## Boles and Sims repeat 7-2A tennis champs

The Winters High School tennis teams brought home several awards from district competition last Wednesday and Thursday.

Play began in 29 degree weather at Abilene Christian University. Then games and temperatures heated throughout the first day of matches.

The varsity doubles team of Jennifer Boles and Jamie Sims, seeded #1 in the tournament, coasted to another district championship with victories over Rotan's #2 team, Haskell, and Rotan's #1 team. Boles and Sims will advance to regional competition April 28 and 29 at Abilene Christian University.

WHS senior Rhonda Bethel took third place in varsity girls singles play. Other girls competing on the varsity team were Brenna Mikeska and LisAnne Smith, doubles; and Jennifer Matthews, singles.

Chadd Springer and Jonathan Cobb won 3rd place in varsity boys doubles. They actually played in the championship match and lost a close one to the #1 Jim Ned team but because of the UIL rules, the #2 team must play the #3 team if they have not played each other already. So from their #2 standing, Springer and Cobb had to play a Rotan team which was in third place. That match took place on Thursday, April 7, on a very windy day, and the Winters duo lost a heartbreaker to Rotan.

Mikey Hernandez and John Biddix made up the second varsity doubles team for Winters, while Archie Lancaster and Willie Brown played singles.

Tennis coach Biff White said, "This was a good showing for us

As editor of this paper and mother of a competing tennis player, I was most privileged to watch the Winters High School tennis players compete in district play last week.

As most parents know, watching your child compete is always more difficult than playing the sport yourself. I feel the regular "butterflies" that competitors have before a contest, but mine always seem to last until the final buzzer, point or race whenever it involves my children.

So watching my daughter play in the district championship match last week was another opportunity for the "killer butterflies" to consume me.

But this time it was a little different. Not because the court was different or the rules unchanged. Not because my daughter cared any less about repeating her district title. She wanted to win, I knew that. So did her partner, Jamie.

In fact, Jamie is what made this competition even more special. To see Jamie out on the tennis court, in the cold wind or hot sun, pounding that ball with all her might, is not to be taken lightly. To see Jamie at all is nothing short of a miracle.

As many of you know, Jamie

was involved in a serious car accident last September and remained in a coma for four weeks. She was in intensive care for six weeks following several surgical procedures to save her life. Her parents were told that Jamie would have some visual problems and paralysis on the left side of her body due to the brain surgery. Each day was filled with anguish and anticipation.

I visited Jamie in intensive care and my heart broke for her and her parents. Things like that weren't supposed to happen to strong, young, fun-loving kids. Especially this kid who lives behind my house and played tennis with my daughter and me for several years. How could this happen? What would the future hold for this child?

While none of us know what the future holds, we can at least be certain of Who holds the future.

