laid out on a quarter of a block with 150 foot wings forming a "V." Each room will house a bedroom and bathroom with shower. The plans also call for kitchen

facilities in some of the units, but these have not been designated. The flat top units will contain central heating and air conditioning. Completion date for the project was not disclosed.

Also on the commercial side of the ledger for September is a permit calling for the construction of a new cafe estimated to cost \$3,250. This brick, stucco project will be located just in the city limits on the west side of Highway 51 south. Claude Forson is listed as owner and his son, Kenneth, as contractor. The 14x40 foot structure will have a vestibule entrance and will house 12 counter stools and three booths. The building will be of a cream color and will be trimmed in maroon. Forson plans to expand the building later. The cafe will be open day and night during the fall.

Under residential construction for September a \$14,000 home being built for Sam Maynard tops all other permits. Dimmitt Lumber Company is contractor for this 56x30 foot project which will be located on the east 70 feet of lots seven and eight of block 153.

A ten thousand dollar home is being constructed by R. Y. Buchanan for E. E. Sadler on the east one-half lots four, five and six of block 136. The home will have dimensions of 52 feet by 39 feet.

Two \$5,000 homes are underway by Buckeley and Engler, who are also listed as owners. The 28x55 foot structures will be built of brick veneer and will be located on lots 11 and 12 of block 141 and lot 56 of block 145.

Under construction in the Myrtle Wright Addition is a \$12,000 home for Jim Golding. E. H. Burtman is contractor for the 34x48 foot residence which is to be located on lot 19.

Earl Cowell is listed as contractor for a \$4,000 home being constructed on lot nine of block 121 for W. C. Miller. The wood frame structure will have dimensions of 24 feet by 36 feet.

Rounding out September building is a \$2,000 home on lot one of block 51 and a \$200 garage being constructed on lot seven of block 139. Howard Scoggin is listed as owner of the home and J. W. Daugherty owner of the garage.

The Dimmitt Bobcats, battling all the way, absorbed their first defeat of the 1954 gridiron season at the hands of a strong, determined Hale Center eleven Friday night. Although the Bobcats drew first blood they were doomed to defeat in the outset as Coach Hoss Beverly's Owls, considered one of the best teams in Hale Center football history, struck through the air and on the ground for five touchdowns in the first half and two in the second half. The final score was made in the last two minutes of play leaving Dimmitt on the short end of a 44-6 count.

The speedy and deceptive Owl team drew at least 15 penalties, however, in gaining the important triumph while Dimmitt was penalized only ten yards during the entire tilt. The game will not have any bearing on district play, as is a non-conference tilt.

## Dr. Bischoff Named To N. Y. Academy

Dr. Harold W. Bischoff, physician and surgeon at the local hospital, has been elected to full, active membership in the New York Academy of Sciences. The membership of the Academy is made up of distinguished scientists and doctors from all over the United States.

Dr. Bischoff, who came here in January of this year from Lamesa, has had a variety of training in bacteriology, pathology, surgery, pediatrics and chemistry. He has held a National Research Council fellowship in orthopedic surgery, and in 1948 was a National Institute of Health Research fellow.

Since coming to Texas the Dimmitt physician has had two grants-in-aid from large pharmaceutical houses for the clinical use of new therapeutic agents. He was offered the directorship of the pathology and bacteriology laboratory of one of the largest pharmaceutical companies in U. S. before coming to Texas.

## Scout Council to Develop Camp in Silverton Area

The South Plains Boy Scout Council has an 80-acre tract of land 10 miles northeast of Silverton in Briscoe County awaiting development—awaiting the funds to pay for the development.

The tract is known as Camp Haynes, given to the 20-county South Plains Council in 1942 by the late John Haynes in memory of his mother. The camp is located in a huge canyon area, beautiful because of the roughness of the terrain and because of the contrasting coloring of trees and rocks. The Little Red River runs through the canyon and the Scout Council has a fine dam which has created an excellent water area for fishing and boating.

The camp will serve the boys of the Council as an advanced short term, overnight and weekend camping area. The plans for development call for three developed Troop campsites, each capable of handling 36 Scouts and Leaders at a time.

