WISD trustees set new election structure in motion

The Winters Independent lives in each district. School District Board of Trustees phased in the new election structure on Monday, December 20.

The new five district, two atlarge election system was implemented as a result of a lawsuit against WISD, brought in May by the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC).

The purpose of the lawsuit was to promote minority representation on the board. When the suit was settled in October, the five and two plan was approved.

Within the guidelines of the Texas Education Code, WISD Trustees designated districts six (6) and seven (7) as the at-large districts. The single-menber districts are one (1) through five (5). pire.

The school administration is still interpreting the district geographical lines to determine who

Districts 3 and 4 will have elections on May 7, 1994, to determine the trustees representing them. A person elected from a particular district must live in that district if elected. Only persons from those districts can vote.


Elections will be held for the other districts when the incumbents' terms expire.

In trustee elections for the atlarge districts, 6 and 7, all registered voters will be allowed to vote. Elections will be held in these districts in 1995 and 1996.

views on oil prices for the coming pens (i.e., PLO/Israeli problems, year. The task is made especially difficult this year based on the volatility of late in oil prices with an emphasis on the downside, but I will give it a shot.

First, a little background setting is in order.

Oil prices have dropped to lows not seen since the mid-80's, and the mood is decidedly gloomy. OPEC is not interested in supporting price at the expense of market share. The perception of a this time last year. The entire oilglut prevails. The conventional wisdom is that we are in an extended period of oversupply that will entail a several-year period of low oil prices. Worse yet, gas prices are being dragged down with oil.

Further, the government has come out with a plan to become more involved in everyone's business, while promoting all other fuels except oil--in fact the document ignores domestic oil production altogether.

Let's look at the market facts and try to separate them from the perceptions that grip the market at this time.

The supply of oil is not that much larger than the demand, despite all information being reported by the media to the contrary. The perception prevails for now because of fear. The fear of OPEC totally losing any control over production. The fear of Iraq entering the selling market. The fear of the unknown.

In actuality, there is a rough balance between supply and demand that could not stand major disruptions without tightening supplies. Yes, the North Sea is increasing production, as are other non-OPEC suppliers. But, they are small contributors compared with OPEC, the USA, and the former Soviet Union (FSU). If any one of those suppliers were to cut back production significantly, prices will rebound in a hurry.

Gas supply-demand balance is even more precarious, but prices continue down. This results from varying market forces.

Traders perceive gas and oil as the same product when trading futures for some reason. (They don't know any better, so prices of each tend to move in unison on sudden movements down or up). Also, utilities that use gas can now switch to fuel oil or coal much quicker than they could previously. This is the result of good planning on their part considering the volatility of supply of gas and fuel oil and the price swings each encounter. Thus, they can switch to cheaper fuel oil, lowering the demand for gas. Finally, the winter has not been a cold one up to mid-December, so gas inventories are relatively high for this time of year.

So, where does it all go from here?

I see oil prices at \$13-15 for the first six months of 1994.

This price range will be predominant because the current supply market perception will continue until something turns it on its head. That something will probably occur in late summer when

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This is the time when I give my something in the Middle East hap-Iraqi trouble, or OPEC production tightening).

But, even then, I see prices slowly climbing back to \$18 as a peak for the year. If the winter is harsh is late 1994, then prices could reach \$19-20. The conventional wisdom is right in that there is enough oil available to depress the prevailing prices for the entire year at a level about \$2 below where they were expected to be at buying industry's mindset is that oil prices are going to be below \$18, as opposed to earlier estimates of \$20. This does not bode well for prices sans a major supply disruption.

Over the longer term, oil prices will face a major watershed event in 1995 or 1996 as imports reach 60 or even 70 percent of domestic consumption. At that level of dependence, markets will be very nervous and prices could spike

Gas prices are going to suffer for another few weeks then head back to where they were in November. The weather is turning cold in the days before and after Christmas and inventories will be drawn down. Prices will stay between \$1.90 and \$2.50 until the end of 1994.

Not the best of New Year's greetings I realize, but we should all prepare to deal with this year of lower product prices. If anybody can do it, you can.

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

C.F. "Fat" Marek


ROWENA—C.F. "Fat" Marek, age 84, died Sunday, December 26, 1993, at his residence.



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



Christmas is a time. One of the carols we sing has this line," It's Christmas time, Christmas time." Many times it seems all too short. And when you try to cram all the cards, gifts, dinners, and get togethers in one 24 hour period, or even 48 hours, it's just too short.

Maybe that's why some traditions celebrate the 12 days of Christmas. From December 25 to January 6. Spread out the time. Not to be in such a hurry. Give time to lower your bucket into the well spring of your soul, and pull up the memories, and drink deep of Christmas past.