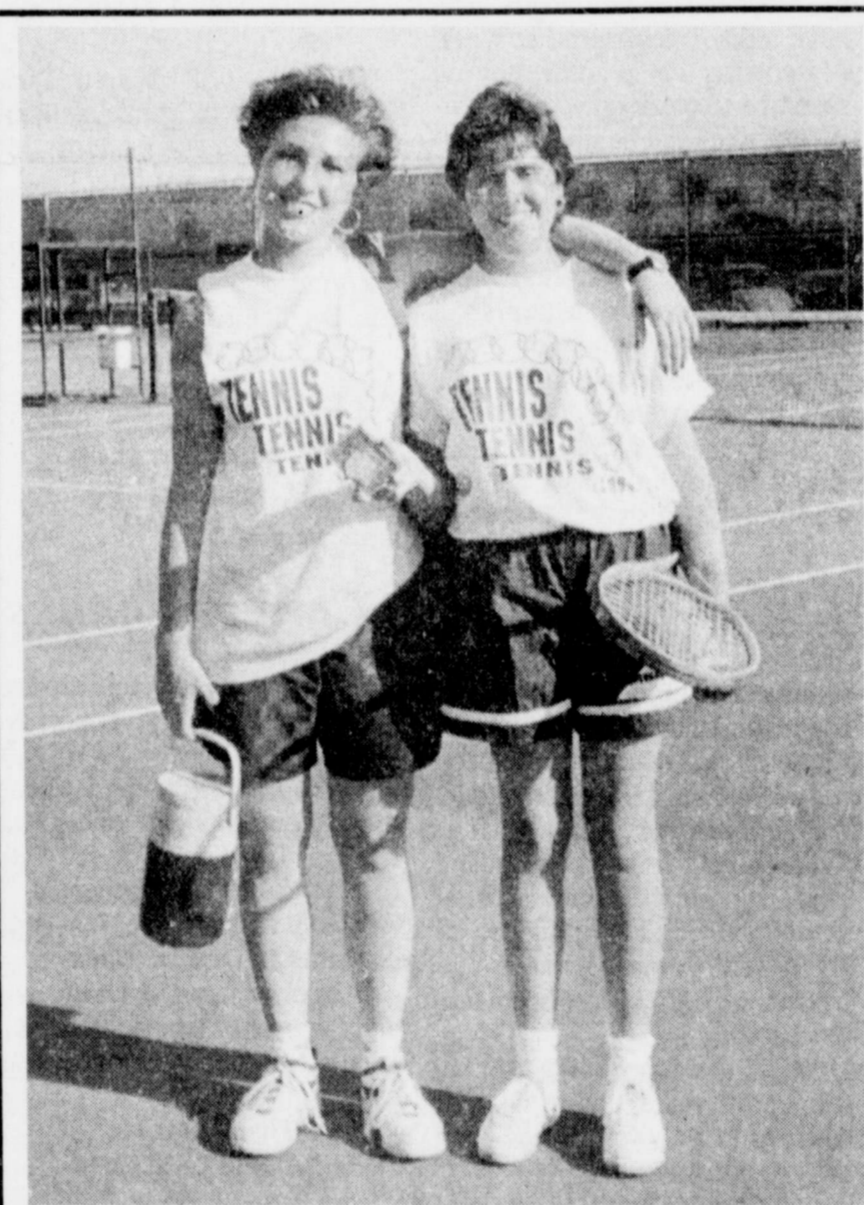
Mountains of prayers were prayed and oceans of tears were shed for Jamie and her parents. We needed a miracle.

With barely more than two inches of rain in almost four months, drought conditions have been setting in quickly.

Mike Mauldin, Runnels County Extension Agent, reports that the wheat outlook looks pretty poor right now.

"Many farmers are grazing their wheat out or baling their small grains due to the drought," says Mauldin. "Grain sorghum planting is on hold until we get some good rain."

"Pasture conditions are also looking pretty sad," Mauldin continues. "Some pastures were green two weeks ago but that was wild rye and now it's gone. Stock water in south Runnels County is critically low."

In an effort to hurry the much

needed rains, a community-wide prayer service was hosted at the First Baptist Church Sunday evening. Worshipers of all faiths gathered for a single purpose — pray for rain. And pray they did.

At approximately 5:00 a.m. Monday, these prayers were answered as some wonderful rain fell.

While Winters residents reported a scant one-tenth of an inch in town, Wingate received about a half inch, while a good inch or so fell at the Shep area and also at Moro Mountain.

The rain was certainly good while it lasted. Now if we could just have a repeat performance. The question is — who makes the next move. Or should we ask when is the next prayer session?

## From birthday to career

Billie Whitlow's 81st birthday was April 3 which came on Easter Sunday. This made it convenient for her children to give her a surprise party.

Her children, Jerry B. and Beth, had invited her over for Sunday dinner. Son Kay and children, Julia, Matthew and Jessica had arrived from Houston. This pleased Billie greatly and she wished all of her children could be with her on this day.

When Billie arrived at her appointment for dinner she was shocked at the number of cars around the Whitlow's house. But when she entered everyone shouted, all 22 of them, "Happy Birthday, Gran-Billie."

They were all there. Others present were Cheryl and Keith Simmons of Dallas and children Chadd and Stacy Springer; Tanya Peugh and son Chris of Ft. Worth; Jessie and Nell Whitlow from the Rocker B Ranch in Irran County and their children Kaci, Tate and Jace; Mark and Ricci Whitlow and children Colby and Madeline from San Angelo.