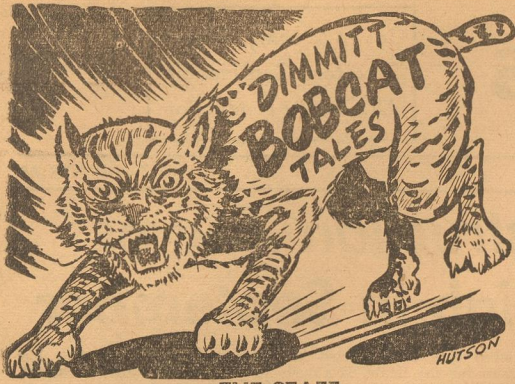
But the development will depend on the success of the annual campaign for operating funds in the 20-county area in October and November. The total construction cost is estimated conservatively at \$7,000 at the campsite. This figure will be included in the Council's campaign for its regul-

ar operating budget this fall. Total campaign goal, according to Joe T. Salom, President of the South Plains Council, is \$100,000.

W. R. Sowell of Lubbock is Chairman of the Council's Finance Committee; and Ray Mowery of Texas Tech is Chairman of the overall operating and capital development part of the entire program.

Each of the three developed Troop campsites will include a Troop cabin 12 by 14 feet with cement floor, provisions for cooking and small meetings. The Three Cabins will be built in a rustic style out of quarter logs, which (Continued on back page)

### Fire Prevention Week Proclaimed

Farm fires last year cost an estimated \$139,000,000 and took some 3,000 human lives. In view of these staggering losses, the week of October 3 through 9 has been proclaimed by President Eisenhower as Fire Prevention Week.

In his proclamation, Mr. Eisenhower calls upon the nation's citizens to initiate a year-round campaign against waste caused by preventable fires.

Fires in rural areas continue to be a costly drain on the farmer's income.

An extensive check of the farmstead for the common causes of fire is urged during this week. Fire officials say there are nine causes of most fires. They are: careless smoking and matches, improper use of inflammable liquids, spontaneous combustion, collection of trash and other rubbish, defective heating apparatus, combustible roofs, defective chimneys and worn-out, defective lightning-rod systems.

Prevention of fire isn't a one-week-in-the-year job, but a full time proposition. Everyone in the family—mom, dad, junior and sis—should become more fire prevention conscious and take steps to eliminate ever present hazards.

Because farms usually are located distant from organized fire protection, the need for "prevention" is ever more pressing than in the urban areas.

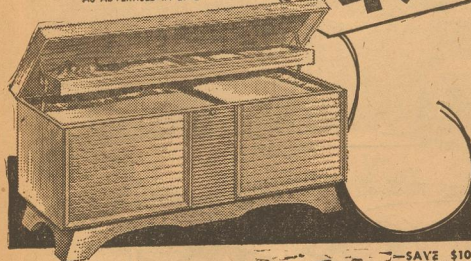

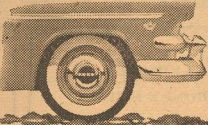

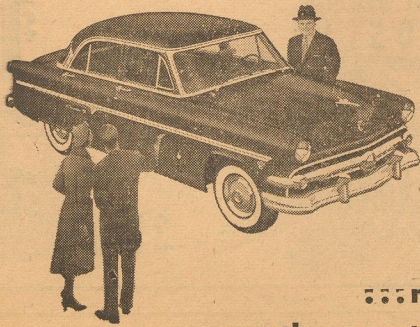

## News of Our Neighbors

**CHILDRESS**—(from the Childress Reporter) A state of "emergency" was declared to exist in Childress Monday night as the city council adopted an ordinance prohibiting the sale of printed material or objects "tending to incite minors to violent depraved or immoral acts. No deadline for removing material from newsstands, which would fall under the classification of the ordinance, was stipulated in the article. Violation of the ordinance is classed as a misdemeanor and is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$200. Each day during which a violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

**HEREFORD**—(from the Hereford Brand) Employment of a full time City Engineer Monday night headlined developments of the City Commission. D. E. Jones of Dallas was employed as full-time engineer by the City Commission. He will receive a salary of \$6,000 a year. He will assume his duties day night and visited that night and Sunday with their children, Cleve and Geneva, who are students at Texas Tech.

On November 1, Jones holds a registered professional engineer's certificate in Texas and for the past seven years has been employed by the City of Dallas.

**CANYON**—(from the Canyon News) The City of Canyon will call an election soon for a bond issue of \$60,000 for the purpose of building a city park west of the new elementary school building. It is proposed that a swimming pool, landscaping, three tennis courts, and an activities house be built with the bond issue.