I started that early this year. Pulling up old memories is like taking ornaments out of the box. As I dust them off, these remembrances, and hang them on the branches of my conscious mind, they fill up my inner being with the beauty of the best.

Like when my father told me about what his father did each Christmas. Every Christmas Eve, while the kids were sitting around waiting for supper and for the few gifts under the tree, Grandpa Hanson would bundle up and trudge through the snow out to the barn. The cattle were in their stalls. And in the silence and stillness, he would dish out a double portion of oats or ground feed for each one. Because, as he put it, "They received the Christ child. They made room for him." And after that ritual, he would come back to the house to celebrate.

Mother told me about their Christmas celebration. The emphasis was on food. The Christmas Eve dinner was the big one. They had all kinds of traditional foods. There was meat and potatoes, of course. And also a fish, called "ludefish." This was cod, soaked in lye to preserve it, and then to prepare it, soaked in water and then boiled. Then served with melted butter. It was not my favorite food. There was also a potato tortilla, soft, and when buttered and sugared, was so tasty. Young men were known to fight over the last piece. And fancy cookies. And a fruit soup, served hot. Mouth watering. But before dinner, some carols sung by the family. Grandpa would read the Christmas gospel. And you can be sure, that the Christmas when God gave them baby Marie, my mother, he read that story with a deeper meaning than ever before.

Mother also told me about the first Christmas she and dad had together. She had wanted to get him something special. She saved up a few dollars, and on Christmas Eve, went to the general store. On the wall was hanging a pair of sleigh bells. That was just what she wanted. Those sleigh bells would keep her beloved husband company as he drove his team of horses home after dark, coming back from an evening service in a country church. When she asked the owner the price, he replied, "Twelve dollars a pair." When he saw the look on mother's face, he asked, "How much money do you have.?" Mother said, "Three dollars." And he said, "Today, I'll give you one for three dollars." Then when he was wrapping them up, he said, "I'm going to give you the other one, it's my present to you." You can imaging her joy and gratitude.

Ramona and I have our share of memories too. When we talk about ing back into the hills to get a real tree, buying presents, cooking "ludefish" for the first time, our first Christmas away from family, our second Christmas when Nathan, our first born was gently placed under the tree, a living reminder of that first born of all creation, and who Christmas is all about, our hearts are warmed and faith is reborn. And that's what Christmas is for, a time to remember and believe.

> As the story of Moses was reviewed, I recalled the time I stood on Mt. Nebo on an international tour with a group of Texans back in 1979. After a long journey by air and sea we landed at Amman,

While we sped along in an airconditioned bus, a guide supplied us with information about the area.

The name Amman means "city of many waters." Of the two mil-Jordan, one million live in the capital city of Amman. They are kets. the descendants of Lot's youngest daughter.

Only 11 percent of the land is fertile. The rainy season is from October to April and the average yearly rainfall is only 13 inches. Crops of wheat, barley, lentils and tobacco are produced. Wild pepper is grown where the land is irrigated. Grapevines and olive trees could be seen along the road which is the ancient "King's High-

We traveled this highway to Mt. Nebo, about 45 minutes from Amman, where Moses stood and viewed the Promised Land. The weather became hotter and the land more arid with little vegetation in sight.

The bus load of travelers stood on Mt. Nebo and viewed the beautiful valley but none seemed inof the heat, so we missed the Promchapel on the hill and visited with

Mt. Nebo overlooks the entire Dead Sea, which covers 400 square miles and is 1300 feet below sea level, the lowest spot on earth. There is little vegetation around the Dead Sea, but many valuable minerals have been discovered in its waters and health resorts are becoming more numerous in the area.

Unusual black shelters dotted the almost barren fields along the roadside. They were pointed out as the homes of the nomadic bedouin who roam the deserts and fields in search of food for their herds of sheep, goats and camels. They prefer to use the black goat wool for their tents because it will last from 100 to 150 years, provide more shade and will not stretch when wet. There are about 38,000 of these nomads in North

It was plain to be seen that their limited desert economy was no longer adequate to meet the needs of the bedouin, but the subject was not mentioned again until some of our group went to a Thursday sale, which is carried on each week by the bedouin. They spread their wares on the ground and a lion, 700 thousand inhabitants of little of everything is sold including copper kettles and camel blan-

Even in 1979, there was fear that the bedouin will vanish, these proud but silent dark-skinned people of the desert.

There is little choice but to look for other sources of income outside the bedouin regions. Many males have joined the army or have become employees in central government offices.

Ninety-five percent live in permanent houses made of stone, concrete or sun-dried clay. Many enjoy piped water but few have electricity, and depend on kerosene fuel for light and heat.

Today's universal toy, the transistor radio, is a common possession; many women have their own sewing machines, and a fair number of bedouin today move about in cars on pickup trucks.