Before the honoree could get her breath she was showered with gifts, flowers and a huge birthday cake. There was a lot of laughter as the children said, "This is one party that Gran-Billie didn't plan."

"It is a long-standing joke in our family, that I have to be the leader," said Billie. In the afternoon there was an Easter egg hunt for the children, and knowing Billie, I'm sure she was out hunting Easter eggs, for her greatest joy is entertaining her grandchildren.

This comes naturally for Whitlow, who spent 28 years as cafeteria supervisor in the Winters school. In addition to seeing that more than 600 children were fed each day, she took time out to plan unusual dishes and treats for the many dinners and banquets her staff served.

Whitlow liked the financial management best of all. She also enjoyed planning menus and making them attractive. She attended the workshops held in Lubbock at Texas Tech each summer, and attended the Food Service Convention each year.

School cafeterias have come a long way since Whitlow began her work in 1944 with two ordinary size kitchen stoves. One of

the oven doors was held up with a screen door spring. There was also a one-compartment sink, benches and wooden-top tables.

The cafeteria began in a room at the high school building but was moved into the remodeled rock high school building the year that Whitlow began her work.

Finally, an automatic washer and dryer was installed to care for cup towels. An electric slicer, food chopper, 20-quart mixer and a 60-quart mixer completed the improvements added during the time L.L. Lasater was superintendent of schools.

Whitlow says they were so proud of the new 60-quart mixer which creamed enough potatoes for 600 at one time. "We mixed all our meatloaf and salmon croquettes on this machine, and prepared all batter for rolls or cookies at one mixing."

To simplify serving, there were steam tables, cook tables, a stainless steel reach-in box for vegetables and desserts, dishwasher and double line serving counter. When the cafeteria was moved to its present building, the only equipment added at that time was \$500 worth of green plastic compartment plates.

In 1967 school lunches were raised 5 cents a plate to 35 cents for children through the sixth grade and 40 cents for seventh grade and above. This was the first and only price advance in school lunches in the 28 years.

"If we operated well on the amount of money we had, it was due to the fact we were all in one building," said Billie. "We could economize on space. Also, the workers doubled their services for each had more than one job."