**MULESHOE**—(from the Muleshoe Journal) Hundreds of Mexican laborers have been pouring into the Muleshoe country in the last few weeks to help with cultivating crops and with the harvest. Around 1,000 men have been brought into the area in the past two weeks. Farmers have requested another 1,000 laborers. They will weed and thin lettuce and do tractor work and irrigation work.

**ABERNATHY**—(from the Abernathy Weekly Review) H. H. Selke, local building contractor, was awarded contract to build Abernathy's new city hall and fire station. His bid of \$51,380 was accepted by the City Council in special session Thursday. The new structure will be on the south side of the city square, with the

mair entrance on Avenue D and the fire station entrance facing on Ninth Street. In addition to the 2-place fire station, with space for an apartment above, and city offices, there will be a large assembly room, kitchen, library and auxiliary offices, one of which may be occupied by the justice of the peace.

**HALE CENTER**—(from the Hale Center American) A move is underway to establish a nine-hole golf course here and organize a golf club. The move has been brewing for sometime but the campaign for members did not start until this week. An ideal site for the course has been secured. A pasture containing 120 acres of land and located conveniently for both Hale Center and Cotton Center communities has been purchased. At least 40 members are needed.

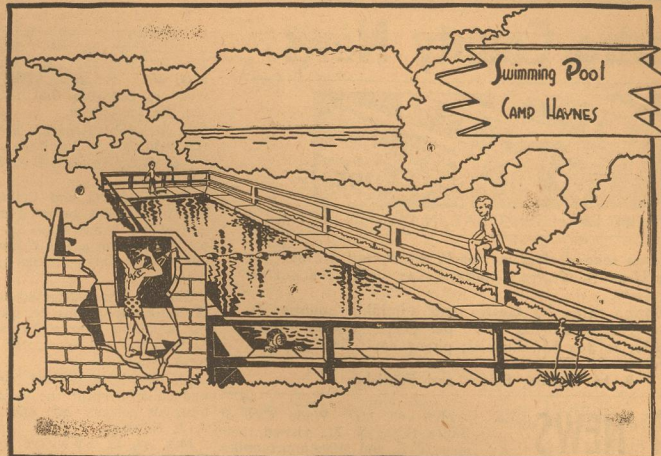

 will blend with the rugged environment.

An adirondack shelter 9 by 14 feet for winter camping purposes will be included on each Troop campsite. They will have concrete floors and will be constructed with quarter logs. Fireplaces for cooking and reflector heating will be on the open side of the shelter.

Troop washing and bathing and toilet facilities will be erected on each Troop campsite. The Troops will add, later on, flag poles and Council fire wings.

A large spring under a big cottonwood tree northeast of the dam has been boxed in cement.

Water will be piped to an overhead storage tank to be chlorinated for drinking purposes. Pipes then will carry the water to each Troop campsite. Water from the springs will also be diverted through pipe to the new concrete swimming pool. The swimming pool will be 20 by 50 feet with water flowing through it constantly. A four-foot apron of cement will form a walk completely around the pool. A two-rail cement fence will surround the wall thus enclosing the pool.

A 10 by 10 foot-bath house for dressing and showering will be located on one corner of the pool at the shallow end. The bath house will be of concrete block construction. The depth will range from 3 to 7 feet. An 8-inch

drain will provide the necessary drainage so that the floor and sides can be cleaned regularly.

An outdoor shelter 16 by 32 feet will provide an assembling area in case of a rain or for large gatherings and demonstrations. It will have a concrete floor and a pitched roof supported by five poles on each side. Provisions will also be made for an up-to-date rifle range with 8 shooting stands and a filed archery course.

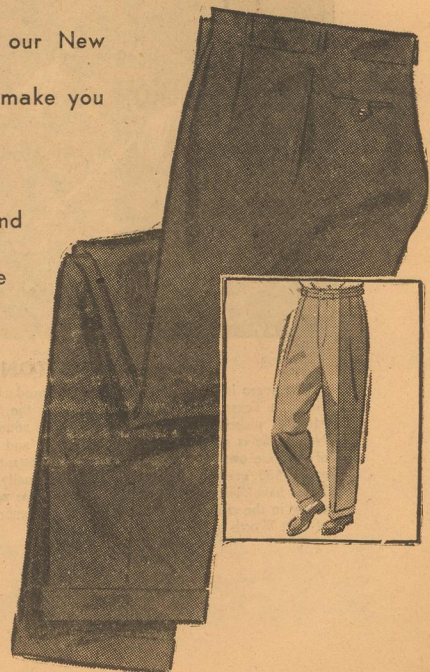