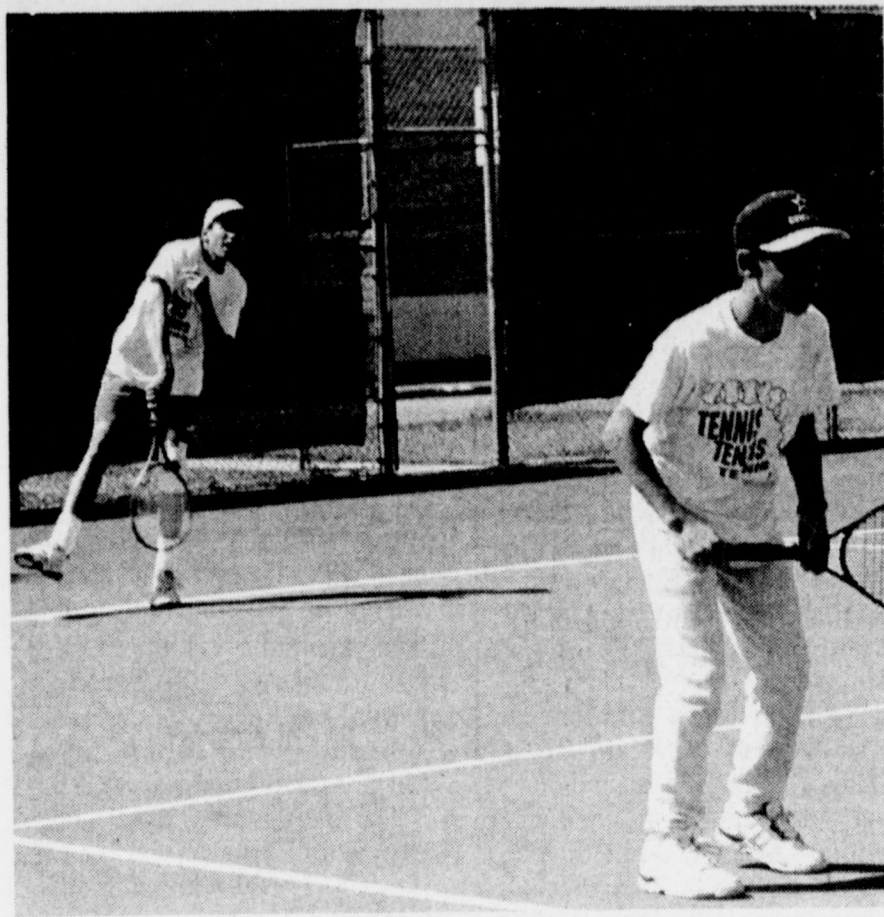

## From The Well

Her name was Pearl. Pearl Jackson. And, she was one. Like what Jesus talked about in Matthew 13:45 and 46, "The kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls; on finding one pearl of great value, he went and sold all that he had and bought it." She was not the kingdom. But she surely was and is one in the kingdom. A gem. Precious. And polished.

The first time I really met her was after one of our worship services at the Nursing Home on Wednesday morning. That day I had preached on the presence of God, and how important it was for us to take care of our souls. Almost immediately after the service, this little lady came up to me and said, "Soul, soul... what is a soul? People don't talk about souls anymore." I said, "I do." She said, "Well, come to my room and let's talk about it."

That day marked the beginning of a good friendship. This 100 year old teacher and this 65 year old preacher had some really good "go-rounds". She must have really been a good teacher, because she was a good student. She asked all the tough questions - "Why is there so much pain in the world?", "Why do good people have to suffer?", "What happens after we die?" And she wanted good answers.

She talked about her experiences in the class room. Having lived for her students, she lived on the memories of them. She told of one of her students who came to see her long after she had retired. She was tired of living and wanted to die. She turned to him and asked, "Why doesn't God let me die?" He thought a moment, and then replied, "Because God doesn't need another boss!" And, then, she chuckled. Because it was true - she had been a strict disciplinarian. A task-master. Learning is not easy. It takes effort and concentration and stick-to-it-iveness. She gave her teaching her best. And she expected the same of her students.

She knew how to help her students "catch on". Because typing is sort of like playing the piano - it helps if you have a sense of timing and rhythm - she brought into her room a record player and a record. And the students would type along to the music. It helped. The only problem was that, after a while, hearing the same record became somewhat monotonous. Especially to the custodian who was out in the hall. So, one day he brought her another one. She wasn't offended. She said, "I knew it was bothering him and wondered what he would do about it!"

She kept on learning all of her life. When she knew her eye-sight was going bad, she started to memorize poetry, to fill her mind with good thoughts, to store them up for use when she couldn't read anymore. And she kept on teaching, showing us how to live. When she moved into the nursing home, she did not give up. She made of her room a hospitality place. She received her friends and her guests there. She had some books, and she did some writing. But she also served. She went up and down the halls - visiting her neighbors, trying to help them. One of her last acts in the home was to give a new patient a back rub. Two days later she died.

She was no stranger to death. She had been there when her father died when she was 12, and years later when her husband died. She sat with brothers and sisters when they died. She was not afraid. When her final hour was about to come, lying in a hospital bed in Abilene, waiting for surgery the next morning, she told her cousin, "I'm not going to have surgery in the morning. I'm going home." And she did. Her last lesson to us was, how to die. And her greatest lesson to us - no matter where how old you are, or who you are, give life your best. "Trust and obey. There is no other way."

Thanks, Pearl. Blessed are you. And, blessed are we - because of having known you. Thank God.

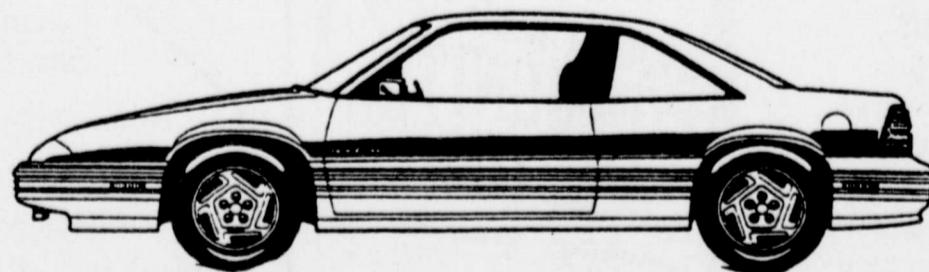

## The Education of a Small Town Doc

Keith Boles has signed a contract with North Runnels Hospital to come back and practice medicine in Winters once he is through with medical school and his residency. At this time, he is a second year medical student at Texas Tech in Lubbock.

Hello Winters! Sorry it's been so long! As one of my classmates said, medical school is like trying to drink from a fire hydrant. And here lately, they've been tweaking the valve open a tad bit more. I apologize for not writing sooner.

In my last article I promised to talk about the Clinton Health Plan in this article. But, hey, politics is boring and from the way it looks now the final product may look nothing like the existing plan. So, why talk about it? Instead, I'll update you on what's happening with school which is more the purpose of this article.

I just finished a test block on Thursday (3/31) so Lori and I relaxed this past weekend. I went fishing at White River Lake on Friday but didn't have much luck. I caught a 21" Walleye there last year!

Two things are making life a bit more tense this spring than usual. One is the USMLE and the other is not knowing where Lori and I will be living next year.

USMLE stands for United States Medical Licensing Exam. There are three exams total. I take the first one on June 8th and 9th. All medical students must take (and pass!) these exams in order to become a licensed or "board-certified" physician. The "board" in board-certified is either the National Board of Medical Examiners or the appropriate state medical board.

In the U.S., a license to practice medicine is granted only by state medical boards. They each have their own rules but all 50 require passage of a licensing examination. It is expected that in the very near future all will accept the USMLE.

There used to be two different licensing exams: the FLEX (Federal Licensing Examination) and

the NBME (National Board of Medical Examiners). The USMLE has replaced these two in an effort to make licensure more standard and uniform across the nation. Every medical student in the U.S. must take the same series of three exams in order to be licensed.

The first exam is taken in June between years two and three of medical school. The second is taken during the spring of the fourth year. The third is taken in the summer after the first year of residency.

Let's talk about the one I'm most concerned about, the first one (officially called USMLE Step 1). It's a two-day examination with approximately 800 multiple choice questions. The exam is broken into four 3-hour sessions with about 200 questions per session. If you're calculating like I am, that's a little less than a minute per question. Not much time for dilly-dallying. The big kicker is that it covers all the material we've covered in the first two years of school and we only have three weeks to study for it. There's not much time during the regular semesters to prepare for it.

There is some comfort in the fact that the average passing grade for all U.S. medical students is about 60%. And I've heard that if a student has done at least fair over the first two years and conducts a decent review in the three weeks allotted, he or she should have no problem passing.

But still I have these unrealistic scenarios run through my head every now and then. Like, forgetting to set my alarm and sleeping through part of the exam or completely going blank in the middle of the exam and not even being able to remember my name. Then there's the one where my car breaks down on the way to the



exam or the one where the electricity goes out during the night and completely messes up the three alarm clocks I have set and I wake up two hours late. These are completely unrealistic, I know, but every medical student has had these thoughts at one time or another, I assure you. Needless to say, I'll have at least three alarm clocks set for the mornings of the exam, at least two of which will be battery powered and I'll leave two hours early for the exam so I can walk the rest of the way if my vehicle breaks down. Ha! There's not much I can do to keep my mind from going blank.

Concerning our city of residence for next year, at Tech they divide the class into thirds and send one-third to Amarillo, one-third to El Paso and one-third stay in Lubbock to complete their third and fourth years. Currently, Lori and I are scheduled to go to Amarillo but we would really like to stay in Lubbock. Lori has a really good job, she is able to take classes at Tech, and we've made lots of friends through our church here. Tech does have a campus transfer policy. If a student has a good excuse and a space is available, they can be granted a campus transfer to Lubbock.

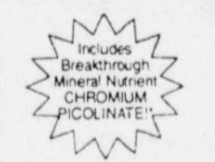
